JAMES NISBET SON OF ALEXANDER NISBET IN IRVINE NEVER LEFT SCOTLAND

Fasti Ecclesiæ Scoticanæ Ministers vol 3 says

JAMES was later a merchant in Irvine and died 2nd Sept 1745 and the origin of his father is unknown

This same James has been claimed to be the James (belonging to DNA2 group) that immigrated 1685 to USA - died there in 1720

The descendants and others of the James that went to USA have claimed that his father Alexander was uncle of John the Martyr and also claimed to have descended from Nisbets of Greenholm.

At this time there is nothing known that connects Alexander the minister to either John the Martyr or to Greenholm or even indicates that this is a possibility.

p. 268 & 269 has the follow information:

Rev. MacWhorter says in his Century Sermon, "There was an addition to this church worthy of notice about 1690 when horror raged in Scotland under the headlong and debauched King Charles II. Some suffered death, others fled. Three of the persecuted people came to this town and were received with great pleasure by the church and became eminent members of it. The names of these three young men were (James) Niesbit, (Robert) Young, (James) Clisby."

From Historical Discourses Relating to the First Church of Newark by Stearns. About 1692, Rev. Abraham Pierson Jr. was encouraged by four men from Scotland, who had fled from the persecutions and troubles there under Charles II. There names were Young, Nesbit, Clisby, and Douglass who for their zeal and piety had been admitted by the first settlers to great privileges in the town."

From the History of Newark 1878 by Arkinson

The Rev John Prudden Sr. was installed pastor of the First Church of Newark in 1692, as the successor the Rev Pierson and soon after Prudden's ministry began there was an accession to the town (early 1693) of eleven planters, of whom James Nesbit, James Clizbie, and Robert Young were exiles from Scotland.

Oscar Jewell Harvey, A.M. in his book *The Harvey Book 1899* written also 200 years later (which should always put up a red flag if this pedigree is correct unless it has reference to original documentation)

It says **John the Martyr** was his uncle so just another pedigree that has speculated relationship with him. And we can almost 100% say that any pedigree that includes him is most likely wrong
