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Crawford County During The Civil War

Jonathan J. Hubbard.


He is written about in the 1901 Biographic sketches of Cowley County. He came in 1870. [1870] PAGE 49.

JONATHAN J. HUBBARD, a veteran of the Civil War, was one of the prosperous farmers of Cowley County, Kansas, residing on section 18, in Vernon Township. He was a native of Harrison County, Indiana, and a son of James Hubbard. His grandfather was born on the other side of the Blue Ridge Mountains, in Virginia, and both his grandfathers were in the battle of Tippecanoe, in which his paternal grandfather was shot in the left arm, necessitating amputation.

James Hubbard, father of Jonathan J. Hubbard, was born in Virginia, but was taken to Harrison County, Indiana, in 1800, the year of his birth. From his father he learned farming, which was his occupation throughout his entire active career. About the commencement of the War of the Rebellion, he broke his thigh, and though he was unable to serve in behalf of the Union, his sons, nevertheless, voiced his patriotism, as several of them enlisted in the Union Army. Mr. Hubbard was united in marriage with Rebecca Battman, who was also born in Harrison County, Indiana, and whose parents were natives of England and Scotland. They had ten sons and two daughters: Jeremiah; John; Mary E. (Burnett); Francis Marion; Jonathan J.; Christopher Columbus; Andrew Jackson; Benjamin Franklin; James K. Polk; Elvira (Newkirk); Josiah; and George Washington. Mr. Hubbard passed to the other world in 1890, after living four score and ten years. His widow died at the age of sixty-eight years.

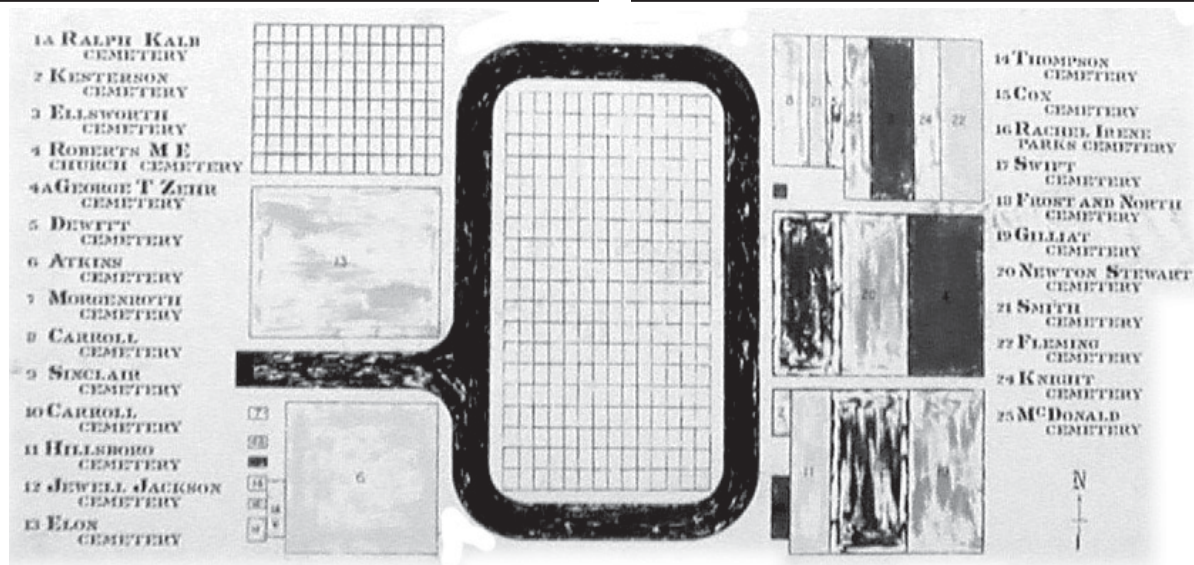

SCHOOLS OF GREENFIELD TOWNSHIP

This township not having been settled so early, schools were not organized here until a later date than in the other townships of the county. I have not been able to locate the first school within this township. Among the earliest was the one organized in the old log church at Providence. Amos Critchfield was the first teacher here. He taught a six months' session in 1830. The patrons of this school were the Stones, McCanns, Bennetts, Pitmans, Kendalls, Agans, Newkirks and Grimeses.

Critchfield Family Cemeteries

There are two known Critchfield Cemeteries in Greenfield Township, Orange County, Indiana.

The second cemetery is located in Section 26, T1-S, R1-W. It is abandoned and the location is unknown by this writer. Critchfield families were among the early settlers in the township. Amos Critchfield entered land in the southwest of this section in 1854. In 1830, he taught school in Providence log meeting house. His wife was Susanna Real. The little cemetery is on their farm. Some of the markers have fallen. Besides six marble stones with inscriptions, there are a few sand stone markers, evidently graves of children. The inscriptions were copied by James L. Noblitt.

When the Civil War broke out, Mr. Jonathan J. Hubbard laid aside all plans for the future to take part in the contest for the preservation of the Union. He became a private in Company C, 17th Reg. Ind. Vol. If. He enlisted December 6, 1861, and served three years and nine months. He was in the battle of Chickamauga, and in the engagement at Selma, Alabama, where 18 of the 36 men in his company were killed. He saw two weeks of constant fighting around Kennesaw Mountain, in Georgia, at which time his company was under John T. Wilder. In many of the skirmishes he was so near the Confederates that he could see their eyes. He took part in the Atlanta campaign, during which he was at the front on skirmish duty. While under fire Mr. Hubbard was always cool and deliberate, and although he displayed much valor, he was not a man to expose himself needlessly to danger. Many a time he lay behind rocks which the enemy's bullets scaled, and he concealed himself behind stumps, while the leaden missiles pealed the bark from the other side. On one occasion a bullet passed through his blouse, and he felt the wind from hundreds of bullets, but fortunately he never received a single scratch from any of them.

Mr. Hubbard chose for his life companion Mary H. Pennington, a native of Harrison County, Indiana, and their home was blessed by the birth of seven children: Dennis; Elvira, deceased; Rebecca (Porter); Floyd W.; Rosalind; Nicholas Smith; and Howard.

Notes for William Harned:

William was born in Pennsylvania. He married Rosanna Shyrock (or Schryock), whether in Pennsylvania or Virginia, it is not known. Their children were all born in Virginia. They lived in Loudoun County. On August 22, 1802, his wife Rosanna died and he married her sister, Margaret. (This may not be so - in Rosanna's father's will, he listed Rosanna Harned, dec'd and her sister Margaret was married to Ezra Fox at that time, abt. 1833 and their marriage record was found in 1799). In 1805 they moved up near the village of Hillsborough, where they remained until Sept. 1, 1813.

In this document William Harned mortgages a parcel of land that he is purchasing from the estate of Robert McCormack. The Mortgage is to Joseph Lovett and Samuel Smith in the amount of \$941.37 which is to be paid back in the amount of one third each year for three years .

Contract of William Harned

Loudoun Co, Virginia August 1807

William Harned and his wife Margaret buy a house from Lewis Ellzey for \$478.34 and sell it to James G Hamilton, George S. Hough and Thomas Hough for one cent to pay off a debt. Harned agrees to pay Ellzey the amount due by April 1809 or the house will be sold to pay off the debt.

This day in open court renounces all allegiance to any foreign king, potentate or power whatever and more particularly to George the Fourth, King of Great Britain of whom he is now a subject and says that he intends to reside in Crawford County, Indiana and become a citizen of the United States.

Signed this 26th day of March, 1822.

At this time came the Plaintiff by H. H. Moore, Esq., his attorney, and on motion leave is given him to amend the Declaration filed in this cause whereupon he amended *instantus* and it is ordered by the Court that this cause stand continued until next term at the Plaintiff cost.

Daniel Weathers vs. Archibald Allen & Others — Case.

This cause is continued for want of a Declaration.

Caldwell Hisk vs. Valentine Sauerheber — Debt.

At this time came the parties by their attorneys and on motion of the Plaintiff *dedinuerm* are awarded him to take depositions in the State of Virginia and this cause stands continued until next term.

William Harned sells a parcel of land to Jesse Evans for the sum of \$700. The parcel consists of 3/4 of an acre and is sold together with a house and all buildings.

Sale of Land

William Harned Loudoun Co., VA
December 1, 1813

William Harned sells to Benjamin Brooke a parcel of land and all of its structures for \$2,086. The land consists of 65 acres and 33 perches .

William made a nice profit on his property of 65 acres before they started west. He made \$1772.21, and only had the property four years. They then left for the west, crossing the Blue Ridge. As they began the ascent the road was dusty, but before they arrived at the summit the road was almost unpassable because of the snow. The cold was very severe. They arrived at a place called Redstone, now Brownsville. William, in company with a man named George Smithers, got a flat boat built and in this they floated down the river to Marietta (then called Limestone), where Smithers left them for Greene River, KY. Harned and his family proceeded on down to Cincinnati, Ohio, the place of their destination. William concluded that this place was too old a settlement for him and they halted only long enough to lay in a supply of provisions and then floated on to Louisville, KY, to the mouth of the then classic Bear Gran. They arrived there between Christmas and New Years. They found relatives in Kentucky, where they remained while Harned came over into Indiana Territory hunting, and finally entered a quarter section about 25 miles west of the village of Valeene, in Orange county. After this the family moved to Indiana, where it was yet in its native wilderness. William rented a sort of cabin from John Hollowell, and then he and his family began their pioneer life in earnest by cutting logs and building a cabin of 18 feet square. They then moved in, and went to thinning out the timber which was very heavy. They made slow progress, as they were unacquainted with such kinds of labor. They toiled on, although at times in straighted circumstances for bread, and at other times flooded with good things, such as bear, venison, turkey, and the very best of fish.

(Much of the above was sent to me by Thelma Lindley and is from the genealogy section of the John Hay Museum in Salem, IN.)

William was a Quaker, and was received by request into the Quakers on Sept. 24, 1808. (Since he was requested into the Quakers, his father had not been a Quaker). He was issued a

certificate of membership May 27, 1809, at the Goose Creek monthly meeting in Loudoun Co., VA. On Nov. 15, 1820, he was appointed clerk at the Lick Creek, IN, monthly meeting. He died in Orange County, IN, where he had moved to in February 1814, and had farmed until his death .

Notes for John Schyrock Harned:

John S. Harned was born in Loudoun County, Va., in 1796, and when twenty-one years of age emigrated to Canton, Washington Co., Ind., where he taught school, and later engaged in merchandising. He was a member of the Society of Friends; was an honored and esteemed citizen, and died June 22, 1880. His wife was also a Quaker in religious belief, and died several years previous to the death of her husband.

on his farm near Valeene, and was run by the waters of Patoka Creek. For several years it was in full operation, but has for some time been destroyed.

From page 375: The Valeene fortification was an embankment upon the banks of Patoka Creek, on the farm of Amuel Harned, about one-half mile east of Valeene, built to withstand siege.

From page 543: At what is known as Harned Chapel, three miles southwest of Valeene, is another class of Methodist church, that was formed about the year 1845. The church house was built of logs and afterward weather-bearded. It is now a very comfortable building and has cost about \$500, being contributed by people who lived adjacently. Thomas Harned and family, the Dillards, Sloans, Crandalls, Bateses, Stones and others were among the principal early members. Three of the Harned boys — William, Michael, and John became noted as preachers, they first preaching at Indianapolis and Jeffersonville. This church has been prosperous and in connection with it is maintained a good Sunday school. The Christian Church at Valeene was organized about the year 1830. Samuel Harned was among the prominent members of this society.
