**S**EVEN sons of A. B. Cass, president of the Los Angeles Young Men's Christian Association and president of the Southern California Telephone Company, 716 South Olive street, are in the war service of the United States.

Two of the seven already are in France, one is serving in the Navy, three are in training camps in the United States, and the seventh son, just 18 years old, has passed his physical examination and is awaiting call by the Government.

## INFLUENZA WANING L. A., SAY OFFICIALS

The reduction in the number of cases of influenza reported to the health department today was indicating continuation of the downward trend shown by yesterday's figures.

At 10 o'clock this morning there were but 304 new cases reported to the health office, or more than 100 less than at the same hour yesterday.

The grand total yesterday was 1,038 new cases and 34 deaths. This was 310 cases fewer than the day before and a reduction of eight in the death toll.

The situation at the municipal influenza hospital was also easing. S. D. Brooks, surgeon in charge, reported 85 patients in the hospital.

Seven new cases were admitted yesterday, eight were discharged and two died last night, making a total of 1,038 patients admitted, 193 discharged and 63 deaths.

The work of equipping the convalescent home for influenza patients was continued today at the Mt. Arlington hotel.

Dr. Powers, health commissioner, said he hoped to open the hospital Monday or Tuesday.

Dr. Powers today entertained the hope that the situation is really improving, and that the five-day period usually required to reach the full intensity of the disease has expired, a steady decline being marked from day to day.

There will be no raising of the quarantine. This was announced positively by the medical board. Both the Army and

William T. Cass, 18 years old, the youngest of the seven brothers, has just been favorably passed and now is subject to call any day.

Mr. and Mrs. Cass live at 1601 South Fair Oaks avenue, Pasadena. They have two daughters and three other sons, who would like to be in the service, making a family of 12, all real Americans.
