Lewis Soldiers in N. Y. Before 1775.

- Anthony Leuwish, volunteer for the expedition to be made against Canada, under Capt. Albertus Tiebout, mustered in New York city, 1746.
- Barent Lewis, given commission as "Ensigne" Sept. ye 10, 1684; "Albany ye 24th March, 1689. Ordered that Barent Lewis be commissionated as Captain for Albany City." In 1717 the "Officers and Souldiers now alive, who served on the ffronteers at Albany under Capt. Barent Lewis in 1689 and 1690'' were pensioned.
- Barnard Lewis, commissioned by Jacob Leisler as captain of a Company of Foot for the expedition to Canada, Feb. 26, 1690.
- Benjamin Lewis, certificate : "I do hereby certific that Mr. Benj. Lewis did on the 28 June Engage himself in his Majes'ys service as Ensign in my Company of Foot on the pres't expedition against Canada and that he has been Aiding and Enlisting to the utmost of his power in filling and Compleating my Company. New York, 30 July, 1746. Peter Wraxall."
- Benjamin Lewis, private in the Queens county company under Capt. Richard Hulett; enlisted April 5, 1759; mustered April 12, volunteer, enlisted by Capt. Hulett. Remarks: Age 23, born Rhode Island. Labourer. Light comp., sandy beard, height 5 ft. 41 in.
- Daniell Lewis, private in the Huntington company of Capt. Thomas Highe, Suffolk co. Regiment of Col. Henry Smith, 1715.
- David Lewis, served in "his Maj'es ffort at Albany" 1689-1690, under

Staats'' and was awarded 40 oz. $17\frac{1}{2}$ pwt. of silver plate therefor by act of the Legislature Dec. 23, 1717. (Colonial Laws of N. Y. Vol. I.)

- David Lewis, 'Centinell' (private) in the company of Capt. Peter Mathews, on roll of April 24, 1714.
- Elisha Lewis, a subaltern, led a detachment up towards Albany in April, 1757, and was awarded the sum of £11, 5d. therefor, by act of Legislature in 1760. (Colonial Laws of N. Y. Vol. III.)
- Francis Lewis, appears as private in Capt. Edmond Matthewes' company, on the muster rolls of July 31, Oet. 9 and Nov. 2, 1755. Company mustered at Albany June 4, 1755, and at Lake George Oct. 5.
- Henry Lewis, private in Capt. Peter Van Denburgh's co., from Westchester co., roll of July 11, 1755.
- Israel Lewis, private in Capt. Alex. Smith's company. Detached April 24, 1758.
- James Lewis, volunteer under Capt. Nathaniel Richards. Mustered in New York city, 1746.

Lewis College.

FROM SIMPSON'S CYCLOPEDIA OF METHODISM.

Lewis College is located in Glasgow, Howard co., Mo., on the line of the Keokuk and Kansas City Railroad. The surrounding country is rolling, fertile and beautiful, and the place is one of the most beautiful in the state. It is owned jointly by the Missouri and St. Louis Conferences of the M. E. church and is under their direct control. It owes its origin to the benevolence of the Lewis family of Howard county, who desired to conseerate a portion of their wealth to the the Comand of Capt. Jochins, promotion of general knowledge and

religious culture. The first step taken was the establishment of the Lewis library, by Colonel B. W. Lewis, who bequeathed to the church for that purpose the sum of \$10,000. A library building was then erected by Mrs. Eleanor Lewis and B. W. Lewis, Jr., and Major J. W. Lewis, at a cost of \$26,000. In this edifice the college was organized and opened by Rev. D. A. McCready, in September, 1866. Its commodious building, beautifully situated on elevated grounds, overlooks the city and river. It is now (1881) under the presidency of Rev. James C. Hall, A. M., who is assisted by a corps of able and competent teachers. Though comparatively young, it has done a good work in the cause of education.

Major James W. Lewis was born in Virginia in 1822, but removed to Missouri and settled at Glasgow. He engaged in mercantile business, and also acquired considerable wealth. Being devoted to the interests of Methodism he has labored for its advancement. Through his gifts and that of other members of the family a college was founded in Glasgow. He représented the Missouri Conference as a lay delegate in the General Conference of 1872.

FROM YALE ALUMNI WEEKLY.

On Thursday, April 27, 1899, the Corporation announced the Yale choice of Professor Charlton Miner Lewis (5 v p 92 Vol. V) as the first Emily Sanford Professor of English Literature at Yale. This chair, was endowed by the will of the Hon. E. C. Billings of New Orleans in memory of his wife, who was Miss Emily Sanford of New Haven. The gift of \$70,000 was made in his will, and his death occurred December 1, 1893. The fund, principal and interest, amounts to date to between \$86,000 and \$87,000.

No appointment has been made to this chair until that of Professor Lewis. The failure of the authorities of Yale to act has been the subject of a great deal of comment and criticism, and those in power here have admitted that it had always been a perplexing question. There had been talk of various candidates from time to time, and it is probably true that one or two elderly men of national reputation had been informally approached in the matter. That the position, however, has been offered to a long string of literary men, as some of the papers have indicated, has no foundation in fact.

There has been from the first an extreme solicitude to be as nearly as possible exactly right in making this choice. The chair was a conspicuous Aug. 4, 1874. 3 ch b. Digitized by and an important one; the English Department was in its formative state and much in the public eye. The value of a good man in the position, it was felt, would be tremendous and the injury from a wrong choice would be almost irreparable.

Professor Lewis was the oldest of the younger wing of the English staff in the Academic Department. Although he has been comparatively a short time in teaching, his mind and temperament have always been distinctly that of the scholar, and he has always shown a decided trend towards literary work and study.

The appointment is emphatically a success. In this verdict undergraduates join with graduates. The appointee has first of all the respect of his colleagues as a scholar and respect of his students as a man, and as a teacher, of nice discrimination, of originality and thoroughness. Having been for less than five years in the pursuit of letters, he has not a long record in book-making. His most ambitious work, the thesis on which he was given his doctor's degree last June, "Foreign Sources of English Versification," has received very favorable comment from scholars in Europe and America. Not only does Prof. Lewis display fulness of knowledge, but he has treated a perplexed and difficult subject with admirable lucidity. In general, a fact of much importance, all of Professor Lewis' work, even to the smallest detail of instruction, has been thorough and scholarly. He is a hard worker and in his discharge of duty very exacting of himself and conscientious! His standard of class-room work is high and he has a very general reputation among the students for comparatively low marking. That in spite of this he is so universally liked is not the least of the tributes to

OBITUARIES.

"At 2 o'clock this afternoon Apr. 3, 1899, funeral services were held over the remains of Second Lieut. Lewis H. Lewis, late of the Ninth United States infantry, in the New York Avenue Presbyterian church of Washington, D. C. Simultaneously memorial services were conducted at Cobleskill and at Amsterdam. Lieutenant Lewis was born in the former town and was taken by his parents to Amsterdam when a lad ten years old. Five or six years afterwards as the result of a competitive examination

he won a cadet-ship at West Point and was named for the place by Representative John Sanford. Throughout his career at the academy, Cadet Lewis made himself one of the most popular at that institution. It is because of his reputation as a boy and a young man in the places where he was best known that this unusual mark of honor is rendered to his memory today.

"Lieutenant Lewis was killed by a Spanish bullet in front of Santiago on July 1st and his body was brought here on the Crook last week. ARNOLD ANGELL LEWIS.

The passing away of such a character as the late Arnold Angell Lewis demands more than a brief record of his death. For fifty years he has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and for fully sixty years an integral part of New York City life, knowing and being known by a large proportion of the older as well as the present generation of down-town business men.

For nearly forty years he was in mercantile life, corner of Front street and Coenties slip, being the senior partner in the firm of Lewis & Brown. and for the last twenty years he has been a broker in commercial paper in Hanover stseet.

Mr. Lewis was remarkably affable and courteous in manner. The writer of this notice hasknown him intimately for more than fifty years, and has never heard one word relative to him others than of praise and commendation

Mr. Lewis was born in New Berlin, Chenango County, N. Y., his parents

part of the State, coming there from Providence, R. I., in 1800. He was descended in direct line from Roger Williams, and also from Harris. Arnold, Olney, Whipple and many others of the founders of Rhode Island. Mr. Lewis was a grandson of Col.
