ON this ~~twenty second~~ day of February 1833, personally appeared in open Court, before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, in and for said County, now sitting, ~~Jonathan~~ <sup>Case</sup> a resident of ~~Seth~~ <sup>Seth</sup> in said County, aged 76 years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers, and served as herein stated. ~~At the time of the Revolution war and during~~ the war he resided in Ashfield in the State of Massachusetts that before the war began he enlisted as a minuteman in a company commanded by Capt Smith & served with Dooly in regiment commanded by Col Ward and Major Reedham that as soon as papers could come after the battle of Lexington he was called into actual service it was on the 21<sup>st</sup> or 22<sup>d</sup> of April 1775 that he and his company marched to Cambridge and joined the army there that he served in the army of the United States under the above mentioned officers ~~the term of 9 months in General Loring's Brigade that~~ he was stationed at Cambridge until after the Battle on Bunker's Hill and was then stationed at Dorchester to the end of the term of nine months service, that he was in the battle of Bunker's Hill that he went on <sup>in the morning</sup> to the Hill that he retreated <sup>Prospect</sup> Hill saw an Bunker's Hill General Warren Putman Col Brewer Major Moore & that as a minuteman he served nine months which was the longest term that he could be held that his term expired the 21<sup>st</sup> or 22<sup>d</sup> of January 1776.

And the said Jonathan Case further declares that at the expiration of his nine months term of service he enlisted into the service of the United for the term of one year and served in the army of the Revolution the full term of one year in a company commanded by Capt Samuel Bortlett Lieut Samuel Allen & Ensign Caleb White in a Regiment commanded by Col Ward in General Loring's Brigade or under his command that he joined his new company and commenced his years term of service at Dorchester the 22<sup>d</sup> or 23<sup>d</sup> day of January 1776 at the expiration of his nine months service that he was with the troops that took possession of Dorchester

with the army for New York they went by land to New  
London and then went by Water to New York that he

that from Long Island he retreated to New York  
from New York to Kingsbridge from Kings Bridge  
went to White Plains that he was in the <sup>last</sup> ~~at~~ White Plains  
from White Plains to Deeks Hill where he remained  
till the expiration of his term of service that he was  
discharged the first of January 1777 does not recollect  
the particular <sup>any</sup> that he in the whole served one year  
and nine ~~months~~ <sup>a few days</sup> as a private Soldier that in the  
years term of service he was acquainted with General  
Washington Greene Sullivan Lee Lord Sterling &

That he was born in the town of Middletown in  
the State in the State of Connecticut in the year 1757  
that he has no record of his age and knows a few  
Clergymen who is acquainted in the neighborhood  
where he resides that James Hewett John Hewett  
Truman Hamblin John Mowbray James Hewett  
reside in his neighborhood and can testify as to his  
reputation for truth and veracity and that he is repu-  
ted in the neighborhood where he resides to have served  
as he states that he knows of no person has personal  
viewed of his service in the army of the Revolution

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or Annuity except the present; and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State.

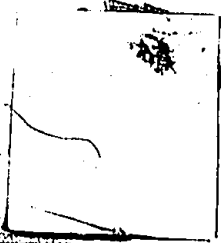

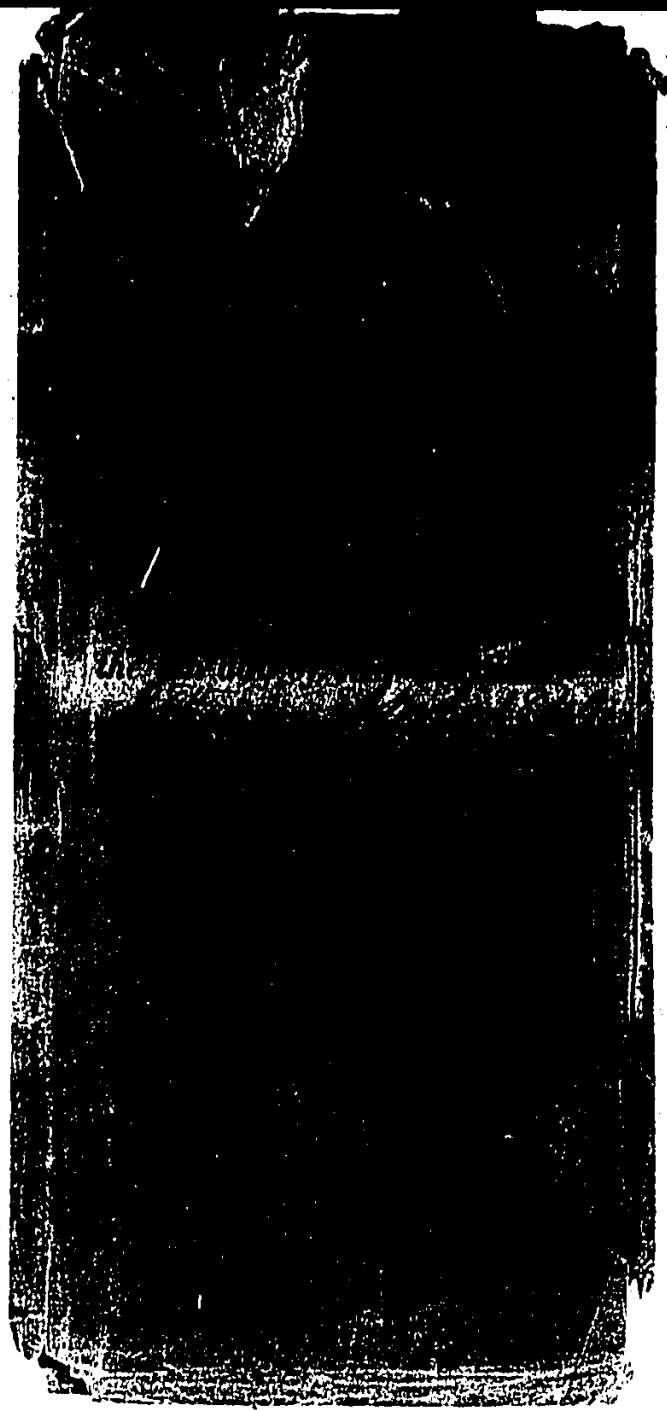

An Special Term of the Supreme Court held  
at the Court House in the Town of Lyons in the  
County of Wayne and State of New York on the  
thirteenth day of December in the Year of  
our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and forty  
nine. Present Samuel S. Selden Justice  
Personally appeared Catharine Carr a resident  
of the Town of Wolcott in the County of Wayne  
aged Eighty Eight years who being duly sworn  
according to law doth on her Oath Make  
the following Declaration in Oath to obtain the  
benefit of the provisions made by act of Congress  
passed "29<sup>th</sup> July 1848" That she is the widow of  
Jonathan Carr who was a private in the Army  
of the Revolution and drew a Pension of Seventy  
Dollars per Annum His Pension Certificate was  
dated May 16<sup>th</sup> 1833 and Recorded in the Pension  
Office in Porto E. Vol. 4 Page 50. by George Taylor  
Clk. to. That she was born on the 29<sup>th</sup> day of  
March A.D. 1761 That she was Married to the  
above named Jonathan Carr on the thirteenth  
day of January in the year One Thousand Seven  
Hundred and Eighty in the town of Schaghticoke  
Rensselaer County New York and there and  
believes that the Minister name who married  
her was Benjamin Rensselaer of the Presbyterian  
Church. That her husband the aforesaid Jonathan  
Carr died on the twenty eight day of April  
in the year one Thousand Eight Hundred and  
Forty nine. And that she further swears that she  
is now a Widow and that she has never  
before made any application for a Pension.

brothers and three sisters younger than myself  
as set forth in the declaration of my mother.  
That my father Jonathan Carr was a pensioner  
of the United States and received seventy dollars per  
Annum his Certificate was dated May 16<sup>th</sup> 1833  
That he died in the town of Miletto, Wayne County  
New York on the 28<sup>th</sup> day of April 1849. The  
records which is attached has been made more than  
thirty eight years being in an old book which has  
been in the family forty years.
