Dr. Timothy Huggins Bishop (3050 v p 49 Vol. XVII) who d Dec. 25, 1906, entered Yale with the class of 1859 and after his graduation from

the Yale Medical School went abroad to continue medical studies in Edinburgh and in Paris. He returned to Clayton Lewis, Frank Lewis, Augusta this country at the outbreak of the

Civil War and took the position of assistant surgeon, being stationed at Alexandria, Va., until the close of the war. He afterward joined the staff of the New Haven Hospital then called the Knight General Hospital and he assisted in the care of the sick and wounded soldiers until the disbanding of the hospital corps of surgeons.

Dr. Bishop was a member of the Quinnipiac, Country and New Haven Lawn Clubs of the New Haven Colony Historical Society, the Society of Colonial Wars, Society of the Cincinati, and the American Archaeological Society. EDMUND LEWIS, Lynn, Mass. Chapter CLXXXI.

Read May 9, 1888 at the annual meeting of the Providence Marine Corp of Artillery by Adjutant Geo. B. Peck.

Dexter B. Lewis (83. LX v p 25 Vol. VII) second child of Benjamin and Mary Sprague Lewis, was born in this city Sept. 20, 1820. He received such education as the public schools of that day afforded, which was supplemented by a more or less protracted course in a private school kept by Oliver Angell (long a terror to the North End boys)

of North Main and Mill streets, after he had relinquished the charge of the public school near the corner of Benefit street. While here young Lewis had for playmates Colonels Edwin Metcalf and Willard Sayles, who have since won enviable reputations at the bar, and the late Rev. Joseph R. Manton, well known on both banks of the Mississippi from Minnehaha to Vicksburg as an active, devoted and popular preacher. Later and when vet a vouth he was employed as a night clerk in the post-office, devoting such hours of the day as were not required for sleep to the care of Cleveland Brothers' books, as well as of another set whose owners are not remembered. Subsequently he was employed for similar duty by Abbott & Bliss, calico printers. Waile here he so improved his opportunities for picking up practical information that we next find him, with the late Benjamin Cozzens, running a cotton mill in East Greenwich. For some years he was associated with the late Robert S. Barrough, under the title of Burrough & Lewis, in the oil and cotton business, but for many years with Colonel J. Lippitt Snow, as Snow & Lewis, in the handling of dyestuffs and chemicals on Exchange place. He died suddenly of heart disease, July 17, 1887, ac. 66 y 9 m 27 d.

Mr. Lewis was eminently mercantile in his tastes and hence was not entirely at home save in his office and with gentlemen devoted to commercial pursuits. Columbus, Jany 17, 1907.-John B. Lewis was today pardoned from the State Penitentiary, where he has been confined since 1892, on a life sentence for murder, committed in Hamilton county.

Lewis says':--'I am a descendant of an old family and none of my family besides myself has ever been in prison.

"My gt. gr. father's name was John D. Lewis. He had five sons, Fielding, William, David, Stephen and John D., All were born in Culpepper co., Va., and grew up with the Washingtons. Fielding, the eldest son, m Elizabeth (Betty) Washington. the sister of George Washington.

"In 1784 Washington, with Lawrence Lewis, his nephew, eldest son of Fielding Lewis, and three of the latter's brothers, David, William and Stephen, with several others started on an expedition to Ohio. They struck the Ohio River at Fort Duquesne and went down the Ohio to the Muskingum. Washington and his nephew. Lawrence Lewis, returned to Virginia, while several of the party continued to descend the river. Among these was my gr. father, Stephen Lewis, and two of his brothers. William and David. Coming to Kentucky, my gr. father, his brother David and other members of the party stopped in what is now called Lewis county, taking its name from my grandfather's. After remaining a few months in Kentucky David Lewis, with a force of men, went to Southeastern Ohio to help fight the Indians, who were committing depredations against the white settlers. Here David settled in what is now, I believe, Warren county.

"My gr. father, Stephen Lewis, m

David, William, Stephen and John. All were bern in Lewis county and all are dead. My Uncle Fielding lived to be eighty-four years old. My father, Stephen, was killed by a locomotive explosion in 1873.

"I have now living three brothers, Stephen S., C. P. and Robert Lewis. the latter my twin. All served with Kentucky regiments in the Civil War-I was born March 7, 1850, and was not old enough to enlist. After the death of my father I remained at the old homestead with my mother until she died in 1880. I was married at the age of thirty-nine years in Cincinnati. We moved to Oklahoma and after six years returned to Cincinnati. We had two ch.

"And here I am, just freed from a felon's cell, the sting of disgrace in the hearts of my loved ones. But, though I was a convict. I am not a criminal. The act for which I was sentenced was not of my own volition, not caused from malice, but from a drunk-crazed brain."

In 1892 James A. Lewis and Frank F. Lewis were living on a little farm in Indiana. There was a large family (9ch.) and the parents were poor. It was a constant straggle to provide food and clothing for all. There was no money for education. The two boys went in rags, wearing no shoes until the first snow fell, but they whistled as they worked and were happy.

To-day the Rev. James A. Lewis is well known on the lecture platform, and is at present making a tour of the Central States in the interests of the Mallalieu Seminary at Kinsey. Ala., the youngest field secretary engaged in such work in the United States. He is 33 years old.

The Rev. Frank F. Lewis is pastor of one of the largest churches at Somerville, Mass. Both young men were graduated from De Pauw Univ. The Rev. Frank F. Lewis, the younger brother, now 29 years old, in addition to his work at De Pauw, has been granted a diploma from the Boston Theol. Seminary and has won scholarship to Harvard. During his pastorate of the coming year he will attend Harvard and will receive his degree next year. After a year at Boston as assistant pastor of the Old South Church he took a trip to Europe. He visited

nine countries, including England Norway, Italy, Turkey, Greece and Asia Minor, and his expenses on the trip were just \$150.

Receiving an invitation from John Lewis, my classmate in the University of the City of New York, and in Union Theological Seminary, to attend his ordination at Fairplay, Wisconsin Territory, I (Rev. William Salter) crossed the Mississippi at Bellevue the last day of April (1844) and was two hours in getting over, the river being higher, it was said than since 1828 and the islands and lowlands on the Illinois shore under water In his examination by the Mineral Point Convention Mr. Lewis stated that when a clerk in abookstore in Boston he attended Lyman Beecher's church and that on several successive mornings when sweeping out the store, Beecher came there and gave him wise and helpful counsel. Mr. Kent preached the sermon, and I gave the right hand of fellowship. obtaining his education Mr. Lewis had been aided by Christopher R. Robert, the founder afterwards of Robert College, Constantinople,
