From Westminster Abbey Registers.

Jan. 15, 1754, Erasmus Lewis, Esq., of Abercothy in Carmarthenshire, in the East Cloister. He d Jan. 10, 1754, ae. 83. The journals of the period say that he was secretary to the Earl of Oxford, when he was secretary of state to Queen Anne. His will, as of Abercothy, co. Carmarthen, dated in "Cork street, London," Feb. 28, 1742-3, was proved Jan. 17, 1754, by Elizabeth Lewis, spinster, whom he called his cousin, then living with him, and to whom he bequeathed £200 per annum for life. His bequests to his relatives were: brother George and his 6 sons and 3 daus. each £500 and to George one of the sons £1,000 more; brother Bernard £200; sister Griffies £200, her only dau. £500, her son John Griffies his estate in Lan y Pien-sant and to his cousin Anne Lewis, who lived with her, £200; cousin Juliana Sowersby £20 per annum for life; kinswoman Mary Lewis, then widow of John Bartlett and living at Tenby, £100. His estate in various Welsh parishes he left to trustees for the use of James Morgan of Lincoln's Inn, Esq., for life. Among his bequests one £100 to Mr. Pope.

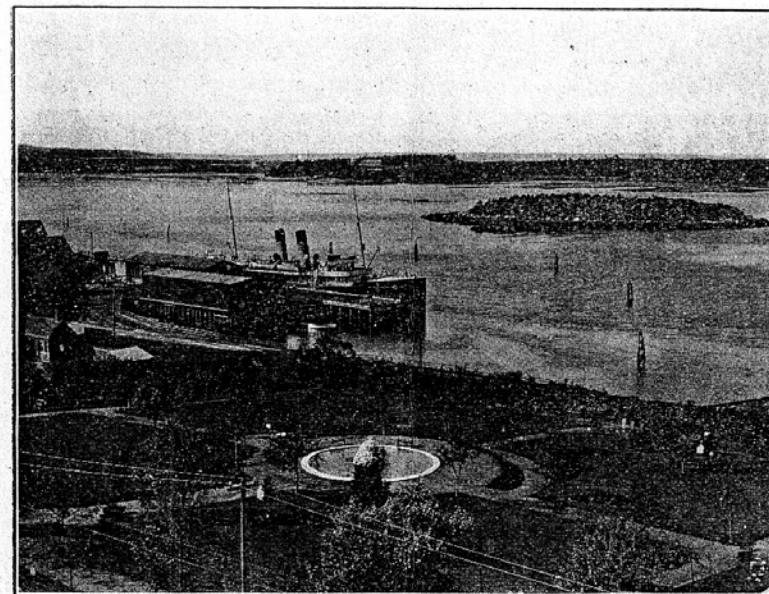

Edwin A. S. Lewis (147 v p 9 Vol. XI) a well known Hoboken lawyer and a member of the Stevens family of Castle Point, died Sept. 5, 1906, after a long illness at Bethlehem, N. H., at the age of 36. He was a son of the late Col. E. P. C. Lewis, United States Minister and Consul-General at Portugal during the first administration of President Cleveland. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Alice Stuart Walker of Morristown, and two sons 6 and 3 years old. The interment was at Princeton, N. J.

Gen. Joseph H. Lewis (42 v last issue) with Col. Cofer, formed the Sixth Kentucky Infantry, of which he was chosen Colonel to rank from November 1, 1861.

Gen. Lewis first led his regiment into battle at Shiloh, where it was engaged throughout the two days of that memorable conflict. His daring leadership won for him at once the admiration of his men, and, though two horses were shot under him and he was ever in the thickest of the fight, he escaped unwounded. He assisted in covering the Confederate retreat and on foot with his men and fighting throughout the march retired to Corinth. At Corinth his health began to decline, but he remained with his command until Vicksburg was reached, where he was compelled to go to the hospital. He was ill at the Baton Rouge engagement, that being the only battle in which he did not lead his men. At Stone River Gen. Lewis distinguished himself again and after Chickamagua he was made a Brigadier General and given command of the

famous Orphan brigade. With his brigade he was in the biggest and bloodiest battles of the war and his name is inseparably connected with many of the greatest events of the great struggle. He was struck but once during the entire war, a piece of shrapnel shot striking him in the left breast at Jonesboro, in one of the closing engagements of the war. The shot made but a small bruise.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis lived near Andersonville until 1864, when they moved to a farm three miles west of Alpine, where they lived 17 years. In 1883, Mrs. Lewis came to Connersville, where she continued to reside until her death.
