From Genealogy of the Lewis FAMILY BY WM. TERRELL LEWIS.

Col. Joel Lewis (28 v p 62 Vol. IV) was born in Albemarle co., Va., Aug. 28, 1760. He was a large man of great muscular strength. He had just entered college at Lexington, Va., when the tocsin of war sounded. He returned to his father's home in Surry co., N. C., and joined as lieutenant the first company that left the county. There being a demand for more soldiers he returned home, made up a company and was elected its captain. The company, it is said, consisted mostly of his cousins, uncles, etc.: there being not less than twenty-two of his relations belonging to his company. It was while he was acting as captain of his company that the battle of King's Mountain came off. Col. Cleveland being a corpulent man could not climb the mountain very well, consequently he requested Capt. Joel Lewis to lead his left wing in closing around the enemy.

In this battle Capt. Joel Lewis was twice wounded, once in the thumb and once in the leg. A short time before the war closed he returned home. raised a new regiment, was elected its lieutenant-colonel; on their march to join the army news came that Cornwallis had surrendered.

Of Col. Lothrop Lewis 44 b Feb. 13. 1764. Joseph Pierce Esq. in his history of Gorham says: "Probably no Gorham man ever stood higher in the estimation of his fellow-citizens than the Hon. Lothrop Lewis. His morals were pure, obliging and courteous in manner, prudent in words and action, and distinguished for sound common sense. His mind was not brilliant nor its operations rapid, but he was much engaged in surveying

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lands. He was often a referee in important and difficult cases. He held many civil and military offices and discharged their duties with fidelity. He was Colonel of a regiment of cavalry, Justice of the Peace, Deputy Sheriff, Selectman. Representative to the General Court, member of the board of war from 1812 to 1815, and land agent of the State of Maine. No evidence has been found showing that there was any other Joseph Lewis in the N. E. Colonies at that time. It seems clear that Joseph Lewis, the son of John Lewis of Malden, was he who married Mary Jones, and settled in Swansea, and lost his life at the outbreak of King Philip's War. It is interesting to note how Joseph Lewis and Mary Jones must have come to know each other. After the death of Mary Jones's maternal grandfather, John Bibble, her grandmother, Sibyll, married Miles Nutt of Malden and went there to live. Mary seems to have been a favorite with her grandmother and must have visited at Malden often. Later she named her only daughter Sibyll, for her grandmother. Miles Nutt died in July 1671 and in 1674 Sibvll Bibble-Nuttmarried forher third husband. John Doolittle of Malden and thus continued her residence there. Soon after Joseph Lewis's untimely death at Swansea in 1675, his widow removed to Malden with her children, Joseph and Sibyll, the former three years old and the latter a little more than a year old. January 11, 1676 7 Mary (Jones) Lawis the widow Mass, Sally Carroll, b. Dec. 14, 1799

of Joseph Lewis, married Obadiah Jenkins of Malden, and several children were born to them. After Mr. Doolittle's death Mary (Jones) Lewis-Jenkins, and her husband went to live with her grandmother and took care of her in her last years, and had the property by the will of her grandmother Doolittle, after paying the other heirs small legacies.

If Joseph Lewis was a son of John Lewis of Malden, it may seem strange that his widow and children were not mentioned in the distribution of the property of John Lewis, after the death of his second wife. There seems however, to have been very little property to divide and Joseph Lewis's widow and children had undoubtedly had their portion before she married Obadiah Jenkins in 1677.
