In September, 1890, David J. Lewis, Jr., (9.CXXVIII v last issue) was in the employ of the Porter Boiler Manufacturing Co. at South Chicago, as Superintendent. One year later he perfected the motor of the Standard Fireless Engine Co. located at the Chicago World's Fair grounds, which is operated by anhydrous ammonia. He then became Engineer for Stern's Manufacturing Co. of Erie, Penn., and gave particular attention to their Western business, with headquarters at Chicago. After leaving Chicago in 1893, he became Superintendent of Motor Power of the Merrimack Manufacturing Co. of Lowell, Mass.

In 1897 Mr. Lewis was engaged by

the A. A. Griffing Iron Co., taking charge of the engineering of their Boston branch. He was transferred to their New York establishment in 1898, and in 1900 was made Consulting Engineer in the Dept. of Steam Specialties, having under his charge all engineering problems connected with their extensive business. Mr. Lewis developed the Bundy trap. His specialty is the saving of water-condensation, and the application of exhaust steam for manufacturing purposes. He is the inventor of the Vacuum Oil Separating Device for condensing engines. He is now connected with the A. A. Griffing Iron Co. and is reaping due reward for his remarkable service.

Chapter DXX.

From the Autobiographical Memoir of
Hon. Seth Lewis.

(Continued from last issue).

In the meantime my brother, Daniel, had been engaged in business in which he had succeeded so as to enable him to purchase three slaves and was going on in a profitable occupation in partnership with a gentleman living in New Orleans when (I think it was in the latter part of February of that year) there came down the Mississippi a body of armed men, under the command of a Captain William, who professed to take possession of the country in the name of the U. S. . . . My brother, Asahel, in the warmth of his zeal for his country's cause, had joined this party when they first came down and was among those who remained at Maushac. Not many days after their commander had left them they were attacked by an armed force of British refugees, who came up from the river Amite and from the lakes, dispersed the whole party, took a number of prisoners of war, and carried them to Pensacola. Among these was my

brother Asahel.

Amidst this scene of confusion my brother, Daniel, deemed it prudent to take shelter for the time under the Spanish government, and for that purpose, having obtained permission from the Spanish commandant, he removed the family down to Plaquemine, where we were to remain until the storm should blow over. A few days after this, having occasion to go to New Orleans to settle some business with his partner, he set out for that place, but on his way down the small boat he was in was suddenly struck by a squall and upset. One white man sunk immediately and was seen no more. Another white man with a negro belonging to my brother saved themselves by holding onto the boat, while my brother, who was an excellent swimmer, undertook to swim ashore, but before he could reach the land his strength failed; he sank to rise no more! And here again the family, consisting of my brother's widow and three small ch., with my four sisters and myself, were left in a forlorn condition without a protector or guide. Not many days after this the Mississippi overflowed its banks and compelled us to leave the place where we were. From there we removed to Baton Rouge, where a gentleman named Holly, an old sea captain, who owned a plantation there, kindly gave us a comfortable house to live in. And here begins one of the trying scenes of my life.

Rogers came into the Port of Baltimore with a Prize Schooner called the Hannah, which together with the Cargo were there Sold under the direction of Mr. Lewis, and the neat Proceeds lodged in his hands for the use of the State and Captors in Continental Money,

That Capt. Rogers fitted his Vessel

for an other Cruise and that the Moiety due the Captors remained in Mr. Lewis's hands waiting for their return to Baltimore, the other Moiety due the State he also retained Subject to the order of Convention, who directed him therewith to purchase Salt for the use of the State, which he endeavoured to do but found it Impracticable, and not receiving any further directions from the Convention how to dispose of the money he Vested fourteen thousand dollars of the money in his hands into Pennsylvania Loan Office Certificates and the remaining sum of three thousand three hundred and thirty-two dolls and $\frac{3}{8}$ in Continental money Issued in the year 1776 (the proceeds of the prize) remains still in his hands, all which he is ready to pay into the State Treasury.

In pursuance therefore of the power vested in us by the 10th Clause of an Act Authorising the Auditor to Audit Certain Accounts and Claims and for other Purposes therein mentioned, passed the 22d April 1785
