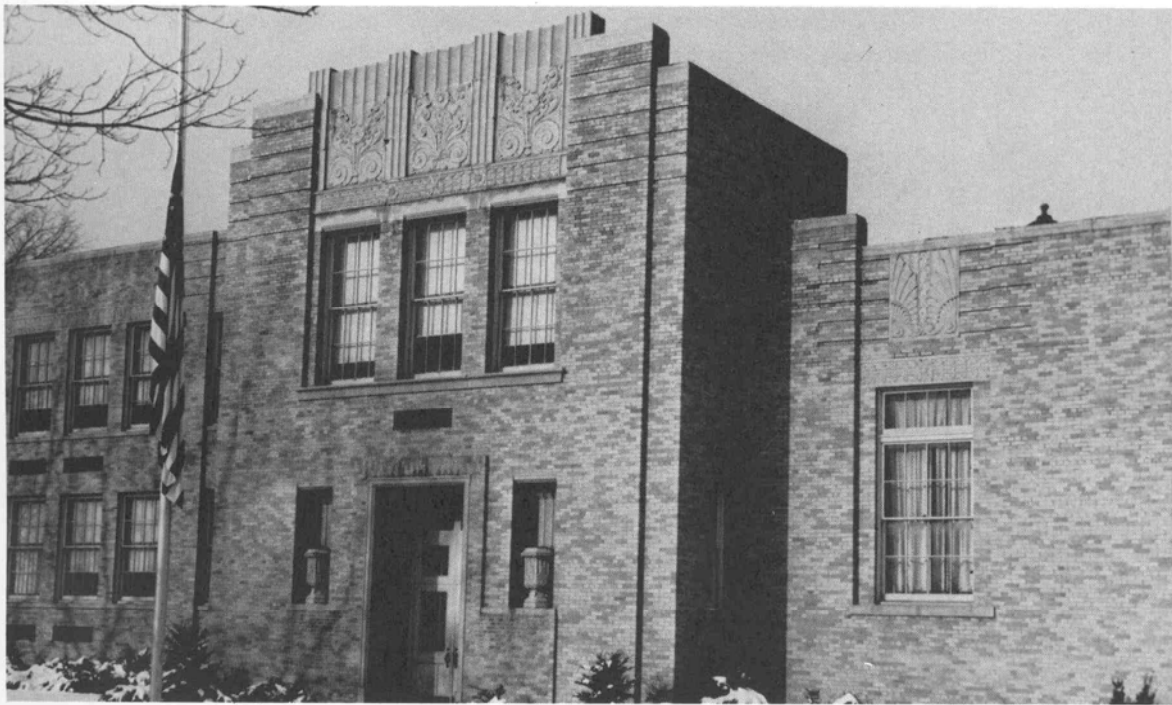

Principal's Message

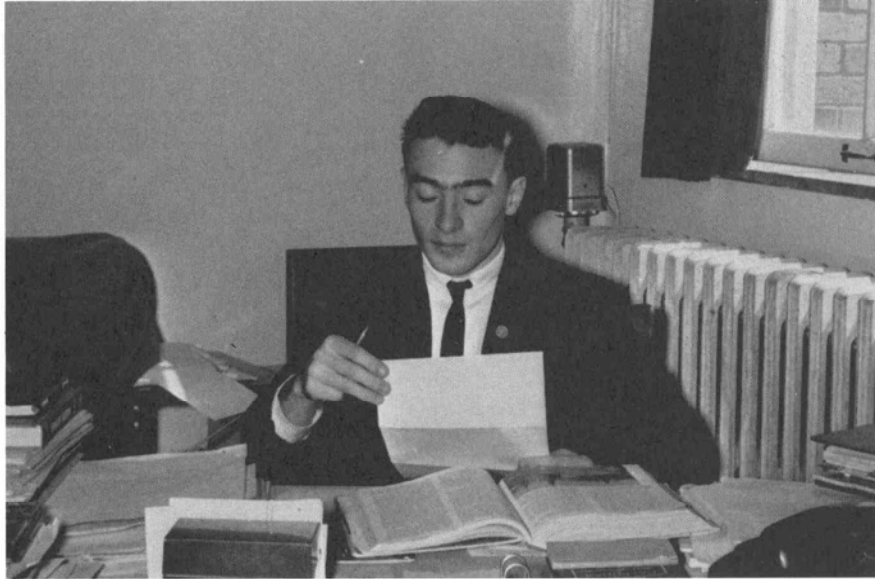

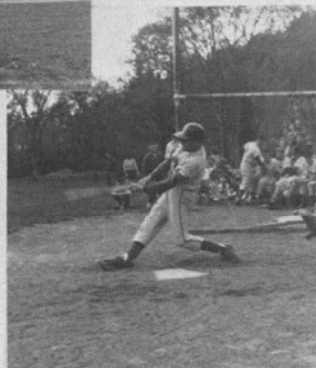


BASEBALL 1964

A second loss to Downsville preceded our final-game triumph over Andes. Six runs in the third inning provided Steve Valk with enough support to win his second game of the year, and ended the season on a happy note.



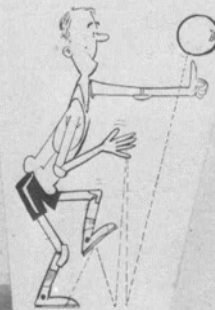

Fleischmanns took an early lead but after a see-saw battle it had plummeted to one-point at half-time. MCS put on a third-quarter surge that seemed to put the game on ice, but Fleischmanns had saved a surge of its own for the final period.

Doug Hinkley collected 27 points in a losing cause to lead the scoring. Jerry Balcom led Fleischmanns with 19.

BASKETBALL 1963-64

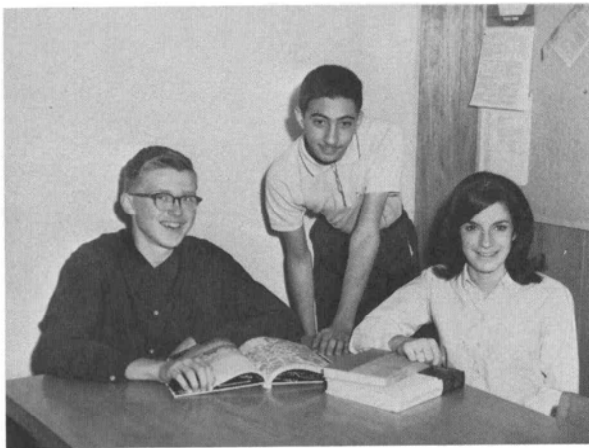
