Anglers looking to recapture the brass ring

2003 CITGO BASS Federation Championship

Imagine cashing in on a 10,000-to-one chance ... twice. The dream of nearly every angler competing in BASS Federation tournaments is to advance to the CITGO Bassmaster Classic presented by Busch Beer. In order to achieve that difficult dream, an angler must qualify through the CITGO BASS Federation Championship. Each year, 54 anglers from around the world qualify for the prestigious event out of approximately 50,000 federation anglers. Realizing that the numbers work out to roughly 10,000 to one, it is quite a task for an angler to qualify for one Championship in his career. That makes the accomplishments of Idaho's Tom Schachten, Illinois' Ken Christ, Utah's **Ron Colby** and Maine's Tom Bayley even more remarkable. Each of those anglers has competed in multiple Federation Championships and, in the case of Bayley, Christ and Colby, they have achieved the feat in back-to-back years.

"The time these guys invest in competitive fishing is amazing," said BASS Federation Director Al Smith. "They may not call themselves full-time anglers, but when you look at the amount of time, they probably are full-time, only they have other jobs and careers as well. For someone to qualify for a second Championship is an amazing feat."



Ron Colby finished at the top of his division at last year's Federation Championship and earned a trip to the Classic; he hopes to repeat that success again this year.

For Colby, the road started shortly after last year's Championship event.

"Our Divisional Championship took place about three weeks after I was in Shreveport," said Colby. "I think I was running on adrenaline and everything was going really smoothly. It was a great feeling to re-qualify, because once you've been a part of one and seen the brass ring it makes your drive even harder to get back."

Christ earned his way back to the Championship this year by virtue of being the champion of last year's event. "When Al called and told me, it nearly caused a wreck," said Christ, who is competing in his third Championship, having also qualified in 1993. "This tournament really has the cream of the crop and is a tough tournament wherever it is held because the caliber of the competitors is so high. I was honored to have the opportunity to come back." Both Christ and Colby competed in last year's CITGO Bassmaster Classic and agree that it is a tremendous experience.

"Making the Classic is a dream come true," explained Christ. "It's what every amateur dreams about and shoots for. It is the highlight of your career."

Colby also attempted to qualify as a professional angler through the CITGO Bassmaster Central Open division in the fall, and believes the caliber of anglers in the Federation is close to that of the professionals. "It's very hard to make the Classic as a Federation angler because of the time aspect," explained Colby. "There are also a lot of very good anglers competing that I think could compete on the pro side. They have the same drive and talent as the guys fishing the Opens."

"The performance of these four guys shows the caliber of Federation anglers," said Smith. "It also proves that the Federation is a good place to prepare for and propel an

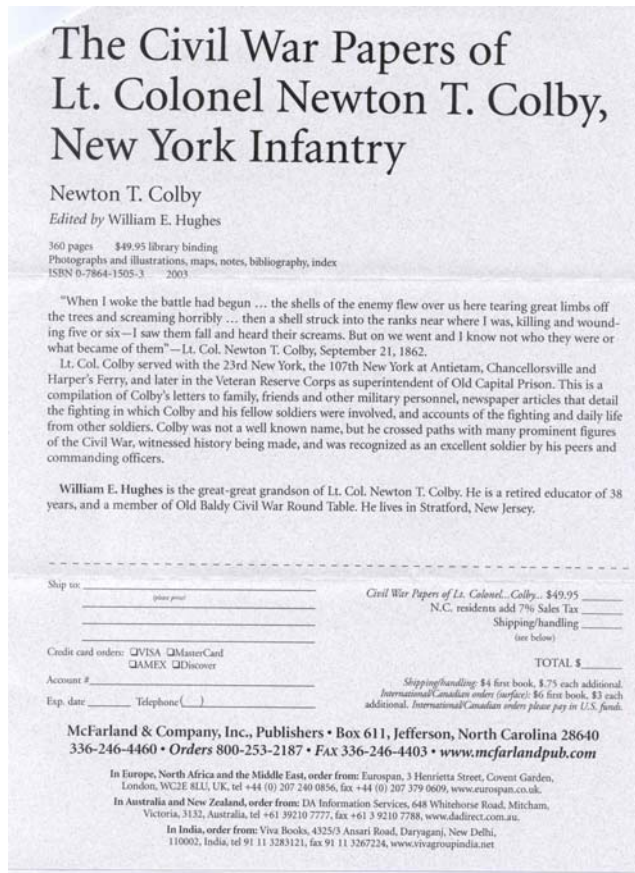


IN MEMORIAM

Interesting Colby facts

In addition to **Ron Colby's** website, you may also find very helpful links and information at **Alice Volkert's** website. Alice updates the information regularly. She provided some insight to the question submitted by Kenneth Scholten in the March 2003 issue. Joseph Kent was married to Dolly, not Polly, Colby. They were contemporaries of Nathan and Eunice Blood, so they could not be grandparents of Gilmeath Horne. With so many Pollys and Dollys, Sarahs and Sallys, and Marys and Marthas, it can get pretty confusing. Thank you Alice!

Gary Vaillancourt of Foley, AL wrote that his daughter lives only blocks from **Roy A. Heutmaker** in Cottage Grove, MN. It's a small world!

John B. Threlfall of Madison, WI responded with comments about the origins of the Colby name. He states, "Kohle is the German word for coal. Kohl is indeed the

word for cabbage, but in England, Cole would mean charcoal." John enclosed a copy of his manuscript from his book, "Fifty Great Migration Colonists to New England," which was published in 1990. John provided me with a copy that I will be happy to send out to those who wish to have one. John says, "Many Colby descendants still believe the claim that our Anthony came from Beccles. He came from Horbling in Lincolnshire, along with his lifelong friend, Simon Bradstreet. I found four Anthony Colbys in old England in the early 1600s. All but the Horbling man can be eliminated for one reason or another." The following is an excerpt from his book: "Colby is a place name deriving, in this case, from the parish of Coleby, which lies seventeen miles northwest of Sempringham and six miles south of Lincoln. There is also a parish of Colby in Norfolk, next to Beccles and it too seems to have been the source of a quite unrelated Colby clan. There are also villages called Colby in Westmoreland, in Yorkshire and one in Denmark.

The place name is of Viking origin and means *coal place*. There are a number of English place names containing the element *cole* (i.e. coal), such as Coleridge, Colclough, and Colebrook. The *-by* suffix is the Viking or Scandinavian word meaning *homestead farm*. Thus, Coleby was probably a farmstead where charcoal was made in ancient times by Viking settlers.

The first record of a Colby in Sempringham is a deed dated 3 February 1421/2 by which William Stanenstone of Pointon conveyed to John Boche and his wife Alice three selions of land in the fields west of Pointon, two of which parcels were bounded by William Colby. This William Colby was undoubtedly an ancestor of the Colbys who lived in the village of Pointon in the parish of Sempringham several generations later.

On 7 May 1505, Robert Rogerson of Pointon granted to John Huchyson of Billingborough and Robert Colby of Pointon, 'one message and 20 acres of land and meadow with all the appurtenances in the village and the fields of Pointon, which lately was inherited after the decease of William Rogerson his father and Alice his wife.' Five days later, on 12 May, John Huchynson and Robert Colby deeded the same property back to Robert Rogerson, his wife Margaret, Katherine (the sister of the late William Rogerson) and a niece, in a somewhat complex deed which was made for the purpose of getting around the laws of primogeniture. Robert Colby was acting as a straw man. This Robert Colby was probably the great grandson of the above William Colby."

More Colby Connections

If you didn't already know, Vice President **Dick Cheney** is a Colby descendant. His line was provided by Ron Colby in Utah: Anthony(1), John(2), Thomas(3), Elias(4), Esther(5), Hannah Eaton(6), Elias Eaton Cheney(7), Samuel Fletcher Cheney(8), Thomas Herbert Cheney(9), Robert Herbert Cheney(10), Richard Bruce Cheney(11).

Barbara Anderson of Portola Valley, CA, sent in some pictures that she has not been able to identify. She also states that the information Weis' book gives for her Colby line is incorrect. On page 190, he lists Mary Colby and Elizabeth Colby as children of Joseph Lunt and Sally Foot Colby. However, Sally died three years before they were born! On page 252, it states that Hannah Fowler married twice. The daughter Hannah that Weis said died the same year she was born, did live. She is the Hannah that married John Lee. Hannah and John Lee took their family to California in 1860-1862 and settled in Vallejo. Their daughter Ann Elizabeth Colby Lee was born in Amesbury (as was her sister Maria) and died in 1912. Their brother Alfred "Alf" Lee was also born in Amesbury. He fought in the Civil War, married a girl from Amesbury and, when he died, was buried by his uncle Ralph Colby in the Newburyport Cemetery.

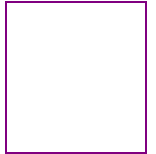
Reunion RSVP
