



The nurseries are now in full operation, producing three varieties, most popular in the state. Oats, Peaches and Pears. Thomas L. Heath, Crawford's Barley, and the new variety of barley, which is the best of many varieties, and the best of all the wheats, is also produced by Mr. Cuthbertson. 
The best pear for this country, claiming that it is almost free from blight, is a most magnificent fruit, and is an early and sure bearer.



an abundant supply of water, but no one could get it from a spring or a stream. To get it they had to go at great expense to buy it. It took many months of trials and disappointments before they were able to rise more than fulfilling their brightest hopes. Then they began to plant trees rising within 200 feet of the surface of the ground. They were planted in rows to the reservoir, situated in a granite ledge to the west. The outlet is a steady flow of water, which will furnish water and supply for a city of 50,000 souls.
