In reply to your letter of the 16<sup>th</sup> ultimo, you are advised that from the records of this Bureau it appears that three hundred acres of bounty land were allowed on account of the services of Captain David Bates of Colonel Seth Warner's Regiment, War of the Revolution, on Warrant No. 140 which was issued August 2, 1789 to John Doty.

There is no further data on file relative to said soldier as the papers in the bounty land claim were destroyed when the War Office was burned in November 1800.

The Revolutionary War records of this Bureau fail to afford information in regard to any other soldier of the Revolution named David Bates than the above noted.
