Temporarily located at 112 Parker Street in the Industrial Park during renovations The Hamilton Room houses the "Special Collection" over 4,000 items collected for over 130 years. Each item is by local authors or has to do with local history and genealogy. The collection is comprised of book, broadsides, local family genealogies, maps, pamphlets, photos, and sermons. Because this room is staffed by volunteers the hours are subject to change. Call a day or two in advance to ensure they will be open.

The Phillips Library is one of New England's most important and historic research libraries and safeguards several documents related to the Little family. It is a major resource for persons interested in genealogy and New England history. Among its most important holdings are all the Essex County court records from 1636 to 1820, including the court records from the 1692 witchcraft trials. More than a linear mile of manuscript materials include journals, diaries, account books, farm business records and correspondence, a vast collection of old newspapers printed in Essex County, as well as business and personal records of many historic figures. Open to the public (paid admission) Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday from 10 to 5, Thursday from 1 to 8.
