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

Addin's (486 v p 166 Vol. IV) youth was spent with his father upon the farm in that part of Southington that is now the eastern part of Wolcott. It is supposed that he pursued his preparatory studies under the direction of Rev. Israel B. Woodward, pastor of the Wolcott church. At the age of 19 he entered Yale College, and graduated with that rank in scholarship, in 1803, that he was recommended by President Dwight for a position in the University of Georgia as Tutor. He continued here, teaching in several departments; for about ten years. The influence he exerted and the name

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he secured, are exhibited in the fact that he was appointed Collector of the Port of Mobile without his solicita- 328.VI. Sarah Jane b Dec. 24, 1819 m tion. It was a most responsible and delicate position for any man, for at that time this section of the South was in a disturbed condition. Neither the size of the place nor the emoluments of the office could offer inducements for him to remove hither, but as a government office, it was at that time among the most important. It required a mind well-balanced, discriminating, and divided. These traits Mr. Lewis had, and withal, the intelligence and gentlemanly bearing becoming the place. Entering upon his duties, he found that the office would require the utmost patience and prudence. He started out with thorough system and adhered to it strictly. As the city grew his responsibilities increased, for as the chief government officer he was naturally consulted in all important questions. He was made Post Master, an office in those days of far more importance and influence than now. The people elected him Mayor, and he was also the President of a Bank.

(Jones) Lewis-Jenkins, the Doolittle- Margaret Lewis of Malden. Jenkins property was distributed to the heirs. Strange to say no part of the estate was given to Joseph Lewis. Jr., the son of Mrs. Jenkins by her first husband. Joseph Lewis of Swansea, and his name was not mentioned. His sister, Sibyll (Lewis) Howard had the same amount as her half sisters in the aggregate, though it appears she had received a part of it previously. Joseph Lewis, Jr., seems to have had his portion previously, and therefore he was not mentioned. After the death of Obadiah Jenkins, Jr. and his wife, as they left no children, their property was distributed between his brothers and sisters or their heirs.

The children of his half brother and his wife. Joseph and Hannah (Jones Lewis, Jr., and of Samuel and Sibyll (Lewis) Howard, fared the same as those of his own brothers and sisters. See Records of Probate Court East Cambridge, thus showing that Joseph Lewis, Jr., was heir to the Doolittle-Jenkins property though he was not mentioned in the first distribution. The omission of his name did not show he was not an heir: likewise the omission of the names of Joseph Lewis Senior's widow and children, from among those to whom the remnant of John Lewis' property vas distributed, in 1695, does not show that he was not a son of John.

George Lewis of Barnstable left a will in which he mentioned his children by name but there was no Joseph. John Lewis of Malden died in 1657 without making a will. There was no formal distribution of his property till 1695 or thirty-eight years after his death. Previously to that the heirs of his son, Joseph, seem to have receive their part of the property.

From a review of the facts. it appears that Joseph Lewis. of Swansea. must have been a son of John and
