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P R E F A C E

The work which eventually resulted in this book was begun when the writer became historian of the Michael Walter Reunion Association of Somerset County, Pa. It was greatly extended when he found this Walter Family closely associated with the Ankeny Pioneers in the Somerset settlements,- Michael's wife Catherine being a sister to the Ankeny brothers. Thus both Walter and Ankeny data were collected and arranged so as to reconstruct a complete family tree for the present widely dispersed members of this notable family.

The material for this sketch of the Ankeny Family, descendants of the pioneer Dewald, has been gathered from various sources. Much of the traditional part was given by several persons locally interested in the family; some was obtained by correspondence. Most of the relationships, names and dates, have been obtained from the various records found in the county histories, court records, church and cemetery records; and a few from living members of the clan. So it would be impossible to give credit to all who have contributed in some way or other. But among those who have done so in the largest measure, one should mention the following: Mrs. John Zimmerman, Somerset, Pa., Mrs. Martha Ankency, Hagerstown, Md., Mrs. Webb Souers, and Mrs. Mary Hunter, Des Moines, Ia., Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Ankeny, of Confluence, Pa., Mr. Karl Brown, Youngstown, O., Mrs. Pearl Buss, Silverton, Ore., Mrs. Wilbur Ankeny, Mr. George W. Ankeny, and Mrs. George Maxwell, Portland, Ore., Mr. W. E. Corpenning, Connellsville, Pa., Mrs. T. Blair Williston, Cleveland, O., Mr. Geo. B. Chorpenning, Clarksburg, W. Va., Mr. Ira I. Chorpenning, Washington, D. C., and Mr. William Ankeny, Johnstown, Pa. To all these persons the writer wishes to express his sincere thanks.

Many others answered one or two inquiries and thus contributed also in a smaller way, and to these the writer is also grateful. Unfortunately many who could have given much needed data to fill in blank spaces in the family outline failed to answer the inquiries. Much is also due to the courtesy of Dr. E. C. Saylor, Berlin, Pa., who allowed the writer free access to his vast collection of Somerset County records of early families which he has gathered from court, church and cemetery sources. Finally one should not overlook the aid given by officials of many Historical Societies and Court Houses in many places, this aid being generally given without compensation. It is the writer's hope that the result as given in this book may be worth all the effort expended.

One of the Pioneers in the later Colonial period of Pennsylvania and the father of other Pioneers of the Revolutionary period is the subject of this sketch, Dewald Ankeny, an immigrant who arrived on these shores in the year 1746. This fact is found in the list of immigrants from the Rhine Palatinate and Switzerland, by Strassburger-Hinke, and in this account we find that name in the list of passengers on the Ship Neptune which arrived at the port of Philadelphia on October 25, 1746, the name being given there as Dewalt Ancony. (We shall find that both his names were given in those early days under various spellings.) On the same ship was one Caspar Dewalt, said to have been an uncle,-brother to his mother. In the list of those who took the oath of allegiance to the king on the same date, his age was given as 18; so from that we get the date of his birth as the year 1728, which may or may not be exactly right.

From the same list of Immigrants is also found the name of Johann Nickel Agne, age 47, and wife Anna Catherine, age 38, as having come to America in 1736. The name appears later in the Bucks county records as Nicholas Onkeny, and will be referred to again. Also the list of Immigrants reveals the name Theobald Angane as having come to America in 1753. Both these names are found in a sketch of the life of Joseph Ankeny, a grandson of Dewalt, in a book, Prominent Iowans, by Brigham, as brothers of Dewalt, but this statement as well as several others in the same sketch is probably not correct, as will be shown hereafter.

By tradition, the Ankeny family originated in France, probably in Flanders, and the name was said to have been Enghen at that time. The early members of the family were Protestants and followers of the Prince of Conde and Admiral Coligny,-that is, they were Huguenots. Persecution forced them into exile, and they latter appear in the Rhine Palatinate. In the proceedings of the Pennsylvania Folklore Society, edited by the late Rev. Dr. John Baer Stoudt, is found data pertinent to this sketch from the Bavarian State Archives, found at Speyer, Germany, and other sources. In vol. 1, p. 105, Stoudt refers to several immigrants from various towns in Zweibrucken, in the Palatinate, or The Pfalz, as it is sometimes called. One of these was Peter Heyderick, of Oberalba, who left there in 1738 for Pennsylvania, and who afterwards lived a neighbor to Dewalt Ankeny in Lancaster Co., Pa. In 1736, he points out, one Johann Nickel Agne, of Einoth, left for America. In the same list was one Theobald Kieffer, to whom Dr. Stoudt refers, in a footnote, as Dewald Kieffer, the change from Theobald to Dewald being significant, as indicated later. Also from the same Oberamt (district), in 1746, came Theobald Agne and his sister, Magdalena Agne, of Lamsborn. The reference is without doubt to "our" Dewald Ankeny who came in that year. (As Nicholas and Dewald came from different towns, and ages were quite different, they probably were not brothers, as given in the account referred to above.)

Also in vol. 3, p. 19, Pennsylvania Folklore Society Proceedings, items from German newspapers which are of interest to us are quoted. On September 30, 1758, a notice by John Theobald, who had come to America in 1752, and had settled 3 miles from Ephrata, advertised for the whereabouts of his brother, Caspar Theobald, who had come to America 15 years ago. The article says John was

accompanied by his sister, Catherine, who was married on ship-board (married name not given). Dr. Stoudt again, in a footnote, refers to the dates of entrance of John Dewald and Caspar Dewald, as given in the List of Immigrants referred to above. He also mentions that John Dewald was born at HahSpeyer, Germany.

In the above two paragraphs, the writer has given the data on which he bases his conviction that the names Theobald and Dewald are the same, or were thus used at that time. Hence he believes that the Theobald Angena who came to America in 1753 was actually Dewald returning from a visit to his former home. He signed his name to the ship register as Theobald Angnee, and we find the name spelled thus in church records in Somerset county when Dewald's children had settled there. Again we find in a church record of Salem Church, near Hagerstown, Md., where he settled later, this item: born to Theobald Angena and wife, a daughter Elisabeth, December 4, 1772, christened February 28, 1773; also in same record it is found that Theobald Angena and wife, Margaretha, were witnesses at christening of a son, David, born to John Shoff and Fronica, the latter being a daughter of Dewald's wife, Margaret, by her first husband. It can also be stated here that later, in the church records of Somerset Co., it is found that a son was born there to Peter, son of Dewald Ankeny, and was christened as Theobald. Thus this writer is convinced that Theobald Ankeny was no other than "our" Dewald, wherever the name may be found in those early records. Many instances can be found where the ministers of that period usually used the name, Theobald, rather than Dewald, though the latter form was generally used colloquially.

Regarding Johann Nickel Angne, who came to America in 1736, and was probably an uncle of Dewald, it appears that he settled in Bucks Co., Pa., and that the name soon became Onkeny. His descendants lived in Bedminster township, according to records of the county histories, as well as the Historical Society of Bucks Co. Christian and Jacob Angeny are mentioned in the latter, and in the county history it is found that Nicholas Onkeny settled in the "Deep Run" section in 1741, and is mentioned as one of the Tohickton settlers. In the 1790 census, one finds the names of Jacob Onkeny, Sr., and Jacob Onkeny, Jr. The Pennsylvania archives, Series 3, v. 13, p. 304, refers to a David and a Christopher Angeny, as living in the Leatherman Tract, and also refers to Jacob Angeny, Sr., Jacob Angeny, Jr., and Henry Angeny, all of whom were taxed during 1781 - 1787. There was an Angony mill on Deep Creek in 1785,--the earliest mill in that section. Thus it appears that this family also has "a posterity", though it is not clear whether the name is now Angony or may, perhaps, have become Ankeny. A recent item has been found in the Congressional Library, Washington, D. C., in which it appears that one Jacob Ankeny, who had married Mary Slifer, was a grandson of Jacob Angeny, born in 1740, who had married Elisabeth Wismer in 1762. He was the son of a Jacob Ankeny who had married Barbara Gehman and the other children were named: Elisabeth, Abraham, Samuel, William and David. Also his children were named: Joseph, of New Britain, Pa., Jacob, of Dublin, Pa., Catherine who married Abraham Hunsberger, of Dublin, Pa., and Nancy. So it is possible that some of the Ankeny names now found in various localities may be traced back to Nicholas Angne, rather

than to our Dewald. See Supplement page "II".

Now, turning to the subject of this sketch, it is found that Dewald settled in Lancaster county, Pa., somewhat west of Ephrata, referred to above, and in what is now Lebanon County, Pa. A letter to the writer from the Director of the Pennsylvania Land Office states that a warrant for 50 acres of land was granted to Dewalt Angena on February 14, 1750, and that a survey of the tract was made, and returned 121 acres, 120 perches. - Pennsylvania Archives, Ser. 3, vol. 24, p. 352. He also stated that the land was then in Hanover township, Lancaster Co., but now is in Union township, Lebanon Co., a short distance west of Swatara Creek, midway between Jonestown and Lickdale. From the History of Lebanon Co., by Egle, p. 179, it is found that he was taxed in East Hanover township in 1756 under the name of Dayvolt Angony, and that he was not one of those settlers who fled on account of the Indian attacks. A church record in the Jonestown Reformed Church shows the following item: Christian, son of Dewalt Annias (as translated) and Catherine, was baptized Dec. 23, 1750, and witnessed by Christian Lang and Anna Maria, daughter of Peter Hedrick. This is an interesting item for several reasons. Peter Hederick, as already mentioned, came from the same district in the Palatinate as did the Ankenys. Also on the same ship with Nicholas Angne there was one Nickel (Nicholas) Lang, and this man was a member of the Jonestown church as early as 1742, at which date he had a daughter baptized there. These two men may or may not have been related to Dewalt, possibly one of them a brother-in-law, but at least they all seem to have settled together. As the name Dewalt was not common, and as the name Annias is not known to have existed, it seems almost certain that the item refers to the subject of this sketch, and further evidence of that likelihood is this fact that Dewalt did have a son, Christian, who was born December 25, 1749, and his christening at this time would be quite likely. Reference to the name Catherine in the above item will be made in a later paragraph. But another item comes from the record of the Host Church, on the Big Swatara, near Jonestown. Here we find: that Rebecca was born to Theobald Angne, July 5, 1755, christened August 17, 1755, witnesses being Peter Heitherick and Rebecca Lang, both single. As the sponsors are from the same families, and from the similarity of names (allowing for variation in translation) it seems clear that both refer to our Dewalt. From the tax records, we know that he lived in this section, and no other references to any name like his is found. So we ~~accept~~ both these references as belonging in this account.

Tradition has it that Dewalt had married Mary Jane Domer and that she was the mother of the older children. This name is found in the account referred to in the account of Joseph Ankeny, given in Prominent Iowans, already referred to. Here it is stated that she was a daughter of Thomas Domer, and that the first two sons were named for two brothers, - Peter and Christian Domer. We know that the Domers lived in Maryland, where Dewalt later lived, but it is not known that they ever lived in Pennsylvania. Also we know that some of the names that were used in the account just referred to, were not entirely correct. So as far as this writer

is concerned, there is a question as to the verity of that tradition. From the above item, it appears that the wife of Dewalt and the mother of Christian was named Catherine. Her family name is not evident, but might possibly be either Lang or Hederick. It might also be noted that none of the children of Dewalt named any of their girls Mary Jane, but nearly all of them did have a daughter named Catherine. And Dewalt also had a daughter - his first - who was named Catherine. Also as we are quite sure the items mentioned above refer to Dewalt, it must follow that the first wife was named Catherine, and probably not a Domer. But tradition has it that she died at an early date from injuries received in the burning of their barn. It seems that she tried to save some of the cattle. The exact date is not known. Before leaving this matter of names, it might be noted that one of the members of the Jonestown Church was Kilian (or William) Lang, whose wife was Magdalena; that was also the name of the sister of Dewalt who came with him to America in 1746. These two Magdalenas may well be the same person.

Living near them at that time was a man named Noah Frederick who, on October 12, 1756, was killed by the Indians in one of the frequent attacks that they made on the frontier settlements. Also several of the older children were carried off by them. The widow of Frederick was left with two small children, both girls, and several months later a son was born to the widow. About 1758, Dewalt married this widow - Margaret Becker Frederick - and perhaps adopted the posthumously-born son as his own. This son was named Johann George, born March 27, 1757, and christened May 8, 1757, as recorded in the Bethel Church of that district. A Lancaster county court record shows that on January 16, 1759, Dewalt Ancony and his wife Margaret, late Mrs. Frederick, were appointed to administer the estate of Noah Frederick. The two daughters of Margaret and Noah Frederick were Veronica, born 1752, and Christina, born 1754. The Court, in 1762, appointed a guardian for them, and in 1766 a different man was appointed to serve until they became of age. (It appears that Margaret was the second wife of Mr. Frederick, and so the older children who were carried off by the Indians were not hers, - only her step-children.)

It was about this time that Dewalt and Margaret moved to Maryland, settling at a place called Clear Spring, in the Conococheague Valley. Here he bought a small tract of land in 1764, and, on January 19, 1773, it is found in the Maryland records, that Duval Anconi had a warrant for 500 acres, - the tract he named "Well-Pleased". He lived here during the remainder of his life and became one of the wealthy men of the region. He later took out warrants for, or purchased, at least four tracts of land in what was then Bedford, now Somerset County, Pa., where several of his sons had settled. Very likely all of the children, - the five who were born to the first wife, and several of those born to the second wife came before he left Pennsylvania and were probably baptized there. At any rate, only the christening of his last child - seventh in the second family - is shown by the old church records. This is found, as already mentioned, in the Salem Church where the record shows that Elisabeth was born to Theobald and

Margaretha Angena December 4, 1772, and was christened on February 28, 1773, the witness being Elisabeth Ruf(in). It is interesting to note, in referring to these early records, how many different spellings are found for both the first and the last name of our subject. Dewalt is written as Dewald, Dayvolt, Duval, Devault. The last name comes in even more spellings, - Anconi, Ancony, Angne, Agnee, Angena, Acconi, etc. It is now generally spelled either Ankeny or Ankeney, the latter form being that generally used by the families that remained in Maryland and their descendants in the west. And regarding the form Theobald, it might be mentioned that one of the sons of John, oldest of the second family of Dewalt, was named Dewalt for his grandfather, but in Greene County, Ohio, where he spent most of his life, he was known as Theobald Ankeney.

The subject of our sketch died at Clear Spring in 1781. He left a will in which he directed that he was to be buried in the "orchard by the graves already there", just whose it is not clear, - possibly several infant children whose names are not recorded. This burial plat has been lost and plowed over; so today there is only a memorial stone set up at St. Paul's Church, on Highway #40, a mile or two east of Clear Spring, this cemetery being on his original estate and given for burial purposes by his son John. The inscription on this stone is: To the memory of DeWalt Ankeny, the first of his name, and the founder of that family in America, one thousand seven hundred forty six. Born 1728, died at Clear Spring, Md. 1781." In his will, which is very interesting in many ways, especially as to his specific directions for the dividing of his properties and the caring of his widow, Dewalt refers several times to his "twelve children", or the "seven sons and five daughters". As he names individually the seven in the second family, it is clear that there were five in the first family, - two sons and three daughters. Another odd feature of the will is that he provides for giving his property in Maryland, divided into two farms, to two of his sons "by the casting of lots", though the two who got these farms were to pay out to the others according to the value, and the others were each to have one of his tracts in Somerset, then Bedford, County, Pa. This will is published in the Journal of American History, vol. 2, pp. 661 - 2, under the heading: The Will of a Wealthy Colonial American, of 1781. Most of the larger libraries are likely to have a copy of this publication.

His services to the Revolution are these: He took the Oath of Allegiance to the Colonial Cause before John Barnes, a Justice of the Peace in Washington County, Md., February 28, 1778, as found in the Unpublished Records, vol. 3, p. 39, of the Daughters of the Revolution; and from the Maryland Historical Magazine, vol. 12, p. 345, it is found that he was one of 54 persons named to relieve distress among the inhabitants. His name here is given as Devault Anchony. A record of and grants in his name is found in Scharf's History of Western Maryland, vol. 2, p. 985, and in the Pennsylvania Archives, Ser. 3, vol. 24, p. 352. Reference to him is also found in Memorials of the Huguenots, by Rev. A. Stapleton, as follows: North of South Mountain, in the limits of Washington

County, Md., the first settlements were made by Pennsylvania Germans prior to 1735, in the vicinity of Clear Spring. Among the settlers with Huguenot antecedents was Dewalt Ankony, who arrived at Philadelphia from Europe in 1746, and died at Clear Spring in 1781, at a very advanced age. (Today we should hardly call 53 an "advanced age".)

If the first wife of Dewalt was really a Domer, this paragraph may be of some interest. Tradition says that a sister of Mary Jane married Joseph Fiory, and a daughter of that union was married to Dewalt's son George. The following is found in a Md. record: Joseph Fyers, (Fiery ?) md. Anna M. Dommer, Aug. 3, 1762. Others of this name who are shown by the 1790 census to have been in Washington County, Md., then are: Ludwig, John and Christian. In Hagerstown, or near by, in 1776, were Michael Domer and wife Anna, and sons Michael, Jr., and Frederick. The name is also common in Somerset County, Pa., and in Tuscarawas County, Ohio. In the latter county, one of the first settlers was a Frederick Domer, from Somerset County, Pa., known as "Judge" Domer, and was a Dunkard preacher. Brothers of his were George and Jacob. Also a Michael Domer settled in Holmes County, Ohio, adjoining Tuscarawas County. Jacob and George, at a later date, went to Elkhart, Indiana. Michael died in 1845 and left sons John, Jacob and George, besides six daughters.

The sons and sons-in-law of Dewalt Ankony were among the first settlers in that part of Bedford county which later became Somerset, when the county was divided in 1795. Christian, the oldest of the family, was listed among the taxables there in 1775, and both Christian and Peter in 1776. In the Penna Archives it is found that Dewalt, Christian and George, a son of Christian, had taken out warrants for lands in that part of Bedford county on September 6, 1774, - the amounts of land being 250 acres, 150 acres and 150 acres, respectively. Altogether, the family - father, sons and grandsons - had taken out warrants by 1795 for a total of over 3000 acres, and probably most of these tracts were later surveyed and patented to them. They also purchased other lands, either by warrants or deeds; as, for instance, the lands of Ulrich Bruner, who had laid out a town plan called "Milford", and of his sons, Henry and George, which were purchased by Peter Ankony, and more lots were laid out on portions of this land by him. This was the beginning of the present town of Somerset.

In Blackburn's History of Somerset and Bedford Counties, Vol. 2, p. 128, reference is made to a letter, written by request apparently, by Joseph Ankony, son of Peter, to David Husband, in 1870. Quoting from this letter, after he refers to Uncle Christian who came first to Somerset in 1772 or 1773, and settled on the Fritz farm near Pine Hill. Then, the letter says, he later returned with Peter to Somerset where "Christly" settled on the John Schrock farm west of town, and Peter on the Hugus place where he built a log cabin and planted an orchard. Peter went back for winter to Washington Co., Md., and returned in the spring with his wife and oldest child, and household goods, including a stove. Then he says, to quote directly: My impression is that Uncles Chorpenning and Walter did not come until 1780. Uncle Chorpenning's first improvement was on the same ground still occupied by the

buildings on the Old Chorpenning farm. Walter's I am not able to describe. (Thus he must have been referring to John Chorpenning as his uncle, as there were no other Chorpennings in the county except John and his sons.) He adds that he thinks that Harmon Husband came next summer (1781), when he rode a sorrel horse and had one son - Isaac - whom he called "Trippy" along. He went by the name of Harmon Scape-death, came often to Ankeny's as he and his son kept "Bachelor's Hall", and he enjoyed the cooked meals. (Again one might mention that in 1781 he was just returning from the general flight of 1778 due to the Indian scare. He had been to Somerset county much earlier and had made surveys prior to that time.)

Thus it seems probable that during these early years the men raised their crops on the frontiers in the summers and returned to Maryland for the winters. But in 1784 both Christian and Peter were included among the list of residents of Somerset county each with a family of seven. There are also records of baptism of their children in Somerset even earlier than that date. Catherine Ankeny, the oldest sister of Christian and Peter, had married Michael Walter and had lived for several years in or near Hagerstown, Md., and had also moved to Somerset by that date or earlier; and possibly several of the other sons, - half-brothers - had settled there too, as well as the other son-in-law of Dewalt referred to above as Joseph's Uncle Chorpenning. In the records of the Berlin Church, - both Lutheran and Reformed at that time, - entries are found giving baptismal dates of children of all the following: Peter and Christian Ankeny, Michael Walter, Jacob and David Ankeny, and John Shoff, husband of Dewalt's step-daughter Veronica. In 1789, according to the Penna. Archives, Christian, Peter, David and Jacob were all registered for military service, well as Gillian Gary who after the death of Michael Walter in 1788 married Catherine, Michael's widow. The census of 1790 gives all the above names as residents of that part of Bedford later known as Somerset County.

You will note that an earlier parenthetical statement referred to an uncertainty in regard to the Ankeny relationship to a member of the Corpenning family. The name was originally spelled thus, and by tradition again, it was said that one of three brothers had married one of the Ankony daughters. By some it was said that Elisabeth Ankony had married George Corpenning, and had gone to North Carolina to live with the family of the oldest of the brothers, Albert Corpenning. This man, the oldest of the sons, only two, as we now know, - had married Barbara Probst, June 23, 1774, and gone to that state, though a storm detained them during the first winter in Virginia. Correspondence of the writer with members of that family now living in North Carolina has brought out the fact that they know of no George in the original family of Hendrick Kourpenning, who came to America in 1751 with two sons, Albert and John, though Albert later had a son called George. Dewalt's grandson Joseph, in the statements quoted above, clearly established the fact that he had an uncle of that name, and the description of the location of the farm definitely refers to the other brother John, though he does not use the name. The trouble in identifying this Corpenning uncle may have come from a statement in a sketch of the family of John Corpenning written some years ago.

by J. Harry Fritz, an attorney of the Somerset Bar, who should have known how to base his writing on facts, but apparently did not. In this account he says that John Chorpenning-the name had changed to that spelling by that time-had married Anna Maria Ingrason. So far as known, he did not give the source of his information; but one may assume that he found the name in an old Bible, or an early church record. If so, the name was probably written in German, and the form of the name, as written at that period, would add the letters "in" to the name of a woman to make it feminine. Thus the name Ankeny for a woman would appear Angnesin. This would look much like the name Ingrason in the German script, and one not skilled in translation of the German names as written 150 years ago might readily make that error. At any rate, all evidence we can get clearly shows that it was John Chorpenning who married Anna Maria Ankeny, the youngest daughter of the first family of Dewalt. Further reasons for taking this view comes from the fact that in the census, taken at Hagerstown, then called Elisabeth Hundred, Maryland, in August of 1776,-as given in a photostat in the History of Western Maryland, by Brumbaugh,-the names and ages of Michael Walter and his wife Catherine are given and immediately following each - men and women were given separately - come the names of John Corpenning and his wife Mary and their ages. Apparently they were living together or next to each other as would be natural for two sisters. The date given for the marriage of the Corpennings was March of that year, so they might well have lived together with members of the family until then. Another striking bit of evidence is the practice of having the christenings of their children witnessed when possible by parents, brothers or sisters. We find that in the case of the Ankeny, Walter, and Corpenning families, members of these families frequently, or generally, did just that for each other. Thus John and Mary Corpenning were witnesses twice for Ankeny children, and the Ankenys or Walter and his wife witnessed four times for the Corpenning children. And this is for only a part of the children, as the records are not all given. Also when John Corpenning died at an early age and left most of his children still minors, several of the Ankeny brothers were on the administrator's bond and two of them were guardians for some of the children. This mass of evidence makes it apparent that Fritz erred when he gave the name of Mrs. Corpenning as he did. In addition, the name Ingrason cannot be found in any list of names of that period; and so there can be no reasonable doubt that John Corpenning was a son-in-law of Dewalt Ankeny.

In this sketch of the family, we shall take up the children in the order of their ages, so far as we know that order. Then we shall also give the same data for the two step-daughters, Veronica and Christina. The children of the first wife were Christian, Peter, Catherine, Rebecca, and Anna Maria (Mary). The seven of the second wife were John, apparently adopted by Dewalt as his own, then Henry, David, Jacob, Margaret, George and Elisabeth. Margaret may have been older than one or both of the two brothers named ahead of her. But otherwise the order is believed to be correct. We shall give pertinent facts about each as to where he or she lived, died and is buried, if known. Also something about their

activities, the names of their children, and the children's children,- in some cases, down to the present generation. The children of Dewalt will be numbered 1, and their children will be given the number 2; and so on, with an increase of one for each succeeding generation.

Signatures on the bond for the administration of the estate of Noah Frederick, in Lancaster County, Pa., January 16, 1759, of Dewalt and Margaret Ankony were both made by their marks, thus:

An addition to the discussion of the names Dewalt and Theobald, given earlier in this account, comes from a Circular, # 6, recently sent out by the Historical Society, of York County, Pa., on the confusion of names among the Pennsylvania Germans. In this list of confused names given by the Circular is:-
Dewald, 18th century German form, same as
Theobald, the correct English translation. Then follows that the name is confused with the name David.

Miss Anna M. Angeny, 600 Market St., Perkasie, Pa., a granddaughter of Samuel Angeny, who was a grandson of Nicholas Angeny, an older brother, or uncle, of Dewalt Angeny (Anconi - Ankeny). Letter from her to Mrs. Foster was seen and returned to Mrs. Foster. It is not certain that Samuel was related just as stated above, but he was a son of Jacob, who was possibly a son of Christopher, a son of Nicholas. At any rate she is of the line of Nicholas, reference to whom was made in the early pages of the Dewalt Ankeny account. (See also page 3).

1. CHRISTIAN, oldest of the children of Dowalt Ankeny and his first wife, believed by this writer to have been Catherine _____, was born December 25, 1749, and christened, as shown above, in Lancaster County, Pa., at the Jonestown Reformed Church on December 23, 1750. He married first Elisabeth Shaffer, daughter of George Shaffer, of Washington County, Md., who was born July 14, 1748, and died in Somerset County, Pa., in 1816. Her father, George Shaffer, died in 1796 and left a will which is recorded in Hagerstown in which he named his son, Paul, and his son-in-law, Christian Ankeny, as executors. It is known also, from the will of Conrad Miller, of Cumberland County, Pa., that Shaffer was married to a daughter of Miller. Christian married again on April 7, 1817, this time Mary Kooser, sister of John and Jacob S. Kooser, and of Catherine, wife of Conrad Shultz, all prominent citizens of Somerset County. He died in Westmoreland Co., Pa., on March 17, 1824, and is buried in the Brant's Cemetery, about two miles from Ligonier. His estate was settled by his son Christian, Jr., and Conrad Shultz, as administrators. The second wife died in 1847, and her estate was settled by her nephew, David Shultz. She left no children and the location of her grave is not known to the writer. The inscription on the stone of Christian is as follows: Christian Angney, born the 25 of December, 1751, died the 17 of March, 1824. For some reason there was an error of two years in the year of his birth, as his younger brother Peter was born in March 1751.

Christian was an active citizen and had many interests. He served in the Revolution as First Lieutenant in the Company of Captain Rhoads in the First Battalion of Pennsylvania Riflemen under Colonel Thomas Smith. He was also Courtmartial Officer in the Company of Captain Black, of Turkeyfoot township. For this data, see Eglo, Pennsylvania in the Revolution, pp. 646 & 656. He was the owner of several tracts of land in Somerset and later in Westmoreland counties. He was the builder of the first grist mill near Somerset, this being on his tract about a mile south of the town. It was a large log structure, and he later built a fulling mill at the same place. The latter passed in 1842 into the hands of John F. Kantner whose father was a pioneer in the same industry near Stoyestown. He was also active in the Samuel's Church, about three miles west of Somerset. He and Elisabeth were the parents of ten children - five sons and five daughters.

2. George, the oldest, was born near Hagerstown, Md., October 16, 1772, as recorded in the record of the Salem Church, where he was baptized November 12, 1772, and witnessed by George Shaffer. He died in Milford township, Somerset Co., Pa., probably on the tract which his father had taken out in his name in 1774. He married in 1794 Magdalena Putman, daughter of John Putman, and niece of Adam Schnoider, joint founder, and of Henry Bruner, original owner of most of the site of the present town of Somerset, which was then called Brunerstown. The Putmans, as well as the Ankenys and Bruners, were from Washington County, Md., and were early settlers in the same section of Somerset County. Magdalena

was born September 30, 1773, and died October 2, 1858; both she and her husband are buried in the New Center-ville Cemetery. It is stated in an account of the Putman family, by an author named Williams, the book being in the Hagerstown Library, that John Putman, her father, was a veteran of the Revolution, but the writer has no other data on that point. That George Ankony was married to a daughter of Putman is found in Penna. Germans, Vol. 10, and in the estate papers in which Putman's widow Sara and his son-in-law, George Ankony, were named administrators. In the will of George Ankony, made July 25, 1846, there is a list of the heirs given, nine children being named.

3. Christian died September 15, 1872, in Tazewell Co., Ill., md. Catherine Putman, daughter of Peter Putman, Sr., a brother to John Putman and also a pioneer settler in the county. She too died in Tazewell Co., Ill. on January 3, 1890. They moved to the west soon after their marriage, and on April 25, 1851, a tract of land was purchased by them from Isaac Snyder. At his death he left a will which was probated October 1, 1872, and in it his widow and heirs are mentioned. They were buried in the cemetery at East Peoria, Ill. In November, 1872, the court was petitioned to appoint a conservator for the widow, who was and had been of unsound mind for a period of 15 years, and the Court appointed Louis Kopcha.
4. George, b. May 19, 1823, d. December 12, 1824, buried at Samuel's, Pa., near the ancestral home.
4. Magdalena Margaret, b. 1825, d. January 20, 1915, and buried in Oakwood cemetery, near Waukogan, Wis. She married Harrison Nolcher, - names and number of her children not known. But an adopted daughter was the mother of Mrs. Jessie M. Hubbard, 231 McQueen Ave., Peoria, Ill. Also a J. B. Nolcher, of Peoria, may be a grandson. And a man named L. G. Gumbrock, of 1021 North Johnson St., Madison, Wis., is also a grandson.
4. Joseph, b. February 24, 1827, in Somerset Co., Pa., died October 6, 1902, and is buried at Tobias, Saline Co., Nebr. He married Mary Chamborlin on March 13, 1861, at Peoria, Ill. She was b. January 11, 1843, and d. February 29, 1920. He bought portions of his father's land in 1854 and 1865, but in 1872 he and family moved to a farm near Tobias, Saline Co., Nebr., where he became a well-known stock raiser. He later moved to town and conducted a loan business. They raised a family of 11 children.

He was Captain of the Fifth Company, Third Battalion of Penna Infantry, organized Apr. 21, 1781. (See Egle, v. 2, p. 665). He was, as noted before, one of the earliest settlers of the present Somerset County, and he purchased from the Bruners the lands upon which he laid out the south portion of the town of Somerset. In it the streets, Rosina and Catherine, were named for the wives of Peter Ankeny and Adam Snyder, the latter of whom extended the plan of the north portion of the town, both having followed in the main the plan already in use and which was made for Ulrich Bruner by Herman Husband. He was a very active citizen and the owner of many tracts of land. He was an active member of the Reformed Church, first at Samuel's, where he was an Elder, and later, in 1797, he was one of the leading spirits of the now St. Paul's Church in Somerset. The church was on the site of the present Ankeny Square Cemetery, which he had given for such use in perpetuity. He died at an early age, and is buried in this plot, and on the slab which is over the grave is a full account of his active life. One of the interesting events in his career while he was a member of the Samuel's Church was the baptism of his servant Rachel, formerly a slave in the household of his father; on Apr. 17, 1791, he and Henry Stahl, a deacon, standing as sponsors for her at the ceremony. His wife, Rosina, b. Sept. 17, 1751, d. Feb. 5, 1834, was the daughter of John Bonnet, of Bedford County. In an abstract of John Bonnet's will of April 30, 1793, and proved Aug. 15, 1793, found in Penna. Geneological Society Bulletins, v. 10, p. 166, it appears that he gave to his daughter, named as "Leesay, wife of Peter Ankeny" the plantation formerly of Gasper Teavebough, containing 215 acres. She was apparently his only daughter, the brothers being, besides Jacob, already mentioned, John, then living in Quenahoning township, and Isaac, of Bedford County. The farm on which Peter Ankeny and wife lived in Somerset County was just west of town, and was known then as "Edgewood Farm". Names and some data of each of the children follow, but several of them went west and it has not been possible to get much information about them. It might be mentioned that the will of Peter provided a farm, or residence, for several of his sons and at least one of the sons-in-law.

There is also a record of the certificate in the Register's office, showing that Catherine signed her name in German, "Angnesin", and Frederick in English, using the form Moyer. It was registered Sept. 10, 1800. The twelve witnesses were: John Lind, (Lint), in German, George Lobengier, John Reoso, Susanna Schneider, Elisabeth Angeny (Angnesin), in German, Peter Ankeny, John Coolponny (Corpenning), Caty Bonnett, Henry

Ankony, John Ankony, Kiliun Gehri, in Gorman, (the English form being Gillian Gary), and Peter Ankony. Catherine got a tract of land named "Ulrich", - from Ulrich Bruner, no doubt, - but it is likely that they lived in Westmoreland Co. Complete list of the children is not known. A search of the records of Westmoreland County shows that Frederick and Catherine sold various properties there, between 1808 and 1819, but no papers were found to show any children or estate papers. Here it should be stated that all this account of Rosina and George Shaver, except the date of Rosina's birth, the fact of her marriage to George Shaver, and the birth of her children Joseph and Eliza, is taken from data gathered by Elmo Elton Shaver, of Long Beach, Calif., who very generously

contributed his work to this writer to make up for the absence of earlier data on this couple.

The marriage of George and Rosina took place at Somerset on Dec. 7, 1815. Mr. Shaver was apparently quite prominent in these early years, held several county offices, was a Major in the State militia, and served in the State Legislature. However, early in the 1840's, his business career came under a cloud, largely due to his having endorsed for too many of his friends in their business adventures. So about that time they sold what was left of their Somerset properties and migrated westward with their large family and two of the sons-in-laws. They went down the Ohio River to Bloomington, and finally arrived at Muscatine, Ia., Apr. 18, 1844. They settled in Johnson County where George Shaver took out a claim for large tract of land and built a log cabin, and soon afterwards they went down with the cholera, common in that section at this time, and so did not live long to see their holdings develop. This data about the family comes from the son Daniel. The older children took charge and held the family together till all grew up, and several of them became very distinguished citizens.

She gathered much material for a history of the Ankeny Family, mostly on the Joseph Ankeny branch - which she intended to have published, but died before getting it done. Others, particularly, Mrs. Eunice Souers, have tried to carry on, but one thing or another, it seems, has prevented the completion of the task.

The following is a brief summary of some of the high points in the life of Joseph Ankeny, as found in Brigham's "Prominent Iowans."

Joseph Ankeny first came to Iowa in 1854, entered some government land, and then returned, about 13 years later, with his wife and family and became a permanent resident of Iowa. He was descended from Huguenot Ancestry. His father, Dewalt Angena, came to America in 1746 with his uncle Casper DeWalt, he being then 18 years of age. Two brothers, Nicholas and Theobald preceded him. (We are now convinced that Theobald is just another name for Dewalt.) He first settled in Lancaster County, Pa., and later at Clear Spring, Md. He married Mary Jane Dorner (meaning Dorner) who came to America with her father Thomas Dorner, and two brothers, Christian and Peter, for whom her first two sons were named. (This statement seems to have been based entirely on the tradition previously referred to, but now believed to be unreliable.) After the death of his first wife, Dewalt married Margaret Friedline (meaning Frederick), and had 8 (really 7) children, - John, Henry, David, George, Jacob, Mary and Elizabeth. Mary married a Mr. Benford, and Elizabeth became the wife of George Chorpenning. (This sentence also at variance with other traditional statements, especially the use of the name Benford where others use Brading.)

Peter Ankeny, the second son, was born March 1, 1751, and married Rosina Bonnet, whose father Jean Bonnet, was proprietor of the first inn west of the Alleghenies, on the Forbes Road, called "The Forks", being near Bedford Springs. About 1773, Mr. and Mrs. Ankeny (Peter) crossed the mountains to where he had a large tract of land, called "the Manor". (Then follow items about Peter's children.)

Joseph was born June 30, 1802, and two years later his father died. He had no schooling after he reached the age of 13 years. He early managed a store for his brother-in-law, Peter (should be Frederick) Meyers, at Ligonier, Pa. At 18 years of age, he went down the Ohio river on a raft, as his brother John had previously taken his family to Brownsville, Ill. Joseph visited him but later returned to Westmoreland county and spent some time there with his uncle, Col. John Bonnett. On July 29, 1823, he married

at Berlin, Pa., Harriet Susannah Giese, daughter of Rev. Henry Giese, who came to America in 1776, with the Hessian Army, but who, at that time, was the minister of the German Reformed Church of Berlin, (this town being in Somerset Co., Pa.), serving there from 1795 to 1838. He was ordained at Frederickstown, Va., married Anna Maria Baker near there, and was disinherited by his father because he would not return to Germany. He had several children,- Valentine, b. 1785, who was Captain of the Fayette County Blues, of Penna., in the War of 1812. Other children were: Catherine, who married a Loar, and Herbert; Elizabeth, who married a Lawry; Anna Maria, who married a Rean; John, a Methodist minister; and Harriet. Also a half-sister who married a Compton.

Joseph and his wife lived in Penna. until 1831 when they moved to Holmes County, Ohio, and lived there on a farm for a year. Then they moved to Millersburg, and became prominent in the affairs of the town. He was made a Mason on Dec. 1, 1823. During the years 1834-1837, he represented his district in the Ohio State Legislature. He was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the Second Brigade of the Ohio Militia. He and his wife were members of the Reformed Church. They had eight children. (Then follow the names of the children, omitted here.)

The Will of John Bonnet, father-in-law of Peter Ankeny, and grandfather of Joseph, is found partially recorded in vol. 10, p. 166, in the Report of the Pa. Genealogical Society. It was made April 30, 1793, and proved August 15, 1793. The widow's name was Dorothy. Dorothy was the second wife,- the first wife, and mother of the children was named Mary Bickley (Biclet). The children named besides Rosina, were John, Jacob, and Isaac.

1. CATHERINE, b. 1753, d. probably about 1805, md. (1) Michael Walter, b. 1749, and d. in 1785. Sometime later, probably 1786, she md. Gillian Gary (Kilian Gehri, in German, as he generally wrote it). A complete account of Michael Walter, an immigrant to America in 1764, who lived for a time in Lancaster Co., Pa., then appears to have gone to Maryland where he met and married Catherine, about 1775, has been written up and as the wife was third in the Ankeny family, it would belong here. But because of its size, and as it is pretty much of a unit in itself, it will be placed at the end of this manuscript. Following it will also be given all that has been found about the Gary children, and about Gary himself, he too being an immigrant who had served in the Revolution. There were six children in the Walter family, and three to Catherine and Gary. The date of birth given for Catherine, as shown above, is based on the 1776 census records of Elizabeth Hundred (Hagerstown), Md., at which time she was given the age of 23. Further data on that and on the approximate date of her death will be found in the Walter account.

1. REBECCA, b. July 5, 1755, date of death given below. As given on an earlier page, the statement that she belongs to the family comes from the record of baptisms found in the Host Church, on the Big Swatara Creek, in Berks County, near the district, however, where Dewalt Ankeny had settled over in Lancaster, now Lebanon, County. This record was discovered by Mrs. Martha Ankeney Foster, and fills in the family of "the twelve children" referred to several times in the Will of Dewalt. The witnesses at her baptism on Aug. 17, 1755, were Peter Heterick and Rebecca Lang. Lancaster County records show that Peter Heterick and Dewalt were neighbors in West Hanover township, their names being in the same assessment list. Regarding Rebecca, since Dewalt was left, at the death of his wife, with five small children, it is likely that Rebecca may have been taken to raise by a relative, possibly the grandmother or an aunt, and so was raised apart from the other Ankeny children. At any rate, her existence seems never to have been mentioned by any of the early members of the family.

Just as was hoped when these facts came to the writer, and even sooner than was thought possible, information has been found showing that Rebecca later became the wife of George Cook, a Revolutionary soldier who served as a private under Col. Samuel Royer, 1779-1781. This record comes from a book, or sketch, entitled Revolutionary Soldiers of Franklin County, and states that George Cook was a son of George Adan Cook, who died in 1785. He also had 3 brothers who were in the army named Adan, Jacob, and John. George was born in 1751, and died in 1842, and is buried in the Grindstone Hill Graveyard, in Guildford township, Franklin County, Pa. The same record states that his wife was Rebecca Ankeny, who died Jan. 21, 1832, aged 76, having lived a married life of 57 years and 9 months. (Note that the date of her birth as found in the Host Church

records would make Rebecca just 76 yrs. and 6 mos. of age at the time of her death.) This latter information comes also from the persistent search on the Ankeny Line by Mrs. Martha Foster, of Hagerstown, Md.

With the above data as a guide, the writer visited the County Seat of Franklin, at Chambersburg, Pa., in the Register's office in the Court House, and found the names of the children of the family from the settlement papers of the estate of George Cook. His son John was the administrator and his account was filed Aug. 24, 1844, the date of the death being given in one of the papers as Sept. 24, 1842. From the amounts left to the several children, and the advances having been previously made, it appears that the estate was worth at least \$15,000, thus making him a rather wealthy man for that period. They lived in Quincy township, south and east of Chambersburg, and not so far from Hagerstown, nor from the region where the Dewalt Ankeny family had settled in Washington Co., Md. Other records in the same office - deeds, wills and estate settlement papers - give some further data on several of the children; and no doubt other information of later generations could likewise be found there if time permitted. But as the brothers of George Cook also lived in the same section of the county, the descendants of the several families would be hard to separate, thus making it almost impossible to tell which ones were descendants of George and Rebecca. An attempt was made by the writer to get some information of the early families from present residents of the Quincy and Guilford districts by mail, but without any success. And time did not permit his visiting the section at that time to inquire personally for the identity of descendants living there. So the following names of the children of this family are based entirely on data found in the records referred to above. The order of the names does not, of course, have any relation to the ages of the children.

2. John, the administrator. One of that name, with Hannah as wife, made a deed to Peter Cook, of some land that came from Adam and George Cook in 1844; but at that time they were living in Washington Co., Me. This may have been a different John. But the records show that one of the name John Cook died in 1868, being at that time a resident of Quincy township, Franklin County. This would seem likely to be the son of George and Rebecca. The administrator of the estate was F. A. Cook, probably a son, but no list of children was given nor was the name of the widow shown.
2. Adam, no other data found. One of that name lived in Somerset County at an early date, and may have been this man.
2. George, Jr. One George Cook, resident of Quincy township, died Apr. 11, 1882, will being probated Apr. 20, 1882. He left a widow and a daughter named Catherine (Katie) and a son Hiran. Hiran H. Cook was the executor of the will.
2. Samuel; Jacob; nothing further on either of these two.
2. Nancy. One of that name made a will Aug. 31, 1846, naming John Cook as the executor. The will was probated Nov. 5, 1862, she being then a resident of St. Thomas township,

Franklin Co., and she gave all her estate to her daughter Jane, married to Samuel Palmer. Nancy was apparently unmarried.

A son in this family, sketch of whom is given on the latter page mentioned above, was Hiram Essick Wertz, b. Sept. 25, 1829, and listed in the history as a prominent citizen of Quincy township.

- Regarding the latter, the papers show that John and wife got one third of a share, and the children two thirds. So it would appear that his first wife had died and that he was married again.

1. ANNA MARIA, B. 1757, d. 1806, md. in Washington County, Md., on Mar. 6, 1776, John Corpenning, b. 1749, d. 1804. They were living in or near Hagerstown (Elizabeth Hundred) when a census of that section was taken in August, 1776. Dates of birth of both of them is based on the ages given to them in that census. It is not known where Attorney Fritz when he gave the name of Anna Maria as Ingrason found that information. That statement, as given before in this account, was made by Fritz in his Sketch of the Chorpenning Family. The writer has not been able to find any such name in any of the old records of that period, such as the 1790 census of Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, or even North Carolina; nor in the Penna. Archives, nor in the immigration records. So he is firmly of the opinion that it was a mistranslation of the name Angnesin, written in German and in the form used for a woman. The "in" is the feminine ending, and the German capital "A" looks very much like our "I"; and the small letters, in German, for a, e, and i look very much alike.

In addition to all this, it has been found that Fritz made a number of other errors in the account referred to, showing that he was basing much of his material only on tradition. He says that the Corpenning family came from Europe to North Carolina where they met John Walter, and came with him to Maryland and there met the Ankenys. Now it can be shown that much of that statement is wrong. The Immigration records show that the Kourponning family came directly to Philadelphia, on the ship "Duke of Bedford", last out of Amsterdam, and landed in Sept. 1751. Records show that the family consisted of Hendrick, the father, and sons Albert and John. Hendrick settled in Eastern Penna., probably in Northampton County, as it was in Lynn township of that county, now in Lehigh county, that Albert married Barbara Probst on June 23, 1774. Later the same year they set out for the Carolinas, became snowbound in the Shenadoah Valley, Va., but reached N. Carolina the following year and settled in Lincoln County; later moved to what is now Caldwell county, where many of the descendants may be found today. Also a Probst Bible, now in the Sondley Library, Ashville, N. C., gives a little Corpenning data,- the names of Albert Corpenning, Abraham Corpenning and John Corpenning are found, but the latter two are probably the sons of Albert. Three other sons were George, Jacob, and David.

So it appears the tradition, or Fritz, was wrong as to the origin of the family. It was also wrong as to the given name of the Walter involved,- it being Michael, and not John, Walter that joined the family but in Md. And in addition he came direct to eastern Penna., from Europe and settled in Lancaster Co., before he went to Washington Co., Md., where he married Catherine Ankeny, in 1775. The tradition, as given by Fritz, says that the Walter, Ankeny and Corpenning families which settled in Somerset county did not go there until 1780, but that only the men went and left the families in Maryland. But the church records show that all of them had children born and baptized in Somerset county as early as 1777. Also the tradition that says one of the Ankeny girls married a

Corpenning, but gives the name as George, and that the couple moved to North Carolina, and had 8 children, is likewise only in part based on fact. The name George might have been the second name of John, as was common at the time, - being in fact the baptismal name of their third son, as shown later. Also they did have 8 children who probably grew to maturity, though there were only 7 children at the time of the father's death in 1804, as shown by the settlement papers. And in this point of the number of children in the Fritz family, Fritz was also wrong, as he included a John who it will be shown must have died before the father. John and Anna Maria Corpenning apparently lived with Michael and Catherine Walter when the 1776 census was taken, as their names are listed together. Also in the christening of their children, the Ankenys, Corpennings and Walters were witnesses for each other many times, and at the marriage of Peter Ankeny's oldest daughter, Elizabeth, the name of John Corpenning is one of the twelve witnesses who signed the certificate, all of them being close relatives. It might also be said of Joseph Ankeny, youngest of the children of Peter, who in his later years refers familiarly to his "Uncles Corpenning and Walter", that if his Uncle Corpenning had moved to N. Carolina when married, Joseph, who was born in 1802, would have known very little of him.

The John Corpenning family lived on a large tract which was very near, or perhaps bordered, that of Peter Ankeny on the west. John Corpenning got a warrant from the State, Feb. 26, 1788, for 300 acres in Bedford (Somerset) County. This farm later became the property of Samuel C. Livengood, and came to be known in the vicinity as the "Livengood Farm". The writer knows it quite well. John and his family were members of the Samuel's Church, Lutheran or Reformed, but perhaps the former. Here Peter and Christian Ankeny and Michael Walter were also prominent members. It is probable that Corpenning and his wife were buried in the cemetery there, but if so, the stones have weathered and lost their inscriptions. So no records of them can be found. It should be said that the name was properly Corpenning until it was changed by Henry, the oldest son, to Chorpenning. The Carolina family, however, still use the old spelling.

2. Elisabeth, b. Sept. 19, 1777, bp. in Somerset Co., Oct. 12, 1777, and Elisabeth Ankeny, wife of Christian, was the witness. Nothing further is heard of Elisabeth, so she probably died early.
2. Henry, b. Nov. 10, 1779, bp. Sept. 1780, Michael Walter being the witness. He died Feb. 21, 1865. His wife whom he married Apr. 7, 1801, was Veronica Schaaf, b. May 2, 1782, d. Oct. 8, 1855, a daughter of John and Veronica Schaaf, the latter one of the step-sisters of Anna Maria, - a daughter of Dewalt Ankeny's second wife by her first husband, Noah Frederick. Henry was a very active citizen, - teacher, farmer, financier, county commissioner in 1815. He was popularly called "Judge", but this title really belongs to his brother George who was an associate judge some years

later. He lived on a good farm, several miles farther west, on the upper New Centerville road. Here he built a stone house which stood for many years; and in the early days of the writer, it was owned by Jonathan Walker whose wife was a granddaughter of Henry. According to the account of Fritz, also a descendant, he moved from the farm to Somerset where he lived on Main St., and later moved to Lavansville, Pa.

The preceding accounts are of the children in the first family of Dewalt Ankeny, except the oldest daughter Catherine. The following are similar accounts of the seven children in his second family, and also of his two step-daughters. Then after that is the account of Catherine Ankeny who married Michael Walter.

The date of birth used here for John is based on the assumption that he really was the posthumous son of Mrs. Frederick who became the second wife of Dewalt Ankeny, as indicated in the early part of this sketch, and that Dewalt adopted him as his own in every respect. It could hardly be otherwise, as this second marriage probably did not take place until 1758, possibly late in the year, and Henry was born to Dewalt and Margaret in 1760; and John must have been older than Henry as Dewalt always mentions him ahead of Henry, and he seems to have named the children in the order of their age. John was a captain in the Eighth Regiment of the Washington County Militia of Maryland. He got one of the home farms, given apparently by lot, and on Apr. 14, 1795, he deeded $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land from his tract to the Lutheran and Reformed Church for a church site and cemetery, now known as St. Paul's, situated on the National Highway, or better known as U.S.#40, a mile or two east of Clear Spring. He held at his death the original tract of Dewalt, called "Well-Pleased", also Galaspy's Bargain, and Clift Spring. Magdalena later, on Jan. 25, 1803, married Major Martin Kirschner, who died Nov. 17, 1817, at the age of 74, having been a prominent soldier and land holder in the Conococheague Valley.

In the following list of children of John and Magdalena, there seems to be some confusion of names, as the baptismal record of Salem Church gives Anna Margaret as born May 2, 1783, baptized July 21, 1783, and witnessed by Adam and Christine Gerlach, the latter a sister, or half-sister of John. But in this list, Elizabeth is given as the oldest, no age given, and Margaritha comes later with the date of birth given as 1794.

So it seems there was a large family but most of the names have been lost. Names of children to the second wife include only two,- there were probably others. He also sold two tracts, both in Turkeyfoot, in 1805 and 1808, and the signature in both cases showed no wife. First two children are from baptismal records.

Jacob seems to have lived for some time in Somerset County, as one or more of his children were baptized there. But he had property in Mt. Pleasant Twp., some of which he sold in 1795, and in the deed is given as a resident of Westmoreland Co. His farm was on Champion Run. He made a will Apr. 6, 1798 and it was probated on May 17, 1798, providing 100 acres for his widow, and the remainder to be rented. John Bonnett, brother-in-law to Peter Ankeny, and the widow Christine were named as executors. The ch. were:

But Joseph was probably a son though he might have been a son of Peter B. Ankeny, a first cousin of George.

Regarding Jacob's widow, Christine, she married Alexander McMullen, or McMillen, as the name seems to have been later, before 1804. On May 15, 1809, a record in Greensburg, Pa. Court House shows that Alexander and Christine, formerly Christine Ankeny, filed a paper stating that as heirs of George Yerion they were entitled to share of his estate and 1/2 such share was granted to guardians for their use. He was settler in Knox Co., O., about 1830, or little later, as he was named as the father of David McMillen who became prominent there, and the mother was named as Christine Yearian. David was oldest of five children born to Christine and Alexander.

1. MARGARET, b. probably 1762 - 1767, mentioned in Dewalt's will as one of the daughters of his second marriage. The only record we have of her, or rather the two records, are as follows: In the baptismal records of Salem Church, near Hagerstown, Md., where other Ankeny records have been found, is found this item which without doubt refers to her, - Jacob, born Nov. 3, 1781, baptized Jan. 3, 1782; parents: Jacob Kirschner and Margaretha Angona, unmarried; witnesses: - Adam Gerlach and Christine. The other item is this: in the records of Washington County, given in the History of Maryland, by Brunbaugh, one finds among the marriages there recorded the following: Elder Broden and Margaretha Acconi, by Rev. Young, on April 9, 1783. The early spelling of the name Ankeny in Maryland was generally Anconi. So there is also little doubt that this refers also to Dewalt's Margaret. Also we have a follow-up to this marriage, as we find in the church record of Samuel's, in Somerset Co., where the Ankenys, the Walter and Chorpenning families all belonged, that on May 1, 1787, the pastor baptized Wilhelm, son of Elder Bruden and Margarotha, b. May 27, 1784, the witnesses being Peter and Rosina Ankeny. So it appears rather definite that Margaret had these two sons at least. In 1806, one William Braden died in Somerset Co., leaving a widow named Margaret, later married again to a Mr. Waggoner. She had one child living by Braden, under 14, for whom she asked the court for a guardian. It is possible that might be the Wilhelm referred to above. But it should be mentioned that a large clan of Bradens lived, and died, in Westmorland Co. to which this man might belong. No further data on Margaret or her family has been found.

1. ELIZABETH, youngest of Dewalt's children, b. Dec. 4, 1772, and bp. Feb. 28, 1773, as the child of Theobald Angena and wife, and witnessed by Elizabeth Ruf(in). As explained before, it is believed that the name Theobald is the one most ministers used for the name Dewald. The record is also found in the Salem Church book, referred to above. There is still a question as to her future life after the death of her father when she was only nine years of age. She likely remained with her mother; but what became of the widow is not clear either. Again she may have lived with one of her older brothers, perhaps in Somerset County. As Joseph Ankeny's sketch, which we summarized in the section devoted to him says one of the daughters married a Mr. Benford, it is the theory of this writer that she may have married John Benford, member of a pioneer family in Somerset at that time, and died after the birth of two or three children, and so have dropped out of the knowledge of the next generation. There was a Catherine Benford who was born about 1791 - 1794, who married John Bruner, great grandfather of the writer, and she could well be Elizabeth's daughter. Catherine seems to have had a brother named Peter who was with the Bruners at times, and attended church communion with them in 1818 - 1819, several times, and he could easily be a son of Elizabeth, as the name Peter would be a "natural". However, there is nothing substantial to uphold this theory, except that John Benford's later wife was Elizabeth Ling, and to her he had 18 children; but the tradition has been that he was the father of 21 children.

It seems unlikely that at this late date anything definite can be learned about her and the children she may have had. An Elizabeth Ankeny, along with Peter Lenhart and Elizabeth Lenhart, were confirmed at Samuel's Church July 9, 1789. It seems probable this was Dewalt's Elizabeth as she would have been 16 years of age at that time. It indicates her residence in Somerset Co., at that time, and so it would be likely she may have married there. Whether it was to John Benford, as implied above, or to some other, or died single at an early age, her name does not appear again in the church records. If married to John Benford, two children were:

From the same source we learn that at his death he left besides widow, five sons and six daughters. First records of Schoff and his wife are from the Salon Church, near Hagerstown, Md. One of these shows that a son David was christened there on Apr. 11, 1773, born Jan. 13, 1773. Apparently they lived there before moving to Somerset County with the others of the Ankeny relationship. The farm he obtained was near the present town of Rockwood, and the first settlement there was called "Schoaf's Bridge". Here he got a warrant for 295 acres on which the survey was made Feb. 25, 1776. Later the Shaff farm was located a mile or two farther west. The data given below about the children of the oldest son David has been taken from a book on the Oldfather Family which the writer found several years ago in a Los Angeles library.

Whether or not these men were relatives is not known, nor whether the girls were raised by relatives in Pennsylvania, or went with their mother and step-father to Maryland. However, they both seem to have married in Maryland, or at least lived there in their early years. Both took out land in Somerset County, Pa., where Fanny (Veronica) and her husband spent their lives. But for some reason, Christine and Adam moved to Ohio, and settled in Greene County, near Xenia, where some of the Maryland Ankeny families had settled. What follows in this sketch is rather incomplete, having been gathered entirely from accounts in the histories of Washington Co., Md. and Greene Co, Ohio. There were, no doubt, other children in this Gerlach family, in addition to the sons given here. From the deed records at Hagerstown, it appears that Adam Gerlach owned numerous properties in Maryland, and from the church records we find that he and Christine were witnesses frequently for christenings in the family of John and Magdalena Ankeney. The baptism of his own children except for Susanna and for John Adam, Jr. was not recorded in the churches usually attended by the Ankeney's. From Conover's History of Greene County, Ohio, it is found that he moved to that county in 1806 and settled in Beaver Creek township, not far from Dayton. He took up land there, and later Adam, Jr., had title to perhaps one thousand acres. He died at an advanced age; Christine d. 1806-8, Adam later md. Madeline, mother of S. Puterbaugh.

Will of a Wealthy American in 1781

Quaint Document exhibiting the legal phraseology of the first years of the American Republic - Estate of a "Rich" Citizen.

In the name of God, Amen. The eleventh day of March in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hundred eighty one. I Devault Anconey, of Washington County & State of Maryland, being sick in body but of good and perfect memory, thanks be given to Almighty God, and calling to remembrance the uncertain Estate of this Transitory life and that all flesh must yield unto Death, when it shall please God to call do make constitute, ordain and declair this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, Revoking and annulling by these all and Every Testament & Testiments, Will & Wills heretofore by me made & declair, Either by Word or Writing, and this is only to be taken only for my last Will and Testament, and none other, and first being penitent from the bottom of my heart for my sins past and most humbly desiring forgiveness for the same, I give and commit my soul unto Almighty God, my Saviour and Redeemer in Whom and by the Merit of Jesus Christ I trust and believe assuredly to be saved, and to have full Remission of all my sins and that my Soul with my body at the General day of Resurrection shall rise again with Joy and through the Merit of Christ's Death & Passion Possesses, inherit the Kingdom of Heaven prepared for the Elect and chosen and my body to be buried within the orchard fence by the graves that is already therein and now for the setting of my Temporal Estate and such goods, chattels, and Debts as it has pleased God far above my deserts to bestow upon me. I do order, give and dispose the same in manner and form following that is to say First I will all those debts and Duties as I owe in right to any manner of person or persons whatsoever well and truly, paid and contented or ordained to be paid within convenient time after my decease by my executors hereinafter named.

ITEM I give and bequeath three hundred Acres of land the Lower Part of the Original whereon I now live with all the meadows & improvements thereunto belonging, to Whichever two of my sons it shall fall to by a fair Drawing of Tickets for the same by my seven sons hereinafter named, Christian, Peter, John, Henry, David, Jacob & George Anconey, the Advantage of the Water within the Meadows to be equally Advantageous, each to the other, and further the said three Hundred Acres of land is to be Justly appraised and valued in hard money or the exchange at the time of Appraisement, by my sons which is come of Age, then the said sons shall find and Give to my beloved Wife Margaret Anconey Yearly and every for the Term of Six years if in case the four younger is not properly educated the two sons as aforesaid is to give to the said Margaret Anconey yearly twenty five Bushells of Good Merchantable Wheat Each also ten bushells of good Rye, each also ten Bushells of good Indian Corn, also ten Bushells of good Buck Wheat each, Also five Bushells of good Barley Each, Also fifteen Bushells Potatoes Each, Likewise the said sons is to find sd Margaret Anconey one tun of Good First

Crop hay Each, also one tun & a half Each Second Crop hay and the whole to be delivered by sd sons in good order into the barn or the Stable which she shall think proper, and the aforesaid sons that gets ye place is to move the old house from where it now stands on the other side of the Upper Spring and to repair the same in such manner as she ye said Margaret Anconey may live warm and decently in the same. Also they are to put into said House my pipe stove which now stands in my Room with the pipe thereto and she said Margaret is to have sd house & stove during her natural life if she chooses. Likewise my Wife is to have the negro Girl Rachel during her natural life, then after her decease the said Negro Rachel is to be sold and the money or price of her is to be divided amongst the Whole Children seven Boys & five Girls, the sons is to chop and haul all the firewood for said Margaret Anconey during the time she may or shall have occasion for it. Likewise the sd sons shall find sd Margaret Anconey One Large Year Old Hog Each Yearly & Every Year fit for fattening. Also fifteen pounds of Good Hacked Hemp Each and fifteen pounds of Good Tow each. Likewise the sd Margaret Anconey is to have her choice of a horse or mare out of all I have, with her Saddle & Bridle, the Saddle and Bridle to be found new by said sons Likewise she is to have three cows the choice of the Pen.

ITEM I give and Bequeath Two hundred acres of land it being the remaining part of my Original Tract called Well Pleased lying North East of the aforesaid three hundred Acres to any two sons of my seven sons as aforesaid whichever one shall draw it by a fair drafts of Tickets as aforesaid for the Other three hundred Acres, it being also appraised or valued by my sons as before Mentioned and at the expiration of six years the appraisement Money of the said two hundred Acres of Land is to be Equally divided amongst My Twelve Children to be paid in Equal payments Every year within the term of four years after the appraisement of sd Land. Likewise the before mentioned three hundred acres the value of which is to be equally divided amongst my twelve Children, and paid them within or at the Expiration of four years as before Mentioned by which ever two sons get it, but if in case my son Peter Anconey should draw one of the improved places in the Original Tract whereon I now live it is my desire that he should let one of his younger Brothers have the place whereon he now lives according to the appraisement of each or as they otherwise agree, but if my son Peter should not be willing to agree with his Brother it is my desire that he Will purchase one for his Brother that may be educated to the appraisement.

ITEM Whichever of my sons as does not draw a piece of land in my Original Tract shall each one have one Tract of land lying in Milford Township in ye State of Pennsylvania at the first cost. One bought of Michael Huff 55.0 One bought of John Shoffe 143.0-0. One bot of Mattathias Ditch 36.10 One bot of Jacob Honke \$110. Hard Cash.

ITEM I give to my beloved wife to take her choice of four ewes of the best of my Flock, likewise all of my household furniture during her natural life and after her decease it is to be sold and the money equally Divided amongst the Children, except

the three Cows & their increase after her Decease is to be given to my youngest Daughter Elizabeth. Moreover after the expiration of six years, which two of my sons gets the places, they are and shall find my beloved wife Yearly and Every Year a good and sufficient Maintenance of Meat & drink & Cloathing & other Necessary which she may or shall stand in need of.

ITEM I do ordain and order that all my Stock & farming utencils Except that I have already Bequeathed shall be sold by Public Vendue and the money arising therefrom shall be Equally Divided among the Twelve Children and my beloved Wife Margaret. Likewise Sixty Pounds Good Money which I received with my wife Margaret by our marriage which sum I appoint to be divided between said wife and the children that she had by me viz My sons John, Henry, David, Jacob & George Anconey & my daughters Margaret & Elizabeth Anconey, by her first husband Franey and Christina Frederick, all in equal shares, and if God in his Providence should call me off the stage of life before my younger children should receive their Learning in the dutch School I appoint that my wife shall receive Twenty Pounds of Good Money out of the Vendue Money for the School the sd children. And I ordain and appoint my beloved wife Margaret and my oldest son Christian Anconey my executors of this my last Will and Testament, for the true intent and Meaning of the same whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this day and year above Writing.

This Will in its wording and punctuation except the above two endorsements has been copied from an authentic copy in the Journal of American History, vol. 2, pp 661, 662, being the issue for the fourth quarter, 1908. Copy made by Chas. R. Shultz, of Swissvale, Pa., Jan. 17, 1939.

It may be inferred from the terms mentioned in the will relative to the "Negro girl Rachel," that Margaret, the widow of Dewalt, had died before Apr. 17, 1791, that being the date when Rachel was received into the Samuel's Church, in Somerset County. She was to be sold "after the widow's death"; and apparently at the time given she was in the household of the Peter Anconey, an elder of this church. Of course, she was no longer a slave, as slavery did not exist in Penna.

Note: Relative to JOHN, Page 76, first of Dewalt's second family, a descendant gives the date of his birth as 1759, and of his death as Feb. 28, 1799. The writer does not know the source, or authority, of the date of birth. It would have, of course, a bearing on whether John was a real, or an adopted son, as assumed in this account.

Ankeny Data, Unclassified or supplementary

Two early deeds of the Ankenys, - one by Christian, and one to Peter, recorded in Bedford, Pa. (before Somerset was made separate.)

Christian Ankeny to Leonard Stahl, 223 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres, warranted to him. 9/6/1774, adjacent to M. Huff and J. Weimer, for 140 pounds, - dated Apr. 19, 1784, signed by Christian and no wife. Also Jonathan Buck to Peter Ankeny, of Milford township, 325 acres, which he obtained in 3 parcels, 308 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres from Ulrich Bruner, Nov. 12, 1789; 18 ac. from Henry Bruner, Dec. 1, 1792; and 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ac. from Herman Husband, June 8, 1792, adjacent each other, and comprising $\frac{1}{2}$ of Milford town, - J. Buck having sold 3 lots of said town plan, and another acre out of the original 325 acres, - for 300 pounds. Deed signed June 8, 1792, by Jonathan and Leruah Buck. (This tract was the part of the town laid out by Peter Ankeny.)

The following belongs to Account of Henry Ancony, of Dewalt: Death of Dr. Frank Nowcomer Hoffmeier, of heart attack, of 442 N. Potomac St., Hagerstown, Md. He was a noted specialist in X-ray work, was a captain of the medical corps in the first World War. Had many honors, member of all the Masonic bodies. He died Feb. 19, 1948, at his home. His widow, former Nellie Mc-Cardell, a daughter, Miss Susan Jean Hoffmeier, a brother, Henry Hoffmeier, of Arlington, Va., two sisters, - Miss Emily Hoffmeier, of Westchester, Pa., and Miss Helen Hoffmeier, of Hagerstown, survive. See page 83.

In the 1850 census for Jenner twp., Somerset County, Pa. Washington Ankeny, age 33 (Thus born about 1817.)
Joseph Ankeny, age 16 " " " 1834. They were listed in the census as one family, or living together.

The Knupp connection with the Ankenys, - hard to make out J. Madison Knupp, 82, d. in Bakersville, Pa. 1943, thus b. 1861. His widow is Ida B. Miller Knupp. He was a son of Levi and Mary Ankeny Knupp.

Mrs. Rena Lou Knupp, a daughter of Calvin Knupp, md. John Clark Walters, son of late Palmer and Mrs. Annie Walters, Lavansville.

S. E. Knupp, 71, died in Somerset, Pa., in 1945, thus b. 1874. He was prominent in the automobile business in Somerset 1912-1936. He was a son of Eli and Harriet Ankeny Knupp, b. in Westmoreland Co., May 20, 1874. He md. Elizabeth Shaulis; a daughter Ruth Wilson, dec., a granddaughter md. _____ Wolff, and a sister is Mrs. Ed Sechler, also a brother and a sister died earlier.
