

HOMEMAKERS TO MEET APRIL 9

Frederick County Council To Hold Sessions At Hood College

The annual meeting of the Frederick County Council of Homemakers Clubs has been set for April 9 at Hood College. It was announced Saturday by the Home Demonstration agents.

The meeting which usually attracts some 500 club women opens at ten o'clock in the morning for the business session followed by a review of the year's activities.

Following luncheon on the college campus, the women will meet for the program which will feature a speaker of general interest.

This will be the first time that the meeting has been scheduled as an all-day affair. Usually the business session and speaker are scheduled for the morning session followed by lunch and a display of homemakers work.

Editorial content of newspapers take into your home to be your friend, your servant, and a reflection of your community life," he added.

In refuting the charge that advertising contributes to the price of a product, the speaker cited prices of farm food products and gasoline which have not increased as fast as the inflationary spiral. He also showed that many electrical appliances in 1958 were priced lower than their counterparts in 1952.

City Without Newspapers
The tie-in with advertising to newspapers is a natural, the journalist stated, with advertising carrying the same aliveness as news content, with new products, styles and prices being part of the American appetite for news, along with the weather.

To explain the importance of newspapers to a community, Mr. Delaplane reviewed several studies made during the shut-down of papers in New York City around Christmas of 1958.

"A common answer to a questionnaire was that although the strike hadn't affected the actual routine of eating, sleeping and working, it left the people feeling out of touch with the world—a distinct feeling of loss," he said.

The Frederick papers turn down many advertisements each year for several reasons, Mr. Delaplane said. Ads by liquor manufacturers are refused, as are ads which are felt to be fraudulent, or cannot be true or factual such as some patent medicines are purported to be.
