Fifthly: at the death of my wife Sarah Phil-
lips, I give and bequeath to my four single
girls, Nancy Phillips, Elizabeth Phillips, Ellen
Phillips, and Sarah Phillips equally the tract of
land I now live on, and also part of the Mat
Richardson tract, if either one of the girls
marries they may live on the said Richard-
son tract, and also all the stock and money
at my wife Sarah Phillips death.

Sixthly: at the death of my wife Sarah Phillips
I give and bequeath to my son John Phil-
lips the tract of land he now lives on,
my son John Phillips paid two hundred
and fifty dollars on the tract of land he
lives on.

Seventhly: At the death of my wife Sarah
Phillips I give and bequeath my son Jacob
Phillips the tract of land he now lives on,
my son Jacob Phillips is to pay Benjamin
Dickerson fifty dollars at my wife Sarah
Phillips death, I also give and bequeath to
my daughter Lotisha Ray one hundred
dollars which I paid on the tract of land

Last Will and Testament of Lilly A. Gilliland, Decd.

I Lilly Gilliland, widow of James Gilliland, deceased,
make and publish this my last will and testament,
I give and bequeath all my estate, held and
possessed by virtue of the last will and testament
of the said James Gilliland, as follows; that is to say:

Last Will and Testament of Lilly A. Gilliland, Deceased.

1st. It is my will and desire that my body have a suitable burial and all my just debts be paid out of any money or property I may possess.

2nd. It is my desire that my daughter Emma M. Gilliland have more of my property than my other children and heirs, for the reason that she has sacrificed the most of her time in waiting on me in sickness and old age; now, therefore, I give and bequeath unto my said daughter, Emma, all my bedsteads and bedclothing, except two bedsteads and bedclothing hereinafter disposed of, and all my drapery, pictures and picture frames, my sewing machine, one small clock, one bureau with the glass on the same, one looking glass, chosen by her; all my cabinet ware, such as plates and table cutlery, &c, and my tin-front safe, and every thing that she now claims about the house, which I trust she to point out. I also give her a full year's provision of every thing I may possess that is in any way connected with edibles for the table, such as meat, corn, wheat, vegetables, poultry, &c, &c; And to the Executor I trust to set a side for that purpose an ample quantity of all said articles suitable for a creditable support.

3rd. It is my desire that my daughter Lilly A. High, have one of the beds and bedclothing in the upper room, and one hundred dollars in money for the reason that I think my other heirs have had more than she has in the way of rents and other privileges.

4th. It is my desire that the children of Elisha Wells by my deceased daughter Bethia Wells, have the other bed and ^{bedg.} clothes in the upper room.

5th. It is my desire that my daughter Emma, have also, all the property and money provided for her in the last will of the said Jacob Gilliland, that she may not get before my death.

6th. It is my will and desire that all the balance of my property be sold (unless the heirs can agree in a division of the same) and the proceeds, together with the balance of all moneys I may have on hand, and proceeds of my notes and accounts be divided equally among all my legal heirs; to wit: A. J. Gilliland, Frank Gilliland, Len Gilliland, J. R. Gilliland, Emma M. Gilliland, Lilly A. High, and the children of Elisha Wells by my daughter, Bethia Wells, as one heir.

7th. I appoint and constitute J. R. Gilliland
