The Library and Archives of Canada has recently added a database of people who applied for and received the status of naturalized Canadian from 1915-1951.

The database includes digitized images of the lists of names of people who applied for and obtained naturalized status between 1932-1951.

References located in the database can be used to request copies of the actual naturalization records, which are held by Citizenship and Immigration Canada.

### **Ancestry.com news**

Ancestry.com has recently announced that it has new images and an improved index to the U.S. 1910 federal census.

The updated index includes suggestions sent to Ancestry.com by users. If you had problems locating a relative in the 1910 census, now is the time to give it second try.

All the new images are currently up but the new index to images is being uploaded in two parts. The indexes for the following states is available now: Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, Texas. The indexes for the rest of the states will be available in 2011.
