Monument to First Settlers on the Lower Green

On the Lower Green can be found a bronze sculpture representing *Mary and John* at full sail on the top of a granite pillar commemorating the landing and initial community of the first settlers of Newbury. George Little's name can be found on the bronze tablet. This First Settlers' Monument was dedicated by the Sons and Daughters of the First Settlers of Newbury in August, 1935, in celebration of this 300th anniversary.

Also on the Lower Green is a one-room, two-door schoolhouse from the nineteenth century.

Further down along the same side of Route 1A, about 0.3 miles, is the Burying Ground of the First Settlers. The Sons and Daughters of the First Settlers of Newbury are dedicated to bringing about the restoration of this old burying ground. This organization was founded 5 July 1927 by Ann Coleman Moody and is a lineage society. Anyone descended from one of the over 300 first settler ancestors of Newbury is eligible to join. Many of our GLFA members are also members of this worthwhile organization. The Sons and Daughters of the First Settlers of Newbury will be holding their annual meeting on 19 August 2000. They will join with the Morse Family Society to place a marker at the site of the home of Elizabeth Morse, the Newburyport witch.
