Alfred Edwards, who m Sophia Matilda Lewis (551 v p 83 Vol. XIV) was educated at private schools in New York city; apprenticed at 16 to his uncle, Arthur Tappan, a dry goods merchant of New York; rose rapidly to partnership and finally the house of Alfred Edwards & Co. became recognized as the indisputable leader and ruler of the trade. He was the first to begin the uptown movement (from near Pearl and Hanover streets) and "rashly" went up as far as Park Row. He was also the first to venture to carry an exclusive stock of silk goods. He was enterprising, active and successful and his name is enrolled among the "Merchant Princes" of New York city. He was the first president of the Pacific Marine Insurance Co. and held the office until his retirement from business in 1867. He was extremely liberal and connected with many of the most deserving charities of the city. Many years ago he was associated with Harlan Page as a S. S. teacher and during the last twenty-five years delighted to spend a part of each Sabbath in explaining scriptural lessons to the inmates of the "Home for the Friendless." It is said that his love for children amounted almost to a passion.

He was a devout Presbyterian and a member of Dr. Hall's church. He was influential in introducing the English sparrow to exterminate the measuring worm pest, and bore a large part of the expense for bird houses, etc.

She was strong and robust. Often, while working in Newport, she walked from the South Ferry to Kingston railroad station, then from Westerly home. After the two terms at the high school she returned to her work in the factory, and began to lay up provision for old age. She worked as a weaver in factories in Westerly and at Ashaway, until by industry and economy she acquired what she considered a competence.

She was a great reader, but never cared for fiction, and was always greatly interested in questions of the day. For thirty years she took and read the New York Tribune and could discuss questions of state and finance with anyone, having a better understanding of such things than most men, but she was never an advocate of woman suffrage.

She never married, but lived her sturdy, upright life independent in all things, not disposed to quarrel with those who differed with her, still tenaciously holding to her own opinions—in all things a fearless woman. Her memory was wonderful and she delighted to relate dates of old days. In that way she was a storehouse of information. Now that she has gone a link that bound us to the past is broken, and many beside her relatives will be sad at the death of a good woman.

At the conclusion of the morning service he said that a feeling of illness had almost overcome him in the pulpit. When he reached home a messenger was dispatched for a physician who arrived just as Mr. Pullman fell dead on the stairs leading to his chamber.

Dr. Pullman was a brother of the late George M. Pullman, (1627 v p 19 Vol. V) the millionaire parlor car builder. He was 67 years of age and leaves a wife and a son.

Simeon D. Lewis (393) died suddenly at half past nine o'clock on Wednesday evening, May 20th, 1903, of angina pectoris. The news of Mr. Lewis's death was a great shock to this entire community as he had been driving and walking about the streets and was in his place of business during Wednesday, in apparently his usual health, which, however, had not been vigorous for several years.

In his death our town and county has sustained a heavy loss. In every walk of life, whether in the home, or in social, business or religious circles, he could always be relied upon, and counted on the side of uprightness, enterprise and progress. His wise counsels were often sought and much relied upon, and the record made by his well lived life will ever remain as a lasting memorial to his life work. His ac-

quaintance throughout the county was a very extensive one, and by all was he held in the highest esteem.

Eber Lewis (355 v p 9 Vol. XII) was among those who removed to Marlow, N. H., from Lyme, Conn., in 1767. He settled near what is known as "Marlow Hill," for many years the business part of the town. Here he built the first stone (rough stone) house ever built in town where he lived and died. He was a prominent man in town affairs; was one of the proprietors' committee in 1772, 1773, 1776 and 1777; was selectman 1771, 1772 and 1778.

The town furnished quite a number of men for the Continental Army. Eber and John Lewis were members of an Alarm Band organized to be ready to march at a moment's notice under Capt. Samuel Cunfield. They were called to answer the Lexington Alarm and afterwards being attached to Col. Bellow's regiment they marched to Vermont several times when the advances of the British made it necessary. Eber was Ensign of the 6th Co., 16th Regt., Col. Bellows, Mar. 15, 1776. There was also a Samuel Lewis, a John Lewis and an Eli Lewis in town.

Nov. 5th, 1861, Amos (1654) writes: "There are eight of our school district gone to the war. Wm. C. Benedict, son-in-law; Wm. A. Spaulding, stepson; this last leaves us all alone. Wm. C. in 5th regiment, Wm. A. in 13th

regiment. If a man wishes me to love him let him enlist and be a good soldier in a just cause. I have been acquainted in youth with old revolutioners and saw what an unbounded friendship they manifested for each other when they met and 'shouldered their crutches and showed how fields were won' I almost begrudge the soldiers of this war the satisfaction they will take in each other's company if they ever return in peace."

Jan. 16th, 1863, he says:—"The last news we had from Esther she was matriarch in the hospital in Springfield, Mo., her son Webster was Uncle Sam's printer at Helena, Ark."

In a letter dated "Lakeport, Mich., Dec. 25, 1865" he writes:—"Arrived at Eber's at 12 midnight and found them all enjoying comfort under the care of Morpheus but soon their slumbers were broken as yours were when I came at your house. Eber's daughter Josephine is convalescent with diphtheria. A little lock of hair from my scalp I will you spare." The writer was able to send a portion of the lock to his great grand-daughter, in Botson, thirty-seven years afterwards.

The University of Heidelberg did a previously unheard of thing last August. It conferred degrees upon two women, Mrs. Agnes Smith Lewis and Mrs. Margaret Dunlop Gibson, of Cambridge, England.

They discovered what is now known among scholars as the Lewis palimpsest. This is a Syriac version of the four Gospels, pronounced to be the oldest manuscript of the Gospels yet discovered.

Mrs. Lewis and Mrs. Gibson, who are twin sisters, made a caravan trip of nine days into the heart of the Arabian desert to find this manuscript (v p 98 Vol. IV). They discovered it in a Greek monastery, almost as old as the Christian era, built on the side of Mount Sinai, 80 miles from the nearest building, a strange old jumble of towers and dungeons fortified by the Roman Emperor Justinian in the fifth century, and known to have existed 300 years before that.

Mrs. Lewis and Mrs. Gibson came to America a few weeks ago to visit cousins in Canada and Virginia. They lectured on Oct. 13 at the University of Pennsylvania, and on Oct. 15 at the Jewish Theological Seminary in this city. The story of their explorations in the Far East reads like romance.

In their lectures Mrs. Gibson and Mrs. Lewis wear a little drapery of scarlet silk, which is a mystery to the uninitiated. It is the hood of St. Andrew's, Edinburgh, which gave them

both the degree of doctor of laws. Heidelberg gave them both the same degree, and the University of Halle-Wittenberg conferred a Ph. D. upon Mrs. Lewis. Only one woman before her received a like honor from this university.

They sail for England Oct. 24.
