205. Was there a Lewis among the early settlers of Delaware?

205. (answer.) In Scharf's Hist. of Delaware it is stated that in the latter part of the 17th century the coast was much harassed by the French privateers who threatened to lay waste such towns as refused to pay them tribute. Fears were early entertained that Lewes, (Del.) would be signaled out for an attack, and on the 15th of July, 1695, the Court at Lewes ordered that "two men shall be Hired to Watch upon the Cape every day from five in the morning until seven 'att night." Subsequently it was deemed best that this watch should be distributed among the citizens of the town and the vicinity, and the Court decreed that "Watch bee appointed to be kept at Cape Inlopen to begin Monday, June 7, 1697, and to continue until the season was ended....by two at a time successively as they are hereafter named, at the rate of 3c a day, per man," The 9th out of the 15 sets was Thomas Lay and Peter Lewis.

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Some Old Land Grants.

From The State, Columbia, S. C.

Several exceedingly interesting old land grants have been found in Rock Hill, S. C. One of them grants to William Lewis 88 acres on Rocky Creek in consideration of two pounds sterling. It is dated February 5th, 1787, and is signed by Gov. and Commander-in-chief William Moultrie. Another is a document about 17 by 27 inches in size and beautifully written. It is dated January 29th, 1777, and conveys certain lands from John Buros to William Lewis. This land is described as being on Rocky Creek in Craven county.

Chapter CCLXXXII.

Having gained the confidence of his cousin, Eber B. Ward, the millionaire steamboat owner, of Detroit, Gleason (1944 v last issue) was sent to Cleveland as agent of the Ward boat lines. All old residents of that city admit that the history of Cleveland could not be written without recording many of Lewis's achievements. He was for years the intimate friend of Hon. Ben. F. Wade, U. S. Senator from Ohio, and of his law partner, Hon. Joshua R. Giddings. It was a hobby of Wade's to secure legislation for the promotion of Agricultural Colleges in the various states and it was Gleason F. Lewis who advised him to propose a bill donating public lands and the issuance of land scrip for that purpose. This bill was put forward by Wade, and championed by Giddings, Samuel C. Pomeroy, Geo. W. Julian, and others. It was fought by Harlan, Long and

others from the new western states, but finally passed and received the signature of the President on July 2, 1862. (For full copy see p 2187 Congressional Globe for May 19, 1862). During the discussion prior to the passage of the bill, Lewis was summoned to Washington by its champions, for a conference, which resulted in a successful coup planned by Lewis and carried out by Wade and his followers, through which the proposed amendment was so re-worded as to make the land scrip receivable the "same as military land warrants" to which the opposition consented, unwittingly nullifying the effect of their own amendment. The passage of this bill threw eight millions of acres of land and eight millions dollars of scrip onto the market. Gleason bought as an opening investment, \$300,000 of Kentucky scrip for \$40,000, made an enormous profit and subsequently handled all the issues of the Southern States, Maine and Vermont, and three-fourths of that of New York state and Pennsylvania. In handling the 990,000 acres of New York state scrip Gleason became a personal friend of Ezra Cornell, founder of Cornell University, whom he greatly assisted to realize on scrip held by Cornell. Their friendship was life long. In an article regarding Cornell University in Scribner's Monthly Vol. VI, p 203, it is stated that 400,000 acres were sold as scrip at one dollar per acre the remaining 540,000 being carefully located, chiefly in Wisconsin and afterward sold at a handsome profit. It was in connection with the advertising of this land scrip that Horace Greeley wrote the famous words: "Go west young man, go west." Much of the inside history of this deal is also recorded in Greeley's "Recollections of a Busy Life."

Lewis was largely instrumental in building the Duck River Valley R. R. and served as president of the Co. two years prior to its lease to the N., O. & St. L. R. R. ceeded wherein most men would have failed. He is now (1886) attorney for the Nashville and Chattanooga R. R. in Maury, Marshall and Lincoln counties. His ability as a lawyer is too well known to need comment and he is a public spirited citizen of the county, having done much for the schools, churches and all other benevolent organizations of the county and state. The firm name Lewis Bros. was dissolved in 1885 and Capt. Thomas F. Lewis (994), his brother, the junior member of the firm is now a member of the bar at Jackson, Tenn.

Castner Hanaway and Elijah Lewis (31) hearing that warrants were issued against them, came to Christiana and voluntarily gave themselves up, calm and strong in the confidence of their innocence. They, together with the arrested colored men, were sent to Lancaster jail that night. . . . Castner Hanaway was first to be tried; over him, therefore, the great contest was to be made. For the defense of this particular case the abolitionists selected J. M. Read, Thaddeus Stevens, Joseph S. Lewis and Theodore Cuyler, Esq.

How it was cooked and relished the present writer does not recollect any tradition thereof; this took place about 1735. The Holly tree spoken of was found about one mile in a northeasterly course from where it stands on ground Gen. Washington's picket guard occupied during the winter of 1777-8.
