Percy was born on 13th
August 1921 and baptised
Percival Charles Ignatius
Desmier in,S't Mary's
Cathedral Trichonopoly
(now known as Tiruchirupalli. he died on 16th
November 1992 at the age of
7I and was buried in his
grandmother's grave in the
Cathedral cemetery. The
following account of Percy
was sent to me by Winifred his
wife.



When the British-Indian army was at war with Japan, many of our boys were serving with them including Percy. He had on his uniform with three stripes so I think that he was a Sergeant or Warrant Officer, I am not sure. Anyway he and the forces came to Burma. It was only in the last faze of the war that he came to my area (Moulamein. South Burma) with the Beach. Group. He was a Security Officer and knew all about us, our families etc. We

were under house arrest and only allowed to do some marketing and to attend Sunday Church services.

Since he was a Catholic he came to pick us up to attend Mass and to bring us home safe and sound. Here my dear mother used to cater for the boys who came to our house. She used to say "Poor boys, they must be missing their homes." and so she fed them.

and the surrender of the Japanese army some 48 manding, after that he was sent back to the Signal miles from our home at a place called Amherst, centre at Jabalpur where he put in his resignation There were many families.

I was a working girl, my sisters Irene, Leonie and Mildred all knew Percy. When the war ended and he had to return home to India Percy approached my father and asked for my hand in marriage.

After arrangements on his side and mine we got engaged on my father's birthday, 10th February and then married on 27th December 1947 which is my birthday. I returned to India with Percy on 8th February 1948.

When the British left India later that year

our boys joined the Indian Armed Forces. After a course at Poona Percy passed out as a 2nd Lieutenant and subsequently joined the signal corps. He has been stationed at Calcutta, Delhi, Meerut, Jullandar, Mathura, Ranchi (where our daughter Dorothy was born in 1958) back to Julandar, Ferozepore and then Goa after it was being taken over from the Portugese.

His last post was Jabalpur. Then he was A year later, towards the end of the war sent to Karrakudi to the N.C.C as Officer Comthe boys would come to visit us. Percy was also in because aunty Kate (Mary wife of Francis Desmier) charge of the Cinema Section and when there was became seriously ill. After four months in hospital a good picture on he would come and pick us up. she expired on 22nd February 1976. Percy retired as a Senior Major.

> After his retirement Percy spent his time by helping the poor and needy, writing applications for them, helping them with cash or kind. He was a friend to all. He loved gardening and spent his time watering the plants daily. He loved roses best. After 16 years of retirement he became ill and died on 16th November 1992.

I have been to many places with Percy when family accomodation was available. Family life in the Army was very enjoyable, we all lived as brothers and sisters of a family.










Winifred with her daughter Dorothy and grandchildren, Joev (15 Years old) and Marie (16 vears old). The photographs were taken about two years ago.

Thomas A desmier (1867-1892)

Uncle Tom as he was known was, like the others in George Arthur Desmier (1862-1936) married the family, on the railways. He was instrumental in Winifred Maud Gordon and had a family of four the planning of the railway colony Golden Rock south east of Trichy, he was the organist at St Mary's Cathedral. The pipe organ is still in the Cathedral but remains unused. He married Mary Therese Fernandez and they raised a family of five Signalling Inspector at the time of his death of boys and four girls. Mary Eldest daughter of Thomas married Jimmy Gallyot and emigrated to Kenya where she died.

Bertram and Cyril (pictured) both worked on the railways. More on their descendants in another newsletter.

Dorothy (1905-1981) was called Done she was a nursing sister and never married.

Frederick (pictured) was a guard on the SI railway. His wife Dorothy (Doris) was Matron at the Uncle Eric in Canada more than 35 years ago General Hospital Tanjore. Cecelia known as Cissy married Freddy Jeremiah (driver South India Railways). They had five sons, (one died young but the other four are all employed by the railways) Buddie) maried Mervyn Casey and three daughters. The youngest daughter Colleen married Dominic Desmier son of Patrick Vincent Desmier and grandson of Bertram Desmier.

Here is what the Encyclopaedia Britannica has to say about Trichy:

also called TRICHONOPOLY, city, central Tamil Nadu state, southeastern India. It is on the main road and rail routes between Madras and Trivandrum and lies at the head of the Kaveri (Cauvery) River delta. It was an important regional capital of the Pallava, Cola, and Vijayanagar dynasties from the 7th to the 19th century. Its rock fortress, dominating the city, was the scene of bitter fighting between Muslim, Maratha, British, and French troops from the 17th to the 19th century. The city is now an industrial centre that has modern heavy electrical, thermal boiler, and locomotive construction workshops, alongside traditional cotton hand-weaving and cigar-rolling cottage industries. Synthetic diamonds are manufactured as well.

The city is also the site qf Bharathidasam University (1982). The surrounding Kaveri River valley is the best rice-growing region in the state and also produces sugarcane and betel. Pop. (1981) town, 362,045 metropolitan area, 609,548; (1991 prelim.) city, 386,628; metropolitan area, 771,120.
