David Morrow Coil was the eldest son and first born to Adam and Dorcas Morrow Coil. He was born 11 Jan 1828 in Pendleton Co., VA.

David came to Ballard Co., KY in 1848 along with his parents and siblings. He married Mary "Polly" Riggs about 1855 in Ballard Co., KY. Mary was born in 1839 in Ballard Co., KY.

Ballard Co., KY was the original county encompassing Arlington, Bardwell and Berkley, as well as other small communities in the SW section of the county. The county seat was located in Blandville. The residents of these small communities had to travel across the county and the Mayfield Creek to get to the County seat.

The farm owned by Dorcas and Adam Coil was located on the main road used for traveling to Blandville. David Coil opened and operated a livery stable along this route. He kept fresh horses, feed, water and carriage repair parts. Mary offered hot meals to the travelers. The livery stable and home was a viable business for the family.

David and Mary Riggs Coil had six sons and one daughter, Rebecca born in 1858 and deceased before 1870.

David was a member of the Masonic Lodge and participated in the early formation of Bardwell, KY. He passed away on 20 January 1878 and left Mary Riggs Coil a widow with 6 sons under the age of 17 to rear alone.

"Polly" Coil proved to be a very successful business woman of the 1880's. She continued the operation of the livery stable and offered rooms for rent in their home.

David and Polly had made a custom of housing orphaned children before his death and Polly continued this practice after his death. Surely, Polly could use the extra help to run the business and offered her motherly love to all who would reside under her roof.

Of the six sons born to David and Polly, all married except one, James White Coil remained single.

I descend through their son Ad Coil born 14 Dec 1864. Ad was only 6 years old when his father died. However, the resourcefulness of his mother carried the family on instilling strong business, and political values upon the six sons David left behind.

Ad, Tom, James and John Jacob Coil remained in Bardwell as farmers and grocery store operators until their deaths. Robert and Ed Coil married and moved from the Bardwell area.

Polly (Mary Ann) Riggs Coil died 20 February 1920 and is buried in the Old Bardwell Cemetery.

Elizabeth Jane Coil was born 23 May 1833 in Pendleton Co., VA to Adam and Dorcas Morrow Coil. Elizabeth was the second oldest daughter and third child born to this union.

Elizabeth removed from VA in 1848 along with her parents and siblings. She was well educated and had a strong desire for poetry. Poetry seems to be a common thread amongst the older children of Dorcas and Adam Coil.

During the journey from Pendleton to KY, Elizabeth's carriage over turned when a nest of yellow jackets attacked the horse pulling the carriage. Elizabeth was flung down and embankment and escaped serious injury. She was shaken and bruised at the time, however her spirits were fine and she regained her composure quickly and was able to continue on driving the carriage with out fear.

Elizabeth married John Edwin Mercer 22 July 1851 in Blandville, Ballard Co., KY. John was born 6 Sept 1827, in Calloway County, KY to William and Susan Wheeler Mercer. William Mercer served one term in the KY Legislature as did his father (John) before him. John Edwin's grandfather John served 12 to 14 years from Caldwell Co., KY. John Edwin Mercer was the only child of William and Susan Wheeler Mercer.

John and Elizabeth set up housekeeping nearby her family in Blandville. Elizabeth is recorded giving an eye witness account of Civil War soldiers coming onto their property threatening to steal the horses. Her recorded statement is as follows:

Mrs. Elizabeth Mercer states that about the 20th day of June 1864 there were four Rebel Soldiers came to our house. At first they tried to pass themselves off for Federals. They went to the horse lot and caught a mule and a horse. Mr. Robert Thomas was at our house and prevailed on them to leave the horse, which they did but, carried the mule off with them. He asked one of them his name but he would not give his name. Another one rode up and said his name was James Bobo and he was not afraid or ashamed to take it. They wanted the guns very bad but, did not get them and after a good many threats they left. Sworn 30 July 1864 Ballard Co., KY

Elizabeth and John had four young children living in their home on this day, 20 June 1864.

John and Elizabeth moved their family to Wise Co., TX in 1875. They traveled by covered wagon with their nine children, ages ranged from 22 to less than one year old. Their last born child, David Edward Mercer was the only child born in Wise Co., TX.

John, Elizabeth and family settled in TX where they farmed and raised grapes for the making of and selling of wine.

Elizabeth Jane Coil Mercer survived her husband John E. Mercer who died on 2 January 1902. Elizabeth died 10 May 1910 and is buried in Wise County, TX.

The ten children born to this union were: John, Annie, Dorcas, Samuel B., William, Thomas Henry, Mary, Rebecca H., Florence Virginia, and David Edward Mercer.

William's father was named John Mercer and his mother was Lucretia Johnston Mercer. They came to Ky. in the late 1790's from S. Carolina and I believe before that they were in N. Caro. We have a number of books, including a set of Ky. law books that belonged to them. They were obviously educated people for their time.

JACOB CORBETT Through many years the name of Corbett has figured conspicuously and honorably in connection with the official history of Kentucky. Our subject, his father and grandfather have been honored with various positions of public trust and responsibility, and have taken an active and beneficial part in molding the policy of county and commonwealth. Over the record of their public careers there falls no shadow of wrong or suspicion of evil, their capability and fidelity to duty being such as to win for hem admiration and high regard. Jacob Corbett, the grandfather, a native of Virginia, removed to Hickman county, Kentucky, at an early date in its development, and not only aided in its material improvement but also discharged various public services in a most commendable manner. For some time he was deputy county clerk there. In 1842 he removed to what is now Ballard county and was the first county clerk. So loyal was he to the trust reposed in him that he

filled the position for nearly forty years, being re-elected for many consecutive terms. He married Elizabeth Sumner, a native of South Carolina, and to them were born two sons and five daughters. Jacob Corbett was a man of great force of character, of keen foresight and marked energy, qualities which were exerted in behalf of the general good as well as for his personal advancement and success. He died in Blandville about 1886, at the advanced age of eighty-three years. Thomas H. Corbett, the father of our subject, was born in Hickman county, Kentucky, January 8, 1830, and was educated in the old Kentucky Military Institute, near Frankfort. When a young man he began the practice of law in Blandville, where he continued in active connection with the profession until 1876, when he removed to Paducah, Kentucky, where he engaged in the tobacco commission business for a few years. For ten terms he served in the general assembly, being elected first in 1855. He became one of the active working members of the house, and his opinions carried weight in its councils. He made a close study of the questions affecting the weal or woe of the state, and left the impress of his individuality and patriotic spirit upon the legislation enacted during his service as representative. In 1887 he was nominated and elected register of the land office for the state of Kentucky, serving in that position for four years, after four years' service as deputy there. In 1893 he was appointed by President Cleveland as receiver of the land office at Guthrie, Oklahoma, and after acting in that capacity for four years, returned to Kentucky and was appointed register of the land office by the state auditor, serving in that office at the time of his death. At about the time of the outbreak of the Civil war he was elected commonwealths' attorney, but did not serve during the full term, as he was strongly in favor of the Confederacy. As had been indicated, his political support was always given the Democracy, and throughout the whole of his public service he labored with conscientious fidelity for what he believed to be the best interest of the state and its people. His sincerity was never called in guestion, and he commanded the respect of even his political enemies. In early manhood Thomas H. Corbett wedded Rebecca H. Coil, a daughter of Adam and Dorcas A. (Morrow) Coil, who were of Virginian birth. Both Mr. and Mrs. Corbett were devoted members of the Christian Church, and he also belonged to the Masonic fraternity. His death occurred in Frankfort, May 9, 1902, and thus passed away one who had figured prominently in public affairs for many years, and who left behind him an untarnished reputation. His wife is now living in Frankfort. They were the parents of nine children, of whom Jacob Corbett is the second. The eldest died in infancy, as did the third, fourth and eighth members of the family. The fifth is Hal S. Corbett, a lawyer of prominence in Spokane, Washington; and James L. is residing with his mother, who is now sixty-seven years of age. Jacob Corbett was reared and educated in Blandville, and from 1869 until 1873 he served as a page in the Kentucky house of representatives. He studied law under the direction of the Hon. James D. White, of Blandville, and in July, 1878, was admitted to the bar. He has served as city attorney of Blandville, and has been prominent in political circles.

He acted as private secretary to Governor Blackburn during that gentleman's entire service as chief executive of the state, and was also private secretary of J. Proctor Knott during six months of his term in the gubernatorial chair. He also served as secretary of the first Kentucky state board of equalization, and was enrolling clerk during one session of the house of representatives, and also sergeant at arms during one session. During one year he was deputy in the office of the state land register, and thus again and again has he been called to public service by those who recognize his capability and appreciate his thorough

devotion to the general good and to the trust reposed in him. He has also labored earnestly and effectively for the welfare of his party, and was secretary of the Democratic state central committee in 1888. From 1893 until 1896 he was cashier in the government land office in Guthrie, Oklahoma, and then resigned in order to engage in the practice of law in Spokane, Washington, where he remained until 1898, when he returned to Kentucky, locating in Wickliffe for the practice of law. In 1901 he was elected county prosecuting attorney, in which position he is now serving, being a faithful custodian of the legal interests of the county. In 1893 Mr. Corbett was married to Mrs. Emma V. Smith, nee McDonald, a native of Milan, Tennessee. They reside upon a farm about a mile and a half from Wickliffe, and Mr. Corbett is engaged in practical farming, in connection with the practice of law. He belongs to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and to the Knight of Pythias fraternity, and also holds membership in the Christian Church. Fortunate is the man who comes of an honorable and distinguished ancestry. Mr. Corbett has been so blessed, and in character and in talents he is a worthy scion of his race. His own career has reflected credit upon the family name which had previously become associated with the records of honorable service in Kentucky.

JAMES DEMPSEY WHITE, associate judge of the court of appeals, was born in Hickman county, Kentucky, about 1833. His father, Rev. Willis White, was a native of Halifax county, North Carolina, and with his parents removed to this state about 1810. His life was devoted to the work of the ministry and he was identified with the Baptist denomination. His wife, Mrs. Mary White, was a daughter of Colonel Enoch Wright, of east Tennessee. Judge White obtained his elementary education in Ballard county and

further pursued his studies in Clinton Seminary, of Hickman County. He studied law under the direction of J. M. Bigger, of Blandville, Ballard county, was admitted to the bar at that place in 1853, and at once began practice. His success came soon, because his equipment was good, he having been a close and earnest student of the fundamental principles of the science of jurisprudence. Along with those gualities indispensable to the lawyer--a keen, rapid, logical mind, plus the business sense, and a ready capacity for earnest labor--he brought to the starting point of his legal career certain rare gifts,--eloquence of language and a strong personality. In 1858 he was elected county attorney of Ballard county, serving two years. in 1870 he was elevated to the bench of the common-pleas division of the first judicial district and filled that office for nine consecutive years, rendering decisions that won the admiration of the bar on account of their clearness and correct application and the approval of the public by reason of their strict justice. Few men have shown less bias on the bench, and he left the office as he had entered it with the good will and confidence of the public and the profession. In 1880 he was the Democratic nominee for elector on the Hancock ticket and in the electoral college cast his ballot for the chosen standard-bearer of the Democracy. In November, 1896, he was the nominee of his party for judge of the

court of appeals for the first appellate district. His opponent was Judge Joseph I. Landes, of Hopkinsville, who was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Judge John R. Grace. The elections showed that he was the choice of the people for the office, and on the 1st of December he took his seat upon the bench. An excellent presence, an earnest manner, marked strength of character, a thorough grasp of the law, and the ability to accurately supply principles, made him an effective and successful advocate and will insure him equal rank with the other distinguished members of the court of appeals. The Judge has been twice married. In 1860 he wedded Miss Mary E. Coil, daughter of Adam Coil, of Ballard county. She died in 1875 and the Judge afterward married Mrs. Mary A. Utterback, daughter of Thomas J. Jewett, of Carlisle county. She is a member of the Baptist church, and the Judge also is a firm believer in its doctrines. The family includes W. T. and W. J. White, the former a lawyer of Wickliffe, and the other of Bardwell, Kentucky; a married daughter; and a son who has not yet attained his majority. Mr. White is a Mason of the Knight Templar degree, holding membership in Paducah Commandery. He also belongs to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Knights and Ladies of Honor, and is a member of the Order of United Workmen. His nature is kindly, his temperament jovial and genial, and his manner courteous. He is a most companionable gentleman; but when on the bench his attitude at once indicates the studious, earnest and scholarly judge, whose course fully upholds the majesty of the law.

Francis contends that Claudes grandfather (Thomas and Samuel) argued over his birthdate. It appears that Claude was born shortly after the marriage of Samuel and Mary or prior to the marriage. The tombstone date reflects a two year difference in his age. He died at the age of 19 not 17. This causes a problem with James beacuse James is supposed to be the eldest son..however Claude died at such a young age it would have left James the eldest son by 1883, James was only 14 when Claude died.

Samuel Black Coil born 18 Feb 1842 to Adam and Dorcas Morrow Coil, was by far the most intriguing child born to this union.

Samuel Black Coil was educated in the Blandville school system. Following his early education years Samuel studied law for two years under the supervision of his brother-inlaw J.D. White. Samuel was not completely satisfied with the structure of law and retired from the profession two years later and chose to dabble in livestock trading and farming. Samuel married Mary Margaret Thomas, the daughter of William and Catherine Valdingham Thomas, on 4 Sept 1865. To this union five children were born. Samuel B., Claude, Kathryn, Charles and James White Coil.

In 1870 he purchased a farm on the on the west side of Blandville, where he remained for 12 years. In 1876 Mary Margaret Thomas Coil passed away. S.B. married Susan M. Thomas on November 23, 1876. Susan Thomas was a younger sister of Mary Margaret Thomas. Samuel was 34, his occupation was listed as a farmer. Susan M was 24 years old. They were married at the home of William and Catherine Thomas.

The family became strained after the marriage to the second Thomas daughter. There was a growing hostility between Samuel Coil and his in-laws. This may stem from the death of the eldest son Claude Coil.

There are no records to indicate the birth year or the death year of Claude. He was born about 1865 and deceased at the age of 17 or 19 by drowning. Family accounts indicate there were arguments over this sons death. Samuel inherited his sons land and Grandfather Thomas forbade Claude's birth year to be engraved on his stone. It seems that Claude's birth came too early in the marriage or too soon afterwards.

Claude was running a herd of pigs through the fields when he came upon a stream, as he was herding the pigs across the stream he was knocked off his horse with a tree branch and drown. His tombstone simply reads "Claude son of M.M. and S.B. Coil drowned aged 17"

There was a tremendous uproar between the father Samuel Coil and the grandfather Thomas when it came time to engrave his stone. This argument is still recounted in the current generations.

Samuel purchased a 200 acre farm in 1882 where he resided until his death in 1919. His law studies came in handy while he served six years as Constable and two years as a Deputy Sheriff.

Samuel was predominately a farmer although he did run a grist mill and a steam distillery for a few years. He is most remembered for the red rose he always wore in his coat lapel. Samuel is found in Frankfort, KY lobbying to not have a new county formed out of Ballard, in 1886. This was a cause he lost. His will, written 19 August 1913 devises to his two sets of children: His two older living children: Kathryn Virginia Bugg and James White Coil. (Claude, Samuel B Jr., and Charles are not mentioned...Claude and S.B. Jr deceased, Charles most likely died in infancy.)

His three younger children: Mary Hopper, Norben Coil (never married) and Brunia Stanley.

Elizabeth Coil was born 1762 Sept 6 in Augusta County, VA. She appears to be the the second child and daughter born to Rebecca and Gabriel Skidmore. In about 1793 she married Johan Philip FULTZ in VA and gave birth to Jacob Fultz in 1794. Philip and Elizabeth moved to OH in the early 1800's and continued to have children there.

Philip and Elizabeth Coil Fultz sold to James HAINER, 115 acres in the mountains of Walnut Bottoms, from three tracts: 35 acres patented to Frederick KEISTER, (10 Nov 1757 (KEISTER was father-in-law to Elizabeth's brother Gabriel Coil Jr.) Keister conveyed to George FULTZ, dec. and by way of heritiage the tract decended to Philip FULTZ. 16 July 1793. 67 acres adjoining Casner, part of 100 acres patented to Philip 25 July 1793 (most likely around the same date Philip married Elizabeth Coil, daughter of Gabriel Sr.) Consideration \$500, to be paid in lands at the Sciota by Jacob Coil, son of Gabriel. 16 May 1801.

It appears that Jacob Coil (Elizabeth's brother) was in VA at the time of these transactions, as Elizabeth and Philip signed in VA but the money was carried to the Sciota lands by Elizabeth's brother Jacob Coil. With out records of Sciota it can not be proven yet just exactly where Elizabeth and Philip Fultz moved to after 1801.

Their son Jacob Fultz b 3 Feb 1794 in VA married Anna Heiser 4 June 1818 in Ross County, OH. With out further study on Anna Heiser it can not be determined if her parents were the same HEISERS of Pendleton. However, the HEISERS are closely connected to the COILS of VA and most likely, there was a prior relationship before this marriage 1818 in OH.

It is doubtful to me that this is the same Gabriel Coil married to Mary Keister. Gabriel Coil Jr., was born abt 1765, not likely to have been serving in the OH Militia at the age of 82. I suspect the above Gabriel, Howard is looking at is a younger generation from Gabriel Coil Jr., sof of Gabriel Sr.

Here's what can be proven and documented about Gabriel Coil Sr.'s son Gabriel Jr.:

1. In studying the sequential tax lists, Gabriel Jr. was born 1765-6. This is based on the fact that he was not yet 21 when Gabriel Sr.'s personal property taxes were paid in 1786, yet Gabriel Jr. WAS 21 by the 1787 taxes, which were taken early (circa March-May) in the year.

2. As for that list of 1788 vouchers, I suspect that John Wayland misread Jr. for "Sr.", and that it was really Gabriel Coyle JR. who had 2 horses. That is the only scenario that makes sense. There were several later clerks in Pendleton County whose writing for "Sr." and Jr." were nearly indistinguishable (and many have interpreted them incorrectly), and much confusion has been created. It isn't until one reads the other examples in the same handwriting of capital S's and lowercase j's, and studies other contemporary records that you can tell the difference. MAYBE this was the case in the list of vouchers; I don't know.

3. While there is no known (to me), extant proof that Gabriel Jr. married Mary Keister in 1797 as reported by Oren Morton, it IS VERY likely. In his History of Pendleton County, Morton reported MANY marriages in the 1788-1800 period, suggesting that he had access to a no longer extant, first book of marriages. Many of these reported marriages can be proven via other records; so, I no longer have any doubt that he saw an actual record of this. There was a minor fire at the Pendleton Courthouse circa 1920, but it did not destroy any of the major/vital records (contrary to what has long been rumored; however, local residents DID remove books from the courthouse for safekeeping during that fire. Some of these were not returned until years later; I suspect that this first marriage book was taken then, and never returned.

4. Gabriel Coil Jr. disappeared from the Pendleton County taxes after 1797. This makes sense, in that there was a huge emigration of Pendleton County residents to New Design (now St. Clair Co.) IL; some of these people stopped halfway and stayed in Ohio. So, Gabriel Jr. could easily have been among that group.

5. While Frederick Keister Sr. DID leave a will in Pendleton County in 1815, he simply made a bequest to "all my daughters," without naming them. I don't think there is a quit-claim deed for Frederick's heirs, or else the various Keister researchers would have already referenced it. Still, I will check for some when I'm at the courthouse next.

8. I don't have any idea whom the 90 year old Elizabeth Coil may have been

in Gabriel and Mary's 1850 Census. I can think of only two possibilities: 1) Gabriel Sr. remarried to an Elizabeth ----- after Rebecca Skidmore died, and this widow was living with this grandson Gabriel; or 2) maybe this Elizabeth was REALLY Mary's grandmother, of some other surname, and the census taker just messed up by repeating the household surname. I can't think of any other possibilities.

Joseph owned a boat that he used to ship freight on the Scioto River. (Ref Kurt) Joseph lived in Chillicothe, OH. Joseph and his younger brother, Jacob, moved their families to Marion County, Indiana, near Indianapolis, for a time. The move was apparently not to Joseph's liking for he soon packed up his family and returned to Ross County, Ohio. It is not clear when this move to Indiana was made... perhaps between 1809 and 1814 or 1814 and 1817. He appears in the 1814 Tax Rolls of Fayette County, Ohio, and in the 1817 Tax Rolls of Union Township, Ross County, Ohio. It is curious as to why they made the move in the first place... were they squeezed out of any rights they may have had in their father's sizable land grant?

It is possible that his grown son, Saul, ran the farm up in Union Township while he was in the boating business on the Scioto.

This history states that: "Andrew Coil Sr's first wife died prior to 1822" and that "Andrew Coil, widower with his family Peter, Andrew Jr., Jeremiah, John and Ameila (Millie) all single and Elizabeth married to Thomas Parrott left Fayette Co, OH and moved to Union Twsp, Mercer Co., OH in 1822. (This is a total of 6 children by first wife Franny) Andrew died in 1835 while visiting family and friends in in Fayette Co.

Andrew purchased land on the twelve mile creek building their cabin on the south fraction of section 22. Here they raised some corn and vegtables which constituted the first crops produced within the township. The next year Andrew laid out a town, which he named Coiltown, and competed with the St Mary's township and Shanesville for the County Seat. History of VanWert and Mercer Co., Ohio page 387.)

COIL FAMILY BURIAL PLOT Union Township

This family burial plot was owned by Andrew Coil and used as a private cemetery. Andrew was the originator of Coiltown which was laid out in 1824 but soon was non-existent. His daughter Elizabeth married Thomas Parrott, who played a major role in the origin of Mendon.

The cemetery is located in Section 21 of Union Township about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile west of Mendon on State Route707 (sic.) (Note: there are apparently some words omitted at this point) to the Max Shaffer farm, then go north to an uncultivated part of the field a short distance from the St. Marys River.

Many stones are broken, buried or missing. It is believed that Andrew Coil was buried here, but to date no stone had been found. Approximately nine stones are visible, all lying flat on the ground except two large stones, one with the name of John H. and Sarah, wife of John, one with the name of Jeremiah H. and his wife Elizabeth. Jeremiah's stone is a large stone toppledover with the top resting on part of the base.

This burial plot consisting of .25 of an acre is marked with a large pine tree at the end of the plot.

Most of the area is marked off with small cement markers with the initials J.H.C. at each end of the plot.

(There is a 4.75 x 3.5 photo with one stone barely visible)

This last portion in brackets was missing from the original copy, but taken from the Will Book. The entire will was copied into Hampshire County, Virginia, Will Book 2 (1780-1794), pages 111-113, [the index reference is to page 112] from the original which was presented as shown above, and ordered to be recorded. The copyist altered spelling and changed capitalization in many, many places, but did not alter the names or meaning at any point. Theoriginal will has, written on the verso of the third page:

There is another so-called "Will Book" copy of this will in a book of Hampshire County miscellaneous wills [but with no appraisals or sales], 1756 through 1860, but only for deceased with surnames A-J. This is all typed! It is labeled Hampshire County Wills, Vol. 1, but it is not the volume 1 there should have been. On page 15 of that book, Michael Harness's will was entered, but without some sections [eg., slaves], and with name spellings "corrected[read, confused]" and word order changed.

Jacob Coil, Sr., was born in Hamilton County, VA about 1790. He was of German descent. He emigrated to Fayette County, Ohio, where he lived several years and from there came to this township with his family, consisting of wife and several children, in the year 1823, and settled on eighty acres now owned by James Bridges. In 1835 he moved to near Broad Ripple, and died there in the fall of 1837. By occupation he was a farmer. He was moral and industrious, and in business a perserving man. He took an active interest in all matters pertaining to the public good. He followed the burning of lime for several years during his residence in this township, obtaining rock for the purpose out of the bed of the White River. He burned many thousands bushels of lime every year. Most of the lime used in the building of the old State-house was burned by him. After Mary Margaret Coile Rupert and George P. Rupert sold that 109 acres of hers in 1823, she either died or divorced or whatever. I sure don't know what happened to her and wish I did. Anyway, they had 5 children. He married the teenaged Lavina Parrott in 1826 and had 13 children by her, so, yes, she was wife #2. He was named George Rupert, s/o

George Ludwig Rupert and Elizabeth? When his headstone was created, someone (probably Lavina or the children or even the headstone cutter) applied the middle initial to him. Some of my ill-informed or "creative" cousins say it was for Pursley, Peter, Parrott or Putnam depending on which one says it, but they have it entirely wrong. He had no middle name or initial until that stone was created.

Notes for Jacob Jr Conrad:

Jacob Conrad Jr was a blacksmith by trade, as was his father Jacob Sr. Their shop just below what is now known as Ruddle, WV was on the orginal grant of land, and part of the retaining wall that still stands, located close to the river. Jacob Sr., willed his blacksmith tools to Jacob Jr and Jacob Jr willed them to Ulrich.

Jacob Jr was only about 6 years old when he came to America and was about 19 when he came to South Branch. They drifted down through the Shenandoah Valley to a place they named Conrad's Store, now close to McGaheyville, VA, in Rockingham, County.

Pendleton Co was part of Augusta Co., at this time. In 1763, James and Moses Green of Culpepper and Mary Wood of Frederick, MD conveyed to Jacob and Hannah Conrad for 90 lbs, 457 acres of the South Branch. The deed was delivered to Jacob Conrad (Deed Book 11, page 437 in Stauton, VA - \$300) On this land was a "squaw patch", of about one acre of land, cleared supposedly by the Indians. This acre formed the nucleous of his land. There was a log cabin there that he used until he could build a stone house.

In this house Sabina gave birth to the first great-grandchild of Jacob Sr., John Colip, born April 8, 1790, son of Sabina and John Colip. Sabina was the first born child of Jacob and Hannah Conrad. There were 12 children born to Jacob and Hannah. The dates on Hannah Bogard Conrad's tombstone reads are ----born 1743, died March 10, 1808. Since the last child born to Jacob Conrad Jr., was Ulrich and his date of birth is 21 August 1786, Hannah Bogard Conrad was the mother to all of Jacob Jr's children.

Jacob Conrad Jr was a community worker. He filled several important offices inthis new land. He must have been a good business man for he was often called on to help settle estates. 1776 Appraisal of Jacob Conrad's estate by Adam Lough and Thomas Skidmore. Numerous items were listed but total appraisal not shown One pair of leather britches was listed at 1# (Will Book 5, page 478, Stauton, VA)

Franklin the County Seat was designated as a town Dec 19, 1794 by the legislature. The Trustees of of Franklin, as named in the Legislative Act, were Jacob Arbough, Jacob Conrad Jr., James Dyer Sr., John Hopkins, and others. By another act 1800, "The Trustees were authorized to make and establish legal regulations for protecting property from fire, for keeping hogs from running at large, to prohibit horses from racing in the streets and alleys and preserving good order generally."

In participated in the southern campaigns of General Arnold and Cornwallis and was captured at Yorktown in 1781.

This Johannes Kohlepp was from Hohenzell in the district of Hesse Hanau and served as a Private in the Crown Prince of Hesse Hanau's Company #5. Proof of that is his being listed in the HETRINA Project (Hessian Troops in the American War of Independence, Vol 5 of 6 volumes collected by the National Archives at Marburg in Germany, 1972) The HETRINA volumes were written in German and have not (as far as I know) been translated. I learned of HETRINA because George Ludwig Rupert is listed there also. I read parts of Vol. 5 while researching Rupert at the Ft. Wayne Library, Ft. Wayne, IN. I don't know where other copies of the HETRINA books are located, but I do know that the FHL at SLC has an index of the names, ranks, military unit, etc. The local FHL in San Jose tells me that the book cannot be loaned out to this local facility.

The marriage data has been submitted to JSHA by a descendant and would not be in the HETRINA. The JSHA did a profile or featured story on him in their 1998 Journal.

In the 1850 Braxton County VA (WV) Census, several of Daniel's children are listed in the household of John B. and Mary (Mace) Conrad.

Daniel's will was published in "The Braxton Democrat" for December 5, 1905 and was reprinted in "The Hacker's Creek Jornal" Volume XVIII, Issue 3, 2000.

"Know all men by these presents that I, Daniel CONRAD, of Lewis County, and State of Virginia, being in my natural senses and in perfect mind. I will my soul and body to the hands of the Almighty God of Heavens, and I beg the Almighty God of Heavens for his mercies and to pardon me, grace my sins and iniquities and transgressions and of all my evil and unlawful and unrighteous deeds and sins, and if the Almighty God of Heavens will spare my life and let me always live, and will pardon me, and will spare my life and let me always live and will restore me to my natural health and strength and to the natural use of myself

again, and will let me be restored to my natural health and strength and to the natural use of myself again, and will enable me to get those ores and coins and treasures and matters that are on my land, or on any of my land, or anywhere else, when the Almighty God is willing and pleases to let me find and get on ground and under ground, and will enable me to make use of, and to have made use of and will enable me... are paid, is to be added to said church." "As for Abe, the black boy that father willed to me is not to come to any of my family, and as for Peggy, my wife, is to have no inheritance on any of my land nor any of her children, and my brother, John, and none of his family, nor none of Benjamin's, nor of Haymond's, nor Boseley, nor his heirs is to interfere in my lands and legacies. Greenwood is not to interfere in any of my concerns."

"Whereas I appoint Mary BASTABLE, of Weston, my heir and administrator, and to come and stay with me and to take care of me and of my things, and to keep my and my things in nice and genteel order for me, and to do all that is just and right for me and herself while we both live, and to get all done that she can for me that is just and right."

O'Brian, Vol #1 Pg 70 and Vol #2 pg 29). In the Records of Augusta County they are listed as Kite. Early on, Felte Kile (Coil) and Family lived in Rockingham County, Virginia.. Gabriel Kile lived well up on the Blackthorn Creek, a branch of the South Branch of the Potomac River. The Kile (Coile) family was living in Pendelton County, Virginia before the French and Indian Wars. (Morton's History of Pendelton Co., VA., page 54). NOTE: The eastern border of Pendleton Co., W. Va adjoins Rockingham Co., Va A town named Ruddle is found today in Pendleton County. It may be that in the creation of Pendleton County, that that part of Rockingham County where the Coils resided, became part of the new County of Pendleton

1758 - RANGERS under Capt. Patrick Martin, dated March 1758; List includes Gabriel, Jacob and George Coil. These boys were very young and had been signed to Ranger Duty by their father, Felte Coil (Chalkeys Vol. I, page 469). At an earlier date possibly in or about 1758, (according to Morton's History of Pendelton Co., VA., page 54), before the Kiles had left Rockingham County, George and Jacob Coil were taken prisoner by the Indians. During their captivity, Jacob being very strong, was made to carry heavy burdens. Escape was ever present in their minds. One night Jacob managed to gnaw through the rope that held him. He then released his brother and the two put distance between their captors and themselves. They reached Roaring Plains, in their long journey home, enduring hunger and exhaustion. Here, George, utterly unable to proceed further, laid down, consealing himself in some brush with the aid of Jacob, for if the Indians were to find him it would mean his certain death. Jacob continued on to the Blockhouse at the mouth of the Seneca River. Because of his Indian costume, the blockhouse sentry nearly firing on him. A relief party was sent out and the exhausted brother was soon brought in. The brothers fully recovered from their ordeal in captivity. During these times, the Seneca Blockhouse was used as a rallying point. The towering cliffs nearby served as a lookout point.

Valentine bought 230 acres there in 1761 and others shortly thereafter. Their given names were all typical German --Valentine, Gabriel, George and Jacob.

Valentine Coil's Will

I Valentine Goil of the County of Augusta, Colony of Virginia having my perfect senses blessed by God, for the enjoyment thereof but being by the will of providence under a lingering state of health, after duly considering the frailty and mortality of all human flesh, knowing it is appointed for all men once to die, and after that to judgment. I hereby do present and acknowledge this to be my last will and testament, and in confirmation of the same. I do first of all recommend my soul to God, who gave it and my body, to be decently interred, after a Christian like manner, and most of all, I acknowledge and allow my just debts to be duly paid, with the remainder of what worldly substances Gad has blessed me with, after which with such part of my estate remains, I further do will. And allow it to be disposed of in a manner as follows (to wit).

First of all I will and bequeath unto my loving wife Margaret fifty pounds of Virginia currency and one Milch cow with half of the product of the land while she lives.

To my eldest son Gabriel, I will and bequeath one black horse rising five years old me, now delivered into his custody and possession over and above his equal part of the estate after dividing the moveable part of all moveables.

To my son Jacob, I will one equal part of the moveable parts of my estate.

To my son George, I will one equal part of the movable parts of my estate.

To my son Martin, I will and bequeath all the freehold land that I claim right of being in quantity of one hundred thirty acres proviso that he shall pay his sisters, Barbaray and Elizabeth, fifteen pounds each on his entering into possession of the same, with one black horse and one set of plow irons; and to give his mother and sisters the privilege of living peaceably on the said land, to wit his mother, as long as she lives, with half the produce of the said land, for her maintenance while she lives and with his sisters there, to reside till they are married, or otherwise provided for; and if he proves disobedient or by turbulent means offers to deprive them of peaceable enjoyment. He is to lose all rights of possession and the land is to dissolve to his mother, and after her demise to Barbaray and Elizabeth. He otherwise is to have two milch cows.

To my daughter Barabary, I will and bequeath two milch cows and one mare colt.

To my daughter Elizabeth, two milch cows and one mare colt.

Paul Teter was born about 1730, probably in Pennsylvania. He lived as a young man for some years in Rowan Co., North Carolina, but removed from there about 1760 with the other Teters and Henkels to Augusta Co. Virginia. The first mention of Paul Teter on the records of Augusta Co. appears to be on Aug. 19, 1766, when he and his brother George proved by their oaths in court the will of one Felten (or Valentine) Koil (later Kyle). They had been witnesses to the will which was dated Oct. 11, 1765. It seems likely that the Goil (Kyle) family were relatives or close friends of the Teters (the two families continued to be associated in later years).

The bond of George Coil and George Hammer as Executors is also dated Aug. 19, 1766. Sureties were Henry Stone and Sebastian Hoover. (Augusta Co. Will Book 3. p. 452). As can be seen Paul Teter signed his name in German script as "Paullus Dieder".

The appraisement of the estate - "The prass. of Valentine Giles desesed Estate" - was dated Sept. 9, 1766. It was made by Jonas Friend, George Dice and Michael Mallow. Returned and recorded on May 22, 1767. The total was the comparatively large sum of \pounds 186-14-3. Among the items were: to George Teter's acct. \pounds 3-0-0; to acct. of Moses Elsworth \pounds 15-12-0; of Youst Henkel \pounds 18-0-0. The numerous personal accounts suggest that Valentine Koil was a sort of merchant or storekeeper. The settlement of the estate was recorded on Aug. 19, 1767. After a long list of payments to various people, including Gabriel and Martin Coyle, there was a balance of \pounds 149-9-1 left for the heirs, (Augusta Co. Will Book 4, pp. 14 and 35). On Aug. 19, 1766, George Teter and his brother Paul proved in Court the will of Felten (Valentine) Koil, to which they had been witnesses. This will was dated Oct. 11, 1765. (Augusta Co. Will Book 3, p. 452). In the settlement of the estate, dated Sept. 9, 1766 and recorded May 22, 1767 it is seen that George Teter owed the estate the sum of 3 pounds. (same, Book 4, p. 14). See the notes under Paul Teter for details of this will. Probably the Koil or Kyle family was related to the Teters.

George HAMMER, the pioneer who bought first the 114 acres of land on the South Branch of the Potomac in 1761, then Augusta County, VA, built a huge house of log on which was first known as the "strong house".

There were no schools for these early families, so the children received only what education their parents could give them, which was a mixture of German and English---first being German.

We have record that the George HAMMER, pioneer who came here in 1761, departed this life early in 1801, having left a will dated Dec 1797, signed by his own hand in the German language. He appointed his wife Susannah, Balsor HAMMER, and Jacob CONRAD, executrix and executors.

There are two records, either of which might be his: in 1749 Johann Gorg HAMMER arrived in PA on the ship Lydia, and in 1752 John George HAMMER arrived.

Hans Nickolas SIMMONS was born in 1707 in Germany. BIO:Arrived in Philadelphia 19 Oct 1749, age 42, on the ship "Lydia"

From deed book #1, p. 248, dated 6 May 1793, John Sumwalt and Elizabeth his wife deed to Zachariah Rexroad Junior three tracts of land . . . on South Branch up from Trout Rock, formerly granted Valentine Coil by James and Sarah Trimble . . .

In 1727, George Teter (American spelling) found his way to Philadelphia from Schwaigern. That he came relatively soon to the Robinson River Valley may have been due to the influence of other people there from Schwaigern. He bought 200 acres of land in 1735/36 under the name Jeter (which is how I believe is the way he is to be found in the tithe lists). Though he was relatively young, he died in 1743 and his wife Margaret Teter was appointed the administrator of his estate. The picture grows a bit fuzzy but the Teter family went to North Carolina. There, there were four marriages between the Henkel and Teter families.

This cemetery has been completely descecrated at this date. None of the graves are marked or listed in the grave registers.

According to George's will Jacob and John are under the age of 21 and George Jr is unmarried and 23 years old in 1793 (date will written) According to my estimated birth date for John, he would be 12 and Jacob would have been 13, definately under the age of 21, at the time of George's Will written. George Sr leaves George Jr as manager in charge of the provisions for the younger children provided he is married before the younger sons become 21. Jacob's bd comes from his own hand written note. ***The estate was sold 1805 and final settlement made 1823. IF John 21 in 1805 then his bd closer to 1784 than 1787-88, leaves a three year gap.

Hannah Coil, widow went to Ross Co. OH and appointed Wm. Sinnet POA in 1823 to come back to Pendleton, WV to take care of estate settlements. Hannah most likely died in OH.

Notes for Hannah / Maria Johanna Hevener: CHRONICLES OF BORDER WARFARE CHAPTER V In the fall of the ensuing year (1768) Samuel Pringle, and several others who wished first to examine for themselves, visited the country which had been so long occupied by the Pringles alone. Being pleased with it, they, in the following spring, with a few others, repaired thither, with the view of cultivating as much corn, as would serve their families the first year after their emigration. And having examined the country, for the purpose of selecting the most desirable situations; some of them proceeded to improve the spots of their choice. John Jackson (who was accompanied by his sons, George and Edward) settled at the mouth of Turkey run, where his daughter, Mrs. Davis, now lives - John Hacker higher up on the Buchannon river, where Bush's fort was afterwards established, and Nicholas Heavener now lives -Alexander and Thomas Sleeth, near to Jackson's, on what is now known as the Forenash plantation. The others of the party (William Hacker, Thomas and Jesse Hughes, John and William Radcliff and John Brown) appear to have employed their time exclusively in hunting; neither of them making any improvement of land for his own benefit. Yet were they of very considerable service to the new settlement. Those who had commenced clearing land, were supplied by them with abundance of meat, while in their hunting excursions through the country, a better knowledge of it was obtained, than could have been acquired, had they been engaged in making improvements.

Hannah Heavener was the child of Nicholas and Elizabeth Seybert Havener. She was christened in PA.

At one point in the Heavener history, there is a recount of the Indian raid on the family and there was mention of Miss Hevener having been taken and no mention of her return. Most researchers stopped there. Meaning they no longer looked for her, taking the story as being the end of her.

The publication: Heavener-Hefner-Hevener of the Virginias Vol. 1, Jacob Compiled by Dennis Hevener states the following:

"Maria Johanna Hevener, daughter of Nicholas Hevener and Anna Elizabeth Seybert, was born 29 May 1747 in Tulpehocken, Berks Co., PA. Maria Johanna was baptized on 6-7-1747. Her sponsors or God-Parents were Henrich (Henry) Lorentz and his wife Johanna ?? Seybert Lorentz, a maternal grandmother. Henry Lorentz died in 1757 and Johanna in 1758 "On the frontier" in Pendleton County, at the hands of the Shawnee.**

Research has provided no further records of Maria Johanna (Nicholas and Elizabeth's daughter). The 1769 Will of her father does not refer to Johanna by name but rather by inference in his reference to "my two sons and two daughters." It is noted that Catern, her sister and brothers Jacob and Frederick are mentioned by name. Johanna was provided for under the will to the extent of her one fourth participation in the remainder of the will after specific bequests.

There is the possibility that at the time Nicholas was preparing his will in 1769 there was uncertainty of the whereabouts of his daughter Maria Johanna. The following is taken from the FORT SEYBERT MASSACRE, Ft. Seybert by Mary L. Keister Talbot. page 52 and quoted in part as follows: "after a journey of nine days the band reached Indian village in the Ohio near Chillicothe. The captives whose names are known were Nicholas Seybert, James Dyer, Mrs. Hawes, Miss Peterson and a Miss Hevener. The words "the band" in the preceding sentence refers to the Shawnee--the mention of Miss Hevener was a reference to a sister Maria Caterina or more likely Maria Johanna Hevener."

Now---My take on this---

1. Nicholas Hevener's will confirms the children he had--2 sons, 2 daughters.

2. No where in the Indian raid does it state--the captives died or the first name of Miss Hevener..

3. Nicholas did include his daughter in the will (Maria Johanna) of 1769--she was alive and well.

4. Maria Johanna was married to George Coil, who was listed on Nicholas's estate settlement, named George GILE on the original document and as Geo. Coiles on the clerks record.

5. Nicholas crossed out his daughter Hannah GILE in the original will and the clerk did not include this in the court transcription--because Hannah did not require any assets from her father as she was married.

6. Maria Johanna Hevener Coil, Gile, Kile died in OH about 1837..

Mary Conrad daughter of Hannah Bogart and Jacob Conrad and wife of George Coil/Kile Jr., to the best of my knowledge, has never been part of Indian raid stories or otherwise involved with the situations George Sr.s wife may have been involved.

It is a hard stretch to think "Miss Hevener" even refers to Hannah. It could have as easily been her sister Catern. Especially, since the writers chose to assume it was Maria Johanna because they could not find her in the court records. The writers never looked at the real source, which is the original will of Nicholas Hevener.

This is a classic example of not looking at the REAL records and relying on court transcriptions. This is also a classic example of researchers leaning on other's publications to prove their family lines.

I would make the suggestion, there are no records to support that either wife of George Sr. or George Jr. was the product of Indian heritage. The "rumor" is just as it is--a rumor, with no documentation to support it.

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NICHOLAS HEVENER

My direct ancestor among William Hevener's children is Nicholas Hevener (Generation 2), who, I feel certain, was the eldest of William's four sons if not the eldest of all the children. Nicholas was born in Germany and came to America as a refugee from the Palatinate, arriving in Philadelphia on 25 October 1738. He appears to have been the first member of the family to come to America which is what makes me believe that he was the eldest son.

Nicholas married, in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, a girl named Elizabeth whose maiden surname I have never learned, and they must have lived on William Hevener's Lancaster County farm, since there is no record of their buying land of their own during the fourteen years they remained in Pennsylvania.

The identity of Nicholas Hevener's mother is also lost. It is probable that she died in either Germany or the Nether-lands before the family emigrated, since she does not appear on any ship records as an immigrant.

At the time of the Fort Seybert massacre in 1758 in which William Hevener (Generation 1) was killed and his daughter (Generation 2) captured, Nicholas Hevener (Generation 2) was away from the fort with the supply pack train returning from Staunton. Since Nicholas' wife, Elizabeth, was still living when Nicholas died in 1769, she must have been one of the ten captives taken by the Indians, then later either escaped or was exchanged.

In September 1758, five months after the Fort Seybert tragedy, Nicholas Hevener's name appeared on the muster roll of Augusta County militia that was established to help control the Indian uprisings along the frontier.

In 1750 Nicholas Hevener was naturalized in Pennsylvania, as previously stated, but each colony had its own naturalization requirements that were often not recognized as binding by sister colonies. Therefore, on 18 May 1762, Nicholas Hevener was again naturalized, this time in Staunton, Augusta County, Colony of Virginia. He received his Certificate of Naturalization from the Royal Governor at the same time as his brother, U.Ludwig Hevener.

On page 339 of Oren F. Morton's A HISTORY OF PENDLETON COUNTY, WEST VIRGTNIA is the following:

The records of Augusta state that the individuals named below [Nicholas Hevener and U. Ludwig Hevener were two of the fourteen names] "produced a certificate of their having

received the sacrement, and took the several oaths to his majesty's person and government, subscribed the ab-. juration oath and test, which is ordered to be certified in order to their obtain-ing warrants of naturalization."

After William Hevener's death at the hands of Kill Buck's braves, Nicholas Hevener became the owner of the farm on South Fork of South Branch. He prospered and, as the inventory of his estate testifies, he was quite a wealthy farmer and stock breeder in Pendleton County as was his brother, Peter Hevener, in what was to become Highland County.

Nicholas Hevener's will, written on 5 April 1769, reads:

In the Name of God amen the fifth Day of april in the year of our Lord 1769 I Niclos Havner of augusta County being week in Body but of perfect Mind and Memory thanks be given to God tharefore Calling to Mind the Mortality of My Body and knowing that it is apponted for all all Men once to dye do make and Ordain this to be My last will and Testament that is to Say Princepaly and first of all I give & recomend My Soule unto God that give it and My Body I recomend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christen manner at the Des-cretion of My Executors nothing Doubting but at ye Resurrection I Shall recave the Same again by the mighty power of God, -- and as touching Such worldly Estate wharwith it pleas-ed God to bless me with in this world I give Devise and despose of them in manner following

VIZ, it is my will and do order that. in ye firs place that all my Just debts & funarel Charges be paid I then give & bequath unto My well beloved wife Elezebath Havner after debts and Charges is paid the full third part of all my Moveable Estate of goods and Credets whither in this Colony or any other which I will hur My iron Stove in part tharof, and My Son Jacob Havner is to find hur ten bushels of wheat & one hundred pound of pork yearly and fead for hur one hors & two Cows, and Sow half a bushel of flaxseed yearly in good order as long as Shee liveth and Make for hur a good warm house Conveniant for hur with ye help of My Son Fradreck Havner -- Over and above hur thirds I likewise Constitut make and and Ordain My well beloved wife & my Son Jacob Havner My Executors of this my last will & testament

itam I give and bequeth to My well beloved Son Fredreck Havner a Sarten part of ye plantation I live on laying on ye west side of ye South forke begining at a gulley about ten poles above the head of my bigg feel from thence up-ward to the head of my Land and and a Sarten pies of Land which I prchesed of Robert Davis & my Son Fredrecks and one Black Hors Caled Yonker

From these documents it can be determined that Nicholas Hevener died between 5 April 1769 when he made his will and 20 June 1769 when his wife, Elizabeth, and his son, Jacob, applied for probate certification and had the will placed on record.

In order to qualify as executors of Nicholas Hevener's estate, Elizabeth and her son, Jacob, had to post bond, and the document filed for that purpose reads:

In the preceding documents a number of interesting bits of information come to light. Nicholas Hevener was a just and honest man, deeply religious, more literate than the average man of his day, educated in Germany, and very much in love with and concerned for his wife. He loved and trusted his sons, loved his daughters, too, but in the way of that era, he ex-pected, if they were married, that their welfare would be the responsibility of their husbands, not their parents. He was a practical man and a hard worker, astute in business, wise in the use to which he put his land. He was not a reader, since the only books in his home were a Bible, a Testament, a Psalter and a book of sermons. Nor did he indulge in fripperies, his home being furnished comfortably but practically with no such luxuries as mirrors and clocks. Although Nicholas Hevener could read and write, he wrote in German script, and it was in German script that he signed his will, spelling his name the old German way and adding an umlaut over the "o" in his surname. The will also gives an accurate listing of the children (Generation 3) of Nicholas and Elizabeth Hevener as follows:

1. Hannah Hevener married George Kile.

3. Catherine Hevener married Michael Cowger.

2. Frederick Hevener married Rachel_____

4. Jacob Hevener married Mary Mallow.

The order of births of the four children of Nicholas and Elizabeth Hevener is not clear, but it appears that Jacob was the older of the two sons since he was willed the home place and also was named, with his mother, as co-executor of his father's estate.

HANNAH HEVENER

Hannah Hevener (Generation 3), daughter of Nicholas and Elizabeth Hevener, was married before her father's death in 1769 to George Kile. In her father's will her name was written in, then boldly inked out although still left legible, her husband's surname spelled "Gile." The error on the part of whomever wrote the will verifies Oren F. Morton's listing of George Kile marrying Hannah ______. George Kile was the son of Valentine Kile and served as executor of his father's will. In 1761 the young couple, George and Hannah (Hevener) Kile, were living on the Kile farm in the portion of Augusta County, Virginia, that became Pendleton County, West Virginia. There-fore, although I have found no record of their exact marriage date, the event was solemnized some time before 1761.

The elimination of Hannah's name from the list of devisees in her father's will was not an indication of any disapproval or disinheritance on Nicholas Hevener's part but simply the

customary assumption that husbands, chosen after careful con-sideration and approval by the girl's parents, were capable of supporting wives and families and would assume full responsibility for them.

In 1779 George Kile was appointed road overseer in Pendleton County, and between 1780 and 1786 he and George Mallow, brother of his wife's sister-in-law, Mary (Mallow) Hevener, were appointed constables.

George and Hannah (Hevener) Kile became the parents of three sons and four daughters before George's death in 1794.

On page 177 of Toothman's Deedbook Records is a power of attorney executed by Jacob Coil, Senior, on 7 November 1809.

Jacob Coil did die prior to 29 October 1810 leaving widow Margret and the children named in the deed executed this date and recorded in Deed Book 5, pages 251-53 [Toothman pp. 189-90.]

It is interesting that Henry is named Exec. of Jacob's estate. It is possible that Henry was the only son living in Pendleton at the time Jacob wrote his will. George, Oliver and Henry are on the Tax records in OH as early as 1806. Maybe George and Oliver had already left for OH, since they didn't have any land to sell and Henry was at home with wife in VA.

Actual dates are proven by tombstones, wills, or direct descendants verification. Only the "abt" dates are estimated.

Jacobs will:

In the name of God Amen, I Jacob Coil Sr of the County of Pendleton, and state of Va weak in body but of sound mind and memeory, calling to mind the mortality of all flesh do make and ordain this my last will and testement, that this is to say principally and firstly, I will and recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it nothing doubting but at the general resurrection , at the last day I shall recieve it again.

And my body recommended to the earth from whence it was taken to be buried in a chriatian like manner at the discretion of my executor and surviving friends. And as touching worldly goods wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I will and bequeath of the same in the following manner and firstly I will and desire that all my funeral expenses together with all my other lawful debts be paid out of my estate.

And concerning my legitimate heirs and successors, I divide and devise my real and personal estate among them in the following manner and first and foremost I will and bequeath to my well beloved wife Margaret a descent and comfortable maintenance out of my estate during her natural lifetime.

to my daughter Mary (last name illegible ((Miller)) widow, \$200. to be paid within the space of three years after my decease, and within one year after that he shall pay to my son Jacob Coil the sum of \$200, one year after that he shall pay to my daughter Molly (unreadable) \$200 and within one year after that he shall pay to my son George \$200 and within a year after that my son Elrick \$200. And I will further to my wife Margaret all my household goods; two milk cows and two sheep, maintained upon the place for her use, and after her decease to be the property of my son Henry. I likewise will to my son Henry all my other property of goods and chattles to him and his heirs forever. And lastly I ordain and appoint my son Henry Coil to be the Executor of this my last will and testement hereby pronouncing and declaring this to be my last will and testement revoking, disallowing and making void any former will and testement by me made and attested hereuntofore, confirming, ratifiying and establishing this and this only to be my last will and testement.

In 1793 they sold 190 acres on the South Branch of the Potomac at an area called Peter Reed Creek that had been granted to Peter Moser by patent in the year on September 20, 1768. This is the only proof that Adam may have been the son of Peter Moser who was killed in the indian attack on Fort UpperTrack in 1758.

The Mosers emmigrated from Switzerland to the Palatinate in the 16th cenutry during the Protestant Reformation. The Palatinate is located between the Rhine River and France.

In Sept. 1748, a Peter, George, and Elizabeth Moser arrived in Philadelphia on the Ship Restauration. All passengers on this shipwere listed as being from the Palatinate. The Mosers later emmigrated from Philadelphia to what is now Pendleton County, WV. Peter Moser was killed on the Indian attack on Fort Upper Tract on March 1758 and his brother George died from wounds on April 1758.

Son, George, married Hannah Jones in Ross Co., OH, and became the first settler to erect a cabin in Paint Township. Henry was an entrepreneur in Fayette Co., Ohio. Bloomingburg Cemetery. Coil, Margaret, Died Aug. 10, 1824 Aged 75 yr. 7 mo.

There were four Coils listed in the 1783 Indian captives list;

Martin, Barbary, Cristin and Barbury. Martin may have been Valentine "Felty" Coils father. Felty had a grandfather of the same name who had a son named Martin.

The Draper papers mention a Kyles family being at Ruddell's. This is a spelling that has been seen in other records for the Coil family. A brother of Martin Coil, Jacob, settled in Bourbon county and some of his descendants married into the Spears and Lail families. Also Martin Tofflemire's daughter

(who?) was married to a "Mr. James Coyles," I'm not sure if there is a connection.

VALENTINE (FELTY) COIL was captured at Ruddles Station, in Bourbon Co., KY, June 22, 1780. It is said that he was about 2 years of age at the time. However, his date of death is recorded as 28 Nov 1853, and that he was 85 years old at the time. This makes him born 1768, therefore, when he was captured in 1780 by Indians at about age 12.

In the History of Fayette county, Ohio" (by Frank M. Allen, editor, Indianapolis, IN., 1914) on page 284, Felty (Valentine) Coil was noted as one of the earlier settlers of the Washington Court House neighborhood of Fayette County, Ohio. The following is his story as it appeared:

During the early Indian wars (about mid-1780's) when he was about two years of age (should read 12 years of age), he and his sister (Polly b.'ca.1762VA-d. 28 Nov 1857OH?), were taken captive at RUDDLE'S STATION'(VA-KY?) by the Indians and Canadians under Colonel Byrd. They were carried across the Ohio at Cincinnati to Niagara Falls, thence to Canada where he'was adopted by a squaw who had lost a son. He lived with her until his'marriage to an Indian.

"It is said that the notorious Simon Girty, who had been among his captors, 'met Felty at a public house in Canada and after inviting him to drink, and when under the influence of "fire water," Felty bantered Girty for a fight.'Girty refused but grew very talkative, revealing the whereabouts of his'friends. On the strength of The Girty information, Coil returned to Kentucky'where he found an uncle, who went with him to Virginia (Pendleton Co.) and found his mother who had married a man named HENDRICKS.

"When she saw her long lost son, she did not recognize him until by means of'a mark he was made known. At the end of his visit, Felty returned to his'wife and children in Canada.

"After his wife's death, he left Canada, joining his white brothers in'Fayette Co., Ohio. In Canada, Valentine had learned the art of whiskey making, making it for the English Fur Trading Company. He followed this trade here for a time, setting up a distellery near Washington C. H. He eventually abandoned the whiskey business and moved into town."

Hi Pam,

I think I may have found something in my notes that I have overlooked in the past. It may not be much, but I think it places the Coils at Ruddell's Station. The Draper manuscript collection has numerous interviews by Lyman Copeland Draper during the 1800's. I found this reference in 185:115 (vol 18, Drapers Notes "S," p. 115), Historical Society of Wisconsin, Madison, WI. I don't have who Draper interviewed but I can get later when I go to the library next. My guess is this deposition was made in the 1850's.

"Capt. Ruddell soon surrendered - and all blamed him for not maintaining his position longer. Thinks there were at least 18 or 20 families there - with block-houses and pickets - The Ruddells, Kyles, McFall, Robert McDaniel and others. Christian Spears was there a young man - taken to Detroit, there married a fellow prisoner and after peace he removed to and settled in Ky."

I know that Kyle is a variation (or mispelling) of Coil. So I think this is at least some small proof the Coils were definitely at Ruddell's Station on June 24, 1780 when it was captured. It may be a while before I find out who made the statement. I live in Japan serving with the US Air Force so my trips to the library are few. It may not be important but I'll find it.

Notes for Joseph SKIDMORE:

Notes for Joseph Skidmore , Jr.:

Joseph Skidmore settled in Pendleton Co., VA (WV) in or soon after 1749. He married Agnes Caldwell (by 1730) the daughter of Andrew & Margaret (Train) Caldwell, who survived him by many years and was living in Pendleton Co as late as 1792. Joseph Skidmore sold Fisher's Delight a plantation he inherited from his father in Delaware, in 1736 and moved his family to what is now Washington County, MD. In 1749 he moved from there through the gap at Harpers Ferry to what is now Rockingham County where the family camped for a time on Skidmore Fork while Joseph and his sons went over the mountains

looking for a promising site for their new home. He decided on a fine tract at Ruddle, (now Pendleton Co., WV), where he built a log house and mill soon after. In 1753 he and his wife made a trip back to Maryland to sell, Monican, their plantation there, having decided to stay in Virginia. There is good evidence that Joseph and his family stayed in Pendleton Co during the bloody years of the French and Indian War. When new settlers flooded into the county after the war he had accumulated a fine selection of the very best land in the county to sell them. He never acquired any large tracts of several thousand acres, but

instead patented the very best of small parcels of river bottom land that could be easily cleared and developed. His mill ground grain for the troops in the French and Indian war, Lord dunmores War and the american Revolution as the accounts paid by the House of Delegates sitting in Williamsburg show. In 1775 Mrs Agnes Skidmore was paid for "diets" (meals) served to the militia as they passed up the South Branch Valley on their way to Point Pleasant. He and his partner Daniel Harrison were devout

members of the established church and Harrison built a chapel of ease on his plantation near Dayton, Va. Joseph and his family worshipped there whenever a traveling anglican clergyman stopped on his rounds of the Virginia frontier.

Joseph Skidmores bible (printed in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1756) and his book of Common Prayer are included in the inventory of his estate made on 19 June 1778. Also included were his "specttales" a number of slaves, household goods, and plantation tools. The following by Warren Skidmore:

Joseph Skidmore, who had come to western Maryland by 1742 from Murderkill Hundred in Kent County, Delaware, lived no great distance away. He had formally acquired title to a plantation called Monican from Cornelius O'Neale on 11 June 1748 for £50 preparatory to moving to Virginia, but had probably lived there much earlier. Monican is described as being at the head of the Little Antietam.

Notes for Sarah Skidmore:

Sarah. She married Captain Jonas Friend who was living (presumably) as late as 28 September 1801 when he was named as a defendant in a suit in Randolph County. Sarah has long been said to have been buried in 1808 at Friend's Fort, but the dates of death given for this couple are now known to have been erroneous. Sarah was living on 25 May 1795 when she joined her husband in a deed.

Notes for Jonas Friend:

Israel married "Sarah" (some say "Bokavar", a Shawnee) about 1729 in James City, Jamestown Co., Virginia, and died about 1753, leaving the bulk of his estate to his sons Charles, Jacob, and Jonas Friend. Sarah later married John Valentine House and supposedly went west with an Indian tribe.

His children were:

1) Jonas Friend, b: 1730 in Rockingham Co. VA d: 1807. Married Sarah Skidmore.

2) Jacob Friend, b: abt 1731 in Rockingham Co. VA d: 1817. Married Elizabeth Skidmore.

3) Charles Friend, b: abt. 1733 in Rockingham Co. VA d: 1811. Married Rachel Tackett.

4) Catherine Friend, b: 1735, Rockingham Co., VA. Married Conrad Peck.

5) Mary Friend, b: 1737 in Rockingham Co. VA d: before 1811. Married Capt. Abel Westfall and Jonathan Clark.

Jacob and Jonas eventually moved to what is now Pendleton Co. West Virginia. Jacob married Elizabeth Skidmore, daughter of Joseph and Agnes (Caldwell) Skidmore. Jacob died about 1818.

Jacob was certified by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), as a patriot on September 11, 1942.

He was certified as a patriot by the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) on Jan.24.1997. At least three of his grandsons (by son Israel James) joined in some land deeds in Braxton Co. WV.

Jonas married Sarah Skidmore, also a daughter of Joseph and Agnes (Caldwell) Skidmore.

Jonas's son, Andrew Pendleton Friend was born in 1779 in Pendleton Co. and moved to what is now the Sutton area of Braxton Co. WV about 1807. He was one of the first settlers in that area and probably built the first grist mill in the territory, on the banks of the Elk River.

He married Elizabeth Frame and served in the military during the War of 1812. He was on the commission that established Nicholas Co. in 1818. Andrew Pendleton Friend died on May.13.1865.

Andrew's son, Andrew S. Friend, married Malinda Williams, and they moved to the Ivydale, WV area around 1835, where they built a log cabin on the banks of the Elk River.

Andrew S. Friend was deeded land on November 19, 1847, which eventually became a large part of what is now Ivydale, WV.

Andrew S. Friend's death date is not known, however, he and his wife are both buried in the Friend Cemetery at Ivydale, WV.

iii.John Skidmore born 10 June 1736 ; died Bet. 16 September - 5 December 1809 in Pendleton Co. Virginia.

Notes for John Skidmore:

On Sep 16, 1809, George Coil, John Conrad and Ulrey Conrad were the witnesses to the Will of John Skidmore. The will was proved Dec 5, 1809.

John A. Skidmore, a son of Joseph and Agnes Ann (Caldwell) Skidmore, was born on the plantation "Fisher's Delight" in Kent County, Delaware, June 10, 1736. Soon after his birth, the family moved to that part of Augusta County, Virginia that is now Pendleton County WV. John served in the Augusta County Militia during the French and Indian War. He was called out in 1755 and and served until the end of the War. John married Mary Magdalena Hinkle in the early 1760's. Mary

was a daughter of John Justus and Magdalena (Eschemann) Hinkle. John Hinkle and his family settled in the section of Virginia known as Germany Valley and were the builders of Hinkle's fort.

In 1767, John Skidmore was appointed Captain of the Augusta Militia and in 1770, he was commissioned as one of His Majesty's Justices for Augusta County. In 1774, John's company of the Augusta Militia was mobilized for service in Dunmore's war and took part in the battle of Point Pleasant. John was wounded twice during the battle of Point Pleasant, in the leg and in the hip.

In 1778, John was appointed a justice of the newly formed Rockingham County by Patrick Henry. The first Rockingham County Court, in session April 28, 1778, found John A. Skidmore "fit to serve as major" of the Augusta Militia. John declined the appointment, but retained his captaincy for several years.

When Pendleton County was formed in 1778, John was elected the first president of the new court. John served the new County for several years, including two terms as sheriff. John died in Pendleton County October 12, 1809 and Mary died October 18, 1829.

Jonannes Conrad of Walliswil emigrated to Pennsylvania some years ago, with his parents and his brothers and sisters. The government gives him permission to withdraw a sum of money amounting to 1955 gulden which belongs to the family. The Landvogt of Wangen is to deduct the 10 percent emigration tax and have the surrender of the land-right recorded. Conrad's proxy is to be left with the commune.

(Walliswil is a little village in the district of Wangen. The name is written Konrad now and is still to be found in the vicinity.)

Communication from the Government to the Landvogt of Saanen

Ulrich Aellen and Johann Christoph Hausman, both of Saanen, emigrated to Pennsylvania some years ago. In return for the surrender of their land-right, they now desire, through their proxy, Johann Conrad, to withdraw the property which they have in this country. The Government commissions the Landvogt to relinquish the property after deducting 10 percent, unless some legitimate opposition shall be made. Conrad's power of attorney is to be deposited in the Commune as surety.

(Saanen is a small district in the Bernese Oberland.)

Ulrich Aellen of Saanen emigrated to America about 10 years ago and is residing in Philadelphia. He gave up his land-right and withdrew his property according to permission granted March 3, 1749. He is still credited annually with 14 crowns income from a usufrucht in this country. This interest now amounts to 140 crowns. Aellen commissions Christian Fuhrer of Langnau, who also resides in Philadelphia, to withdraw this money and, in fact, without paying a tax on it, since it is only the interest on a usufruct. In order not to delay the proxy, Fuhrer, who wishes to leave the country soon, the Landvogt gives him permission to withdraw the money without tax and reports to the government concerning his action. In case the tax should have been paid, it is to be deducted from the future interest. The government explains to the Landvogt that the tax of 10 percent is to be required only in case the interest is on property belonging to Ulr. Aellen.

Jacob Conrad Sr came from Bern, Switzerland to Philadelphia in 1750. His wife Franney Svena Lauk died in April 1749, so Jacob Sr., was a widower when he left Europe with his four children. They probably left Bern August 11, 1750 on the ship named "patience". Hug Steel - Captain, from Rotterdam, last from Cowes on Isle of Wright. Jacob Conrad Sr and Jacob Conrad Jr (his son) are listed as passengers, name written CONRATH. (30,000 Names of Immigrants from Pennsylvania by Professor I. Daniel Rupp) However it is not until 1763 that Jacob bought land on the South Branch of the Potomac River.

Jacob Born 1705 and died Dec 1, 1775 Recorded in George and Mary's Bible record.

Isaac Teter married, Sept. 7, 1795, Frena Fisher, daughter of George Fisher Sr. Her marriage bond is signed by her father. Her mother was Elizabeth Conrad, a daughter of Jacob Conrad, as is seen by a deed, dated Feb. 2, 1801, from Charles Fisher and Eunia his wife, and Frena Teeter, widow and relict of Isaac Teter dec. as joint tenants under devise of Jacob Conrad deceased, to George Fisher Jr., for 50 pounds, their part of a certain tract of land at the head of North Mill creek, which was left by Conrad to his daughter Elizabeth and her children with the proviso that her husband George Fisher should have a life interest, etc. (Pendleton Co. Deed book #3, p. 331). After the death of Isaac, his widow Frena appears on the Tax lists for 1803, but not after that date. About that time she married James Allen, and they removed to Harrison Co.

Phebe Skidmore was probably a descendant of John and Susanna Skidmore, who resided in Jamaica as early as 1662, when John was granted a home lot in said town.
