CHAPTER CXII.

The following reminiscences of Abraham Bradley Lewis, (902 v p 53 Vol. IX) is taken from an old New Haven paper.

The father of the late A. B. Lewis was proprietor for a long time of a drug store. The store was on Chapel street and stood where Burgess & Burgess' hat and fur store is to-day. The father was Nathaniel Lewis, and having been long in the drug business became commonly knownas Dr. Lewis, a title to which the son Abram, who was much in the store, succeeded. The young Abram attended a school which was quite famous 60 years ago. It was kept by Mr. Jarman, grandfather of Mr. Jarman, the bookseller on Church street, and not a few of our old town-born citizens of to-day attended it. The school was held in the old wooden building on State street near Crown, where Baron Schlegel's saloon was and which has just been torn down by Mr. John Bromley for streets for forty years."

the erection of a new block. The drug store of Dr. Lewis was next kept by Mr. John Fowler, who is living in Milford. The father of Abram left a fortune of \$25,000 or \$30,000 which was quite a fortune in those days. Beside the son Abram there were two sisters, one of whom, Mrs. Pitkin, widow of General Pitkin of Boston, is living. The property of deceased is supposed to be worth somewhere in the neighborhood of \$100,000. With his sister he owned the valuable land with the buildings on the line of the proposed new street from Orange to State, between Chapel and Court streets. The interest of deceased in the Young Men's Institute began 30 or 40 years ago, at which time he began to be a quite frequent visitor at that institution, absorbed in the books. periodicals and newspapers. Deceased was a kind-hearted gentleman and took a good deal of interest in boys and became quite attached to his pets. as he called them, and made some of them expensive presents. He used to say they kept him young in thought. He loved to enter into the happy spirit of youth and forget that he was surely growing to be an old man. Deceased was an attendant of the North church. and among his contributions to the funds of the church he gave \$1,000.

Few if any of those in the active ranks of the public school teachers of Connecticut can say what John G. Lewis (whose portrait appears in this issue) said last June "I have taught in New Haven public schools for forty years and if I live until June next I shall have been connected with the school on the corner of York and George

Little wonder that such long, faithful and efficient services should have been marked as noteworthy by the press not only of New Haven but of Boston and New York. How many of the small army who have gone forth from his instructions would not have liked to personally thank the gifted New Haven editor for his glowing tribute (v chapter 280 p 37 Vol. IX) or would not heartily agree with the Boston writer when he called the subject of his illustration the ideal school master who had made the Webster school-all honor to it-what it is to-day—one of the very best in the New Haven school district, or would not read with most grateful feelings the conclusion of a vigorous article in a Metropolitan daily on the Public Teaching Force of New Haven, that "It is gratifying, moreover, that no age limit has been set up. Everything turns about the usefulness and efficiency of the employe. The wisdom and justice of this new arrangement was strongly enough proved last week when especial honor was done a principal, Mr. Lewis, who was just completing the fortieth year of service. Though advanced in years he has no peer among the principals of the city, and has before him many more years of valuable service. Nor is the lesson lost upon the faithful teachers of the district."

So it was an interesting occasion when on June 23d, 1898, there gathered in the new building which marks the site of the old Webster, members of the board of education, the supervising principals, the special teachers, all the teachers of the Webster school district and a few of Mr. Lewis' many friends—for the number was kept rigidly very small least he should gain even a hint of their intended delightful surprise—the presentation of a handsome and valuable Morris chair.

Likewise it is proposed by some of the many well known political and business men of this city-as James A. Howarth, postmaster, Morris F. Tyler, president of the Southern New England Telephone company, Harry B. Asher, attorney and member of the board of education. John Z. Mason of the New Haven Shoe company, and many more who have been trained at this school during the past forty years that next June shall witness a great celebration of this anniversary and a reunion so far as possible of all now living of the thousands of men and women in this and many other cities of our country who recall with unusual affection the days of pleasure and profit they passed in "Old Webster" with its honored principal, John Gardner Lewis (438 v p 76 Vol. III.)
