The Buffalo Commercial Advertiser of Jan'y 17, 1840, announces the death in Houston, Texas of Col. A. S. Lewis formerly of N. Y., who came to the aid of Texas in the darkest hour of her peril and participated in most of the engagements during the war.

The Descendants of Ebenezer (8) Lewis.

In this, the third, chapter of the
series (v p 161 Vol. XV) is given by
request the record of Barnabas. 1st
(129) although it is far from complete.
His name appears on the land records
of Wallingford, Conn., on Apr. 17,
1722, when John Hall gives a joint
deed to Caleb Lewis (126) Barnabas
Lewis (129) Abraham Doolittle, Jr.,
(husband of Mary (2098 v p 8 Vol.
XVI Lewis) and Samuel Cook, (hus-
band of Hannah (130) Lewis.) Nov.
12, 1722, Abraham Doolittle, Caleb
Lewis (126) and Barnabas Lewis
(129) deed land to Samuel Whittlesey.
The following deed connects him with
the family (v also his ch. below).

Feb. 27, 1722-3 a deed to Samuel Whittlesey of "land at a place commonly called shingle hill which I had and obtained of my brother Benjamin Lewis (181) as well as 8 acres assigned him for his portion of what his interest in what came by Samuel Andrews as his right and reversion in his mother's third, all of which he hath conveyed to me by an instrument under his hand and seal bearing date of Nov. 20, 1722," which reads, "all my right in a parcel of land at muddy river in ye bounds of Wallingford which contains 18 acres and all my right at Shingle Hill which contains eight acres more or less and all my right in ye house yt was my honored father Ebenezer Lewis (8) late of Wallingford dec'd... I say all my right at muddy river as above sd. and all my right in land at Shingel Hill as in above sd. and all my right in sd. house lot and all ye appurtenances thereunto belonging that I ever had ever ought to have in sd. land at muddy river or shingel hill which did accrue to me by right of my father above sd." etc.

Barnabas (129) d Oct. 1, 1729, and New Haven, Ct., Probate records Nov. 3, 1729, give inv. of estate of Barnabas Lewis £129-09-5, m'de Oct. 24, 1729, and adm. "in ye estate of Barnabas Lewis late of Wallingford dec'd was granted to Elizabeth, widow," etc. Possibly she was Elizabeth Lent and was from vicinity of Waterbury, Ct. On Wallingford records are births of 2 ch. but New Haven Probate rec. show there were more.

Mar. 8, 1735-6 "Upon certification of Lent Lewis minor son of Barnabas Lewis of Wallingford dec'd made choice of Caleb Lewis as his guardian."

Jan'y 26, 1736-7, "Caleb Lewis is by this Court appointed Guardian to Lowly and Lois Lewis minor daus."

Mar. 7, 1736-7. "Choice of Lucy Lewis minor dau. of Barnabas, of Joseph Royse of Wallingford as guardian."

Apr. 20, 1741. "Lowly Lewis minor dau. . . . made choice of Joseph Royse as guardian." His ch. seem to be 3009. I. Lowly. On Mar. 30, 1749, Loly Lewis for £70 deeds (Wallingford rec.) to Asahel Hall her right in undivided farm of father Barnabas Lewis in Wallingford on the left side of Muddy river.

3010 II. Lent, deeded (Wallingford rec.) Mar. 21, 1742-3 for £130-19s-6d to Asahel Hall 9½ acres in Wallingford east of Muddy river; and on Apr. 7, 1750, for £70 the same (v below) land again, he being then "of Waterbury." The late E. B. Hart of Meriden, Conn., had among old family deeds and papers a contract, dated Sept. 2, 1743, for building a house under forfeit of £120 payable to Capt. Wm. Judd, which read "We Lent Lewis of Waterbury in New Haven County and Benjamin Heart of Wallingford" . . . and signed by Benjamin Hart and Lent Lewis.

Henry Lewis (20 v p 45 Vol. VII) one of the older residents of the town and one with a wide acquaintance, died very suddenly on Saturday afternoon, Mar. 10, 1906, at the house of his cousin, John Vernon Campbell, in Erie, Pa.

Henry, the son of Jesse and Sarah Laughery Lewis, was born December 9, 1832, in Meadville. The family moved to Edinboro in the spring of 1833, locating a half mile below town where Mr. Lewis conducted a carding mill, raised a family of four sons and four daughters and spent sixty-two

years of his life. Henry was the second child and the oldest son. He attended the country schools, under such teachers as Alexander Hamilton, Isaac R. Taylor and Mary Kingsley, and then learned the trade of carpenter and joiner working with his uncle, N. C. Austin, the husband of his father's sister, and with his uncle, William Lewis, in his planing mill. Mr. Lewis was twice married. January 3, 1856, he married Frances Fry, the only daughter of Deacon Isaac Fry, and they began family life on Erie street in the house now occupied by Mrs. W. P. Butterfield. Three years later they moved into the house on the fair grounds, now the property of the Dr. Hawkins estate. There Mrs. Lewis died after five years of wedded life, leaving a little four year old daughter, Mary Frances, who in turn married and died herself, leaving a young daughter, now the only descendant of the deceased.

Five years later Mr. Lewis married Miss Catharine Shreve, a prominent teacher of Venango county, and for nearly forty years they have occupied their pleasant home here, so well known for its neatness and beauty, inside and outside. No children blessed their union, but a number of little girls were taken successively into their home and raised to young womanhood, trained for usefulness and happiness.
