James Joseph, an aged man, living southeast of Hayward, died Wednesday noon and was

buried Thursday afternoon at 2'oclock in the Hayward Cemetery. Mr. Joseph was an old settler in that neighborhood. He was a distant relative of R.C. and Chas. Mitchell of Covington.

January 12, 1922

R.C. Mitchell, who was injured while working on an oil rig about two months ago, has thrown his crutches away and is getting around with the assistance of a cane.

Later – He has thrown his cane away too, now.

January 26, 1922

W.L. Wolf called C.K. Mitchell Friday and ordered a battery brought to him as the one in his car had frozen and he had to get to town quick. When Mitchell arrived the first thing Wolf said was “have you a chew of tobacco?” When this was supplied he was in no particular rush.
