GENEALOGICAL RECORDS.**Explanations, Abbreviations, Etc.**

For convenience the records of the various Lewis families are divided into Books and each Book into chapters. At the head of each Book appears the name of the earliest known ancestor of that family. The list of Books is a complete index to the Books as published to this time. New Books will be added from time to time as new branches of the Lewis family are found. As soon as Books are proved parts of others they will be merged into the Books to which they belong. Each name is numbered when first printed and whenever the name is repeated this number follows in brackets. The abbreviations common in genealogical work are used.

Katharine Sterling Lewis of Wichita, Kans., delivered the congratulatory address, Sept 30, 1901, at the unveiling of the monument of Lt. Pike at Pawnee Village.

She was born in the city of Bridgeport, Conn., and was educated at the High School and the Ward Ladies' Seminary. In 1872 she m. Dr. G. F. Lewis (3154 above) a graduate of Yale Univ. and Med. Coll., New Haven. After many years of successful practice in Bridgeport and New York, a less vigorous climate was sought, and, in 1891, Dr. and Mrs. Lewis removed to Wichita, Kans. There was then no organization of the D. A. R. in the state and Mrs. Lewis worked zealously to organize the Eunice Sterling chapter, which was named for one of her distinguished ancestors. For five years she was elected chapter regent, until called to the state regency. Mrs. Lewis traces descent through a long line of worthy forbears—revolutionary officers, Indian fighters and colonial workers—back to Charlemagne.

JOHN LEWIS, Westerly, R. I.

From the Westerly, R. I., Sun.

Christopher Clarke Lewis (1088) died at his home in Ashway, R. I., Sunday, Sept. 3, aged 90 years, 5 months and 9 days. Mr. Lewis was the oldest son of Christopher Clarke Lewis and Wealthy Kenyon, and the last to enter the realm of shadows. His father was a well known man in his day, having been town clerk of

Hopkinton forty-one years and a deacon of the First Seventh-day Baptist Church for many years. The children of Christopher and Wealthy were Hannah, who died young, Christopher C., now gone, Alfred, Nathan K., a noted teacher in Hopkinton for many years, Daniel, a physician of good repute, Welcome and Edwin R., who was well known in Westerly often called the "beloved physician."

Now the family have all gone. The family descended from John Lewis, who was the first of the name to settle in Westerly, where he died, being buried in the little burying ground on the side hill, near the foot of the hill, and to the left on Beach street. John had seven sons. Daniel was the first settler of the name in what is now the town of Hopkinton, living near where the Seventh-day Church now stands. His son John succeeded to the place. His son Daniel went into the Tomaquag Valley and was the father of Christopher, the town clerk, and grandfather to him just dead.

This Christopher m. Emeline Wells at Ashaway, where he built the house in which the deceased Mrs. Lewis departed this life some years ago. They left one son, William M., who resides in his father's home and cared for him during his last illness which has been long and tedious, being senile gangrene of the foot.

Mr. Lewis was a good neighbor, an uprightman and a quiet, well-behaved citizen. Never anxious to hold office he has served his town as a member of the council for several years, but cared little for such positions, preferring the quiet of his home to scenes of strife and discussion. He was for many years a consistent member of the Seventh-day Baptist Church. The interment was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Chapter DIV.

An Rhode Island Clipping.

Mrs. Rebecca Cross Lewis, widow of Allen Lewis (2111 v p 54 Vol. VI) one of the oldest residents of the annexed section, died at her home in Olneyville, R. I., Friday, Aug. 25, 1905, after an illness of but a short time. Mrs. Lewis was of an old Rhode Island family and for many years lived in that part of Johnston now known as the annexed section. She was a direct descendant of Capt. Wells, who commanded Rhode Island soldiers during the Revolutionary War. She was a daughter of John and Rebecca Wells of Hopkinton and was born in that town Feb. 26, 1819. Miss Susan C. Lewis, for many years a clerk at the local post-office; Miss Emeline L. Lewis and Mrs. Albert B. Ralph, a daughter by a former husband, survive her. Mrs. Lewis was of a jovial disposition and her companionship was enjoyed by the young folks as well as the elderly people. She was known as a home woman, caring more for her family circle than outside entertainment or lodges, and she had the respect of all who knew her. The burial was at Anthony, R. I.

In a plea in the Chicago Record-Herald for the Cook County Hospital, Denlow Lewis, M. D. (v p 24 Vol. XIII) writes "for many years past I have insisted that there is in our midst no worthier object for the consideration of the philanthropist.

I have known of the workings of the county hospital for more than twenty years. The wardens, without exception, from ex-Congressman Mills to the present incumbent have been earnest in their efforts for the welfare of the patients. The members of the attending staff have given the people of this county the benefit of extended experience and well-recognized skill without thought of a fee. The general management of the hospital, as far as the care of patients is concerned, is now and always has been most excellent.

My connection with the institution for sixteen years as obstetrician, gynecologist, surgeon and as secretary and president of the attending staff permits me to speak advisedly. In my final presidential report, I recorded my recognition of the good work for humanity that is done by the hospital and I emphasized the desirability of financial assistance in the form of bequests and endowments, so that the work might become more effective. I took occasion in that report to call upon our men of wealth to remember the county hospital when seeking means of philanthropic expression."

203. Taken from Baltimore Sun. I am very much interested in the Lewis history. In a commentary on the Bible, the title-page of which is gone, but which is supposed to have been published in 1640 in London, England, is found on the margin of leaves the following on page 42:—"Alexander Lewis, his book, 1756, May 5. I left Pennsylvania province, near Codler county, Delaware, Delaware river, in America, north of Baltimore, held by Lord Baltimore." On page 88: "Josiah Lewis, his name." On page 102: "Rev Mr. Hulliford, minister of the Gospel," and something else which cannot be made out. On page 110: "Alexr Lewis; his book *Equus Liber anno Domini, 1752*, New Providence, in Virginia, Augusta county, North America. Given at my study chamber in Narington, England." On page 132: "Jonathan Lewis; his hand and pen. God save the King!" On page 388:—"Byron Warden was born May 19, 1787. John Rippon Warden was born September 19, 1801." On page 399: "John Tolbert, 1804." On page 438: "Alexr Lewis; his hand

and pen. God save the King!" On page 237: "Philip Warden; his book."

On page 328: "David Lowry." On page 346: "Alexr Lewis; his book; "Benjamin Lewis, Margaret Ross." On page 393: "Alexr Lewis; his book."

Can anyone place these Lewis or any of the other persons named? I have a great deal of data of the Lewis family, but it is so contradictory I feel I cannot depend on it. It has been said anyone can print almost anything one pleases about the name of Lewis, provided it be complimentary. I have data of the family as far back as the 10th century. I read with a great deal of interest all I see about the name, I am descended from one Margaret Lewis, who married Stephen Lowry during the Revolution. I have understood she was from Augusta county, Virginia. Can anyone give me the names of the parents of Margaret Lewis Lowry? After her marriage she came to Kentucky and raised a large family of children. They have carried the name of Margaret Lewis Lowry down to the present day.

Descendant.

"I find in the letter from Kentucky a trace of a family that came to St. George's parish, afterward Burke and Jefferson counties, Georgia, from Delaware. There were in upper St. George's parish about 1774.

Jacob, John, Abraham, Benjamin, Evan, Thomas, Rev. Josiah. This Rev. Josiah Lewis, was a Presbyterian missionary sent out by the Philadelphia Presbytery about 1768. He became afterward a Baptist and was a chaplain in the Revolutionary army. Benjamin Lewis, whose name occurs in the old book, was also one of the immigrants. In the same county at the same time there were Simon, Wm., Mathew and Solomon Lowry."
