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## James Sanders, Early Settler in Macon County, Illinois; A friend of Abe Lincoln

This biography of James Sanders is from the *History of Macon County, Illinois, From its Organization to 1876* by John W. Smith, Esq. (Springfield: Rokker's Printing House, 1876). From pages 278-280 of above history:

**JAMES SANDERS.** There are but few old settlers of the county who do not remember "Uncle Jimmy Sanders." He was one of the noted men, and almost every one knew him, by reputation at least, for an area of a great many miles. He was born in Spartanburg county, S.C., June 15, 1800, and was taken on a pack-pony when very small, to Rutherford county, Tenn., where he remained until he was grown. In 1823 he married Polly Wilson, who was born in North Carolina in 1797, and died in Christian county, Ill., in 1866.

In the year 1829, he removed with his family to Illinois, where he has remained ever since. On his arrival in Illinois, he says he had a wife, five children and an "old plug of a wagon, three old plugs of horses," one good mare, 6 1/4 cents in money. The money he had in his pocket with his shot and bullets a short time after his arrival, was accidentally lost, and he was thereby "broken up."

Mr. Sanders was a man of most powerful constitution, and his strength and endurance were probably not excelled by any man in Central Illinois. On the day of Uncle Joe Steven's wedding, Mr. S., in a general trial of strength among those persons present, took a piece of lead, 75 pounds in weight, in each hand, and raised them on a level with his shoulders, and then pressed them around straight in front until they touched each other. At one time he had been sick for some length of time, and when he had



sufficiently recovered to walk to the blackberry patch, he gathered his hat full of blackberries, and then sat down and ate them all. He returned to the house and said, "Polly, I have eat a few blackberries and feel better."

He was known far and wide as a good rail-maker, and would go as far as 15 and 20 miles and make rails for parties at 25 cents per hundred, or 37 1/2 cents in trade, which he regarded as a very liberal price. He was a man that possessed a great many peculiarities, a particular mention of which, would extend this sketch quite too far. He relates to-day, with pride, as one of his greatest achievements, the fact that he at one time in a wrestling match, threw down \*Abe Lincoln, who had thrown the bully of the county.

Of Mr. Sanders children—ELLEN was born in 1823, and now resides in Kansas. JOHN, their second son, died in the Mexican War. JAMES B. died in 1854. JANE, wife of Prestly Travis, resides in Christian county. PETER H., PEGGY, MATILDA, BETHANY and AMANDA are dead. FRANK, the youngest child, was born in March, 1845, and married Annis Hollingworth, with whom Uncle Jimmy now resides. ■ \*(See more on next page.)

## Why We Sometimes Want to Identify With the Famous

We are supposed to be serious researchers and not allow ourselves to be swayed by things like what Aunt Suzie said about our being related to President John Adams or what Grandma said she heard about our being descended from that king over in France. Right? Maybe we have never been able to prove the connections, and we know it doesn't make much difference anyway, but it sure helps when you are asked questions by your friends and relatives. I mean the ones who think you are a little "touched" because of your trips to graveyards and libraries. You need something to tell them!

John McKinley, editor of the *McKinley Newsletter*, says it's a "magnetic effect" that attracts researchers to the famous personalities. Many so-called genealogists have rushed to publish family histories of Presidents. Sometimes careful research is sacrificed in the interest of producing a marketable book.

Just be warned that any published genealogy should be taken as a guide, and not as fact, if you are interested in having carefully documented research. Likewise, any published material such as obituaries, county history biographies, or family histories (or newsletters) may not always be accurately reported, may be based on "memories," or may contain typographical errors.

There are times when this hobby gets dull, and it should also be fun. Enjoy the article here about "Uncle Jimmy" Sanders and his friendship with President Lincoln. Maybe we could just find a connection! ■

## Sanders Siftings— What It Isn't

I hope you don't expect too much from this newsletter. Here are some things it is not intended to do.

Remember that Sanders (or Saunders) is a very common name. Keep that in mind as you search. ALL of them did not descend from a common ancestor named Sanders or Saunders. ALL the Sanders in the U.S. did not descend from the same person. We are searching for *many* different Sanders families who entered America at *many* different points. Some will be connected to others and we hope that many of you readers will be able to find other family historians looking for the same ancestors.

Don't expect every Sanders with the same odd given name to be the one you are looking for. If you are putting out queries to seek help in finding your ancestor, be sure to have as much information as possible to identify that person—such as an approximate birth year, all the places the person has been at various times (that you know about), who they married—when and where, family members and information about them, etc. Everything helps.

Don't be disappointed if you end up giving more help to other readers than you are able to find through this newsletter. Be ready to help others when you see a possibility that your information just *might* be what a fellow searcher is looking for.

Remember, perseverance! And, most of all, continue to do your research through libraries, family history centers, and the writing of letters to friends and relatives, archives, etc. This newsletter

### More on Uncle Jimmy and President Lincoln

\*Note—It will be remembered in this connection (from preceding page), that Mr. Lincoln, when he first came to Illinois, was a resident of Macon county, and he and Mr. Sanders were great cronies and friends. Uncle Jim says that they spent many Sundays together fishing in the Sangamon, and were often together at barn-raising, house-raising, fox-chases and wolf-hunts. At these early gatherings, when Mr. Lincoln was an awkward gangling boy, he was often called upon, when the work was through, for a Jackson speech, and he seldom failed to respond. Mr. L.'s father was a Jackson Democrat, and his son grew up in that faith, and has made a great many Jackson speeches in this county. He afterwards changed his politics and became a Whig of the pronounced type, which incenses his father no little.

Mr. Lincoln commenced his law studies in this county under the following circumstances: He had gone to "Uncle Billy Warnick's" to see one of the girls; but in going, his shoes not being so good, he got his feet frostbitten, and was unable to return home. He remained there for a week or ten days under the medical treatment of old Mrs. Warnick, and while so doing became greatly interested in reading the statutes and a few other stray volumes of law-books, which, no doubt, afterwards materially

determined his course in adopting his profession.

It was reported in the newspapers during the campaign of 1860, that Mr. Lincoln in his early day was a great rail maker, but Mr. Sanders says that while it is true that "Abe" did make some rails, yet they were few in number.

Mr. Sanders also relates the circumstance by which Mr. L. ceased to be a resident of this county, which is this: A man by the name of Offit purchased a few hundred hogs, and Mr. Lincoln and his step-brother, John Johnson, were employed to assist in driving the hogs to market in Beardstown. When they had disposed of the hogs they invested the money in groceries, which consisted, as Uncle Jim says, of "sod corn." spun cotton, sugar and coffee, powder and lead, etc., the greater part of which were brought back as far as Salem, where they started a grocery, and Mr. Lincoln was left in charge of the goods, to keep store. This was the last of Mr. Lincoln's personal history in connection with this county.

Mr. Sanders' last interview with Lincoln was but a day or so before Lincoln's departure for Washington. As they were separating—which proved to be their last—Mr. Sanders said, "Now, Abe, don't do any wrong." Mr. Lincoln replied, "I will not, if I know it." ■

## A Follow-Up On The Grant Sanders Story

If you read the article about Grant Sanders in the last issue of *SANDERS Siftings*, you may be interested in hearing what Glenn Sanders has learned from his continuing research. We correspond quite often on the Internet. Here's a message I received from him on April 6. You can sense the excitement. Perhaps you know the feeling!

. . . Last night in the mail I *finally* received the long awaited package of Sanders information from Mrs. Mary (Sanders) Cheek in Indiana. Right out of the blue. I haven't talked to her for quite a while, and had just about given up. Every time I talked to her she promised to mail it, but never did! I don't know what moved her to do it now, but I sure did appreciate it and will have to give her a call tonight.

Lots of information on descendants of Anthony that I didn't know about, esp. his children's children, and even some later than that. Very well documented - sources, everything. She's slow, but she's thorough.

My Grandfather (Grant) wrote a few stories about growing up in Indiana in the 1870's - I don't know if I've ever shared those with you, but I did send them to Mrs. Cheek quite a while ago. One of those had to do with a 4th of July celebration, and he talks about going to his Aunt & Uncle's house, where the older folks broke out the "cherry bounce". Then they left (there was some kind of a croquet game going on, apparently all over town!) and the younger kids started to drink this stuff and got quite looped. Anyway he describes the house where this took place. Mrs. Cheek sent me a picture of the house, and it is exactly as he described, down to the cupola on top. That was pretty neat to see! Incidentally, I don't think my Grandfather enjoyed the "cherry bounce" - he was a very very strict teetotaler for the rest of his life.

Also there was a picture of Lovicy Akers Saunders, obviously taken very late in her life. That was a real thrill to see!

The most exciting part is that apparently her cousin Jack had done some research in Virginia quite a few years ago, even employed a "professional"

genealogist. He had written down that there were three men - Fleming, Robert, and Peter Saunders, who formed some sort of corporation to do business in Montgomery and Franklin counties. Fleming was Anthony's first son's name, so there must be some kind of relationship there. Also I know from marriage records that Robert had a daughter named Elizabeth - Anthony's first daughter's name. The professional had recommended that Jack send for Robert's probate records, which incredibly he never seems to have done! (Guess who I'll be writing to tonight)?

Also, there was yet another Saunders boy in the 4th Reg. VA Militia for the War of 1812 that I didn't know about - William. Anthony's 3rd son (I think) was named William. Think I'll send to the Nat'l Archives for his military info, too. . . .

Later, April 18 message:

. . . I've been busy copying the info Mrs. Cheek sent me into PAF. Birth and death dates, marriages, etc. down to Anthony's grandchildren. It helps me to enter this stuff into the computer, just taking the time to do it makes me study the family a little closer. Some of those marriages were performed by my G-G-Grandfather, Martin Rodecap! It's kind of thrilling to discover that kind of info, for some reason.

Mrs. Cheek also sent me maps of Henry and Delaware Counties from 1870 or so, which shows the property boundaries - who lived where. Many of the names keep showing up in the family tree. I think anyone who has lived in those counties for any length of time must be related to everyone else, somehow. . . .

## Pheobe Sanders Lee

The following was submitted by Carole Finley Davis, 553 E. FM 1392, Terrell, TX 75610. This story was compiled by her father-in-law, Louie Richard Davis of Hughes Springs, TX. Please contact Carol Davis if you know the identity of Phoebe's parents.

In the Cumberland mountains of Jackson County, Alabama, Pheobe Sanders married a man named Lee (a nephew of Robert E. Lee). By him she had two daughters and a son named George. After her first husband left her she fell in love with and married a full-blooded Indian by the name of Peek.

Pheobe was a very strong physical lady of whom there are many legends! I have personally talked to her last living granddaughter and she relayed to me that during the Civil War Grandmother Pheobe would bury as many as fifteen bodies in one night's time! My Uncle Tom, daddy's brother, related to me when I visited him in California that she could put both feet in a one-half bushel basket and shoulder two bushels of corn, and few men could do that!

My grandmother related to my older cousins that her husband, Peek, got to drinking more and getting drunk and rough with her and the kids! Being an Indian, her husband liked to drink whiskey and all Indians seem to become alcoholics easily! Pheobe bought some whiskey and when he got drunk she still gave him more until he passed out! Grandmother and her kids packed a little bag on their shoulder and left, going over the mountain and never saw Peek again.

Pheobe's elder daughter married Asa Fowler and is buried in the Fowler Cemetery at the head of Fowlers Cove in Jackson County, Ala. The Fowler home was partially standing when we were there in 1975. On this trip Melvin Fowler and three of his sons placed a concrete slab and metal marker on G-Grandmother Pheobe's grave.

Pheobe had two daughters, Mrs. Fowler and my grandmother, Mary Angeline Lee Davis. Mary Angeline Lee was born 22 Dec 1857. She married Martin Vanburen Davis 23 Oct 1879. She died 27 Mar 1924 and is buried at Gunsight Cemetery north of Cisco, Texas beside her husband. They had two sons and two daughters. ■

Second - I give and bequeath to my wife Sarah Saunders all my property, both real and personal, that I may be possessed of at my decease - to have and to hold the same during her life and at her decease all necessary funeral expences be paid out of said propperty.

Third - I give and bequeath to my wifes sister Ellen Elizabeth Trigg, all the propperty both real and personal that may be remaining at the decease of my wife to the said Ellen Elizabeth Trigg - and her heirs forever.

In testimony whereof, I set my hand and seal this fourteenth of July, 1877.

They had nine children: Susannah, b. 1820, m. William Castleman; William (Drew) b. 1820, m. Jiles Villers; Eli W. b. 1831; Harriet E., b. 1833, m. Nicholas Leek; Sarah, b. 1837, m. 1st to Jim Tollett, 2nd to Mr. Dyer, Elisha Hampton, b. 1839, m. Elizabeth Crawford; and John P., b. 1845, m. Misenire Myrick.

Gibson, b. before 1784, Fairfield Co, SC, died 1820 Franklin Co, MS. Their children: Mary Polly, George Washington (b. abt 1811), Ann Caroline (b. abt 1817), Elizabeth Ann, and John Wilson. Robert Sanders was appointed guardian of these children.

The earliest information I have on my g-g-grandfather, Robert Sanders, is in the 1850 Tishomingo Co, MS census:

From other records, later children were born in 1852 Ala. (Samantha), then 1854 Miss. (Ellihu), 1857 Ark. (John Henry), 1864 & 1866 Ark. (George and Andrew J.). By following the children's places of birth, I concluded that Robert and Mary (Haney) Sanders came to Arkansas between 1854-1857. They settled in IZARD Co, Ark. near the community of Dolph. They lived on what became known as "Sanders lane." Many of their descendants still live there.

Where was Robert Sanders for the years 1800-1850, which represents half his life? His tombstone lists the date of his death as 1882. What did he do for those fifty years? Who were his parents? Brothers and sisters? Who were Green and Sarah Thorn in the Robert Sanders household in 1850?

Judy Davis, 800 County Road 336, Chelsa, AL 35043 needs help in finding the parents of Joseph Sanders, b. 31 Aug 1812 SC; m. Eleanor Williams 12 Dec 1834 in Perry Co, AL. He died 7 Oct 1903 in Perry County. Their children, born from 1835 to 1854 were: Mary Elizabeth, Thomas Alexander, Margaret Louisa, John Danforth, Joseph, Jr., Benjamin F., George Washington, Rebecca Ann, Hiram Newton, and William Jefferson. One researcher has suggested that Benjamin Sanders of Dallas Co, AL may be Joseph's father.

## Something about the Saunders—back to the old country

The following was received from Tom Fredericks, 1664 Larch St., Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada B3H 3X1, [ac636@ccn.cs.dal.ca]

Ora Jackson Saunders, the authoress of the Saunders family material which formed the nucleus of this family genealogy, writes ..... "the text which follows was excerpted from "an old book in a genealogical library in Boston" [doubtless the NEGHS].

"The name Saunders is one of German origin, and the first holder was Robert, Lord of Innsbruck. His son was Charles; then came Charles Junior, then David, Robert, Eula (who married Annulla, daughter of Hebe, Prince of Denmark). His son Harlowen Saunders came to England in 1370 and married Marianna, daughter of Sir Edward Marsh.

"They lived in Northampton and Buckingham until the reign of Charles II [1660-1685]. About this time the family removed to Ireland where they owned lands in County Wicklow, Kildare, Meath and Dublin. They were active in local government. John Stafford Saunders was a Lt. General in the army and his nephew, Edward Henry, Royal Navy, was killed while sailing home during the War of 1812 when his ship was captured.

"The line continues as follows: Sir Harlowen, Sir Robert, Sir Charles, etc. until we get to Cromwell's time when nearly all the Saunders turned their backs on the Crown and became Roundheads. By this time they incurred the terrible enmity of the Crown and this led to the disruption of the family. Old parish books tell us the history of the heads of this family who clustered principally about Weeke, Parish of Downton, County of Wilts. In Weeke there was a quaint old house with a tract of many acres. I [Marshall Saunders] was able to secure a picture of it, and often show it among the slides in my lectures. I have also a wood cut of the fine old village church still standing and visited by the descendants of the many Saunders, men and women, who came from England in 1620 and succeeding years. In John Saunders' will he calls himself "I, John Saunders of Weeke, in ye parish of Downton, in ye county of

Wilts, Old England" [Wayne Neily believes that this is the John Saunders who married Hester Rolfe]. The will was sealed with the crest of the Saunders arms, an elephant's head. John Saunders body was in New England, but his heart remained in the Old Land. The persecutions endured in England were pathetic. The Reverend Lawrence Saunders was murdered [Wayne Neily reports that he was burned at Coventry, in 1555, and that his great grandson, Thomas Saunders, was born in Amsterdam and removed to New Amsterdam in 1636. There is no known relationship to our Saunders line.] with Cranmer and Latimer. Sir Edward Saunders went to the Southern States. He was in the Old Virginia Settlement affair, and with Lord Cavendish and Sir Edmund Sackville, was assisted by a worthy and wealthy merchant of London, Thomas Weston, who was largely engaged in the fisheries on the Nova Scotia coast".

In America the Saunders family were among the founders of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Benjamin Franklin used the pseudonym Richard Saunders for his "Poor Richards Almanac".

Ora Jackson Saunders continues .... "The Saunders coat of arms, with three elephant heads may spring from Sanders of Northants, before the end of the Middle Ages. The Elephant heads which speak of Alexander the Great, patron of all Sanders.

"Other old books tell of the heads of this family around Downton, Wilts, Weeke "a quaint old house with large lands". This disrupted family came to New England around 1620 and succeeding years".

From many books of the 16th and 17th century we find them people of culture and money. They became freemen right away and took an active part in the places they settled. It is believed that their reasons for leaving the Old Country were either political or religious. Bloody Mary had some of them beheaded for being Protestants; notably Sir Lawrence whose only child became Sir Samuel, father of Sir Henry, who may be in our direct line.

Sir Edward went to the Southern States [Old Virginia Settlement]. He was associated with Lord Cavendish and Sir

Edward Sackville and was largely engaged in fisheries on the Nova Scotia coast.

The Historical Library [49nd Street & 5th Ave, New York, New York] has a reference to Christopher and Joseph Saunders [Holmes gives Christopher and George]; brothers in Windsor, Connecticut. These two brothers quarreled and dissolved business partnership. Both were wealthy men.

John Saunders owned many ships and was one of the outstanding Saunders in New England of his generation. John was born in Wiltshire and owned much land there. He had a brother, William, a sea captain, who also owned ships. After 1623 John and William used their ships to bring to America their relations and neighbours from Wiltshire. They colonized four places in Massachusetts and one in Rhode Island [Saunders, Sandeys, Saundersville, Saunderstown]. These shipowners also took people to Virginia, North and South Carolina and some to Canada.

Nearly all their immediate family settled in Salem, Massachusetts, which later Salem became part of New Hampshire. Here William, John and their cousin, Sir Henry, started a ship building business. John settled there in 1631. He made many trips to England and to Barbados. He frequently conferred with Queen Elizabeth about conditions in Massachusetts and stopped the cruel treatment of the Quakers. A very prominent man, he also succeeded in stopping that cruel "gang" of Puritans and their whipping posts in Salem, Boston, Newport and other places. One of his nieces or cousins returned to England to be a lady in waiting to Queen Elizabeth [Mary Saunders, born in Massachusetts]. ■

### **Pssst . . . Want a Tip?**

There is a mountain of Sanders material in the Litchfield, IL, Public Library. Back in the 1960s, Walter R. Sanders collected Sanders notes from all over the country. He later donated them to his hometown library and they were bound into 15 volumes. I understand he wrote a history, too. This little library is probably the only place you'll find them. ■

Not much is known of the parents or origin of Joseph of the eldest generation. According to family tradition, Joseph Sanders and wife Mary came from England and apparently first settled in South Carolina.

Henry, son of Mary and Joseph, was captured by the British at the Battle of Rocky Mount, near his home, as he was gathering acorns to feed General Green's starving army. After being confined for some time, he escaped and continued fighting in the Revolutionary cause until the war ended. He was among the first to volunteer for the Rev. War, and was in service until the Battle of Yorktown. ■
