

side. He says Lee Phillips was the first of the home boys he found. He had fallen in the water. Lee lived about four hours but never regained consciousness. E. C. Fowler was the second man Bob found. He was pinned under some heavy timbers, a bale of cotton and a box car. It was 4 hours before he was rescued, and his right leg is badly mashed just above the knee. It was some time before the bodies of J. B. Cox, L. M. Bible and the young man from Llano were found and rescued from the great mass of wreckage. The indications are that all of these men were killed instantly.

The dead and wounded were carried to Temple on a special train early Tuesday morning. The bodies of the dead men were sent to the undertaker and the injured carried to the Santa Fe hospital for medical attention. Physicians from Kileen reached the scene of the disaster a few minutes after the collision.

The bodies of the dead men reached Marble Falls on the morning train today. L. M. Bible was carried to the Roper cemetery in Pleasant Valley for internment, J. B. Cox was buried in the city cemetery here this afternoon at 4 o'clock and R. L. Phillips will be buried in the city cemetery tomorrow morning.

R. L. Phillips was 46 years old. He is survived by his wife and 2 sons.

J. B. Cox is 47 years old. He is survived by his wife and three children.

L. M. Bible was 58 years old. He is survived by his wife.

We print here extracts from the account of the disaster printed in the Temple Telegram Wednesday morning:

"Both trains, running as extras were east bound. The one in the lead it is said, broke in two shortly after the engine passed the bridge, leaving the caboose of that train standing on the bridge. The two trains were running pretty close together and the engineer of the second train, it is said, had just released his brakes in preparation for the pull up the hill as he neared the bridge and it was impossible
