### ANTONIO DIAZ HAS NOT RUN AWAY

DENIES THAT HE HAS BEEN THREATENED WITH DEATH

Was Rumored That Man in Whose House Fire Originated Had Fled From Ybor City.

Antonio Diaz, in whose house Sunday's disastrous conflagration in Ybor City started, was reported to have fled from Tampa as a result of charges made that he had set fire to his house, stated to The Tribune last night that any statements that he had received notice to leave Tampa were false, and that the suggestion that he had anything to do with the origin of Sunday's fire was unqualifiedly false.

"If anyone made such a statement," said Diaz, "they made it without the least possible spark of truth on which to base it. I have been in Ybor City since the fire doing what I could for myself and my friends. I have not even received an unkind look or suggestion that I was suspected of having set fire to my place. I lost as much as I could have lost, and am now without a penny in the world.

The rumor which prevailed was to the effect that Diaz had received word that he was suspected of having set fire to his boarding house, and that a plan had been made to kill him. He said that he had never heard of such a thing, and that if there was anyone who suspected him he would like to see them.

Alderman Torro, who knows Diaz well, said to The Tribune last night that any such statement was a great injustice to Diaz and is calculated to do him great harm.

### BIG BENEFIT FOR TAMPA FIRE SUFFERERS MONDAY

Mid-Winter Exposition to Have a Big Day Monday—Special Program Has Been Arranged in Jacksonville

Special arrangements are being made at Jacksonville for the benefit that will be given at the Florida Mid-Winter Fair on Monday, and it is expected that the attendance on this day will be the largest of the exposition.

Mayor Frecker has accepted the generous offer of Mayor Sebring, of Jacksonville, to give the proceeds of the special program arranged for Monday to the general relief fund here. The Jacksonville Metropolitan has the following to say of the benefit:

"A number of special features will be arranged for Monday afternoon and evening, and every effort should be made by the citizens of Jacksonville to see that this event is a splendid success. The management of the exposition will give a liberal percentage of all receipts of the day, for the relief of the fire sufferers in the big fire, which swept away more than 800 homes in Tampa, last Sunday.

"Friday will also be a big special day at the exposition. Besides the special events in the horse show, there will be a grand contest of the barbers' contest, a gold medal will be given for the fastest and neatest work by any barber, and also for the winner in the horse-shoeing contest.

"Quite a number of entries have been received in each of these contests, and many of the barber shops, and blacksmiths' shops will be closed from 2 to 6 Friday afternoon, in order that all may visit the exposition, and witness these interesting contests.

"The committee on the barbers' contest is composed of J. B. Gustafson, 303 West Bay street, and D. W. Tainferro, 33 East Bay street. The committee on the horse-shoeing contest is as follows: John Crowley, 110 Cedar street; J. C. Martz, 111 Cedar street, and J. W. Faulkner, 428 West Forsyth street. All those wishing to enter these contests should make application to members of these committees."

### SEVEN FISHERMEN HELD FOR USING ILLEGAL NETS

Waived Preliminary Hearing and Are Bound Over to Criminal Court

Breaking a state law by placing nets of more than 350 yards in width in the Little Manatee river, seven fishermen were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Reed yesterday and brought before County Judge Robles, where they waived examination and were bound over to the criminal court.

Noah Freeman, Robert Swilley, A. J. Felts, H. M. Howitt, Jackson Castello, C. Kowlichewitz and M. L. Oliver are the fishermen living along the Little Manatee who are alleged to have placed nets more than the prescribed length by law to be used as snare nets. They were reported to the sheriff by sent Deputy Reed after the alleged lawbreakers. He had no trouble in locating the men who were at the river tending the nets and arrested them, bringing them here for a hearing. The accused men were bound over to criminal court without bond.

COMPANIONS QUARREL; ONE IS THROWN DOWN STAIRS

Alleged to have thrown a drunken companion down the stairs leading from the Club Chop House on Franklin street last night, Frank Risk, white, was arrested and taken to police headquarters, where a charge of drunk and fighting was entered against him.

Risk and an unknown man had been in the chop house but a short time when they began fighting. Risk proved the better man of the two and pitched the unknown one headlong down the stairs. As soon as the unknown landed he took to his heels. An officer near the scene arrested Kirk. He will be tried today.

### NEGRO WHO VIOLATED TRUST SAYS HE HAS NO FRIENDS

Is Told By Judge That He Was Not Even a Friend to Himself—Held For State Court

Tom Brown, the negro who escaped from the stockade Wednesday and attempted to assault his alleged paragon, J. L. Goldwire, was bound over to criminal court under \$500 bond yesterday by Judge Drumright.

Brown was arrested several weeks ago for beating the woman and was locked up at police station. After a few days incarceration he was made trusty but threw the officials down, thoroughly disregarding all the laws of the station. He was again locked up and after trial sent to the stockade. He escaped from there and hunted up the woman and attempted to assault her but was arrested.

At the trial he said he was alone in the world and had no one to go his bond. The judge thought he was not even friendly with himself.

### CHILD EXPOSED DURING SUNDAY FIRE IS DEAD

Eighteen Months Old Daughter of Jose Alvarez Indirectly Victim of Flames

As a result of exposure during the fire which swept Ybor City Sunday the eighteen months old child of Jose Alvarez, of No. 1706 Eleventh street, died yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

At the time of the fire the child was ill, almost unto death, and it became necessary to remove it. The parents were rendered homeless and for several hours the little one was neglected, with the result that it rapidly grew worse until yesterday when the end came.

The funeral will be conducted today by Undertaker Cone, who will make no charges for his services. The interment will be at St. Mary's cemetery.

### INSURANCE MEN WANT ORDINANCE ON ROOFING

Will Probably Appear Before Council at Tonight's Special Session With a Petition

An informal meeting of a number of insurance men was held last night at which time the matter of appealing to council at tonight's special meeting to ask for better protection from fire loss was engaged in. As a result of this conference it is probable that a petition will be presented tonight asking that all houses constructed in the burned district in Ybor City, and in all other sections of the city have metal, zinc, slate or some other inflammable roofs on them.

There was also an informal discussion of better protection from alleged firebugs in West Tampa, but it is not generally believed among the insurance men that the fires which have originated recently were of incendiary origin. Assurances have been made to the insurance representatives here that everything possible will be done to protect their companies from loss by fire of incendiary origin.

Superintendent C. R. McFarland of the Tampa Water Works Co., also favors the passing of an ordinance preventing the use of shingle roofs. Mr. McFarland cites that since the big fire in Jacksonville no buildings are allowed to be constructed there with shingle roofs, and that this is the case in many cities.

"It is argued by the insurance men that the difference in the cost of the shingle roofs and the metal or slate is but little when it is considered that the shingle roofs have to be replaced and repaired so often. There is a still further saving in that there is a lower rate of insurance, as a rule, on such houses."

KIRCHICK FILES PETITION AND CLAIMS ALL EXEMPTIONS

I. Kirchick, the Franklin street merchant, against whom a petition in bankruptcy was filed several days ago, filed a voluntary petition yesterday in which he claimed all exemptions allowed under the bankruptcy law.

Kirchick places his liabilities at \$16,193.07 and his assets at \$14,024. He does not schedule discrepancy in assets and liabilities. The meeting of creditors, at which it is rumored there will be some unusual charges made, has not yet been called.


