

PREDICTS ECLIPSE OF SULFA DRUGS

Dentists' Speaker Says Penicillin Will Do It

A prediction that penicillin—medicine's closest approach to its "magic bullet"—will make obsolete the 3,500 sulfonamide drugs discovered by chemists since 1937, once it is released for general use, was made yesterday before members of the Ohio State Dental Society holding their 78th annual postgraduate meeting at the Hotel Statler.

Dr. John C. Kranz, professor of pharmacology at the School of Medicine, University of Maryland, hailed the discovery of penicillin, the entire manufacture of which now is reserved for the armed forces, as "epochal." He asserted that its use in the postwar period would "eclipse" the sulfa drugs, pointing out that penicillin, unlike the sulfa drugs, was not toxic to man and did not produce ill effects in patients.

Praises Sulfonamides The Baltimore scientist, however, praised the contribution of sulfonamide drugs to mankind in their brief history of use, particularly during the war.

"Penicillin will be the choice therapy," he asserted, "in the fight against infectious diseases following the war."

An intensive War Bond sales drive which was begun by members of the state dental group Sept. 9 concluded last night with the announcement that more than \$1,600,000 worth of bonds had been sold.

The successful bond campaign, conducted under the leadership of Dr. Thomas J. McDermott of Cleveland, president of the society, was celebrated by a victory bond parade in the ballroom of Hotel Statler. Music was by Angelo Vitale and his orchestra.

Dr. Robert E. Blackwell of Northwestern University said at an afternoon session that unless there was a severe restriction in the per-capita consumption of sugar in the United States science would be able to make little headway in the fight against tooth decay.

He asserted that, while the daily diet of the American people was better balanced, there had been no reduction in the incidence of tooth decay. "As a matter of fact," he said, "while the general health of the public has been improved through the better balanced diet, the growth of tooth decay has increased."

He urged general dental practitioners to become specialists in "preventive" dentistry and outlined five steps for the conservation of teeth: Proper diet, mouth hygiene, prophylaxis, operative dentistry and education of patients.

Preventive dentistry, Dr. Blackwell said, should begin with children at the age of 3—at the latest, while he conceded the impossibility of keeping children from consuming candy and other sweets, he recommended, as the next best thing, that parents encourage children to rinse their mouths immediately after eating such sweets.

Other speakers included Dr. Don H. Bellinger of Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, who discussed oral surgery; Dr. William H. Crawford of Indiana University, who spoke on "Small Castings," and Dr. F. E. Vetter of the University of Michigan, whose topic was "Preparation of Abutments for Fixed Bridges."
