

OBITUARY RECORD.

Elijah A. Houghton.

Elijah A. Houghton of the shipping firm of Miller & Houghton, in this city, died at his home, in Riverside, Conn., last Monday, at the age of seventy-three years. He had been suffering from cancer for some time, and about six months ago he submitted to a painful surgical operation. He was a widower and leaves two sons and two daughters.

Mr. Houghton was born in this city in 1822. At the age of fifteen years he entered the employ of Brett & Vose, shippers, and he continued in the same line of business until his death. Soon after attaining his majority he founded the firm of Miller & Houghton, which engaged extensively in the South American and West Indian trade. Mr. Houghton was one of the founders of the Maritime Exchange, and for a while he was Secretary of that body. He was also a member of the Chamber of Commerce and of the New-York Yacht Club.

Andrew D. Mellick, Sr.

—At Plainfield, N. J., Andrew D. Mellick, Sr., died Monday night at the age of eighty-four. Mr. Mellick came to New-York in 1844, and became a member of the wholesale grocery house of Berle, Mellick & De Witt. At one time Mr. Mellick was a member of the New-Brunswick Common Council, and a Director of the State Bank in that city. He was a Director in the American Exchange Bank and in the National Fire Insurance Company in this city, and a member of the New-York Historical Society. In New-Jersey he was active in locating and laying out streets, and making the preliminary improvements looking to the founding of the City of Bayonne.

OBITUARY NOTES.

—Samuel W. Gaul, who was Mayor of Camden, N. J., from 1871 to 1874, died Monday night, aged seventy-three years. Capt. Gaul served throughout the war in the Fourth New-Jersey Regiment. He was in thirty-six battles, was once wounded, and was three times taken prisoner by the Confederates.

—Mrs. Anna M. Clark, wife of Walter V. Clark, died at her home, at Hackensack, N. J., yesterday. She was the only daughter of the late Supreme Justice M. M. Knapp. Chronic heart trouble was the cause of death.

—Dr. A. G. Tebault died at Norfolk, Va., yesterday, aged eighty-four years. He represented Princess Anne County in the Legislature in 1857-8, and was President of the Virginia Medical Society in 1874.

—Carl Kohn, ex-President of the Union National Bank of New-Orleans, died yesterday at Pass Christian, Lake Pontchartrain.
