John Morris and Lurana Ballard married the 26th day of September 1866 in Crawford County, Indiana.

Lurana Riggle, daughter of James and Elizabeth Riggle, was born in Pennsylvania March 8, 1833, and died November 27, 1906 at her home, six miles south of English. She moved to Indiana with her parents in childhood. She was married to William Ballard, December 9, 1852. To this union there were six children born: three girls and three boys, one of these, a daughter, died in infancy,

his way with his wife and lawyer, Mr. Hatfield, of Booneville, Ind., from Augusta, Ga., to Cincinnati. He says he first went to Louisville and then to Augusta, where he remained until Tuesday. He determined to return home after being told by his attorney that the assignee of the three banks which closed Nov. 9 by his departure had said the banks would pay out. Willett declares he is not a defaulter, and says he left \$15,000 cash, which could just as well have been taken with him. He says he loaned too much. He foresaw a coming crisis, and fled because he feared personal injury, owing to enemies he had made in the county seat contest in that county. He says he will return to Leavenworth Saturday, and will do all in his power to assist the assignee in settling the affairs of the banks.

AT POINT OF GUNS

Revenue Officers Arrest Quartet in Crawford County.

Tuesday's Daily

M. B. Thurman, deputy internal revenue collec-

tor of the New Albany district, returned this morning from Crawford county where he has been engaged for several days in investigating reports of the operation of an illicit still. As a result of his secret trip a worm and still were captured and William Tucker, Charles Tucker, Mahlen Newton and John Newton are in the Crawford county jail at English. The apparatus used in making moonshine whiskey was shipped to this city and will be used as evidence in the United States court.

At present the charge against the quartet of Crawford county residents is for robbing freight cars of the Southern Railway Company and the evidence obtained by Deputy Internal Revenue Collector Thurman will be forwarded to the internal revenue office at Terre Haute, where complaints will be filed against those who are alleged to have been engaged in violating Uncle Sam's internal revenue laws.

In the arrest of the quartet, which was made after midnight last Friday night at the point of guns, Collector Thurman was assisted by John Chewning, deputy internal revenue collector of the Evansville district, and Detectives Perry and McIntosh, of the Southern railway.

For several months the Southern has been suffering from the depredations of a gang of car thieves, the booty secured amounting to hundreds of dollars. In investigating the robberies the Southern detectives ascertained that some members of the gang were engaged in "moonshining" and the railway company and internal revenue department co-operated in an attempt to break up not only the robberies but also the illicit distilling.

Last Thursday the officers went to Crawford County and quietly secured evidence that appeared to point to the culprits and late Friday night they started for the neighborhood several miles south of Eckerty, forty miles west of this city. The Tucker home was surrounded, and at the muzzle of revolvers William and Charles Tucker were ordered to throw up their hands and they were handcuffed. Later the Newtons were caught at their home and the quartet were taken to English and placed in jail.

A large quantity of merchandise of various kinds, which was identified by the Southern officials as property that had been stolen from freight cars,

Lizzie Condra, another daughter died May 17, 1903. William Ballard, her husband, was a soldier of the Civil War, and gave his life for his country in 1863 on the battlefield of Murfreesboro. Mrs. Ballard, the widow, was then married to John Morris, September 27th, 1866. To this union there were born three children, John, George, and Samuel, of which Samuel and John had preceded their mother to the other world.

John Morris died in April 1877. Sister Morris has been a member of the U. B. Church for a number of years. She said that she was prepared to meet her God. She leaves five children, Charles Ballard, William Ballard (Dennis, Glennis, and Peggy's grand father, their dad Jerry Ballard's father), Walter Ballard, Emma Dillman (my great grandmother, my dad John Dillman's grand mother—his dad, Elmer Dillman's mother), George Morris.

These mourn the loss of a faithful and loving mother, but while these mourn she is enjoying a happy reunion with those that were taken from her: she also leaves a number of grandchildren and a host of friends to mourn her departure. The funeral was preached by the Rev. W. H. Howerton at Riddle M. E. Church at 2 o'clock p. m. Thursday November 29, 1906, after which the body was laid to rest in the cemetery at that place.

William H. Ballard son of William and Lurana Ballard was born November 5, 1861, and departed this life June 29, age 69 years, 7 months, and 24 days. He married Julia C. Wright, October 4, 1885. Six children were born in this union, three girls and three boys: Mrs. Lillie Enlow, of Union Chapel; Mrs. Metta Highfull, of Oak Grove; Mrs. Bertha Cole of Leavenworth; John Ballard (married Rosa Schultz, sister of my dad, John Dillman's mother—Elizabeth Christina Schultz Dillman, in other words, John married my grand mother's sister) and Jerry Ballard, of Riddle. (Crawford County, Indiana and one boy who died in infancy.

He leaves to mourn his departure his wife and children, two brothers, Walter Q. and Charles of Burnett, and one sister, Mrs. Emmaline Dillman (my grand mother) of Temple, and a half brother, George Morris, of Cape Sandy.

He is buried at Riddle Cemetery, next to Lurana. [I live about a couple of miles from the

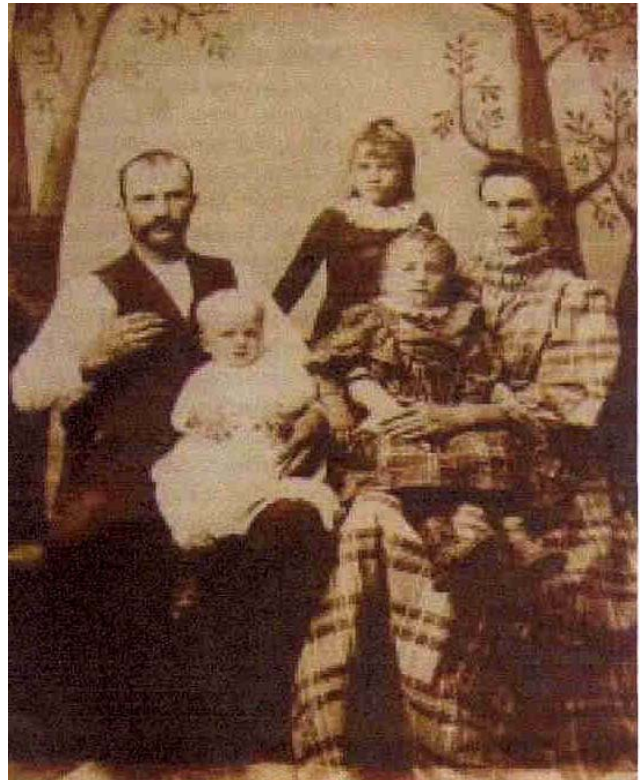

Riddle church and cemetery.]

Walter Q. Ballard, son of William and Lurana Ballard, was born February 10, 1866, and died April 15, 1937, aged 71 years, 2 months and 5 days. He married Pearl Batman on January 1, 1900, to this union 5 children were born: Elwood, Charles and Ethel Elliott, of near English; Lucille Fischer and Hilda Ballard, of Indianapolis. Besides his children he leaves one grandson, Harold Elliott, one half brother, George Morris, of Cape Sandy; one sister, Mrs. Emma Dillman and a host of relative and friends.

His wife preceded him in death on May 5, 1936; also his mother and father, two brothers, William and Charles; one sister, Elizabeth; one half brother, Samie Morris, and two children by a former marriage, Eddie and Nellie.

Mr. Ballard was a former sheriff of Crawford County.

Mrs. Sarrah Ballard passes away

Sarrah Jenkins, daughter of Elisha and Caroline Jenkins, was born June 4, 1864 in Crawford County, Indiana. She was united in marriage to Charles Ballard on September 4, 1885. She was a faithful and loving companion for 21 years. When her husband rejoiced she rejoiced with him, when he was under the cloud of sorrow, she sympathized with him. On Dec, 3, 1906, she contracted that dreaded disease, pneumonia which assumed alarming proportions from the first. On Wednesday, December 5th, sister Ballard realized that the end was approaching and not being satisfied with her relation to God, she called Rev. Howerton of the M. E. Church of English at about 8:30 o'clock. She was gloriously converted, having the assurance of her adoption into God's family. She continued to rejoice in a Saviors love while she lived. On Monday morning, December 19th, the end came. She was conscious until the last. She begged her husband not put off his salvation, like she had. She leaves a loving husband, one sister and a host of relatives and friends to mourn the great loss of the departed. [She is buried at Riddle cemetery also.]

Obituary of George W. Morris

Jacksonville, Ill.—George W. Morris 76, died on March 27 at a hospital here after a lingering illness.

The son of John and Lurana Morris, he was born in English on November 10, 1871. He was married to Vestia Brown on January 1, 1893.

Survivors are his wife, six children: Mrs. Mabel Jenkins, of Athens, Ill.; Mrs. Georgia Hoover, Charles E. and Arthur W., of Jacksonville, Ill.; John M., of Hannibal, Mo.; and Curran E. of Fredonia; 18 grandchildren, 9 great-grandchildren, and a half-sister, Emma Dillman, of near English.

Two children preceded him in death, Grace Ruby, of Jacksonville, and Harry Ray Morris. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Funeral services were conducted in Jacksonville, with the buriel in Ashbury cemetery.

was found at Memphis, Tenn. at my second cousin's home, Fanchion Goldman Smith Pollock. She was attacked in her home and died in April 2003. She was the only daughter of Claude and Lula May Dillman Goldman.

She took care of her mother Lula May Dillman Goldman, until she died, and was brought back to be buried at Dillman cemetery, not far from where I live.

Lula May took care of her mother Emma Ballard Dillman, at her farm, North of English, until she died, and she was buried at Dillman Cemetery, next to John Michael Dillman her husband. John Michael Dillman born September 27, 1876 married Emma Ballard November 2, 1876, died August 29, 1934. Children to this union: Elmer Dillman born June 6, 1884, married Elizabeth Christina (Lizzie) Schulz. Lizzie died April 8, 1932; Lula Mae Dillman born June 12, 1892, married Claude M. Goldman December 21, 1912.

Obituary of Mrs. Emma Dillman

English, Indiana Route 1—Mrs. Emma Dillman, daughter of Lurana and William Ballard, was born March 8, 1859, and died December 19 at the age of 93 years at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Claude Goldman, with whom she had lived for the last 18 years. Due to her age and failing health, she had spent the last few years at home and had been confined to her bed the last 3 and a half months.

On November 2, 1877, she married John Michael Dillman, who preceded her in death on

August 27, 1934. To this union were born three children: Charles who died at the age of 4 years; Elmer and Lula May.

She joined the Methodist Church at Nisbet Chapel, near Mt. Carmel, Illinois, in 1902.

Mrs. Dillman was born in Crawford County and lived most of her life here, except for the 4 years she lived in Illinois. She is the last of a family of nine children: Mary Jane, Elizabeth, Charles, William and Walter Q., and three half-brothers, Johnnie, Sammie and George Morris, all having preceded her in death.

Her father, William Ballard, was a soldier in the Civil War and was killed on the battlefield at Murfreesborow, Tenn., in 1863.

Survivors are a son, Elmer of Riddle and a daughter, Mrs. Claud Goldman; two grandchildren, John Elmer Dillman, and Mrs. Glenn (Fanchion) Smith, and four great-grandchildren.

was recovered.

Information was secured relative to the moonshine still and a visit was made to the farm of Isabelle Knight. In a hollow, carefully concealed, was found the brass coil, kettle and other apparatus used by the moonshiners and it was confiscated. In collecting evidence relative to the operation of the illicit still Collector Thurman learned something about the potency of the product. One man took a drink and started for home and was found in the roadway the next morning still sleeping off its effects. Another man, after taking a drink, did not recover consciousness for thirty-six hours and did not fully recover from its effects for several days.

I thought I should reply to the mistakes made in the February 2010 article about William Mitchell Kellems.

1. William was born 18 DEC 1832 and died 20 MAR 1902. He did not serve in the military during the Civil War. His brother, Martin, died in a Confederate POW camp 28 OCT 1864 at Columbia, SC.

2. James Kellems was born 20 OCT 1784 in Washington Co., VA and died 4 JAN 1843 in Crawford Co., IN. Catherine Mitchell was born 11 APR 1811 in KY and died 3 APR 1901.

3. William and Nancy Kitterman Kellems were married on 27 JAN 1853.

There is a good bio about Wm. M. Kellems from Goodspeed Bros. & Co. pub. in 1885. Perry County Library and Courthouse have information on William and Nancy Kellems as well as her parents, George and Mary Fortune Kitterman.

was the son of David Askren (early spelling sometimes "Askrin or Askins," and Nancy Davis. Both born in Washington Co., KY, he on 18 JULY 1797 and she on 16 OCT 1798. He died 26 MAY 1867 and Nancy on 5 FEB1889. They are buried in the Haas Cemetery south of Frenchtown in Harrison Co., IN. Nancy was the daughter of John Davis and Sarah Litsey. David was the son of William Askren and Hannah Springer. Their children were:
