MARY & JOHN - 1630

For over one hundred years genealogists have speculated on who was aboard the ship, "Mary & John" in 1630, the first ship to sail in the famous Winthrop Fleet of that year. No passenger list has ever been found, and probably never will be. Rev. John White, of Dorchester, Dorset, England, who formed this group, wrote that these people were not acquainted with each other and implied they were going to America for only economic and business reasons. Since many of these people came from the same towns, were often well acquainted, and even related with each other, this was apparently said to hide from the Church of England clergy, the fact they were Puritans and were emigrating primarily for religious reasons.

Two "synthetic" lists have been previously published, one by Charles E. Banks, in his book, "Planters of the Commonwealth"-1930, and another by Maude Pinney Kuhns, in her book, ("Mary & John"-1943). It is known that there were 140 passengers aboard. Banks lists 138 and Kuhns lists 136, but between them they list 195 different passengers. In 108 cases they differ on given persons being aboard.

The attached lists are also "synthetic", but after studying many sources for the past five years, this writer believes he has sorted out some of the mysteries of these people. Some of the alleged passengers came after 1630, some were born after that year and some never came at all. It appears that Banks & Kuhns, between them, did identify most of the correct passengers, but they also included many who could not have been aboard.

The writer used the following criteria for deciding the possiblity or improbabilty of each person being aboard:

- 1. Did they come from Dorset, Somerset or Devon, England, where most of the passengers supposedly originated?
- 2. Were they listed by Banks or Kuhns?
- 3. Were they listed by other sources?
- 4. Were they listed in Roger Clapp's memiors, although he listed some later arrivals too?
- 5. Were they definitely in Dorchester, Mass. in 1630?
- 6. Is there any evidence they were still in England after March, 1630?
- 7. Is there evidence they remained in England, and never came to America?
- 8. Were they born after 1630?
- 9.Did they move to Windsor, Conn. with the majority of the passengers in 1635-6?
- 10. Family tradition.

Following are the principal sources used in searching for "Mary & John" passengers.

- SAVAGE- Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England, by James Savage.
- BANKS- The Planters of the Commonwealth, 1620-1640, by Charles E. Banks, 1930.
- KUHNS- The "Mary & John", A Story of the Founding of Dorchester, Mass., 1630, by Maude Pinney Kuhns, 1943.
- COLKERT- Founders of Early American Families, Emigrants From Europe, 1607-1657, by Meredith B. Colkert Jr., 1975.

In the attached list of possible passengers, taken from Banks & Kuhns, there are 195 names. The 67 names with astericks (*) are considered at least doubtfull, and often, disproven passengers. The remaining 128 people are considered proven, or at least, possible passengers. In addition, there are 11 possible passengers who were not listed by Banks or Kuhns, namely, Joan Denslow, Walter Fyler and his wife, William Hulbert, Thomas Lombard, his wife and four children and Thomas Tolman. This brings the total to 139, and there were, allegedy, 140 people aboard.

Presently, I am preparing a book for publication, listing the first five generations of descendants of these people. The rough manuscript now totals about 700 typed pages and about 20,000 descendants into the mid-1700's. This has been a monumental task and has already taken about five years of searching. Until I complete this book I unfortunately do not have the time to respond, personally, to requests for searches, however, I would appreciate hearing from anyone who has positively identified the English birth places of those not recorded in the attched lists. I would also like to hear about any other possible passengers, where there is some positive supporting evidence.

In 1979, an estimate was made that there were between 145 & 153 million living descendants of the passengers of the "Mayflower" of 1620. This estimate was made, using many assumptions, that could well be in error, because these numbers appear to be excessive. However, due to the high mortality rate of the "Mayflower" passengers, and to the very high birth rate of the "Mary & John" passengers, I believe there are more Americans (and British) who are descended from the latter passengers than from the "Mayflower". For this reason, I believe it is important that this piece of history be compiled for present and future generations to study and appreciate.





The building in Plymouth, Devon, England, in which the people of Devon, Dorset & Somerset first met to form the company that sailed on the "Mary & John" in March 1630 was called the New Hospital. It was an Almshouse, unoccupied and not quite finished. It was here the 140 men, women and children gathered, under the leadership of their chosen leaders, Rev. John Maverick & Rev. John Warham, to spend a day of fasting, preaching and praying. Soon after they boarded the "Mary & John" and set sail on their historic voyage to America. Two months later this building was formally occupied by the town authorities of Plymouth and it was known for a century and a guarter (1755) as "The Hospital Of Poor's Portion". The sketch was made from a photograph taken by Mr. R.M. Worth for his "History of Plymouth". The building was demolished in 1859. Over the main doorway of the building at motto was chiseled, "By Gods Helpe Through Christ". Here Rev. John White, the Patriarch of Dorchester, Dorset, preached to the group in the morning and in the afternoon they chose their two ministers to lead them to the New World. The next day, 29 March 1630, they boarded the "Mary & John" and sailed for New England.

AN ESTIMATE OF HOW MANY LIVING DESCENDANTS THERE ARE OF THE "MARY & JOHN"-1630.

Genealogists in the past have attempted to estimate the number ofdescendants of emigrants to america in the 1620-1650 era. This is obviously very difficult because the important factors, such as average family growth rate, generation length, intermarriage factor, etc. are accurately know. One recent writer stated that many early emigrants now have over one million descendants. Using this figure, as an average, for the 46 "Mary & John" families, and reducing it by ten percent for intermarriage, the descendants would total about 41 million people.

The living descendants of the twenty-three "Mayflower" families (1620) has been estimated to be between 145 and 153 million in 1975. The factors used in this calculation may be questioned, particularly the intermarriage factor. But even if this estimate is off by a factor of three to one, the living descendants would number about 50 million.

In comparing the possible living descendants of the "Mayflower" of 1620 to the "Mary & John" of 1630, it seems very probable that there are more from the latter group. First, the "Mayflower" only carried 23 families and their early death rate was very high. The "Mary & John" families numbered about 46 and their birth and survival rates were very high. Nearly 300 children have been identified of these emigrants which is a first generation growth rate of 6 to 1. Nearly 1300 grandchildren have been identified, for a second generation growth rate of 4 to 1, and certainly there were other grandchildren who have not been found. One emigrant, Elder John Strong, had 17 children so far, 141 grandchildren, 607 great-grandchildren & 1896 great-great grandchildren have been identified. Insummary, these figures indicate there are least 50 million living descendants of the passengers of the "Mary & John" of 1630.

WHY IS THERE NO "MARY & JOHN" PASSENGER LIST? - A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF REV. REV. JOHN WHITE OF DORCHESTER, DORSET, ENGLAND?

The man who was responsible for gathering together the group of people who sailed on the "Mary & John" in 1630, was Rev. John White, the rector of Holy Trinity Church, in Dorchester, Dorset, England. He was bpt. 6 Jan. 1575 at Stanton, St. John, Oxfordshire, son of John White & Isabel Rawle. The latter held a lease under New College, Oxford, by his wife, daughter of John Rawle of Litchfield.

John White entered Winchester School in 1587 and was elected a fellow of New College in 1595. He graduated, B.A. on 12 April 1597 and M.A. on 16 January 1601. In 1606 he was appointed rector of Holy Trinity in Dorchester, Dorset, a position he held for over 40 years. He had an elder brother, Josias White, who was rector of Hornchurch, Essex (1614-1623), whose son, James White, later became a wealthy merchant in Boston, Mass.

He was a moderate Puritan, But not a Separatist. He sympathized with the Puritans but did not regard the ceremonial to be of vital importance and he did not separate himself from the Church of England. He had perfect control over his passions and his parisioner's purses, which he drew upon for his philanthropic purposes.

In 1624, his interest in the Puritan cause led him to organize a group of people, who financed and sent out a party of non-conformists. They went to Cape Ann in New England, where they might enjoy liberty of conscience. When this colony failed to succeed he initiated the formation of a new organization that was to become the Massachusetts Bay Company. The Council for New England signed the Massachusetts patent on 19 March 1628, and the king confirmed it by a charter dated 4 March 1629. John Endecott was sent out as governor, and Rev. John White chose Francis Higginson & Samuel Skelton to be the ministers. The paryy sailed on the "George Bonaventura" on 4 May 1629.

In 1629, organizers of the Massachusetts Bay Colony began to gather together the 1500 emigrants who were to sail to New England in the fourteens ships of the greet Winthrop Fleet. Although the English had been sending over settlers ever since the "Mayflower" landed in 1620, this was the first large migration to the new land. Rev. John White concentrated his efforts on gathering and organizing a group of people from southwestern England, from the shires of Dorset, Somerset & Devon. These people were to become the passengers of the first ship to sail, the "Mary & John".

In the article, "Some Passngers of the Mary & John In 1630", by John D. Hunt, printed in the National Genealogical Society Quarterly, Vol. 63 No. 1, March 1975, he speculated that the "Mary & John: passengers were, indeed acquainted with each other. He quotes Rev. John White as writing, "There passed away about 140 persons out of the western parts from Plimmouth of which I conceive that there were not sixe knowne either by face or fame to any of the rest".*

Hunt believes this vague statement was meant to deceive the London authorities concerning the nature and purposes of the migration, which he had promoted. He suggests a principal reason for White's defensive statement was because Rev. John Warham was with the "Mary & John" group. Warham, an Oxford graduate, was ordained in Silverton, Devon, in 1619, and he later became vicar in Crewkerne,

Somerset. But in 1627, he was ousted by the Bishop of Bath & Wells, William Laud, an Oxford alumnus. Laud was noted for his love of ceremony and his insistance on conformity to the rights of the Anglican church. He ousted John Warham because he was "repugnant in his principals to the Church of England."

In 1628, Laud was promoted to be Bishop of London, where he used his new power to be an obnoxious judge and inquisitor of the Puritans. Soon after, the Bishop of Exeter, Joseph Hall, who was conciliatory toward Puritans, arranged to have Warham appointed to a living at St. Sidwell's in Exeter, Devon. Tjis evidently rankled Bishop Laud. Also, since Rev. John White had in 1625, been involved in aiding other Puritans, this must have made him "persons non grata" to Laud and his followers. In 1630, Laud objected to the White movement, saying, ".... but they do not separate, yet they dislike our discipline and ceremonies and so they will prove them semi-separatists at least, and that is their intention in removing from us, that they may free themselves from our government". Thus, White's comment suggesting the "Mary & John" people were just a group of unassociated families, rather than Puritans with common religious beliefs and bond, may have for the ears of Bishop Laud.

A close look at the homes of these people shows that many of these people knew each other. There were family groupings, such as Nathaniel Duncan and William Hill who had married sisters, Elizabeth and Sarah Jourdain. William Rockwell and Nicholas Upsall had married sisters, Susan and Dorothy Capen.

Certain towns and parishes provided groups of people. From Dorchester, Dorset, the hometown of Rev. John White, came Thomas Ford, William Rockwell, Nicholas Upsall, Roger Ludlow and Stephen Terry, Rev. White's nephew. From Bridport, Dorset, came Nicholas Denslow, John Holman, John Gallop, Henry Way and the Thomas Ford family once lived there. From Exeter, Devon, came Rev. John Warham, Rev. John Maverick, Nathaniel Duncan and William Hill. Roger Clapp and Thomas Tolman came fromSalcombe Regis, Devon. Thomas Lombard and Edward Rossiter came from Thorncombe and nearby Combe St. Nicholas. From the Crewkerne-Chard area of Somerset came William Gay rd, George Hull, Mary Cogan (wife of Roger Ludlow), John Strong and Rev, John Warham was once rector there.

Despite the fact that Rev. White was very influential in the large migration of Puritans to New England, he never came to America himself. He was called "The Patriarch of Dorchester" by his contemporaries and the Father of Massachusetts" by later writers.

By the twenty-ninth of March, 1630, the 140 people gathered together by Rev. White, were in Plymouth, Devon, ready for their historic voyage to New England. On that day they met in an unfinished almshouse, called the New Hospital. There they chose Rev. John Warham and Rev. John Maverick to be their ministers. They spent the day in fasting, preaching and praying. The next day they boarded the "Mary & John" in Plymouth harbor and set sail for their new homeland.

One final note: The reason no records of the passengers has been found in Dorchester, Mass. is probaly because in 1657, the early town records were stored in the house of Thomas Millett. He was the son-in-law of John Greenway, of the "Mary & John". In that year his house burned down, and the early Dorchester records were destroyed.

CONDENSED EXCERPTS FROM ROGER CLAP'S MEMOIRS (Written after 1673)

Roger Clap was born in Salcombe Regis, Devonshire, England in 1609. His father was a God-fearing man of high esteem, He was not wealthy, with an income of not over eighty pounds a year. There were five sons and two daughters. When Roger was about twenty, he told his father he wanted to live abroad. His father, then a widower, gave his consent. As a trial, he went to live with a worthy gentleman, Mr. William Southcot, about three miles from Exeter, Devon. Mr. Southcot was a very religious man, and since there was a very mean minister in his parish, he went to Exeter every Sunday where there were many famous preachers. There Roger met Rev. John Warham and he took such a liking to him that he wanted to live near him.

So with his father's consent he moved to Exeter and lived with a Mr. Mosiour, another religious man. He kept seven or eight men and divers maid-servants. It was here that Roger first heard about New England and about the many godly people who were going there with Rev. Warham. He wrote his father for permission to join the group. His father was so displeased he did not reply but told others he would not agree. When he did not hear from his father he went home to ask permission. His father finally consented. Then, Rev. John Maverick, who lived 40 miles away, came to Roger's home and asked his father's permission to take him under his care. His father agreed so he went to Plymouth, Devon to join the group.

On 20 March 1630 they sailed from Plymouth on the "Mary & John" and landed at Nantasket, on the New England coast, 20 May 1630. There were many godly families on the ship, including two magistrates, Mr. Edward Rossiter and Mr. Roger Ludlow. Before they left Plymouth the people resolved to live together and they chose Rev. John Warham and Rev. John Maverick to be their ministers. Just before they left they spent a day of fasting, preaching, and praying in the New Hospital in Plymouth. Rev. John White, of Dorchester, Dorset, who organized the group, preached to them in the morning. In the afternoon they elected Rev. Warham and Rev. Maverick to be their officers, and they accepted. These ministers preached to them every day during their ten week voyage which brought them safely to New England.

When they reached Nantasket, the captain of the four hundred ton ship, Captain Squeb, would not take them into the Charles Rivers as he had promised. Instead he put them ashore with their goods on Nantasket Point, to shift for themselves in a "forlorn place in this wilderness". However, they got a boat from some old planters. They filled it with goods and some able-bodied, well-armed men took it to Charlestown, where they found some wigwams and a house. There they met a man with some boiled bass but not bread. They ate his bass and then went up the Charles River until the river became narrow and shallow. They landed their goods and "with much labor and toil" carried them up a steep bank. As night approached they learned there were three hundred Indians nearby. The old planter with them, an Englishman, who could speak the Indian language, approached them and advised them not to come near in the night and they heeded him. Roger Clap was one of the sentinels that first night.

The group's captain was a brave Low Country soldier, Richard Southcot. In the morning the Indians watched them from a distance but did not approach. Later some came closer and hdld out a great bass. The English sent a man with a biscuit and exchanged it for the bass. Afterwards they exchanged more bass for biscuits and were very friendly.

Roger Clap called Capt. Squeb a merciless man, but praised God for providing a boat and "then caused many Indians to be ruled by the advice of one man, not to come near us". Since there were only ten men they could have been destroyed by the hundreds of Indians. They stayed there (now Watertown) a few days and then went to Mattapan (Dorchester) because ghere was a neck of land (Dorchester Neck) fit for cattle. There they found more friendly Indians.

Soon after, the Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony came with the other ships and they sailed up the Charles River. They first settled in Charlestown, in tents and wigwams. There were some English at Plymouth and Salem, and a few at Charlestown who were destitute and shor of provisions. Roger wrote to his father and friends for provisions. His father ordered one of his neighbors, a seaman who was coming over, to supply his son what he needed. But before the goods arrived Roger often suffered with hunger. They had fish but bread was scarce and Roger wrote "sometimes I thought the very crusts of my father!s table would have been very sweet unto me, and when I could have meal and water and salt boiled together, it was so good, who could wish better?".

In the beginning, everyone was short of provisions for themselves and their children. Their main food was clams, mussels, and fish. They quickly built boats and went fishing. Bread was very scarce as was meat of all kinds. They traded with poor ravenous Indians who brought corn in baskets on their backs. Ships also brought provisions from Holland and Ireland and Indian corn from Virginia. When a ship arrived Gov. Winthrop ordered the whole cargo be bought for a general stock and distributed to each town and person, according to need.

It was common to drink water and eat samp or hominy without butter or milk. Roast beef, mutton or veal was rare, but soon after there was roast goat. The people were very healthy after the first winter, but there was no great store of corn. The Indians traded corn for clothing and knives and once, Roger traded a puppy for a peck.

Despite Roger's hardships in the early days he wrote "I do not remember that ever I did wish in my heart that I had not come to this country, nor wish myself back again to my father's house.

The magistrates who came included, Governor Winthrop, Deputy Governor Dudley, Sir Richard Saltonstall, Mr. Johnson, Mr. Rossiter, Mr. Ludlow, Mr. Nowel, and Mr. Bradstreet. Their ministers included, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Warham, Mr. Maverick, Mr. Phillips, Mr. Eliot, Mr. Weld, Mr. Cotton, Mr. Hooker, Mr. Bulkley, Mr. Stone, Mr. Nathaniel Rogers, Mr. Ezekiel Rogers, Mr. Shepard, Mr. Mather, Mr. Peters, Mr. Davenport, Mr. Whiting, Mr. Cobbet, Mr. Hubbard, Mr. Brown, Mr. Flint, Mr. Thompson, Mr. Newman, Mr. Prudden, Mr. Norris, Mr. Huit, and Mr. Street.

SEARCH FOR THE BIRTH PLACES OF THE "MARY & JOHN" PASSENGERS-1630

No one has ever published a complete list of all of the birth places of the "Mary & John" passengers of 1630. Some birth places have been claimed which have not been confirmed, while others have been completely refuted. The following is an attempt to list what information is available from many sources.

SAMUEL ALLEN- Birth place unknown. The claim he was b. 1588, in Braintree, Essex, England, and was the brother of Col. Matthew Allyn of Windsor, Conn. has been disproven in the Allen Memorial, by Orrin Peer Allen (1907). The Samuel of Braintree, Essex, went to Cambridge, Mass. in 1632 and later lived in Braintree, Mass. Samuel above, had a brother, Thomas Allen in Middletown, Conn.

THOMAS BASCOM- Birth place unconfirmed. Banks' "Topographical Dictionary of 2885

English emigrants: p. 33 says, Fordington parish, Dorset.

POCED CLARA BATE Apr. 1609 Salcomb Pegis Devon England His ancestry is well.

ROGER CLAP- Bpt. 6 Apr. 1609, Salcomb Regis, Devon, England. His ancestry is well-documented in The Clapp Memorial Record of the Clapp Family in America, by Ebenezer Clapp, 1876.

AARON COOK- Bpt. 20 Mar. 1613, Bridport, Dorset, England, s. of Aaron Cooke & Elizabeth Charde. His parentage is documented in TAG 16:41.

NICHOLAS DENSLOW- Bpt. 4 Oct. 1573, Allington parish, Bridport, Dorset, England. His ancestry is documented in NGBR Apr. 1946, p. 60.

JOHN DRAKE- Birth place unknown, but his father lived in Wiscomb, Devon, England. His ancestry back eight generations is well-documented in "Descendants of John Drake", by Frank B. Gay, 1933.

NATHANIEL DUNCAN- Bpt. 12 Mar. 1586, Crediton, Devon, England, s. of Peter Duncam & pos. Margaret Yarde. This is listed in the Devon parish records. He m. Elizabeth Jourdain, 6 Jan. 1616, St. Olave, Exeter, Devon. She was the dau. of Ignatius Jourdain & Elizabeth Baskerville of Lyme Regis, Dorset & Exeter, Devon. Her ancestry can be pieced together from the wills in NER Oct. 1895, p. 491-495. Their children, Nathanyell & Peter Duncan were bpt. in St. Olave parish, Exeter, Devon.

GEORGE DYER- Birth place unconfirmed. Banks' "Topographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants" lists Dorchester, Dorset (p. 32), Fitzhead, Somerset (p. 142) & Wincanton, Somerset (p. 146).

BYGOD EGGLESTON- Bpt. 20 Feb. 1586, Settrington, Yorkshire, England, s. of James Eggleston and pos. Juliana _____, of Settrington. The birthplace of his twin sons, James & Samuel (b.a. 1620) is unknown. He possibly moved to Southwestern England as a widower in the 1620's.

THOMAS FORD- Birthplace unknown. A private source (upon what authority is unknown) says he was b. 1589, s. of William Ford of Ford Green, who m. Alice Harlilutt, 1569, dau. of Richard Harlilutt of Loyd, Staffordshire. He m. (1) Joan Way, 13 Dec. 1610, Powerstock, Dorset (2) Elizabeth Charde, 19 June 1616, Bridport, Dorset and lived in Dorchester, Dorset a few years before 1630.

WALTER FYLER- Birthplace unknown. In History & Genealogy of Fyler Family, by Wadsworth Fyler--1967 it is claimed he and his sister, Anne were the children of Roman Fyler of Cornwall. No locale or confirmation has been found. He supposedly had a brother, Samuel and nephew, George who came to America. English parish records show an Ann Fyler, dau. of Roman Fyler, born in 1610, in Cornwall, but no date or parish is listed. She married John Hoskins, another "Mary & John" passenger in England or Dorchester, Mass. Walter, supposedly married Jane Irving in England or Dorchester, Mass. but her origin has not been found.

JOHN GALLOP- Born about, 1590, prob. Mosterne, Dorset, England, son of John Gollop & Mary Crabbe, according to The Genealogical History of the Gallop Family in the U.S., by John D. Gallop, 1893, and English parish records. His ancestry has been traced back to his great-great-grandfather. His marriage to Christopher Brushett is recorded in Mosterne (1614) and Bridport, Dorset (19 Jan. 1616). The births & baptisims of his children are recorded in these two towns (1615-1629).

HUMPHREY GALLOP- Birth place unknown. He married Anne _____ in England or Dorchester, Mass. He may have been a cousin of John Gallop. There was a Humphrey Gallop, son of George Gallop and grandson of Thomas Gallop & Agneta Watkins of North Bowood, Dorset. John was also a grandson of Thomas Gallop & Agneta Watkins.

WILLIAM GAYLORD- Birth place unknown. The claim he was Pitminster, Somerset has not been verified. He had children baptized in Crewkerne, Somerset (1619-1624) and he was named in the will of Joan Patten (spinster) of Crewkerne (1634) (See NER 41:183-189). TAG 17:71-74 says the French ancestry given to William Gaylord in the "History & Pedigree of the House of Gaillard or Gaylord" is sheer nonsense. Banks' "Togographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants to New England, 1620-1650" says he was from Chilthorne Domer, Somerset, but this is questioned by TAG 17:73. GILES GIBBS- Birth place unknown.

JONATHAN GILLETT- Birth place unknown. His father, William Gylett was rector in Chaffcomb, Somerset in 1609. Jonathan returned to England to marry Mary Dolbiar in Colyton, Devon on 29 Mar. 1634. She was dau. of Rawkey Dolbiar of Cadhayne, Devon. TAG Apr. 1971, p. 127 questions the alleged French Hugenot ancestry of this family.

NATHAN GILLETT- Birth place unknow. Brother of Jonathan above.

MATTHEW GRANT- Birth place unknown. The Report of the Sixth Reunion of the Grant Family Association, 1914, p. 25, says he was born, 27 Oct. 1601, Woodbridge, Devon, s. of John Grant & Alice Turberville. It also claims he married Priscilla Grey (bpt. 14 Mar. 1609) of Branbury, Leicestershire, dau. of Rev. Anthony Grey, rector of Burbach, Leicestershire & Magdalena Purifoy. Both of these pedigrees have been renounced as fakes by The Genealogical Magizine (1915-1916), Vol. 3, p. 62, the Grant Association, itself, in 1931, NER Apr. 1948, p. 153 & TAG 51:190.

JOHN GREENWAY- Birth place unknown. The only hints on the origin of this family are in the "Ancestors & Descendants of Thomas Millett", by George Frances Millett, 1959, p. 1. The author lists, john"s dau., Mary Greenoway, being born, 1606, at Stains, near Chester. She married, Thomas Millett, b. 1605, Chertsey, Surrey. They came on the "Elizabeth" in 1635, with a group of people from St. Saviour parish, Southwark, England.

WILLIAM HANNUM- Birth place unknown. NER Apr. 1936, p. 157 says perhaps he came from Caundle Purse, Dorset.

WILLIAM HAYDEN- Birth place unknown. In Stiles' History of Windsor, 1892, Vol. 2, p. 369, he says Rev. William B. Hayden of Portland, Maine, presented him with strong presumptive proof that William was the brother of John Hayden of Braintree, Mass. & they were both from Hinton Blewitt, Somerset. In "Records of the Connecticut Line of the Hayden Family", by Jabez Haskell Hayden, 1888, there is an article by Rev. William B. Hayden (p. 39). He lists a will (1637) of widow Joane Hayden of Witcombe, Hinton Blewitt, Somerset, which lists sons, William & John Hayden. In the "Hayden Genealogy", by Mina E. Pomeroy, 1915, p. 25, the author claims he came with brothers, John & James, sons of Gideon Hayden, Esq. of Ebford & Cadhay (Devon?) & Margaret Davy. She traces this family's ancestry back sixteen generations. WILLIAM HILL- Probably born in Lyme Regis, Dorset. His father's will (1620) is listed in NER Oct. 1895, p. 495. He was the son of James Hill, mayor & merchant of Lyme Regis. William married Sarah Jourdain, 28 Oct. 1619, St. Mary Archer, Exeter, Devon, dau. of Ignatius Jourdain & Elizabeth Baskerville of Exeter. Sarah was bpt. 4 Mar. 1598/9, St. Mary Archer, Exeter and was the sister of Elizabeth Jourdain, who married Nathaniel Duncan. They were also on the "Mary & John" in 1630. THOMAS HOLCOMB- Birth place unknown. Banks' "Topographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants" p. 176 says he came from Warwickshire. "The Holcomb Genealogy" by Jesse Seaver, 1925 p. 4, says Thomas Holcomb was b. 1601 in Pembrokeshire or Deven, England, believed to be the son of Gilbert Holcomb & Anne Courtney. In "The Holcombes- Nation builders" by Elizabeth Weit McPherson, 1947, p. 9, the author says one report lists his birth place as Hole (Hull ?), Devon in 1595, 1597 or 1601. Another lists Pembrokeshire, Wales. He was the son of Gilbert Holcombe of Hull, Devon. & Ann Courtney of Vrottonin, Cornwall. In TAG, 26:109, the auther claims the above Gilbert Holcombe died at Milor, Cornwall, and according to his will on 14 Oct. 1623, he had no children. Thomas married Elizabeth Ferguson, 14 May 1634, Dorchester, Mass. According to family tradition, she was also on the "Mary & John" in 1630, but her birth place & parents are unknown.

JOHN HOLMAN- Bpt. 27 Jan. 1602/3, Swrye, Dorset, England, son of Morgan Holman & Alice Odbeere of Swyre, and grandson of Henry Holman & Jan Jolliffe of Swrye. Reference: "The Holmans of America" by David Emory Holman, 1909, p. xxxii.

JOHN HOSKINS- Birth place unknown. In "Descendants of John Hoskins from Plymouth, England-1630"., 1957, the author claims John Hoskins was born about 1585 and was a Baronet of Herefordshire. He supposedly came with his son, Thomas (b. 1610), leaving another son, John Hoskins Jr. (b. 1612) on his estates. The son became the ancestor of the late line of Sir Edwin Clement Hoskyns, a Baronet. Since no sources are listed this information i suspect. John Hoskins is listed in this book as marrying, Ann Fyler, sister of Walter, 6 June 1630, wich woulf have been one week after the "Mary & John" landed.

GEORGE HULL- Born about 1590, probably, Crewkerne, Somerset, England, son of Thomas Hull & Joan Peson of Crewkerne. George married (1) Thomasene Michel, 17 Aug. 1614, Crewkerne, dau. of Robert Michell of Stockland, Devon. Six of his children were baptized in Crewkerne (1616-1630). George came alone in 1630 and his wife came over with their children a year or two later. Reference: "The Hull Family", by Col. Weygant, 1913.

THOMAS: LOMBARD- Bpt. 2 Feb. 1581, Thorncombe, Dorset, England. son of Thomas Lumbard. He came with possibly his second wife & four children. Reference: TAG 52:136. WLLIAM LOVELL- Birth place unknown.

ROGER LUDLOW- Bpt. 7 Mar. 1590, Dinton, Wilts, England. son of Thomas Ludlow & Jane Pyle. TAG 15:129 lists his royal ancestry throu his paternal grandmother, back to Edward I. NER 42:181-184, also lists the Ludlow ancestry.

REV. JOHN MAVERICK- Bpt. 28 Dec. 1578, Awliscombe, Devon. s. of Peter Mavericke & Dorothy Tucke. He m. Mary Gye, 28 Oct. 1600, Ilsington, Devon. He was curate at South Huish, Devon (1606-1613) and Beaworthy (1615-1630). References: "The Mavericks of Devonshire & Mass." by James G. Commin, 1929 & NER Apr. 1915 p. 146. He wife was b.a. 1580, dau. of Robert Gye of Doddridge or Prowse, Sandford, Devon. His ancestry has been traced back six generations in NER Oct. 1961 p. 248-253.

JOHN MOORE- Birth place unknown.

WILLIAM PHELPS- Bpt. 19 Aug. 1599, Tewkesbury, Gloucestershire, England. s. of William Phelps & Dorothy of Tewkesbury. He married (1) Elizabeth _____ and had a son, Richard, bpt. 1619 in Tewkesbury. They had five more children in England (1623-1629) but their birth places are unknown. He may have lived in the southwestern part of England during those years where he came in contact with the other "Mary & John" passengers. His first wife died by 1636 and he married (2) Mary Dover, another fellow-passenger but her birth place and parentage have not been found. Reference: "Phelps Family In America & English Ancestry" by A.V. & O.S. Phelps, 1899.

GEORGE PHELPS- Born about 1605, brother of William above.

HUMPHREY PINNEY- Birth place unknow, but probably Broadway, Somerset, son of John & Johanna Pinney. Reference: "History of Windsor: by Henry Stiles, 1892, Vol. 2 p. 608. WILLIAM ROCKWELL- Bpt. 6 Feb. 1590/1, Fitzhead, Somerset, son of John Rockwell & Honor Newton of Fitzhead. He married Susan Capen, 14 Apr. 1624, at Holy Trinity church, Dorchester, Dorset. They had two children baptized in Dorchester (1625-1627). References: Rockwell Family in America, by Frances W. Rockwell, 1873, Rockwell Family in One Line of Descent, by F.W. Rockwell, 1924. His wife was bpt. 11 Apr. 1602, Dorchester, Dorset, dau. of Bernard Capen & Joan Purchase. She was sister of Dorothy Capen, who married Nicholas Upsall, who were also on the "Mary & John". Reference: "Descendants of Bernard Capen, by Rev. Charles A. Hayden, 1929. EDWARD ROSSITER- Birth place unknown, He was born about 1585 and lived in Comb St. Nicholas, Somerset, but the records of this parish before 1678 are lost. He is listed in a number of wills there (1610-1635). Reference: TAG Jan. 1937 p. 145-151. RICHARD SILVESTER- Birth place unknown.

THOMAS STOUGHTON- Bpt. 9 July 1593, Naughton parish, Suffolk, son of Rev. Thomas Stoughton & Katherine. In 1600 the family moved to Coggeshall, Essex, where his father became vicar. Thomas married Elizabeth Montpeson, a. 1612 of Wiltshire, who supposedly died shortly before 1630. They had three children baptized in Coggeshall (1613-1618) but his whereabouts until 1630 is unknown. References: "English Ancestors of Thomas Stoughton (1588-1661)", by E.M. Turner & TAG Oct. 1953 p. 193.

JOHN STRONG- Birth place unconfirmed, but possibly Chard, Somerset, England, about 1607-1610. He m. Margert Deane, about 1632, dau. of William Deane Of Southchard, Somerset. The family tradition that he was born in Taunton, Somerset, son of Richard Strong is not substatiated in any records. Neither is the story that he came in 1630 with his wife and two small children, and soonafter, married Abigail Ford after his first wife died. Abigail was only ten years old at the time. He is more likely the son of John Strong of Chard & grandson of George Strong. He possibly came on the "Mary & John" as a young bachlor, returned to England to marry, and came again in 1635 with his family and brother-in-laws, Walter & John Deane. When his first wife died, soon after they landed, he went to Dorchester (He never lived there.) to renew his acquaintance with the Ford family. He then married Abigail Ford, then 16, who he had first met in 1630. Reference: TAG 35 p. 1-6, NER 51:382 & "The Strongs of Strongs-ville" by Albert Strong, 1931.

STEPHEN TERRY- Born, 25 Aug. 1608, bpt. 31 Aug. 1608, Stockton, Wilts, England, son of Rev. John Terry & Mary White. His father was the rector of Stockton (1590-1625). His mother was sister of Rev. John White of Dorchester, Dorset, the organizer of the "Mary & John" group. Stephen came alone, age 21. His wife or wives are confusing. THOMAS TOLMAN- Bpt. 9 Dec. 1608, Salcomb Regis, Devon, England, possibly son of Thomas Tolman who was buried there, 24 Aug. 1632. References: NER 14 247-260 & "The Needham Branch of the Tolman Family", by Anna Maria Tolman Pickford, 1894.

NICHOLAS UPSALL- Birth place unknow. He married Dorothy Capen, 17 Jan. 1629, Dorchester Dorset. She was dau. of Bernard Capen & Joan Purchase and sister of Susan Capen, who married William Rockwell. The Upsalls & Rockwells came together on the "Mary & John". REV. JOHN WARHAM- Birth place unknown, but supposedly born, 1592, in Devon or Dorset. He m. (1) Cecelia Hatch, before 1630. He graduated from St. Mary Hall, Oxford, B.A. in 1614 & M.A. in 1618 & ordained at Silverton, Devon, 1619. He was a minister in Crewkerne, Somerset and later had a living at St. Sidwell's, Exeter, Devon. The births of his first three children in England have not been found.

HENRY WAY- Birth place unknown. He lived in Bridport, Dorset (1608-1624) where he had five of his children baptized. Kuhns claims he was son of William Waye of Somerset & Margaret Berry, dau. of Nicholas Berry of Nerbe, Devon, but upon what authority is not known. William was supposedly a yeoman of the Guard of Henry VIII.

ROGER WILLIAMS- Birth place unconfirmed. Banks' "Topographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants" p. 142 says West Harptree, Somerset.

HENRY WOLCOTT- Bpt. 6 Dec. 1578, Lydiard St. Lawrence, Somerset, England, s. of John Wolcott of Gladon Manor, Tolland, Somerset. He married Elizabeth Saunders, 19 Jan. 1601, who was bpt. 20 Dec. 1584, Lydiard St. Lawrence, Somerset, dau. of Thomas Saunders. Gladon Manor, where Henry Wolcott was born is still a working farm, in excellent repair, in the unspoiled countryside, just south of Tolland. It is open to the public a few days each week. His ancestry has been traced back thirteen generations to the knight, Sir John Wolcott. References: "A Record of the Descendants of James & Miriam Wolcott" by Chandler Wolcott, 1907, "British & American Family of Wolcott", 1907, & "British & American Family of Wolcott" by Gen. Joseph C. Jackson, 1912, & Wolcott Genealogy, by A. Bohmer Rudd, 1950.
