To be executed before a Court of Record or some officer thereof having custody of its seal, a Notary Public, or
 Justice of the Peace, whose official signature shall be verified by his official seal, and in case he has none, his signature
 and official character shall be certified by a Clerk of a Court of Record, or a City or County Clerk, unless such certificate
 is already on file in the Pension Office, when such fact should be stated.

Age, disability, or dependence have no bearing upon the rights of applicants.
 The soldier must have been honorably discharged.

The Act of July 27, 1892, requires a service of thirty days in one of the following Indian wars; Black Hawk, Creek,
 Cherokee, or Florida war with the Seminole Indians, between 1832 and 1842, inclusive. The applicant must be a citizen
 of the United States.

The Act of June 27, 1902, requires a service of thirty days in one of the following Indian wars; Florida and Georgia
 Seminole, 1817-1818; Fevre River, of Illinois, 1827; Sac and Fox, 1831; Sabine disturbances, 1836-1837; Cayuse, 1847-1848;
 on the Pacific Coast; Florida wars with the Seminoles, 1842-1858; Texas and New Mexico, 1849-1856; California distur-
 bances, 1851-1852; Utah disturbances, 1850-1853; and the Oregon and Washington territory wars, 1851-1856. Where
 there is no record of enlistment or muster into the service of the United States in any of the wars mentioned, the record
 of pay by the United States shall be accepted as full and satisfactory proof of such enlistment and service.

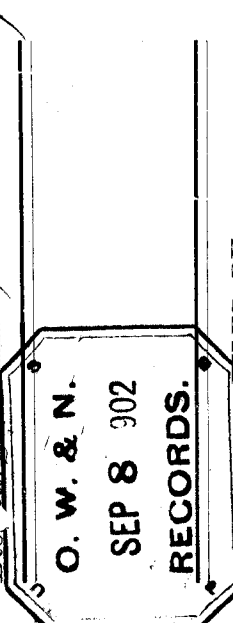
