The opponent for the first tournament game was North English. In a dull, run-away game, with the Iowa City High seconds playing three quarters, Iowa City defeated North English.

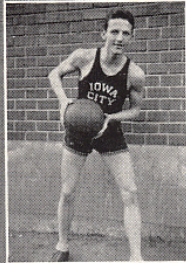
