On this ninth day of
September in the Year
of our Lord one thousand
Eight hundred and thirty three personally appeared
in Open Court before the Judge of the Inferior Court
of Common Pleas of said County now sitting Samuel
Johnston of said County residing in Springfield township
who being duly sworn according to law depose & testify
and make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress
passed June the seventh Eighteen hundred and
thirty two. That in the Year of our Lord one thousand
hundred and seventy six he deponent entered
as a private in the militia in the Revolutionary war
that he was in the Company of Captain James
Green. Lieutenant Elisha Chadwick in the township
of Shrewsbury and that said Quarters was at
Forton falls. It was in the month of September
he entered in the service and continued that
month and in the month of November of that
Year. Colonel Daniel Henderson Commanded the
Regiment to which deponent was attached. General
David Forman was the Brigadier - Deponent did
duty in those months at Sandy Hook and along
the Sea Coast. In the Year one thousand Seven
Hundred and seventy seven in the month of
April he did duty as a private under Captain
Abraham Wallley at the Widow Wests in Colts
Neck in Shrewsbury. was the place of Rendezvous
George Point was the Quarters Commanded by
Captain Wallley & continued duty at different places
on the sea coast for five months every other
month during that Year to wit. in April. June
August. October & December. that in the Year seven
hundred & eighty he did duty as a private in
Captain Michael Sweetmans Company in the
month of February of that Year. that he rendezvoused
at Colts Neck in Shrewsbury and did duty

that year for six months in the townships of
Middletown & Shrewsbury along the Inlets and
places where the Enemy was most likely
to make an attack upon the Americans
he continued doing duty that year in the
month of February. April. June. August October and
December. Hendrickson succeeded him as the Lieutenant
under Captain Sweetman. In the year seventeen
hundred and seventy nine deponent did duty
as a private under Captain Hendrickson
that he march from Minnworth Court House
with Capt. Snuck to Middletown in the month of
April of that year and from there he did
duty at Shrewsbury every other month of
year ~~to wit~~ for four months to wit in
April. June. August & October. That in
the month of ^{one thousand seven} ~~May~~ hundred and
Eighty he deponent did duty as a private
under Captain Thomas Chadwick in Shrewsbury
township along the Coast from Sandy Hook
to Cranberry Inlet. he commenced in the
month of May of that year and continued
doing duty every other month for three months
to wit May. July & September and in the
year seventeen hundred eighty one he
did duty two months under Captain John
Bennet Capt. he commenced in June and
did duty that month & in August at
Sandy Hook & other places on the Sea
Coast. This deponent at the time of Enlistment
resided in Shrewsbury in said County.
This deponent on oath testifies he is now
seventy three years of his age for which service
he this deponent claims a pension in Congress and has
sworn to & subscribed

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S.1032, it appears that Samuel Johnson was born in 1760, at Shrewsbury, Monmouth County, New Jersey.

While residing at said Shrewsbury, he enlisted and served as a private with the New Jersey Troops as follows:

In 1776, two months in Captain James Green's Company, Colonel Daniel Hendrickson's Regiment; in 1777, five months in Captain Abraham Wooley's Company; in 1778, six months in Captain Michael Sweetman's Company; in 1779, four months in Captain Hendrick Smock's Company; in 1780, three months in Captain Thomas Chadwick's Company; in the fall of 1780, one month in Captain James Green's Company; in 1781, two months in Captain Joshua Bennett's Company.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 9, 1833, at which time he was living in Howell

Township, Monmouth County, New Jersey.

It is not stated that soldier was ever married.
