
## CLINTON BROWN



#### IOWA CITY 27, NORTH ENGLISH 13


The opponent for the first tournament game was North English. In a dull, runaway game, with the Iowa City High seconds playing three quarters, Iowa City defeated North English.

#### CROSS COUNTRY


U. High with its fleet captain in the first run of the season, outraced the Iowa City High tracksters 15-6.


