

In reply to your letter of the 16" ultimo, you are advised that from the records of this Bureau it appears that three hundred somes of bounty land wareallowed on account of the services of Captain David Bates of Colonel Seth Warner's Regiment, War of the Revolution, on Warrant No. 140 which was issued August 8, 1789 to John Doty.

There is no further data on file relative to said soldier we the papers in the bounty land oldin were destroyed when the War Office was burned in November 1800.

The Revolutionary Tax records of this Sureau fail to afford information in regard to any other soldier of the Revolution named David Bates than the above noted.

Dear Sire

Reference is made to your request for information relative to David Bates who served in the Revolutionary War as an officer from Vermont and his son, Daniel, who was born December 11, 1776, and served in the War of 1812, living in Cincinnati, Ohio, after marriage in 1805.

The War of 1812 records of this office fail to show that a claim for pension was made to the United States or that manufrant for bounty land was issued on account of the service of the Daniel Baits or Bates described by you.

You are furnished herein, the record of the only David Bates that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

The Revolutionary War records of this office show that on account of the service of David Bates as captain in Colonel Seth Warner's regiment during the Revolutionary War, Farrant 140 for three hundred acres of bounty land was issued Angust 8, 1789, to John Doty, assignee.

There are no further data on file relative to David Bates and none whatever in regard to his family, as the papers in the bounty land claud were destroyed when the War Office was burned in Hovember, 1800.

The Revolutionary War records of this office show that on account of the service of David Bates as captain in Colonel Seth Warner's regiment during the Revolutionary War, Warrant 140 for three hundred acres of bounty land was issued August 8, 1789, to John Doty, assignee.

There are no further data on file relative to David Bates and none whatever in regard to his family, as the papers in bounty land claims were destroyed when the War Office was burned in November, 1800.

For information relative to the location of this land it is suggested that you address The Commissioner of the General Land Office, Interior Department, Washington, D.O., giving the warrant number, the acrosse and the date the land was interior.
