





exactly alike. All have different capacities, some could hold more knowledge than others . . .



BASKETBALL 1963-64

This year saw the F.H.S. basketball team play many close games and win two of the most exciting in school history. Against Onterora Central School, the game was close all the way. The game at the end of regulation playing time was tied so an overtime was used. The teams exchanged baskets and finally Steve Valks foul shot gave F.H.S. the needed margin for a 69-68 victory over the much larger Onteora. South Kortright was next and it became another close game, but this time F.H.S. was on the losing end by a two point margin. On January 2h, 1964, F.H.S. lost to Bownsville 80-72. However, before the first quarter ended there was an air of excitment. With 30 seconds to go in the game, F.H.S. led by one point. Margaretville's most feared player had a clear shot to regain the lead. The ball rolled around the rim for what seemed like hours before it fell into the hands of Malcom Fairlie who tossed it down court to Jerry Balcom who then gave F.H.S. its final points for a 65-62 F.H.S. victory. F.H.S. then remped over Davenport 79-57. Our game with Grand Gorge finished the season giving F.H.S. a 3-13 wom-lost record.







The other major accomplishment was a Constitution written by Jerry Balcom, Karol Mech, Kevin Kornell, Joshua Cohen, John Miller, and Alan Reynolds. The Constitution was ratified on May 29, 1964.

The Constitution wrote all the unwritten rules of the school into legal form. It provided for a General Organization and Student Council as well as the electing of officers for all groups in the school. One of the most important changes was the combining of all treasuries except class treasuries into the Student Council Treasury.


Senior Play
