On this second day of May 1818, before me the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in & for said County, personally appears, Henry Brewer, aged fifty seven years, resident in the town of Union in said County, who being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land & naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war"

That he the said Henry Brewer, enlisted in the service of the United States, in the month of January 1782, in the County of Dutchess, in the State of New York in <sup>the</sup> company commanded by Capt John Campbell in the New York line for the term of one year; that he continued to serve in the said corps, until the first day of January 1783, when he was discharged from service, at the Highlands in said County of Dutchess - & that his discharge has been accidentally destroyed by fire - & that he is in reduced circumstances, & stands in need of the assistance of his country for support - & that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said service -

On this 26<sup>th</sup> Day of December 1820, Personally appeared in open Court being the Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions of the Peace in and for said County of Broome, a Court of record proceeding according to the course of the Common Law, with a Justice of the Peace unlimited in the point of administering oaths of their proceedings, and having also the power of fine and imprisonment Henry Brewer aged 35 years a resident in the Town of Chowang in said County of Broome who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows from the month of January 1780 one year in the Company commanded by Captain John Campbell as a drummer and that the date of his original declaration is the 2nd of May 1818 and the number of his Pension Certificate is 3085. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof either in land thereof or to diminish it with being myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> of March 1818 and I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities on bonds or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule herunto annexed and by me subscribed Schedule of the property of the above named Henry Brewer One Small spoke Heers two much cows three Small sheeps six sheep and lambs three calves two good oxen one horse one old plough three and a half chains a few articles of household furniture

And the said Henry Brewer upon his oath aforesaid further states that he is by occupation a Farmer, unable to do more than half labor generally and that the number of his family is five consisting of himself four wife Cybele aged fifty eight years very much broken down a son named Isaac aged 16 years able to labor and two daughters named Esther and Cybele Esther aged 26 years not capable of taking care of her self and a Cybele aged 14 years able to labor

# APPLICATION FOR A TRANSFER.

County of *Richland Ohio* 39.

On this *fourth* day of *February* 1837  
before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of  
*Richland* personally appeared *Henry Breuer*  
who, on his oath, declares that he is the same  
person who formerly belonged to the company commanded by Captain  
*Campbell* in the Regiment commanded by Colonel  
in the service of the United States; that  
his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of *New York*  
from whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State (District,  
or Territory,) of *Ohio* where he intends to  
remain, and wishes his pension to be there payable, in future. The follow-  
ing are his reasons for removing from *the State of New York*  
to *the State of Ohio* viz to better his condition  
and because his children reside in said  
State of Ohio - *Henry Breuer*  
*Richland*

The oath to be taken before a duly qualified Magistrate, whose official character and signature must be certified by the proper officer, under his seal of office. The County Clerk, Secretary of State, or some other officer, must certify, under his seal of office, that the officer who administered the oath is a Justice of the Peace, Judge, Mayor, Alderman, or Notary Public, as the case may be, and that the signature purporting to be his is genuine.

The oath must be supported by the testimony of some respectable person, as to the pensioner's identity. He must swear that the person who has taken the above oath is the person described in the affidavit. The Magistrate must certify that the witness is a person of veracity; and the affidavit must also be authenticated in the manner above directed.

June 13, 1818, at which time he was living in Adams County, Ohio.

He died February 20, 1829 in said Adams County, leaving a widow, whose name is not given and who died in May, 1829.

In 1830 their following children were as follows- Mrs. Polly Davis of Romney, Virginia; Mrs. Peggy Handsberry (Handsberry) of Fairfield County, Ohio; Mrs. Sally Williams of Adams County, Ohio; Anna Boldman wife of James Boldman of Adams County, Ohio; Susan Brewer of Adams County, Ohio; Elijah Brewer of Adams County, Ohio; and Charles Brewer of Adams County, Ohio. There are no further family data.

Henry Brewer

The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 42100, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Henry Brewer.

He enlisted in January, 1780 or 1782 in Dutchess County, New York and served one year as a private in Captain Campbell's New York Company and was discharged at the Highlands in Dutchess County.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 2, 1818, then aged fifty-seven years and living in Union, Broome County, New York.

In 1820 he was living in Chenango, New York, and stated that his wife, Cybell, was fifty-eight years old, and at the same time referred to the following children- Esther aged twenty-six years, Isaac aged sixteen years and Cybell aged fourteen years.

In 1837 he was living in the state of Ohio and made affidavit in Richland County, Ohio and stating at this time that his children resided in the state of Ohio. There are no further data as to family.
