

Isabella (Roberts) Franklin wife of William Lawson Franklin with 4 of their 8 children



The photograph on the front, taken in Pilot Point, Texas late 1880's, is that of Isabella (Roberts) Franklin (born 3 Feb 1841 Knoxville, Knox County, Tennessee; died 24 Jan 1901 Noble, Cleveland County, Oklahoma) daughter of John C. Roberts and Sarah Rutherford Roberts both of Tennessee.

Isabella married William Lawson Franklin (born about 1829; died 1887?) 10 Mar 1864 Knoxville, Knox County, Tennessee. William Lawson Franklin's father is believed to have come from Virginia. Six years after their marriage they are found on the 1870 White County, Arkansas census. By 1880 they are in Butler County, Missouri.

William Lawson Franklin probably died 1887-88. His widow Isabella was in 1900 Noble, Oklahoma Territory where she filed her homestead claim on 2 Dec 1891. She is recorded on the Cleveland County, Oklahoma Territory census in 1900 where she states only 5 of her 8 children are still living.

Also in the picture are 4 of her 8 children. Those pictured are daughters: Dorcas Jane Franklin (seated) born 1866; Louisa Franklin (standing) born 1865; sons: George Owen Franklin (standing) born 1874 and John Lawson Franklin (seated) born 1877.

Children not in picture: Robert Ferdinard Franklin born 1868, William A. Franklin born 1870, Mary Isabel Franklin born 1872 and Margery Franklin born 1875.

William Franklin (1480 - 1556)

William Franklyn (1480?-1556), Dean of Windsor, was born at Bledlow, Buckinghamshire, probably about 1480, and educated at Eton and King's College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.C.L. in 1504. He took orders, and in 1514 was appointed chancellor of the diocese of Durham and receiver of the bishop's revenues. In 1515 he became archdeacon of Durham and master of the hospital of St. Giles at Kepyer, Durham. In Feb 1815 he was installed prebendary of Heydour-cum-Walton in the diocese of Lincoln, and before 1522 he was rector of Houghton-le-Spring, Durham, and held the prebend of Eveston, in the collegiate church of Lanchester, in the same county.

As dean of Windsor he assisted at the christening of Edward VI and the funeral of Lady Jane Dudley, and his signature is affixed to the decree declaring the invalidity of the marriage of Henry VIII with Anne of Cleves.

Franklyn retired to Chalfont St. Giles, where he died in Jan 1855-56, and was buried in the church. His will met with disapproval, for a grant was made to one J. Glynne of so much as he could recover of goods, chattels, and money, devised by Franklyn for superstitious purposes.

Thomas Francklin (1721 - 1784)

Thomas Francklin (1721-1784), miscellaneous writer, son of Richard Francklin, bookseller near the Piazza in Covent Garden, London, who printed Pulteney's paper, "The Craftsman", was born in 1721 and admitted into Westminster School in 1735. In 1739 he was elected second from the school to Trinity College, Cambridge, where he was admitted on 21 Jun 1739, and took the degrees of B.A. in 1742, M.A. 1746, and D.D. in 1770. In 1745 he was elected to a minor fellowship, was promoted in the next year to be "Socius major", and resided in college until the end of 1758. On 27 Jun 1750 he was elected to the post of Greek professor at Cambridge. He resigned his professorship in 1759, and on 2 Jan of that year was instituted, on presentation of his college, to the vicarage of Ware in Hertfordshire, which he held in conjunction with the lecture-ship of St. Paul's Covent Garden and a proprietary chapel in Queen Street, London. He was appointed King's chaplain in November 1767, and was selected to preach the commencement sermon at St. Mary's Cambridge, on the installation of the Duke of Grafton as chancellor of the university in 1770. Through the favour of Archbishop Cornwallis he was appointed in 1777 to the rectory of Brasted in Kent, whereupon he vacated the living of Ware.

For the greater part of his life Francklin was compelled, by want of lucrative preferment, to write for the press and for the stage. His plays were more numerous than original, but two of them met, through the excellence of the acting, with considerable success. He brought out in 1757 a periodical paper of his own composition entitled "The Centinel", and he was one of the contributors to Smollett's "Critical Review."

Dr. Johnson and Sir Joshua Reynolds were among his friends, and through their influence he was exalted to the place of chaplain in the Royal Academy on its foundation, when he addressed the associates "in good old lyric commonplaces", and on Goldsmith's death in 1774 succeeded to the professorship of ancient history.

It has been generally assumed that he was the "Tho. Franklin" who signed the round-robin to Johnson on the Latin epitaph to Goldsmith; but Dr. Hill says, on account of the omission of the letter "c" in the name, and the difference in the handwriting from his acknowledged signature, "he certainly was not", but no other bearer of the name was sufficiently prominent among their friends to justify such a conspicuous honour.

After a laborious life Francklin died in Great Queen Street, London, 15 March 1784. He married on 20 Jan 1759 to Miss Venables, the daughter of a wine merchant; she died in Great Queen Street 24 May 1796. Francklin's plays are: *The Earl of Warwick, Matilda, The Contract, Mary Queen of Scots*, which was several

times announced but was never acted, and remained in manuscript until 1837, when it was edited by the author's eldest son, Lieutenant-Colonel William Francklin, once of the Hon. East India Company's service.

He died without leaving adequate provision for his family, and in 1785 there appeared for his widow's relief two volumes of "Sermons on Various Subjects", followed by a third in 1787.

William Franklin(1763 - 1839)

William Francklin (1763-1839) orientalist, born in 1763, was the eldest son of Thomas Francklin (1721-1784) by his wife Miss Venables. He was admitted on the foundation at Westminster in 1777, whence, he was elected to Trinity College, Cambridge, in 1781. Preferring to engage in the profession of arms, he was admitted a cadet in the service of the East India Company in 1782, appointed ensign of the 19th regiment of Bengal native infancy 21 Jan 1783, lieutenant 20 Oct 1789, captain in the army 7 June 1796, captain in his regiment 30 Sept 1803, major in the army 25 April 1808, major in his regiment 29 March 1810, lieutenant-colonel in the army 4 June 1814, and in his regiment on 16 Dec of the same year. On being invalidated, 1 Oct 1815, he was made regulating officer at Bhaugulpore. He retired in India in December 1815, and died 12 April 1839, aged 76.

A distinguished officer, Francklin also enjoyed considerable reputation as an oriental scholar. In 1786 he made a tour in Persia, in the course of which he resided for eight months as Shiraz as an inmate of a Persian family, and was thus enabled to communicate a fuller account of the manners of the people than had before appeared.

In 1837 he published his father's historical play, "Mary Queen of Scots." Francklin was a member, and during the later years of his life librarian and member of the council, of the Royal Asiatic Society. He was also member of the Calcutta Asiatic Society.

Jocosa or Joyce Franklin (1531 - 1587)

Jocosa or Joyce Frankland (1531-1587), philanthropist, the daughter of Robert Trappes, a citizen and gold-smith of London, by his wife Joan, was born in London in 1531. She married, first Henry Saxey, a "merchant venturer", and afterwards William (?) Frankland of Rye House, Hertfordshire, whom also she outlived. By her first husband she had an only son, William Saxey, a student of Gray's Inn, to whom she was greatly attached, and who died at Rye House 22 Aug 1581, aged 23.

Conjointly with him she had founded junior fellowships and scholarships at Caius and Emmanuel Colleges, Cambridge, and after his death and that of her second husband, who was perhaps unsympathetic, she determined to devoir her wealth to educational endowments, as the most congenial tribute to the memory of her son.

She left by her will dated 20 Feb 1586, both land and houses for the increase of the emoluments of the principal and fellows, and for the foundation of an additional fellowship, the holder of which was to be by preference a member of either the Trappes or Saxey families.

Richard Franklin (1630-1698)

Richard Frankland (1630-1698), nonconformist tutor, son of John Frankland, was born 1 Nov 1630, at Rathmell, a hamlet in the parish of Giggleswich, Yorkshire. The Franklands of Thirkleby, Yorkshire (baronets from 1660), with whom John Frankland was connected, were originally from Giggleswich (Surtees Society, Vol.xxxviii.) Frankland was educated (1640-1648) at Giggleswich grammar school, and was admitted on 18 May 1848 as minor pensionary at Christ's College, Cambridge. The tone of his college, under the mastership of Samuel Bolton, D.D., was that of a cultured puritanism. Frankland, like Oliver Heywood, received lasting impressions from the preaching of Samuel Hammond, lecturer (till 1652) at St. Giles'. He was a hard student, and took his degrees with distinction (B.A. 1651, M.A. 1655).

After graduating, Frankland preached for short periods at Hexham, Northumberland; Houghton-le-Spring, Durham; and Lanchester, Durham. At Lanchester he received presbyterian ordination on 14 Sep 1653. Discouragements led him to remove to a chaplaincy at Ellenthorp Hall, near Boroughbridge, West Riding, in the family of John Brook (died 1693), twice lord major of York and a strong presbyterian.

Frankland left Ellenthorp to become curate to Lupthern, rector of Sedgefield, Durham. Sir Arthur Haslerig put him into the rich vicarage of Bishop Auckland, Durham, some time before August 1659. Some post was designed for him in the college at Durham, for which Cromwell had issued a patent on 15 May 1657. His patron, Haslerig, was interested in the success of this college, which died at the Restoration.

At Bishop Auckland, where two of his children were born, Frankland confided himself to his parochial duties. After the Restoration he was one of the first to be attacked for nonconformism. His living was in the bishop's gift, but Cosin (consecrated 2 Dec 1660) did not interfere with a peaceable man. An attorney named Bowster demanded of him "publickly before the congregation" whether he intended to conform. Frankland thought it would be time to answer this question when the terms of conformity had been settled; and meanwhile relied on the king's declaration (25 Oct 1660) dispensing with conformity. Bowster, with a neighbouring clergyman, got possession of the keys and locked Frankland out of his church. He indicted them for riot, but the case was dismissed at the assizes for a technical flaw in the indictment. Cosin now offered to institute Frankland and give him higher preferment if he would receive episcopal ordination. He even proposed, but without result, to ordain him conditionally, and "so privately that the people might not know of it." By the act of 1661 Frankland was confirmed in the possession of his living; but the uniformity act of the following year ejected him.

In 1662 Frankland retired to his patrimony at Rathmell, where he lived some years in privacy. His children were baptized (1664-1668) at the parish church. Frankland's health begin to break in 1697, when he was troubled with gravel and died in the midst of scholars on 1 Oct 1698. He was buried on 5 Oct in Giggleswich Church, where his daughters placed an ornate mural tablet in his memory.

He married Elizabeth Sanderson of Hedley Hope, in the parish of Brancepeth, Durham (buried 5 Jan 1691), and had at least two sons and three daughters:

- 1. John Frankland born 13 Aug 1659, entered the academy 5 May 1678, died June 1679, "the strongest man of his age in and about Natland".
- 2. Richard Frankland baptized 8 Jun 1668, entered the academy 13 Apr 1680, died of the small-pox and was buried at Sheffield 4 May 1689.
- 3. Barbary Frankland born 16 April 1661 and buried 5 Aug 1662.
- 4. Elizabeth Frankland baptized 25 Aug 1664 (this is the "Mrs. Frankland" mentioned by Oliver Heywood as collecting materials for a memoir of her father).
- 5. Margaret Frankland married 19 Jun 1701 to Samuel Smith (died 1732) of York.

The first real biography of Frankland was published in the Christian Reformer, 1862, pp 1sq., 80 sq., by the editor, Robert Brook Aspland.

Thomas Frankland (1633 - 1690)

Thomas Frankland (1633-1690), impostor and annalist, was born in Lancashire in 1633. He was entered in May 1649 at Brasenose College, Oxford, and became a fellow in 1654. He proceeded to the M.A. degree on 28 Jun 1655, and in 1662 was proctor of the university. He took orders after his grace had been three times refused, but renounced them in order to practice medicine. He settled in London and passed as M.D., alleging when asked for particulars by members of either university that he had taken his degree at the other. He applied for admission to the Royal College of Physicians, producing a certificate to attest that the M.D. degree had been conferred on him at Oxford, 10 Oct 1667. He was admitted a candidate of the college in December 1671, and on 29 July 1675 became a fellow. At a general election he was appointed junior censor of the college. His overbearing conduct in this office made him much disliked, especially by the juniors, some of whom caused a search to be made in the registers of Oxford University. The officers of the univer-

sity certified by an instrument dated 15 Nov 1677 that no record of his degree could be found. Frankland showed that he held the Cambridge M.D. degree, but it was proved that this had been obtained merely on the strength of his pretended Oxford degree, he having been admitted at Cambridge on 28 Feb 1676 "to the same degree" as he held from Oxford. Other charges of receiving bribes for shielding empiric were brought against him. He was disqualified for membership of the College of Physicians, but his formal ejectment does not appear to have taken place before 26 Jun 1682, Wood says by the connivance of the senior members.

Compelled to abandon medicine, Frankland had turned his undeniable talents to historical study, and in 1681 published anonymously "The Annals of King James I and King Charles I", a folio volume of 913 pages besides preface and index.

According to Wood, Frankland forges a will as well as his doctor's certificate. His name occurs as the recipient of 800£ prison, where he died in 1690, and was buried in the church of St. Vedast, Foster Lane.

Sir Thomas Frankland (1717 - 1784)

Sir Thomas Frankland (1717?-1784), admiral, was the second son of Henry Frankland (died in Bengal 1738), a nephew of Sir Thomas Frankland, bart., for many years (1733-42) one of the lords of the admiralty, a younger brother of Sir Charles Henry Frankland, some time consul-general in Portugal, whose story forms the groundwork of Dr. O.W. Holmes's ballad of "Agnes", and is told in more accurate detail in "Sir C.H. Frankland, or Boston in the Colonial Times", by Elias Nason, and a direct descendant of Oliver Cromwell, being the great-grandson of his daughter Frances. He is described on his passing certificate, 3 Nov 1737, as being upwards of twenty years of age, and as having been at sea for six years and eleven days. After serving as a lieutenant of the Chatham, with Captain Philip Vanbrugh, and of the Cumberland, with Captain James Steuart, both on the home station, he was promoted, in July 1740, to the command of the Rose frigate, and was sent out to the Bahamas, on which station, including the coast of Florida and Carolina, he remained till the summer of 1745. During this time he captured several of the enemy's vessels, privateers and guardacostas, including one, in June 1742, commanded by Juan de Leon Fandino.

In October 1746 Frankland was appointed to the Dragon of 60 guns, which he commanded on the Leeward Islands station till the peace. In 1755 he was again sent out to the West Indies, as commodore at Antigua, with his broad pennant in the Sinchester. His arrival on his station was marked by a disagreement with his predecessor, Commodore Pye, who, being junior to Frankland, had committed the mistake of keeping his broad pennant flying in Frankland's presence, and was "excessively angry" that Frankland would not allow it. He had also, in Frankland's opinion, been guilty, during the time of his command of several gross irregularities, which Frankland officially reported, and which, on Pye's return to England was inquired into by a court-martial. Frankland returned to England in October and had no further employment at sea, though rising in due course to the ranks of vice-admiral and admiral.

In 1768, on the death of his elder brother, Sir Charles Henry, he succeeded to the baronetcy. In 1749 he had been elected as member of parliament for Thirsk, which he continued to represent, not taking any active part in politics, but speaking occasionally, and very much to the point, on naval matters; as, for instance, on the iniquities which pervaded the system of government contracts, 11 March 1779, and on the navy estimates, 17 June 1784.

He died shortly after this last effort, on 21 Nov. He married in May 1743, Sarah, daughter of Judge Rhett of South Carolina, by whom he had a large family.

Sir John Franklin (1786 - 1847)

Sir John Franklin (1786-1847), Arctic explorer, the twelfth and youngest son of Willingham Franklin of Spilsby in Lincolnshire, was born 16 April 1786. It had been intended to bring him up for the church, but a holiday visit to the seashore excited a strong desire to go to sea, which his father vainly endeavoured to overcome by sending him for a voyage in a merchant vessel as far as Lisbon. On his return he entered the royal navy on board the Polyphemus, then just sailing for the Baltic, where he played a leading part in the battle

of Copenhagen. Two months later Franklin was appointed as a midshipman to the Investigator, under the command of his cousin, Matthew Flinders, and on the point of sailing for Australia. While in the Investigator Franklin distinguished himself by his remarkable aptitude for nautical and astronomical observations; he was employed at Sydney as assistant in a little observatory which Flinders established, and won the notices of Captain King, the governor, who used to address him familiarly as Mr. Tyco Brahe. With Franklin's appointment in January 1818 to command the hired brig Trent, fitting out to accompany Captain Buchan in the Dorothea, Franklin's career as an Arctic explorer commenced.

In August 1823 he married Miss Porden. After her death he married 5 Nov 1828 to Miss Griffin. He died 11 Jun 1847. Franklin left but one child, the daughter of his first wife. She married in 1849 the Rev. John Philip Gell, the head of an old Derbyshire family, who, as a young man, had been elected by Dr. Arnold's advide to be principal of the college in Hobart Town, and was long rector of Buxted in Sussex. Mrs. Gell died in 1860, leaving several children.

Eleanor Anne Franklin (1797 - 1825)

Eleanor Anne Franklin (1797?-1825) poetess, first wife of John (afterwards Sir John) Franklin, was daughter of William Porden, an architect of some eminence, and one of a line of architects. She early developed a taste for poetry and art, and while still a girl published "The Veils, or the Trumph of Constancy, a poem in 6 Books". A short poem on the Arctic expedition, and a visit to the Trent, then just come home, brought her the acquaintance of John Franklin. The acquaintance was renewed on Franklin's return from his first journey through Arctic America, and on 19 Aug 1823 she became his wife. On her marriage there was, we are told, a distinct understanding that she would "never, under any circumstances, seek to turn her husband aside from the duty he owed to his country and his profession", a promise that she held ever to the death. On 3 Jun 1824 she gave birth to a daughter; she seems never to have recovered her health, fell into a decline, and died on 22 Feb 1825, six days after her husband had left England on his second journey through North America.

Mrs. Franklin's poetry obtained in its day a certain social success, but it has none of the elements of vitality, and is now quite forgotten.

Lady Jane Franklin (1792 - 1875)

Lady Jane Franklin (1792-1875), second wife of Sir John Franklin, whom she married 5 Nov 1828, was one of three daughters of John Griffin of Bedford Place. Before her marriage she was in the habit of accompanying her father in his frequent journeys both in England and on the continent. Shortly after her marriage Franklin was appointed to the command of a frigate in the Mediterranean, and during the time she travelled in Syria, Asia Minor, and other parts adjacent, joining her husband as opportunity offered. She afterwards accompanied him to Van Diemen's Land, and appears to have travelled not only over the whole of that island, but also in Australia and New Zealand. But she also devoted herself very earnestly to the improvement of the condition of the female convicts, on which, as well as on measures for the good of the honest labouring population, she is said to have expended very considerable sums.

When apprehensions as to the safety of Sir John Franklin began to be felt, she was naturally one of the first to take alarm, and as early as 1848 stimulated the search both by personal influence and by the offer of a reward of 2, 000£. Between 1850 and 1857 she fitted out, mainly if not entirely at her own expense, no less than five ships for the search; the last of these, the Fox, being the one that succeeded in bringing back the story of the lost expedition.

Her very last work was the completion of a monument to her husband's memory in Westminster Abbey. She wished to compose his epitaph, but thoughts and words would not flow in unison, and the task was completed by Lord Tennyson, Franklin's nephew by marriage. It was unveiled a fortnight after her death, and a note added by Dean Stanley tells that it was "erected by his widow, who after long waiting and sending many in search of him, herself departed to seek and to find him in the realms of light, 18 July 1875, aged 83

Robert Franklin (1630 - 1684)

Robert Franklin (1630-1684), nonconformist devine, was born in London 16 Jul 1630. In his ninth year he went into Suffolk to live with an aunt, and in due course was sent to Woodbridge school. Here as he confessed, he was too fond of sports, violent in temper, and prone to lying. He was specially trained in writing and accounts with a view to his being apprenticed in London, but his ability led to his being sent to Cambridge, where he was admitted to Jesus College where he became a preacher. Franklin found that he was unable to subsist in comfort on his living, which only produced 50£ a year, and set up a school, which proved to be educationally successful, but a commercial failure. Franklin died in 1684.

He left a manuscript entitled *Memorable Occurrences of my Life*, which is the principal source for the facts of his career. Franklin was married.

Benjamin and Mahala Franklin

The Ben Franklin listed in the 1820 Chester County, South Carolina Census is possibly the father of our known Ben Franklin below as it shows him as possibly being a widower age 35-45, with five children spread from a minimum range of 11-21, or a maximum of 1-26. There is also a Gillis and John Franklin that are possible, but not as likely. Estimates are that this Ben Franklin was born about 1769 assuming he was about 30 years old at the time of his son Benjamin's birth.

I. Benjamin Franklin (born about 1799 South Carolina - according to the 1850 Ohio census; died about 1854 Ohio) married about 1828 (probably in Mississippi as she was from there and their oldest child was born there) to Mahala (?) (born about 1807 Mississippi (per 1850 Ohio Census); died after 1860. He is listed on the 1830 and 1840 Clinton County, Ohio Census. Per the 1850 Census in Washington Township, Clinton County, Ohio, he was a farmer worth \$1950.00.

According to some notes left by a descendant Mahala may have descended from Jones County, Mississippi southern aristocrats (possibly named ?Qualisand) or maybe Webster (her grandson Byron's middle name, possibly a tribute to Daniel Webster). There is a Jones County, Mississippi about 50 miles southeast of Jackson. Their son Santarelli lists his mother's birthplace as Alabama in the 1880 census, which, since he identified his own concurrently as Mississippi, there may have been a family history of them moving from Alabama to Mississippi. They lived in Mississippi in 1829 when their son Santarelli was born per the 1850 census.

By the 1830 census, Benjamin and his family had moved to Clark Township, Clinton County, Ohio. In 1832 he purchased from D. John, 70 acres in Clinton County. As of the 1840 census they lived in Washington Township, Clinton County, Ohio. In the 1850 census he was worth \$1750 or 70 1/2 acres. They had two children, possibly three as a 0-5 year old female appears in the 1840 census but does not appear in the 1850 census. Benjamin had died in Clinton County by 1854 when his will was executed. He left half of his land to each child after his wife's death. Mahala was living with her son-in-law and daughter in the 1860 Clinton County census, when she was worth \$2800 in real estate and \$150 in personal property. According to the 1850 census both Benjamin and Mahala were illiterate.

Their children:

1. Santarelli Sydenham Galitzin Franklin (born Feb 1829 Mississippi; died 5 Apr 1912 Washington, Rhea County, Tennessee) married 1853 to Artemicia Fugate (born 1827 Ohio; died 22 Nov 1909 Washington, Rhea County, Tennessee) daughter of Thomas Fugate and Mary Wickerham Fugate. According to family history, the Galitzin in his name was for Prince Galitzin of Russia or Poland, whom a friend of "the Benjamin Franklin" taught music too.

Sydenham was a member of the House of Lords in England, and Santarelli was an Italian Count. All of these were acquaintances of Dr. Benjamin Franklin while he was serving as Ambassador to France.

In 1853 Santarelli married Artemecia (he referred to her as Artamecy) Fugate. I don't know where they married as I haven't come across a marriage record. They had three children.

In 1860 he purchased one quarter of an acre in Clinton County, Ohio from J. Turner and 35 acres from his brother-in-law Henry Moore.

In 1866 he sold the 35 acres to C. M. Hunter and purchased another 35 acres from his brother-in-law Henry Moore.

In 1867 he purchased another quarter acre from J. Turner.

In 1873 he sold a quarter acre to T. Ballard.

In 1898 their children, Byron and Mary sold 35 acres to D.C. Bond which was probably the 35 acres that Santarelli owned.

The family appears in the 1870 census in Blanchester, Marion Township, Clinton County, Ohio. Santarelli was a laborer worth \$800 and appeared as Samuel in the census.

Sometime after 1870 they moved to Randolph County, Indiana. According to a descendant FFRU Volume 11 - Page 31 (2nd Edition)

Santarelli owned a building in Evansville, Indiana (where his son Byron supposedly went to school, maybe that Evansville was Evensville, Tennessee, a town in Rhea County) which he sold when he moved near the town of Washington, Rhea County, Tennessee. Most of the people that moved to Rhea County during those times moved there after the railroad from Cincinnati opened and they grew fruit and strawberries which were shipped to northern markets.

As of the 1880 census they were living in Civil District #6 in Rhea.

In 1883 they first bought 70 acres from R. W. Colville for \$750, later that same year they bought three lots from the Presbyterian Church.

In 1906 an additional three lots were acquired from John Price by Artemecia. At some point he acquired two additional blocks of land. In 1906 their son Byron sold his interest in two of the blocks to his sister Mary. Another deed indicated that he somehow represented the interest of the local Presbyterian Church.

Artemecia passed away in Rhea County on 22 Nov 1909 at the age of 82. He passed away in Rhea County on 25 April 1912 at the age of 83.

The Rhea County Poor-House Board members entered in the county records an official tribute to him, in regard to his service for twenty years as a secretary to the board. It refers to his intellect and his dedication to the county. He left his estate equally to his two surviving children. His daughter Mary sold her remaining interest in the property in 1920 to Charles D. Smith.

Their Children:

- (1) Mary Della Franklin (born about 1854; died after 1910) married Lawson Moon and lived in Colorado (as of 1905), Clinton County, Ohio (as of 1912), and Randolph County, Indiana (as of 1920). They had one son Charlie who lived in Canton, Ohio.
- (2) Byron B. The Franklin Chronicles

Submitted by Philip J. Franklin, 2129 Hartford Ave., St Paul, MN 55116

Philip writes: I enclose a family history as far as I have been able to put things together. The evidence from Joseph Franklin forward is rock solid. The data prior to Joseph is based upon deduction, but is the best I can do so far. Hiring a researcher in Virginia I found to be very expensive.

The Franklin, Phillips, Anderson, Davis And Browder families intermarried a good deal.

My Great Grandfather, James F. Franklin, served in the Civil War from Shiloh to the surrender of General Forrest. His highest rank was colonel of cavalry. Immediately after the war, he left Tennessee with his wife, Liza Anderson Franklin, and where he went has been a mystery. James evidently did not live long. You can imagine my great surprise when I discovered the Eliza had married an English immigrant in 1875 at Hull, Iowa. That part of Iowa is almost entirely Dutch, to this day. How she got there is a real puzzle.

I find it interesting that, up through the Civil War, Franklins of my line married ex-Virginians exclusively.

I also enclose a listing of the marriages of the children of Josiah Franklin. In the will of Josiah he refers to his son William Franklin as "of Arkansas." I do wish I could encounter descendants of William, to see if they have further knowledge, primarily where and when my Great Grandfather died.

I have several listings of Halifax County marriages, and I will try to look up entries for anyone having a need.

I am delighted that there is a Franklin Family Researchers, and I hope that I might be able to eventually contribute something worthwhile.

Early Days

It appears from old records, that the Franklins were among the earliest English settlers in the New World. Several Franklins settled in the New England colonies. A William Franklin and a Josiah Franklin, for example, settled in Massachusetts, William as early as 1634. Josiah Franklin settled in Boston about 1683, and one of his sons was the renowned Benjamin Franklin.

Throughout the early colonies, the name was variously spelled Franklin, Franklyn, and Francklin. Eventually, the accepted spelling was Franklin.

Early Days In The South

Francis Francklin came to Virginia in the ship Revenge in 1634; Henry Franklin came over in 1636; George Francklin came to Charles City County, Virginia in 1637; John Franklin came to Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, in 1651; William Franklin came to James City County, Virginia, in 1655; Isaac Franklin settled in Virginia about 1656.

A progression Westward from either Lower Norfolk County or James City County would bring a settler to Henrico or Chesterfield Counties. Thus, there is great likelihood that the ancestor of Thomas Franklin was either George Franklin of Charles City County, or William Franklin of James City County.

23rd day of July 1853. Certificate of marriage was filed 27 Aug 1853 by O. K. Weakly; marriage performed by John F. Lanten-Schleger, Minister of the Gospel.

On 09 Jan 1855 Emily Jane Franklin married James Roach/Roark both of lawful age and residents of the County of Tippecanoe, state of Indiana, witness O. K. Weakly, County Clerk in office in Lafayette on 6 Jan 1855. Marriage performed by Thompson W. Graham, JP.

On 06 dec 1857 Malinda Jane Franklin married James W. Spencer.

On 04 Jul 1852 Rhoda Jane Franklin married James Shigley.

Can anyone help me prove that these three were sisters, or that they had American Indian parents? My ancestor Elijah Moore married an Indian girl about that time, at about that place. (Raymond E. Moore, PO Box 4376, Yalesville Station, Wallingford, CT 06492-7563).

Help! Need information on family of Edward Franklin that was in Orange County Virginia in 1790. Three of his children married children of Job Breeding. Have no proven record after marriage dates. 

Elizabeth Franklin, wife of Daniel Stout, born in Kentucky in 1803 died 1873 in Walker County, Georgia. She married 10 Mar 1826 or 9 Dec 1829 McMinn County, Tennessee. She is most certainly the daughter of Easom Franklin who lived next door to Daniel and Elizabeth in 1830 McMinn County, Tennessee. Adding to the creditability of this is the fact that she named her third son John Esom Stout. She is supposedly a descendant of Benjamin Franklin through William Temple Franklin. Sources also say she was a granddaughter of Cherokee Chief Gordon Greene.

Esom Franklin, quite likely the Easom or Isham Franklin found next door to Daniel Stout and his wife Elizabeth Franklin Stout in 1830 McMinn County, Tennessee. An Easom Frankland married Rebecca Major on 17 Jul 1797 in Blount County, Tennessee and later married in Blount County, Tennessee on 3 Feb 1802 to a Lucy (Lavina) Forrester who was born 1783 in Virginia according to 1850 Perry County, Illinois Census. This Esom was born 26 Oct 1772 and died

17 May 1848 in Perry County, Illinois and is buried at McAlvin cemetery in Duquion, Illinois. Also in Blount County, Tennessee a John Frankland married Polly Irwin in 1799 and a George Frankland married a Jenny Shaw in 1802. These are likely brothers. Apparent children of Easom and Lucy are John Franklin born 1809 Tennessee; died 5 Apr 1866 Illinois married Permelia Butram; William Franklin born 1811 Tennessee; died 4 Mar 1861 Illinois married Margaret Galligher; Esom Franklin born 1817 Tennessee married Susan Collier; Edward Franklin born 1819 in Tennessee married Margaret C. Blackburn; George Franklin born 15 Nov 1826 Tennessee and died 31 Dec 1880 married Ann.
