and repeated over what several of them had & Jonathan says he wished Mary to take the property into her own hands & take David in to her assistance and to choose any one that she may have a mind when this conversation took place Catherine the Mother of Jonathan & David were present then Catherine reicated over the same & David said Jonathan wished Mary to take the property into her own hands and take him to assist her and said he should help her all he could this was on Monday morning

Richard Hann being further examined on the part of the applicant did depose and say the morning after Jonathan died Mary his wife said she was glad he had chose David to be one to help settle the Estate that she was glad and there could not be any hard thoughts on either side

Sarah Moore being further examined on the part of the applicant did depose and say I recollect seeing Sarah Ayers at my Mothers on Monday morning after the death of Jonathan we had some conversation about Jonathans disease, we could not give him up my feelings were so hurt I did not think much about his property at that time I did not say to Sarah Ayars that Jonathan wished Mary to take the property and call David to her assistance I could not have said so nor anything of the kind for Jonathan never said so I have heard Mary several times say she was glad Jonathan had chose David as one to settle the estate as they were brothers and there (?) hard thought I heard her say I wish (?) had been present & heard what Jonathan said I dont think he could have been so much opposed to my doing Jonathans will-- Sworn & subscribed in open court Catharine Hann aged sixty four or thereabouts a witness for the applicant did depose and say before I left the room which Jonathan lay I asked him if he wanted to see any body in particular and he said he wanted to see the Rev McHoff -- all his friends-- run down myself to send for McHoff I came up again and went to the bed side-- asked him if he had anything in particular he wanted to say He said yes I Have just told David & Mary he said he wanted to settle his Estate. David knew more about his affairs than any other man he raised his hands and said I wish you all to take notice Said now do you all hear heard not say he wished Mary to take the Estate into her hands and let David assist her I was not out of the room after this conversation till his death. He died in about half an hour after Mrs. Ayars came to my house shortly after I cannot recollect the day. I was in so much trouble I thought but little of his Estate. I did not say to Mrs. Avers nor aid Mrs. Moore that I heard that Jonathan wished Mary to take the estate into her own hands & David help her settle as this the first time I heard of it or any thing of the like. I am the Mother of the Deceased Sworn & Subscribed in open Court Catharine Hann

Elizabeth Hann aged Forty three or there abouts as witness produced by the applicant being duly sworn did depose and say I am the Mother of David I Hann He was Twenty years of age the 23 day of last December Mary said on Sunday the day of his death she

was so glad that Jonathan had decided who should have the settlement of his estate I then said to her did he me then I said he has chose David & Me there can be no hard thoughts she said she was satisfied there was her brother stood by and heared it & could have no objection after Jonathan was buried her Brother (?) advised her not to have anything to do with settling the estate she said I dont know how to give it up not to do Jonathans will she said she thought had (?) been there & heard Jonathans request she thought he would not have had so much objection or any other person
