The Case of Morrison vs. Houghton-Note from Mr. Houghton.

New-York, Friday, Oct. 21, 1854.

To the Editor of the New-York Daily Times:

The publication in your paper of yesterday of the proceedings of EDWARD MORRISON against EDWARD L. HOUGHTON is maliciously false and not in accordance even with Morkison's own affidavit. The facts are these: On the first day of June last Mr. Mokrison called on the undersigned and requested him to obtain for him G. R. Hoya's check for \$4 200, to make his bank account good; and stated that he had applied to the Bank of North America for a loan of \$4,000, and had deposited with them a bag of foreign gold containing \$4,200, but they refused, and he then came to the undersigned and offered the same security which Mr. Hayr was to deposit to make his check good. The check was given to Morrison and the bag of gold received, and when taken to the Bank found it contained only \$2,830 worth of gold, which discrepancy was evidently intended to deceive, and Mr. Hoyr could not make his account good. The Justice, on hearing a statement of the case, refused to hold the undersigned to bail.

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
