Peter Brewer of Greenwich in the County of Washington
& State of New York being duly sworn deposes & saith
that he Enlisted, in April 1776 for one Year in Captain
Ezekiel Hyatt's Company in Genl. M'Donough's Brigade in the
New York Line on the Continental Establishment was in New
York until it was taken by the British was then removed to
Morristown in New Jersey returned in January to Peekskill
where he was dismissed in April 1777 his Term of Enlistment
having expired - Enlisted again in March 1778 for one
Year under Captain William Sloan in the New York Line
& Continental Establishment stationed at Shingora Ferry at
Stony Point & was employed in Attendance there & with
forty or other Persons in which he continued until May
1779 having served about two Months longer than his
term of Enlistment was then discharged & again Enlisted
March 3^d 1780 for 1 Year under Capt. John Corns in the
Baltic Service of the United States was stationed at the
Continental Village Peekskill until his Year's Service
expired & immediately Enlisted again in the same
Company & Service for another Year which he served
& was dismissed in March 1782, & this deponent further
says that he is a resident Citizen of the United States
& by reason of his reduced Circumstances in Life is in
Need of Assistance from his Country for Support
& that he has not any Discharge which he has heretofore had

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Peter Brewer who served in the Revolution from the State of New York.

You are furnished herein the record of the only soldier named Peter Brewer, under any spelling, found in the Revolutionary War records of this office. The data therein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 44690, based upon his service in the Revolution.

Peter Brewer was born and reared in Cortlandt, Westchester County, New York; the date of his birth and names of parents are not given.

While a resident of Cortlandt, New York, Peter Brewer enlisted in April, 1776, served one year as private in Captain Ezekiel Hyatt's company, Colonels Alexander McDougall's and Edwards' New York regiment, and was in the battle of White Plains. He enlisted in March, 1778, and served one year as private in Captain William Slow's company, Colonel Hughes' New York regiment, stationed at Kings Ferry and Stony Point. He enlisted March 3, 1780, served as private in Captain John Campbell's company, Colonel Hughes' New York regiment, and was discharged in March, 1782.

About 1798, the soldier moved from Cortlandt, New York, to the northern part of that state.

Peter Brewer applied for pension April 8, 1818, while a resident of Greenwich, Washington County, New York. His claim was allowed. He afterwards lived in Easton, Washington County, New York, and was living there in 1824. His age was not given. He died February 6, 1836.

There are no family data in the claim.
