Aaron Lewis, private, Captain Israel Hix's Co., (a Bristol-co. Co.) Col. Josiah Whitney's Regt., for service on a R. I. expedition, enlisted Aug. 6, 1778, discharged Sept. 10, 1778, service 1 mo. 5 days.

Aaron Lewis, private, Capt. Peleg Peck's Co., Col. John Daggett's Regt., for service on alarm at Rhode Island: enlisted Jan. 14, 1778, discharged Apr. 1, 1778; service 2 mos., 17 days. Stationed at Warwick, R. I.: reported 3 mos. Levies. Roll sworn to at Swanzey.

Abiel Lewis, private, Capt. George Dunham's Co., Col. John Bailey's Regt. Residence Plymouth.

Abijah Lewis, private, on statement of Continental Balances in Col. Smith's Regt. Time engaged for 3 years.

Abijah Lewis, of Capt. Joseph McNall's Co., Col. Edw. Wigglesworth's Regt. Belonged to Buxton. Enlisted for Buxton. Mustered by Esq. Wells. Also appears with rank of private on return of above Co. in service on or before Aug. 15, 1777. Also on pay roll of above Co. for Oct. 1778, dated Nov. 16, 1778. Also for May, 1778, dated Camp at Valley Forge, June 2, 1778. Term of enlistment, during war. Reported sick in camp.

Abijah Lewis, appears on list of men enlisted into Continental Army from Buxton, dated Aug. 26, 1777.

Abijah Lewis on list of men's names as belonging to Gorham and enlisting for Beverly.

Abijah Lewis on statement of Continental Balances of Col. (late Wigglesworth's) Regt. Engaged

for 3 years. Certified June 19, 1780.

Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Jotham Loring's Co., which (probably) marched on alarm of Apr. 19, 1775, from Hingham. Belonged Hingham. Service 13 days.

Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Har Williams' Co., Col. Edmund Phinney's Regt. Date of enlistment to date of marching to headquarters July 5, 1775, equivalent to 44 days. Sworn to in Cumberland-co.

Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Peter Page's Co., Col. Edward Wigglesworth's Regt.: enlisted Feb. 20, 1777. Roll made up for March and April, dated Providence May 5, 1779; enlisted for 3 yrs.

Abijah Lewis, corporal, Lt. Nathaniel Sartell's Co., Col. Wm. Prescott's Regt., dated Aug. 1, 1775; enlisted May 15, 1775; time 78 days. Belonged Athol.

Abijah Lewis, on list of men mustered in York-co., to serve in Capt. Wm. Porter's Co., Col. Ebenezer Francis' Regt., by return made Meh. 12, 1777, by Nath'l Wells, Muster Master; residence Gorham; term of enlistment 3 yrs. or during war. Received state bounty.

Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Samuel Sprague's Co.: marched on alarm of Apr. 19, 1775, from Chelsea. Belonged to Chelsea. Discharged May 16; service 22 days.

Abijah Lewis, on list of men who were unfurnished with fire arms. Signed by Nath'l Wells, Muster Master.

Abijah Lues, private, Capt. Williams Co., Col. Phinney's Regt. Dated Cambridge, Oct. 7, 1775. Belonged Buxton, Me.

Abijah Luice, private, on list of men acting as main guard under Lieut. Col. L. Baldwin, June 22, 1778.

- Abijah Lewis, corporal, Capt. Carey's Co., Col. Prescott's Regt., dated Cambridge, Oct. 7, 1775.
- Abijah Lewis, Jr., private, Capt. Jotham Loring's Co., probably marched from Hingham on alarm of Apr. 19, 1775. Belonged to Hingham. Service 13 days.
- Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Fowle's Co., Col. Smith's Regt. For service from Jan. 1, 1780, to Feb. 20, 1780. Residence York. Reported enlisted for three years.
- Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Peter Page's Co., Col. Smith's Regt. Service from Feb. 20, 1777, to Dec. 31, 1779. Residence Buxton.
- Abijah Lewis, private on Depreciation Roll of Col. Edwd. Wigglesworth's (later Col. Calvin Smith's) Regt. for 1st three years. Service from 1777 to 1780.
- Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. Cushing's Co., Col. Heath's Regt. Dated Fort No. 2, Oct. 5, 1775. Belonged to Hingham.
- Abijah Lewis, private, Capt. James Perry's Co., 16th Regt. Enlisted Jan. 1, 1776. Substitute for Benjamin Tibbits.
- Abisha Lewis, private, Capt. Loring's Co., Col. Greaton's Regt. Dated Aug. 1, 1775. Enlisted Apr. 27, 1775; time 3 mos., 12 days. Belonged Hingham. Reported in place of Kenedy.
- Abisha Lewis, drummer, Capt. Pyam Cushing's Co., Col. Lovell's Regt. 4 day's service performed between Mch. 11 and 29, 1776. Reported "assembled to guard the shores." Date of enlistment Mch. 4, 1776; discharged Mch. 8, 1776. 4 days. Assembled at Dorchester.
- Abisha Lewis, private, Capt. Heman Lincoln's Co., Col. Lovell's Regt., for service at Hull. Enlisted Dec. 14, 1776, discharged Dec. 18, 1776, 4 days.
- Abisha Lewis, on order for Bounty coat or equivalent, due for the eight months service; Capt. Chas. Cushing's Co., Col. John Greateon's Regt.: dated Cambridge Dec. 18, 1775.
- Abishai Lewis, Sergeant, Capt. Theophilus Wilder's Co., Col. Dike's Regt., in service from Dec. 13, 1776, to Mch. 1, 1777. Residence Hingham.
- Abishai Lewis, drummer, Capt. Seth Stower's Co., Col. Josiah Whitney's Regt. Service from July 31, 1776, to Nov. 30; service 4 mos. Also on roll of above Co. as private, enlistment May 25, 1776, to Aug. 1, 1776, 2 mos. 7 days.
- Abishai Lewis, private, Capt. Pyam Cushing's Co., Col. Lovell's Regt. For service at Hull in June, 1776. 2 days

Explanations, Abbreviations, etc.

For convenience the records of the various Lewis families are divided into Books and each Book into chapters. At the head of each Book appears the name of the earliest known ancestor of that family. The List of Books is a complete index to the Books as published to this time. New Books will be added from time to time as new branches of the Lewis family are found. CHAPTER CXXX.

FROM SWIFT'S BARNSTABLE FAMILIES.

George Lewes (5) was a planter, and resided in the East Parish of

Barnstable. He was not so well educated as the others of the family, and had not the active business capacity of his brother James or Thomas: yet he was honest and industrious, a good neighbor, and a worthy member of the church. His house stood on the south side of the highway, on the lot of land recently owned by Mr. Daniel Cobb, deceased. His houseclot, containing five acres, with a barn standing thereon, he bought Sept. 10, 1656, of Barnard and Joshua Lumbard. It was bounded north by the highway, east by the great lot of Thomas Lumbard, south and west by the land of Barnard Lumbard. This was originally the land of Joshua Lumbard.

His farm was on the north side of the road. In 1654 he had sixteen acres bounded west by the road to the new common field, north partly by the land of Goodman Wells, and the Indian reservation, and easterly by the land of Thomas Huckins, at the "Horse Prison," so called.

May 19, 1656, he bought for £20 the dwelling-house and sixteen acres of land of Robert Shelley, bounded east by the road to the new common field, south by the highway, west by the Dimmock farm, and north by the land of Goodman Isaac Wells. By the purchase of the Shelley estate his farm extended on the County road from a point a little east of the present dwelling house of Mr. W. W. Sturgis to the Horse Prison, which stood near the dwelling-house of Edward Gorham, deceased.

Beside the above he owned two lots of three acres each at Sandy Neck, and his share in the common lands. Jan. 16, 1683, he sold one-half of one of the above lots at Sandy Neck to his brother James for one good cow, meadow then being more highly valued than at present.

The design of the kettle is that of a type used in the earliest colonial days, but in its physical characteristics it bears evidence of being made of iron cast directly from the ore as reduced

in a blast furnace, and not from pig iron remelted in a reverbratory or a cupola furnace: and there is no evidence or reason to believe that there was either of these furnaces at the Saugus Iron Works.

Thomas Hudson owned sixty acres of land on the westerly bank of the Saugus River, at the present sites of Scott's and of Pranker's mills, and he sold this land to a Company of Undertakers for the Iron Works. He claimed in consideration the first article made at the works, and although not given to idealisms, this kettle was kept by him and his descendants in the male line for over a century, when it passed in the fourth generation to Mary (Hudson) Lewis [v Zachariah (46) p 104 Vol. III] who gave it to her daughter, Mary Lewis, and she in turn gave it to her nephews, Arthur and Llewellyn Lewis, from whom the purchase was made.

These two brothers well remember the story of the kettle as told by their grandmother, who prized this kettle as an heirloom, whose history had in a like manner, been related to her by her grand parents.

The Saugus Iron works were such an important factor in the inception and early development of American industries that their early history merits due consideration. This was not the first attempt in iron-smelting but the first success.

* * *

* * *

The immediate return to those engaged in the enterprise is now of little moment, but the results to the whole Colony of an establishment which attracted, developed and then scattered a body of skilled mechanics were of great importance and no doubt may have been an essential factor in rearing many prominent industries.

The grass-covered mounds of ashes and dross along the banks of the

Saugus River are the only vestige of those busy works, and serve as a uninscribed monument to the mechanical pioneers of America.

Who was the father of Joseph Lewis of Swansea? This question has given rise to much discussion in the pages of our LEWISIANA and while it has seemed easy to say who was not his father, little evidence has been brought forward to show who his father was. I dislike to thresh over old grain, but I have waited many months for the promised *evidence* that he was not the son of George Lewis of Barnstable, but as far as I have been able to gather the evidence is wholly negative and resolves itself into three specifications.

(1) Savage does not mention Joseph as one of George's sons: (2) George does not name Joseph in his will: (3) after Joseph was killed in the Swansea massacre, which may now be regarded as proven (v p 124 Vol. VIII) his widow went to Malden and not to Barnstable where her father-in-law(?) lived.

On the other side is Deane's History of Scituate which makes Joseph the son of George. The authority for this statement of Deane, I have never seen given. The evidence on which Benjamin Lewis, with Joseph his father and Joseph his grandfather was for a time merged into Book XXIV in LEWISIANA was a genealogy compiled by my grandfather James Lewis [Book XLII, 62]. This genealogy was prepared about the time Deane's History was written: the original manuscript does not show whether just before or after. So it must remain a question

whether Deane was his authority, or vice versa, or whether both obtained their data from the same source. James Lewis was a careful and painstaking lawyer, distinguished for his accuracy, and in the genealogy of his branch of the Lewis Family and in that of his wife's branch of the Parker Family compiled at the same time, there has been no statement called in question save this one regarding the children of George Lewis. This statement cannot be overthrown by negative evidence of the character thus far offered, indeed it must stand until positive evidence is produced showing that George Lewis did not have a son Joseph, or that Joseph Lewis of Swansea did have some other father than George. For a while some supposed that Joseph was the son of Edmund of Lynn (Book XXXIII) and then that he was the son of John of Malden (Book XXXVI). These views, I have been privately informed, have been abandoned. The only chances left for him would be to be the son of William of Roxbury (!) (Book XLIV) or to have emigrated directly from England or Wales.

Thomas Lewis, (33 v. p. 138, Vol. VIII) has the distinction of being the second oldest citizen of Kansas City. Although he will be 90 years old on the 9th of next July, he announces, with not a little degree of pride, that he still reads and writes without the aid of spectacles.

Only a few months ago he retired from active business pursuits, never before having taken a vacation, and now he sits among his books, but finds his greatest pleasure in indulging in reminiscences of the past, when he was an intimate friend of Abraham Lincoln, and when he was struggling to win for himself success in the mercantile world.

There are few lines of business in which Thomas Lewis, at one time or another in his life, has not engaged. Apprenticed in his boyhood to the trade of a shoemaker, he has been successively the proprietor of a general store, a manufacturer, lawyer, mill builder and real estate dealer. He has founded a number of corporations, and has been the financial genius of banking, railroad, mining and publishing enterprises.

In the last 70 years of his life he has never indulged in the use of either liquor or tobacco. During 60 years he devoted every day an average of 16 hours of the 24 to business or reading.

"I am a lineal descendant of Edward Doty, who was a passenger on the Mayflower when it landed at Plymouth in November, 1620." said Mr. Lewis, "My grandmother, Anna Doty, was his great granddaughter."

"I was born in Bernards township, Somerset county, N. J., on July 9th, 1808. There I cast my first presidential vote, for Andrew Jackson, in 1828, when Jackson received all the votes of the township except four that were cast for J. Q. Adams. I have always been a Jacksonian democrat.

It was a wilderness from Detroit to Dayton and the day he started home he was taken sick and had to be held on his horse by two men for six days and when he got home he was insensible and continued so for six weeks, and it was two years before he was able to work. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and of the Masonic order.

It may not be out of place to state at the outset, that I can vouch for the absolute accuracy of the following corrections and additional items to the records of our line. I have a great mass of information which I hope to get into shape for LEWISIANA at an early date.

Ellis Lewis (52) son of Ellis Lewis (1) emigrated from Chester Co., Pa., to York Co., Pa., in the year 1735, instead of the various other dates mentioned in previous communications. He died either the last week of December 1794, or early in Jany. 1795, instead of Feby. 1795. He is buried in the old Quaker burying place in Newberrytown, York Co. Pa., also his wife Ruth Wilson. His will is dated Dec. 28, 1794 instead of 1791 as published.

Eli Lewis (2) was born Jany. 31, 1750 instead of 1756, and died Feby. 1, 1807, Sunday morning, (after a short illness) instead of Feby. 2, 1807 as published. He is buried in the old Quaker burying place in Newberrytown, York Co., Pa., also his wife Pamela Webster Lewis.

DEATHS.

Ivy, Va. April 14, 1898.—The remains of the late John M. Lewis were interred in St. Paul's cemetery this afternoon at 4 o'clock: the service being conducted by the rector.

During the whole of his long life Mr. Lewis resided in the neighborhood in which he first saw the light of day, with the exception of four years spent in the army as a member of Ashby's command, serving with great gallantry throughout that memorable struggle. For the past thirty years he has been amagistrate in his section, no one opposing him at the election. Always an ardent Democrat, he declined to accept a proffered political position of great honor at the hands of a party at one time in the control of the State.

For thirty-five years he was a member of the vestry of St. Paul's Episcopal church, at Ivy, and no man in the community stood higher in the regard of his neighbors. His popularity was attested in a large measure by the almost constant stream of friends who have called almost daily since he was stricken.

Mr. Lewis is survived by five sons and one daughter—Mrs. Winston Garth of Albemarle. Messrs. Thomas F. and Walter J. Lewis of Texas, John M. Lewis, Jr., of Norfolk and William H. and Howell C. Lewis of Charlottesville.

Southbury, Ct., June 9, 1898.—The remains of Benjamin F. Lewis who died in St. Louis, Mo., arrived here on Monday evening, accompanied by his daughter and infant grandchild. The interment was in Pine Hill cemetery, in his lot where his first wife was buried, on Tuesday forenoon, Rev. W. H. Barrows conducting a short service. The friends recognized the familiar look on the face of the departed although he has been away from this place over thirty years. Mr. Lewis had been sick with a lingering disease and he enjoined it upon his daughter that his remains might be brought to the place of his birth and laid near his father and mother, which duty she sacredly performed. Mr. Lewis was son of Isaac and Eliza Treadwell Lewis, who owned the place now occupied by David Smith, where he carried on his trade for a number of years. Of their family of ten children seven survive, Justin in Kansas; Mrs. Gray and Mrs. Seward in Bridgeport; Wm. F. and Robert in Watertown; Monroe in Pennsylvania and Everett in New York. He leaves a wife and five children. His age was 65 years.
