NAMESAKES

You possibly know the tradition used long ago in naming children. If only this pattern had always been followed, we would have a much easier time solving our problems. In one of my lines, two brothers used the pattern explicitly, and a third seemed to ignore it; however, it is quite worth checking out.

1st Son - Named for the father's father
2nd Son - For the mother's father
3rd Son - For the father
4th Son - For the father's eldest brother
5th Son - For the mother's eldest brother
6th Son - For the father's second eldest brother
7th Son - For the mother's second eldest brother, etc.

1st Daughter - Named for the mother's mother
2nd Daughter - For the father's mother
3rd Daughter - For the mother
4th Daughter - For the mother's eldest sister
5th Daughter - For the father's eldest sister
6th Daughter - For the mother's second eldest sister
7th Daughter - For the father's second eldest sister, etc. - ED.

Henry Hawkins of Shenandoah County Virginia has a great, great, great, granddaughter, Katherine Ann Hawkins who wrote the following information:

"Henry Hawkins was b. in 1765 in England. He originally came to this country with a man named Pennywit around 1799 to do some fur trapping and trading with the permission of France in what is now the states of Oklahoma and Arkansas. They returned to England in 1802. Henry and his family returned to this country in 1808 and settled in the above mentioned county.

Phillip Hawkins was b. in 1798 in England and mar. Elizabeth Pennywit. He died in 1870 in Van Buren, Arkansas. Phillip returned the family to Arkansas. His wife and her brother Charles were cousins to the man who had come to this country with Phillip's father. Charles and Phillip built the first paddlewheeler type boat for that area. When the Indians I know as the Five Civilized Tribes were moved from the south east in the late 1820s and into the 1830s to Oklahoma, Phillip was in on the last leg of the move. He also saw Lincoln sworn in as president. At the time of the American Civil War also known as the War Between the States, he owned a 2,000,000. dollar farm. At the end of the war he owed nothing on it. At that time he also owned slaves.

Harry Wallace Hawkins was b. July 12, 1855 in VanBuren Arkansas. He mar. Josephine Lemley on April 15, 1884. He died on Jan. 12, 1903 and is buried in the Family Cemetery in Oak Grove Arkansas. Harry and Josephine had 3 children: Roy, James E. and Henryetta. Like his father he had many irons in the fire. Besides being a farmer he also owned a saw mill and a cotton gin. While operating the cotton gin he got caught in the line and was badly injured. He had many broken ribs as well as his left knee being crushed. He had several operations on it of which took place in St. Louis, MO. But the medical profession wasn't as good then as it is now. Great grandmother Jo remarried in 1910 to a Myron Richard West and they had one daughter Thelma Marie who was b. in March, 1913.

Roy Hawkins was b. June 28, 1889 in Van Buren Arkansas. He mar. Lucille Sangster on Dec. 15, 1906. He died May 26, 1924 in Van Buren, Ark. and is buried in the Gill Cemetery in Van Buren.

G.P. Hawkins father, b. Sept 16, 1914 in Fort Smith Arkansas. He mar. Katherine Lake on Aug. 20, 1940. He died in Muskogee Oklahoma on Aug. 7, 1976 in Muskogee and is buried there at the Memorial Park Cemetery.

James E. Hawkins, Great Uncle was b. May 1, 1895 in Van Buren, Ark. He mar. Reba Weaver. He died at Quitman, Arkansas sometime between 1973 and 1975.

Henrietta Hawkins Great Aunt, b. Oct. 14, 1902 in Van Buren Ark. She mar. Pate Bridges and Clarence Gardner. I have heard her called Henry even though I never met her. She is my grandfather's sister and even though there is 13 years and another child between them they could pass for twins.

In the obituary on my great grandmother Jo it says that she was survived by two daughters and a son. At that time 1938 my father was already dead. Great grandmother Jo was living with one daughter at that time and the other daughter Mrs. Clarence Gardner was living in Elwood, Indiana. "

John G. Hawkins, son of Roy Hawkins was b. Nov. 24, 1941 in Pryor, OK and was raised in Muskogee. He mar. Nancy Edwards and is now divorced from her. He mar. Katharine Ann Carsy on Jan. 21, 1967 in De Kalb, IL and they have a dau. Stacy Leigh, b. Oct. 28, 1970.

John is now a Puma County, Arizona Superior Court Judge and Presiding Criminal Judge.

Katherine Ann Hawkins was b. Oct. 29, 1947 in Muskogee. She mar. Dec. 14,

Mrs. Barbara Rettke¹ sent additional names and pictures of the descendants of Philip Hawkins. See pg.40 for the beginning of this story. Included too, is a family history written by Warner Hawkins. It was written when typewriters and ribbons didn't produce work which copied well. There are a few typing errors but his signature and story is much more important. Mrs. Rettke's information is well documented.

Thomas Jefferson Hawkins was the son of Philip Hawkins and Elizabeth Martin. Thomas Jefferson and Virginia A. Allen had a dau. Cloris²Elsie who mar. William Schoolcraft and they had seven children: Margaret, William, Virginia, Robert A., Genevieve, Frances and Thomas.

Otto, son of Thomas Jefferson Hawkins mar. Lora Hawkins³ and they were parents of: Bert, Ruth, Georgia and Russell who died quite young.

Zelia Lane, dau. of Thomas Jefferson Hawkins mar. Arthur McKinney and their children were: Mary, William Thomas, Gusta and Sylvia. Gusta died in young womanhood.

Roland Van, Son of Thomas Jefferson mar. Winnie⁴Humbarger and had one son, Leohn b. Aug. 11, 1899 and mar. Pearl Walk on June 28, 1924. They have a son Philip b. Sept. 14, 1931 and a dau. Harriett Ann B. Sept. 21, 1943.

Lida, dau. of Thomas Jefferson mar. #1. Verdie Wright and #2. Don G.Baird. She had no children.

William Hawkins, son of Philip Hawkins and Elizabeth Martin mar. Vertill-us (Tillie) Brown and had Theodore, who mar. Rachel Allen. Theodore b. 1858, d. in 1910. He mar. Rachel on Dec. 4, 1881 and their dau. was Myrtle Zuma or Zurma was b. Jan. 30. 1885. Myrtle mar. Wm. B. Curless. Their son was Burnell Curless. Rachel Allen's parents were J.V. Allen and Hannah Ried. She was b. in Indiana one mile south of Jerome, on Aug. 12, 1860. She d. Oct. 26, 1921.

William Hawkins' son Cameron was b. in 1864 and mar. Ida Downey on Mar. 28, 1885. They had no children.

Allie Hawkins was the child of William.

Louisa J. Hawkins, dau of William mar. John Knotte on July 4, 1874. She was b. ca 1856 and d. in Howard Indiana on Aug. 18, 1875. From the tombstone at Jerome Cemetery on the same marker with Louisa and John is this inscription: "Louernist A; son of J.A. and L.J. Knotte: d. Aug. 31, 1875 aged 3 mo. and 29 ds."

Philip and Elizabeth's son Samuel mar. Teressa (Turcia) Hatfield. Their children were Clint, Ella and Cleo. Clinton mar. Lora Hawkins, widow of Otto Hawkins and they had May b. Nov. 23, 1908 and a son B. Mar.5, 1902. Another son was b. Aug. 1, 1904.

Green Town News

GREENTOWN.

Thomas J. Hawkins, son of Philip and Elizabeth Hawkins was born in Green county, Ohio, June 1, 1841. He was one of a family of two sisters and seven brothers. His father moved from Ohio and settled on 160 acres of land entered by him in Union township, Howard county, Indiana. In the year 1846, and lived there until his death. Thomas lived on the farm and helped to clear it up until the Rebellion broke out in 1861, then he enlisted on the 10th day of September 1861, in Company K, 34th regiment, Indiana volunteers and served until the 27th day of September, 1864, serving three years and seventeen days. During this period he was severely wounded in the battle of Champion Hills, Miss., where one half of the company was wounded. After the expiration of his enlistment, he went into the harness business for some time. In the year of 1845, April 2, he and Mary M. Brown were married; to this union was born one son, Warner Hawkins, who is living in Nebraska. On March 12, 1858, he was married to Virginia A. Allen and to this union was born seven children, Otto, Zella, J. Roland V., Bryant, Lida, Clara and George O., all of whom are living except Otto who died December 19, 1898. After working at the harness business about two years he went to farming and engaged in farming until the fall of 1894, when he moved to Greentown and went into the real estate and insurance business. In September, 1906, Virginia, his wife, de-

parted this life. In the year 1908 he joined the Friends church at Greentown. He and Mrs. Alwilda Carr were married November 12, 1907, she remains to mourn his loss. These years of affliction had endeared each to the other. Though his was a daily struggle for life, yet the thoughtfulness, hours of wakefulness and loving ministrations required only enlarged the sad vacancy his departure created. Early on the morning of June 26, 1914 all that was immortal of Thomas Hawkins left the mortal for eternal habitation. Slowly and lovingly life receded, not perceptible to the eyes of friends, but suddenly the muffled beat of the heart ceased and days of weariness were done forever. Most of this obituary was written by Thomas Hawkins. The years and feebleness came upon him, all his close family ties had been so broken that he felt it necessary to write his obituary to the paper. He could not be completed after his hand had ceased and mortal life slipped away. Later, and more relevant facts will now be added. Thomas Hawkins and wife found it most convenient for them in these later years to transfer their church relationship to the church of the Disciples in Greentown. Here they worshiped as health made it possible. Thomas Hawkins was a true Christian. He was of fine gentle mould of strength and expression. Boundless good will to all men was a chief characteristic of his life. A true man went home to God.

The funeral of Thomas Hawkins will occur from the Meridian Street Christian church Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. J. H. Baird, pastor of the church will have charge of the services. Interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The immediate cause of her dissolution was Pneumonia, which was more than a match to her already fragile form.

Like all true mothers she was in love with life for her family's sake, hoping, that the hand of the fell destroyer might be stayed that she might linger still a little longer, but it could not be, which she herself recognized and began to look at the crossing as being near. With almost dying breath the expression "Blessed be the name of Jesus" fell from her lips again and again, and as the vision began to dim, "I am going to heaven," she said, with firm purpose of heart. Oh! the way is so bright, I can see the bright and shining Jewels, thus through a halo of celestial light she had a foretaste of her beautiful home.

Then she asked those who surrounded her dying bed to sing. With streaming eyes and breaking hearts, her children sang that ever comforting hymn, "Near-er My God to Thee," then bidding adieu to the weeping and almost broken hearts of family. She talked to God as a friend.

She passed into the beyond December 10, 1900.

THE LAST CALL

Mrs. Virginia A. Hawkins died, Sunday, of Pneumonia, at the age of 51. She had been afflicted with Asthma for about 30 years, and the angel of death called after an illness of two weeks.

She is survived by her husband T. J. Hawkins, three daughters, Mrs. Lida Baird, of Bairdstown, O. Mrs. Zela McKiney, of Tipton, and Mrs. Flora Schoolcraft, of this place, and two sons, Warren, of Nebraska and George, of this place and two sisters, Mrs. Walter Templin, of Kokomo and Mrs. Marshal Ball, of Swayzee.

The funeral was held Wednesday, from the Christian church, conducted by Rev. J. H. Ennis. Interment took place in the I. O. O. E. cemetery.

Virginia A. Allen Hawkins, daughter of Vanmeter and Zela J. Allen, was born in Brown County, Ohio, October 8, 1849. She died September 24, 1900, aged 51 years, 11 months and 9 days.

She was married to Thomas J. Hawkins, March 12, 1868. To this union were born seven children, 4 sons and 3 daughters, all of whom together with the husband survive, save Otto, who passed into the beyond December 10, 1900.

The deceased has been a continuous resident of Howard County since a child one year old consequently she is all our own. Her life to eastern Howard is a lesson book to us all. SUBJECT: Distribution of slaves belonging to Benjamin Hawkins.

TERM OF COURT OF MERCER CO., KY
28th day of June, 1811.

Andrew Hawkins, for the consideration of nine hundred dollars to us the heirs aforesaid in hand paid to the said Andrew Hawkins to have the said tract or parcel of land be the same more or less with it's appertinements to the only proper use of said Andrew, his heirs or assigns forever from all and every claim or claims from us or under either of us our heirs.

Is forever in testimony here of we the heirs aforesaid have set our hand and seals this 28th day of June 1811.

We, the heirs of the aforesaid deceased Benjamin Hawkins do also relinquish all our right, title, claim or interest to the slaves now in possession of Andrew Hawkins, the administrator and the said deceased for the consideration of two thousand dollars to us the heirs in hand paid reserving to ourselves the slaves now in our possession.

NAMELY: Abraham Hawkins, Samuel McCoun to Reuben Boston, Rachel and Polly to William Barnes, Olivar Puesk to Elizabeth Barnes, Jude to John Hawkins and Dick to Pressley White.

We, the heir aforesaid by these present do relinquish our right to the slaves aforesaid in the possession of the aforesaid Andrew, from all and every claim from us or under us our heirs or assignees forever.

The said Andrew Hawkins doth hereby relinquish all his right to title and claim to the slaves now in possession of the heirs aforesaid from himself, his heirs and forever in testimony hereof under him set our hand and seal, the day and year above written.

The heirs aforesaid do also relinquish to each, all above names to continue to the only use of _____ the said slaves now is to continue their property, any claim whatever from us our heirs forever in testimony here _____ have let our hands and seals aforesaid this day and year above written.

Isaac RUCKER
of Amherst County, Virginia

Isaac RUCKER was the son of John RUCKER who died in Orange County, VA in 1742. His mother was Susannah (?COGHILL?). No date of birth has been established.

Isaac married Mildred HAWKINS PLUNKETT, daughter of Benjamin and Sarah WILLIS HAWKINS and the widow of John PLUNKETT*. No birth date has been established.

Note: the compiler does not believe that the Jr. and Sr. notation found in the deeds and the marriage reference necessarily refers to a parental relationship. The RUCKER family tended to repeat names frequently and the notation was probably a means of keeping them straight, not a way to indicate father-son relationships.

The following is a tentative list of children. Susannah is clearly indicated as a daughter of Isaac on the power-of-attorney signed by her husband. The other children have been inferred from the deed references that seem to resemble a intestate probate sale of land.

- 1) Susannah RUCKER. Married James TINSLEY, no date. This family was in Kentucky in 1797, initially settling in Bourbon Co. They later lived in Fleming Co., and were there until the mid-1830's. No date of death is known.
- 2) John RUCKER. In 1800 he has a wife Nancy and therefore it appears that he is the John RUCKER Jr. who married Nancy SHELTON on 14 Mar 1798 in Amherst Co. VA.
- 3) Moses RUCKER. Married in Elizabeth PARKS (widow) in Amherst Co. VA on 29 Dec 1786. Supposedly a Revolutionary soldier.
- 4) Reuben RUCKER. Married Betsy DAWSON on 7 Aug 1792 in Amherst Co. VA (Isaac RUCKER as bondsman).
- 5) Richard RUCKER. Married Margaret MARR 16 July 1798 in Amherst Co. VA.
- 6) Elizabeth RUCKER. Married 9 Sept 1797 Archelus REYNOLDS in Amherst Co. VA. (Isaac RUCKER as bondsman).

HAWKINS - CASSITY

William Morton Hawkins, s/o William R. Hawkins and Judah Hawes, was born in Clark CO, KY, 11-Jan-1832. He married Rosanna CASSITY, born 10-Mar-1833, d/o of James A. Cassity and Mary Ann HEDGES. The family later moved to Clinton CO., MO. There is a biographical sketch in Clinton County Missouri History. They had three children:

Martin J. Hawkins, b. c1854, m. Nancy C. c1879. They had two daughters, Gertrude b. c1880, m. Jacob E. MATHEWS 2-Sept-1900; and Bertha who m. George R. HALL 21-Feb-1912.

Irena (Aurena) Hawkins b. 1857 m. William A. HUNT. They divorced in 1879. In the 1880 census, Irena and daughters Rosella age 5 and Daisy O., 7 mos., were living in the same household with their parents. Irena and William Hunt apparently remarried 21-Dec-1880.

Gessella Hawkins b. 1866, m. Edward J. DEVALL on 3-Jan-1897.

Martin J. Hawkins d. 1943 and was buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery, Nancy C., d. 1946, was buried beside him. In this same cemetery were Perry Hawkins 22-Dec-1871, d. 1-Jan-1948, and Elizabeth Hawkins 12-July-1873 d. 1968. There may be a relation between the latter two and the family of Martin J. Hawkins. JOHN HAWKINS

John Hawkins, father of Hannah Hawkins who married George Smith, was born about 1760-65, probably in Virginia. Not much is known for sure about him, but several authors have done research and made some conjectures. He may have been the son of William and Elizabeth (Bourne) Hawkins. William and Elizabeth's children were said to have been John, Benjamin, James, Polly Barnett (wife of John Barnett), Willis, Sally, and Moses. In 1808 in Jessamine County, Kentucky, the heirs of Elizabeth Hawkins of Culpeper County, Virginia, were attempting to recover some slaves. The heirs were the same as listed above. If John, the father of Hannah, was indeed the son of William and Elizabeth, his maternal grandparents were Andrew and Jane (Morton) Bourne of Culpeper County.

It is known that John married Ann (Nancy) Withers [see the Withers section] about 1782-85, possibly in Stafford County, Virginia, where Nancy was born. The young couple may have started immediately moving west. Stafford County is an eastern Virginia county. A John Hawkins was listed in Kegley's list of Virginia Militia in Captain Looney's Company of Botetourt County, a central county, along with Thomas and Giles Hawkins, possibly relatives. John later had two sons with those names. He may have moved to Kentucky in 1789 or 1790 and settled in the Jessamine County area, then still Fayette County. (4)

There were several activities accomplished by a John Hawkins in early Kentucky. It is unknown whether any of these activities were performed by the correct John for this genealogy. The activities are mentioned here as possibilities for further research. A John Hawkins was said to have represented Fayette County in the Virginia Legislature while Kentucky was still a part of Virginia, and later represented Fayette County in the first General Assembly in Kentucky. The Assembly met in Lexington and he was on the committee that selected Frankfort for the capital. He also represented Jessamine County in several sessions after it was formed. He presided at the first meeting of the Masons when they separated from Virginia and formed the Grand Lodge of Masons of Kentucky. (2) There was a John Hawkins appointed as one of the Jessamine County commissioners to value certain lands taken by the sheriff under execution. The first order ever made by the court of record in Jessamine was to appoint these commissioners. The date was 26 March 1799. A John Hawkins served in the Kentucky House of Representatives in 1806 and 1811. (1)

John and Nancy (Withers) Hawkins had 15 children. Nancy died in Jessamine County sometime before 1814. Nancy's father, John Withers, named his son-in-law, John Hawkins, as a legatee when he wrote his will which was probated in Jessamine County in 1818.(4) John then married Margaret (Hayden) Singleton there on 14 October 1815. Margaret's brother, Jesse Haydon, as well as the groom, provided the bond to assure the court that there was no impediment to the marriage. Margaret was the daughter of Mary and Ezekiel Haydon of Spotsylvania County, Virginia, and was the widow of Edmund Singleton.(2) She came to the marriage having had 8 children with her first husband.(4)

Mary Lee Mahin, a Jessamine County genealogist for many years, says that John owned a ferry and operated it on the Kentucky River where now the Brooklyn Bridge, a part of the Harrodsburg Pike, crosses the river. In 1817, John Hawkins, et al, were commissioners of the estate of Nathaniel Drake and sold land to George Smith.(3)

When John died, he did not leave a will. The appraisement of his estate was on 28 August 1823. The value was \$12,000. Most of his lands were in the western part of Jessamine County on Clear, Jessamine, and Hickman's Creek. Margaret, his widow, waived her right to administer the estate on 18 August 1823, and asked that James Hawkins administer.(2) Margaret later married for the third time - to Samuel H. Craig.

The children of John and Ann (Withers) Hawkins were as follows:

- James Hawkins, born by 1785, married Berilla Ashford in 1806 (4), was named administrator of his father's estate in 1823, but he died in October of 1823 (2) before he could carry out his duties;

- Hannah Hawkins, born ca.1786 [see information following];

- Elizabeth Hawkins, born ca.1787, married Samuel Overstreet on 24 November 1804 at Jessamine County, lived in Oldham County, Kentucky, died 1835;(4)

- Martha (Patsy) Hawkins, born ca.1790 in Virginia, married Gabriel Overstreet on 8 September 1806 at Jessamine County, lived in Oldham County, Kentucky, in 1850 as a widow, possibly with a married daughter, Adeline Clore;

- Ann W. Hawkins, born ca.1795, married Thomas McAshford on 24 February 1814 at Jessamine County (although Thomas used the Mc in front of his name, his wife and children used just Ashford);

Thomas W. Hawkins, born 1795/6, married Mary (Polly) Singleton (his step-sister) at Jessamine County on 7 November 1816, died about 1870; (4)

Catherine Hawkins, born 1798, married Daniel Singleton (her step-brother) in 1817 at Jessamine County, died 1870; (4)

Sarah Hawkins, born ca.1798, married Jesse Hayden (a brother of Sarah's step-mother, Margaret) on 7 August 1817 at Jessamine County; (2)

Allen Withers Hawkins, born ca.1800, married Matilda ?, lived in Scotland County, Missouri (Maidendert Township), was a judge in 1844;

Eleanor Hawkins, born ca.1802, married Benjamin Davis in Jessamine County, lived in Lewis County, Missouri, in 1850 with two children still at home; (4)

William Henry Hawkins;

Mary (Polly) Hawkins, born ca.1810, married Archibald Reed, lived at Fulton County, Kentucky in 1850 with 9 children;

George Giles Hawkins, born 14 March 1810 in Woodford County, Kentucky, married (1) Susannah Harrison Slaughter in Mercer or Boyle County on 13 September 1832, (2) Ellen Elizabeth Eastin on 17 November 1858 in Marion County, Missouri, had 6 children in Knox County, Missouri, 1850 and 1860, died 9 October 1887, buried in Saline County, Missouri; (2)

Porter Hawkins, was the youngest child, since he was still a minor when his father died, married Bettie A. _____, died in August of 1867 in Jessamine County with a will in Book D-272; D-469; K-291. (2)

HANNAH HAWKINS

Hannah, the daughter of John and Ann (Withers) Hawkins, was born about 1786 in Virginia. She moved with her family to Kentucky probably by the time she was three years old.

On 27 October 1803 Hannah married George Smith, son of the Reverend George Stokes Stovall Smith and his wife, Frances Sandifer Smith. [See the Smith section for descendants.]

Hannah and George lived in and around Jessamine, Woodford, and Mercer Counties, Kentucky, all their lives. At one time, prior to the Civil War, they were well-to-do planters and slave owners. By 1860, their son, Thomas, his wife, Martha, and their two children, Ann and Sarah, lived with them in the same house.

It is unknown when Hannah died. Her name no longer was on the Mercer County tax list after the year 1864, and her son, Thomas, was the owner, by the next tax year, of the acreage that had been hers. Thus, she is assumed to have died in 1864 when she was 78 years old.

He moved to North Carolina and died before either Matthew Hawkins or Alex'r Smoot wrote their wills. He or another with the same name is in Orange Co. NC records, and his children are named in the Hawkins vs Popham documents of the Fredericksburg Dist. Superior Court of Chancery File #124. Identical names appear in Alexander Smoot's will. John's name is NOT on the 1815 Rowan County tax list. A marriage record for his widow to Alexander Smoot may establish an approximate death date. A guess is that he died before 1815.

Her first marriage is on record in Culpeper Co. Va. Marriage Index Book 1 on page 196. Rev. Wm. Mason, Baptist. Nancy may have been a sister to Sarah Jones who married John's brother, James Hawkins. Her parents' names are unknown at the present time.

The date of their move to North Carolina isn't known, nor are the dates and birthplaces of their children known--Virginia or North Carolina.

There is evidence that after John died, Nancy wed widower Alexander Smoot who also came from Culpeper County. Alexander's first wife, Ann Hawkins may've been related to John Hawkins. Proof of Nancy Jones Hawkins' marriage to Smoot is found in Alexander Smoot's will, written 26 Nov. 1816 and proved 17 Oct. 1826 which names John and Nancy Hawkins' children including the Hawkins girls' married names as well as the three children with the Smoot surname.

Presently it's not known if these Smoot children were from his first union with Ann Hawkins (Oct. 17, 1798 Culpeper Co.) or were children of his later marriage to the widow Nancy Jones Hawkins. A search of marriage records for these children could possibly furnish clues.

It is a fairly good indication that the inclusion of the names of John and Nancy (Jones) Hawkins' children in his will with the instructions that each is to receive \$50 as their fair share of 'his' or 'her father's estate's meant he (Alexander) was their step-father. His own offspring were to inherit his land and his wife, Nancy Smoot, was to be the executrix.

One published work with a transcript of this will leads one to think these children born to John Hawkins are called 'sons' and 'daughters' by Smoot in the will, but this isn't so. He names them but only refers to Smoot children when speaking of sons or daughter.

* With the exception of John Hawkins who was to be given a horse valued at \$50 instead of the money as his share of his father's (John Hawkins') estate.

In the Culpeper Co. Deed Book 55 pg. 527, William's siblings gave him power of attorney in dealing with their share of Job Hawkins' estate. It was dated Apr. 3, 1826. His brother John J. and sisters Sarah Allen and Polly Ijames were all living in Rowan Co. N.C. at this time so did "ordain and authorize and appoint our trusty friend William Hawkins to have power of attorney." It is likely he was the same William Hawkins who was a Justice of the Peace in Rowan Co.

Pages 528-529 of Deed Book 55 have a deed for Aug. 9, 1826 in which William acting as the attorney for Job's heirs and in his own right sold land to Arron House. He may have been the same William Hawkins who was a Justice of the Peace in Rowan Co., North Carolina.

There's a marriage record in Rowan Co. for a William Hawkins and Mary Allen. This is dated Jan. 19, 1817. Jacob Allen provided bond and the witness was R. Powell. Mary may have been a sister to the Isaac Allen who married William's sister Sarah (Sally).

March 4, 1824, Rowan Co. N.C. Deed Book 29 page 315: Joseph Allen gave Wm. Hawkins 9 acres on Dutchman's Creek (adjoining Samuel Smith) for \$100.00. The witnesses were Peter Eaton and James Smith, dated Feb. 1827.

Their marriage was performed by Rev. Wm. Mason, Baptist minister who performed many marriages for this branch of the family. She went by the name "Betty" in many records. The marriage is recorded in the Culpeper Co. Marriage Index Book Book 1, pg 196. Information on her branch of the family is in HAWKINS HERITAGE April 1987, page 30, taken from the book BITS AND PIECES OF THE HAWKINS FAMILY PUZZLE by Mildred Farmer who received it from Roger Crocker of Llano, Texas. ... "On several occasions Austin H. Morgan told me that he had it from his father Job Morgan, that Joseph Morgan, his father, was a Revolutionary Soldier, and served with several of his brothers-in-law. Brothers of his wife whose maiden name was Nancy Curtis. Austin Morgan's father said that his father said his father told him AUGUSTUS HAWKINS, father-in-law of Job Morgan was a crippled man and was not in the war. Augustus Hawkins married Elizabeth Henley. They were in Burke County, NC. Job was born there." Job and family came to TN circa 1802-1806.

Job was b. 7-Mar-1771 and d. 1-Jan-1857. He was married on 10-Sept-1795 to Sallie Hawkins, b. 17-Sept-1778.

Their children, born from 1796 to 1823 were Joseph; Nancy; Loyd; Elizabeth; Martha; Susannah; Daniel Morgan (m. 28-Oct-1828 to Susannah Smith; Washington; Austin H. m. #2 Amanda Maxwell; William C.; Derby H; Sallie; and Polly.

According to the wording in her father Matthew Hawkins' will, she and Hawkins POPHAM had no children at the time the will was written. Her baptism is listed on page 48 of THE F.T.BAPTIST CHURCH by A. Paul Thompson under the heading, "Baptised since Sept. 11, 1835". The family lived near F.T. Rebecca Hawkins' marriage to her half nephew was "nullified" by a Grand Jury in Culpeper County. An indictment of "guilty" was returned on the charges of entering into an illegal marriage. (It was returned against both of them separately.) The jury, however, decided not to prosecute them but to declare the marriage null and void and the couple paid the court costs. Rebecca remarried very shortly after this to John STORY. She may have been expecting a child; although there are no records of any being born to her and Hawkins POPHAM, the book titled THE RED OAK JOHNSONS lists eleven children born to Rebecca Hawkins and John Story. It has 1822 as the year of their marriage however, the court didn't annul her first marriage until 08 April 1823. The first child named Caroline Story died in infancy and the second child, "William Mather" Story (this should be "Matthew") was born June 12, 1824. There just isn't enough time between the date the first marriage was annulled and the second child's birth for two children to have been born. Either the first child Caroline was the daughter of Hawkins Popham, or the records are in error. Genetically they were no closer than some of the cousin marriages so common during this time.

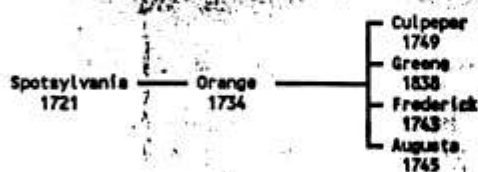

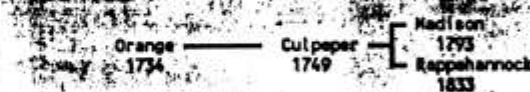
The changing boundaries of the counties are also cause for some confusion where a birthplace or family land may appear to be in an entirely different county 100 years ago than it is today.

Letter of H. C. Hawkins

The following segments are from a letter in General John Parker Hawkins' collection. His correspondence concerning his family research is found in several libraries, including The Kentucky Historical Society Library, Salt Lake City, and in the University of Tulsa. These letters are xeroxed on 300 legal sized pages, and contain many surnames with Hawkins connections besides his own line.

"Fayette, Howard County, Mo.
April 18th, 1892.

Dear Sir,

. . . . My father was named William. He was born 19th of February 1784. . . . He moved from Kentucky to this state in the early settlement when people were living in Forts. He died in Howard County, Mo, the 8th of July 1845. . . . In early times he emigrated from Scott County, from near Georgetown, he first settled in St. Louis, then sold and came to Howard County. . . . My Mother was named Lydia Todd Francis. I imagine she was born in Kentucky, 19th of May 1787. Married in Kentucky. . . . She died May 27th 1861 in Howard County. . . .

. . . . My brothers and sister were named: John Littleberry; William Johnson; Granville Francis and Mary Jane. My sister married Benjamin Cason. I am the only one of the family living. . . .

. . . . Brother William, his daughter the only child named Judith Francis, wife of John D. Cason in Pomona, California. . . . Sister Mary wife of Benjamin Cason - one child died without an heir - brother John and Granville never married. . . .

. . . . We had five children, William Reason; Mary White; Sarah Catherine; Judith Frances; and John Franklin. . . . None of them is married and all live with me. . . . I am sixty-seven the 10th of September next. . . .

. . . . I would be glad if fate should went our way in each others pathway.

Note: In H. C. Hawkins' letter, he commented that even though he and the General might not be related, he felt that they were still of Hawkins birthright. He had no knowledge of where his grandfather was born, nor if he was in the Revolution.
