PURPOSE: The Hawkins Family Organization began in 1985. It is conducted by mail and has no scheduled meetings. The purposes are: To promote genealogical research on Hawkins families and related lines; to promote and share family history; and to strengthen extended family ties.

NEWSLETTERS: HAWKINS HERITAGE is published three times a year in April, August, and December. All members are encouraged to contribute letters and material to the editor. It is preferable if you type your material, but if not convenient, please share it anyway.

QUERIES: Members are also encouraged to send queries to the editor.

MEMBERS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS: HAWKINS HERITAGE was begun with the hope of identifying the parents of James and Margaret ? Hawkins, b. c1765 and 1768, probably in Virginia. Taxations records show that they lived in Stafford CO Virginia from 1793 until 1825, when they emigrated to Clark CO Kentucky. One son, John R., married into the Hawkins/Bourne line, which may be a connecting branch of the above James. Because of an apparent need for "group" research, our publication is now open to descendants of all Hawkins lines.

Individual membership and subscription is \$12 per year. Contributing Membership and subscription is \$20 per year (may vote).

Subscriptions begin with the April issue. Subscribers during the membership year may receive back issues of the current year or begin with the next year and pay for any single back issues, which are \$4 each. The 1st issue was December 1986; 2nd, April 1987; 3rd, 1988; continuing with August and December from then on.

PEDIGREE SERVICE: You are welcome to send your Hawkins pedigree chart to be checked with our collection. You will be given any additional information that we might have on file, that would match up with your own. Your chart will be filed for possible future contact. Our Hawkins ancestor files deal mostly with Hawkins of the south and southwest, although not entirely. Cost of this service is \$1 to cover search and photocopies, plus an SASE.

## BITS AND PIECES OF THE HAWKINS FAMILY PUZZLE

### U.

Ulyesses Hawkins was the son of John William Hawkins and Martha Coleman. They lived in Kentucky somewhere around Frankfort. The family tradition is that he was a descendant of Sir John Hawkins.

Uriah Hawkins mar. Nancy Dean in Mercer CO., KY on Aug. 14, 1826. He was the son of Reuben and Rebecca whose father was Uriah Edwards from Spotsylvania, VA.

Uriah Hawkins and Lucy Green Jones were mar. Mar. 7, 1798 in Mecklenberg CO., VA.

Usebuis Lee Hawkins was b. in Jones CO. NC on Apr. 3, 1880 and d. Nov. 1911 in Wise Fork, NC. She mar. Otis Poole. Her parents were John Little on Hawkins and Laura Virginia Tilghman.

### V.

Valentine Hawkins mentioned in John Hawkins Estate settlement on Oct. 10, 1797 in Louisa CO., VA. Dist. Court Deed BL A pg. 378.

VanBuren Hawkins was b. July 1867 in Cherokee CO., AL and d. in Bell CO. TX. He mar. Halley--- b. Jan. 1870 in Texas. His parents were Amos Hawkins and Sarah Jane Lewallen.

Virginia Morton Hawkins was the dau. of John R. and Sarah Hawkins of KY.

Virgil Stephens Hawkins was b. Dec. 13, 1886 in Banner Mississippi. He mar. Nettie Mae Eaves on Jan. 7, 1917 and they moved to Oklahoma. Nettie was b. May 25, 1894 in Lodi (Indian Territory) Oklahoma. They had a dau. Mildred June Hawkins who mar. Harvey Glenn. Virgil died Feb. 12, 1961 in McAlester Oklahoma and is buried at Red Oak, Oklahoma.

### W.

W.M. Hawkins b. Jan. 11, 1832 Clark CO. KY lived in Buchanan CO., MO. His father was W.R. Hawkins who mar. Rosanna Cassity in 1852. Children: Martin J. Arena S. and Gesella N.

William Hawkins is listed in 1800 censuses in Scott, Woodford and Frankland Counties in Kentucky.

William Hawkins mar. Elizabeth Wenn on Apr. 23, 1833 in Kentucky.

William Hawkins mar. Nancy Littlefield on July 24, 1848 in Kentucky.

William Hawkins ... men with that name in the Franklin CO. KY area were called "Blackhead Billy", Red Head Billy, Green River Billy, Cooper Billy and Rail Billy" From Darnall's book, FORKS OF THE ELKHORN.

William and John Hawkins gave bond for Finny in 1734 in Orange, CO., VA. William was sued for debt. in 1748 in Orange CO. and the case was dismissed.

William Hawkins died in Frederick CO., on Feb. 15, 1782. His sons were Richard Moses and Asa.

William F. Hawkins and David T. Hawkins were the sons of Mary Hawkins who lived in Bath CO., KY in 1811.

William Hawkins of Campbell CO. Va had a son James, one Littleberry and one named Benjamin. They moved to Jessamine CO., KY

William Hawkins was the son of John Hawkins who died Feb. 16, 1725 in Essex CO, VA which was in St. Anne's Parish.

William Hawkins furnishes supplies to Prettyman Merry in Orange CO. VA during the Revolutionary War.

William Hawkins mar. Nancy Suttentfield on Jan. 1, 1792 in Campbell CO VA. Menoah Lesley was the minister.

William Hawkins, the son of Michael Hawkins lived in early Bristol Parish, VA. The property line was next to the cemetery in Williamsburg. ... From a letter from Mr. Regid. Smith who wrote a book on his Hawkins family and did research in most of the Court Houses in Virginia.

William Hawkins was listed in the Barren CO., KY census in 1800.

William Hawkins was listed in Campbell CO. in the KY census in 1800.

William Hawkins purchased land in Bedford CO. VA in 1871 but later moved to Campbell CO. His wife was Mary. Their children were; William, Littleberry, Robert, Joseph, Benjamin, James and a daughter who married ---Hicks. William died in 1793 in Campbell.

William Hawkins of Bath CO. KY mar. Rachel Stephenson on June 17, 1852.

William Hawkins son of Wm. and Martha of Prince George, Bristol Parish was b. on May 4, 1735.

William Hawkins was brought to James City Va by Theodore Moyser in 1637.

William Hawkins of Greenbriar, Louisa CO. VA was listed as Delinquent in the army in 1782.

William Hawkins mar. Rose Cook on Aug. 16, 1727 in St. Paul's Parish in Stafford CO., VA. The Parish Register also says Wm. b. on Oct. 3, 1727. A William Hawkins d. on Sept. 19, 1734. William was the son of Thomas and Sarah Ancium. Others listed with the name Hawkins were Christian who d. in 1721, John who died in 1717. Elizabeth d. 1726 and Thomas in 1735/36.

William Hawkins mar. ---Hogg in Augusta CO., VA.

William Hawkins consented to the marriage of his dau. Peggy to Thomas Curry in Pittsylvania CO., VA.

William Hawkins b. ca 1800 mar. Mary Ann Foster Curd in 1829 in Logan CO., KY.

Rev. William Hawkins mar. first Cassandra Hawkins and Mary Amos was his other wife. Some of their fourteen children were: Elizabeth, Mary, Jane, John, Joshua and Idney. Another report says he had 3 wives and 13 children.

William mar. Delila Martin dau. of George Martin on Dec. 8, 1774. They were in Amelia CO., VA.

William Hawkins was in the Isle of Wight CO., VA in 1739.

William Hawkins son of John and Susanna received in 1715, 50 acres from his father. They lived in Northampton or Accomack CO. in VA. In 1729, Wm. sold his land to ---Harmonson. In 1730 he was living in Pontico, N C.

W.W. Hawkins of Franklin CO. KY Confederate, was killed at the battle of Chickamauga. He was in the Infantry CO. E. 4th Kentucky.

W.H. Hawkins was the Asseccor of Franklin CO. KY in 1904.

William Hawkins son of Amos b. Sept. 22, 1808 in Miami Ohio. His mother was Rachel Jones m r. Jan. 1829.

William Hawkins b. ca 1822 in Harford CO., MD mar. Mary B, b. 1808 PA. H. was a cooper.

X.

There are no names starting with X in my Hawkins records.

Y.

Young Hawkins lived in early Virginia and is in the section called "pieces."

Z.

Zachariah Hawkins mar. Elizabeth Wilkerson on Mar. 5, 1763 in Amelia CO. VA. Sur. was John Drinkard.

Zachariah Hawkins was the son of W. Hawkins an Minerva. He was b. 1839 KY.

Zadook Hawkins lived in Pendleton, CO., KY.

John Hawkins came to Northumberland CO.VA in 1651 by Thomas Axby. John and Thomas came from London to VA in 1635 in the Ship George.

John Hawkins of Duplin CO.NC left a will dated March 29, 1776. Heirs were daughters Mary, Ann and Lettess.

John Hawkins mar. Jenny Johnson on Dec. 30, 1789 in Lunenburg CO.,VA. Rev. James Shelburne, a Baptist minister officiated. John Hawkins mar. in 1790/91 Elizabeth Hix in Lunenburg CO.

John Hawkins mar. Jane Ferguson on Jan. 28, 1790 in Halifax CO. Va.

John Sebree Hawkins mar. Mary Gaines a widow in Jan. 1773 in Orange CO.,VA. This John is usually called Jehu. Their son Jehu or John moved from Virginia to Barren CO.,KY with his wife Mary Grundy George and six children prior to 1810. The children were: Jehu Dyer who mar. Betsy OBannion in Bath CO. in 1808. William Wall Hawkins, Henry George Hawkins, Sally G. Mary and Elizabeth.

John Hawkins mar. Mary--and died in King William CO. Va ca 1742. Their daughter Agnes mar. Thomas Meauz in Orange, VA.

John Hawkins came to Greenville, SC. from VA in 1780. He had eleven sons.

John Hawkins of King William CO. had a land grant in 1731.

John Hawkins advertised in the Virginia Gazette April 6, 1769 the following: "As I shall have the most pressing Call for Money, at the Meeting of the Merchants this Month and June next, I hereby inform all Persons that are indebted to me for Negroes, as well as those that I have sold on Commission as on my Account, that Suits will be commenced, without respect of Persons, immediately after the Oyer Court in June next. I shall take no Paper Money in Payments, but on Condition that it passes at the Treasury."

JOHN HAWKINS

John Hawkins was the guardian of James Gaines, orphan of William Gaines. Beb. 22, 1781. His wife was Mary Gaines, the widow of William.

John Hawkins was b. March 10, 1717 in York CO.VA in Charles Parish.

John Hawkins was the great grandfather of Sarah Faulkner. He died before 1740, leaving a will in Prince William CO.,VA. His wife was Mary and the I.A.G Compendium information on him shows that he was one of the members of the Hawkins Family of the English Navy.

John Hawkins and wife Mary sold 150 acres and a plantation in South Lancaster, N.C. to George Slade in 1704. He was an heir of Thomas and Elizabeth Blount Hawkins.

John Hawkins will of Feb. 8, 1716/7 and probated April 10, 1717, names wife Mary and daughter Joyce Hartshorne, whose son Thomas was also named. They lived in North Carolina. Another source gives the same date but calls his widow Sarah. Joyce Hartshorne was the extr. Children were Joshua, James and Ann. Thomas son of Joyce Hartshorne.

**WILL OF JOHN HAWKINS -- SCOTT COUNTY, KY**

*"At some time a fire occurred in the County Office at Georgetown, Scott County burning many records. The following is all that remains of a partially burned paper. -- John. P. Hawkins."*

"In the name of God, Amen: I John Hawkins, of Scott County and State of Kentucky, being in health, of a sound memory, knowing the uncertainty of human life, do make this my last Will and Testament, and all other Wills by me made before, void of course.

First, I recommend my my soul to God who gave it, my body to be buried at the discretion of my Executrix hereinafter named, and as to what worldly estate the lord has blessed me with both real and personal I give among my children in manner and form following.

Item. In the first place I lend unto my beloved wife Sarah Hawkins, during her natural life, the lands and improvement whereon I now live and Sall, Ceazer, Joe, Betty, Winny and James, and the choice of my horse creatures, and two of my choice Oxen, a sixth part of my other cattle, Hogs, Sheep &c. two . . . . .  
. . . . . and furniture and as much household and kitchen and plantation utensils as she may think necessary, which is to be returned to my children and equally divided among them after my death . . . . .

Item. It is my will and desire that my accounts against my children be settled at what it was worth when they received it, and for them all to be made equal in like property with them that has received the most to be valued at the same rates. I have before charged my children, and then for my just debts to be paid, and if any balance, to be equally divided among my children before hinted, to wit: Jameson Hawkins, Philemon Hawkins, Peggy Cave, Sally Smith Thomas, Nancy Cason, John Hawkins, Fanny Thomas, Betsey Faulkner, William Hawkins, Caty Hawkins, Lucinda Hawkins . . . . .

Item. It is my will and desire after the death of my wife Sarah Hawkins, that what I have lent her be equally divided among my eleven children, before named . . . . .  
. . . . . lastly I appoint my beloved wife Sarah Hawkins, Executrix and Philemon, Thomas, Jameson Hawkins, John Hawkins, Georgetown, and John Payne, Executors of this my last Will and Testament to which I have willingly and deliberately set my hand and seal this 30th day of October 1804.

Sept 13th. 1806.

*Jameson and Philemon were the only children left by  
Margaret Jameson. The others here mentioned were  
the children of Sarah Johnson. -- John. P. Hawkins.*

This the last Will and Testament of John Hawkins, Decd. was this day produced in Court by John Payne, Jameson Hawkins, John Hawkins, three of the Executors therein named and proved to be the act and deed of the said John Hawkins, decd. by the oaths of Toliver Craig, and Andrew Johnson, two of the subscribing Witnesses thereto, and ordered to be recorded & the said Executors having taken the oath and acknowledged their bond agreeably to law . . . . .  
certificate of probate is granted them . . . . .  
Test, . . . . .

State of Kentucky,  
Scott County.           Sct.

I, J. Henry Wolfe, Clerk of the County Court, of the County aforesaid, do certify, that the foregoing Will of John Hawkins, deceased, is a true copy as taken and copied from the record in my Office.  
Given under my hand, this 12th day of April, 1692.

*"Sally Smith Hawkins = Thomas P. Thomas  
Fanny Hawkins = Philemon Thomas  
The latter moved to Louisiana and was distinguished in the early History of that state."*

**Note from the Editor:** The above copy of John Hawkins' will was copied by the Editor from the transcription of the original. Spellings and punctuation are as written on the copy. In the transcribed letter collection of 300 legal sized pages of John Parker Hawkins, he often signed notations between paragraphs or in the margins.

I include such notes in script. In the paragraph concerning his appointments of Executors, the names of Philemon and Thomas were underlined, with an "x" by the name of Thomas. Usually the "x" served as an asterisk, with a reference written at the bottom of the page. In this instance, there was nothing written about Thomas.

An additional comment: *"See Appleton's Encyclopedia of Philemon Thomas. He married Fanny, a daughter of John and Sarah Hawkins. -- John P. Hawkins."*

## Notes From A Fort Wayne, Indiana Library Visit

**Claypoole records** Edward Claypoole is deceased. He lived in Indiana and did much research on some of the Quaker families connected with Hawkins, as well as other records of miscellaneous Hawkins families. His papers and manuscripts were donated to Indiana libraries. I originally saw some of them at the library at Indianapolis. Fort Wayne library has compiled them into several bound books.

**Hawkins Manuscript**--This contains miscellaneous early Hawkins settlers, and is a collection of deeds, cemeteries and other records in Union Co. S.C., with abstracts of some Hawkins wills. It also has some records from Jessamine Co., Ky., including some Hawkins marriages.

**Hawkins Genealogy** three volumes of family record sheets, obtained from various persons, and from some research of his. Claypoole has given some of these Hawkinses numbers starting with U, (which he used to indicate they were miscellaneous, unconnected Hawkinses) I could not find a listing or index of his Hawkinses for these volumes, and the librarian said they did not have one. However I remember seeing such a listing when I earlier saw these records at the Indianapolis Historical library. It would be very helpful to find that, as that would clarify some of his penciled remarks on the family record sheets. He sometimes wrote "probably U---" on some of them.

**Hawkins, A Quaker Family**--This volume takes up the James Hawkins family, Quakers who moved to the Carolinas, then Ohio and Indiana. Anyone who is connected to this Quaker Hawkins family should see this volume and also the ones written by Carl Hawkins of Richmond, Indiana and others, which I will detail later.

**Hawkins Records**-- This volume contains deeds and other information collected by Claypoole on a trip to South Carolina, and the south.. He calls it records of Hawkins and Jones family.

Other books pertaining to Hawkins Families at the library

The library has the book by Milly Farmer, and they have bound some of the Fedorak Hawkins papers that I saw earlier.

Books on the Quaker Hawkins families who moved from the Carolinas to Indiana

Hawkins, O. M. Hawkins's Family Record, 1746-1952. This book was published in 1952.

Webster/Perry Collections of Quaker Families. The volume "H" also has some Quaker records of these Hawkinses in Indiana.

Hawkins, C. H., Hawkins Genealogy. This is a very detailed and complete genealogy of the Quaker Hawkins family, originating with James Hawkins and Martha, compiled by Carl Hawkins of Richmond, Indiana, and is available for purchase, from Zerox University Microfilms, 300 North Ziebel Road, Ann Arbor, Mi. 48106.

#### Other Hawkins Genealogies

McDonald, Delores Hawkins, Our Hawkins Cousins, including the ancestry and descendants of John Hawkins (1813-1897), and the women he married.

This book contains background information on early Hawkins settlers in Virginia, and then takes up the family of Joshua Hawkins who married Sarah Cook, and who moved to Greenville, S. C. and who were the ancestors of many Hawkins families there.

Barnes, G. G., Genealogy of a Hawkins Family.

This book is a genealogy of the Robert Hawkins who came to Maryland in 1715, married Lydia Cruchett in 1739, and of his three sons--Thomas, Robert and Richard. Thomas and Richard Hawkins moved to western Pa. and some of their descendants moved to Ohio and further west.

Craig, Harry LaVird, Descendants of Jane Taliaferro.

This book is a genealogy of Taliaferro Craig, (Tolliver Craig) who married Mary Hawkins, daughter of John and Mary Hawkins, and their descendants.

Brown, Stuart C., Gabriel Jones and Some of His Descendants.

This is a book taking up the life of Gabriel Jones, who lived in the Shenandoah Valley and was called the "Valley Attorney". He married Margaret Strother Morton (widow), and one of their daughters, Anna Gabriella Jones (1761-1824) married Capt. John Hawkins. They moved to Scott Co., Ky, and Hawkins was a prominent early settler there. Their descendants are included in the book as well as the descendants of two other daughters--Margaret Jones who married John Harvie, Jr. and Elizabeth Jones who married Capt. John Lewis.

#### THE HACKLEMAN FAMILY AND HAWKINS CONNECTIONS, miscellaneous notes

Michael Hackleman, immigrant to Pa. from Germany, in 1749. Michael was born about 1732. he bound himself as a servant for three years to pay his passage to America, to a Sailors family. In 1751 he married Elizabeth Sailors.

Starting in about 1763, a great number of Germans living in Pa. started migrating from Philadelphia to Lancaster, and then to York, Pa. Then many went southwest to Winchester, Va., through the Shenandoah Valley, along the Dan River to the Yadkin, south to Salisbury, N. C. Michael and Elizabeth Hackleman made this trek in 1768, to Rowan Co. and then Tryon Co., N.C. They lived in North Carolina about 24 miles from King's Mountain where the Colonists defeated the British.

Michael and Elizabeth had three known sons--Jacob, Conrad, and George Hackleman. Jacob is the son which is followed in the Hackleman diaries and scrapbooks. He and his father and their families moved to the Abbeville District, of S. C. in 1784. Michael died in 1808 and left his estate to the three sons.

Jacob Hackleman was born in Philadelphia, Pa. in 1752. He married Mary Osborne. They had 14 children. Jacob was a private in the Revolutionary War. Jacob and his family moved to Scott Co., Ky about 1802, and then in 1806 to Indiana territory. One of Jacob's sons--Isaac Hackleman, born 1780 in Burke Co., N. C., married first on July 2, 1801 to Elizabeth Hawkins, in Abbeville District, S. C. Elizabeth was a daughter of Joseph Hawkins and his wife Elizabeth. (I think she may have been an Elizabeth Perkins, but the book does not say). Elizabeth Hawkins Hackleman was born May 22, 1783.

Isaac and Elizabeth, and Elizabeth's parents and other members of their family also followed the Hackleman family to Indiana territory. Several generations of Hacklemans and Hawkinses married in Indiana.

At this point I want to make reference to these early Hawkins settlers in Indiana territory. The writers of the latest Hackleman book has made a Hawkins Connection section in his book. They have made the assumption that these Hawkinses are somehow connected to James Hawkins, the Quaker Hawkins family, who were in the same district in S. C., and his sons who moved to Ohio and then Indiana. However I followed that family through the Quaker records and do not find this group of Hawkinses with them. There is no mention in the County Histories of Franklin and Fayette Cos., which refers to this family, stating that they were Quaker. Hacklemans were Baptist.

I found a reference to these Hawkinses in the DAR Roster of Revolutionary Ancestors, for Indiana, and the writer of that publication states that this Hawkins line descended from John Hawkins, born about 1730 in Maryland, served in the Revolution, as a Capt. from Queen Anne Co., Md. John married Elizabeth Jones in Maryland, about 1750. After the Revolution John and his family moved to Abbeyville District, S. C., where he died in 1799. The brothers who moved to Indiana Territory, and who intermarried with Hacklemans were John, Joseph, and Matthew Hawkins. Another brother, James Hawkins came to Indiana later as an elderly man, but several members of his family were among the Hawkinses living in Fayette and Franklin Cos. early. This Hawkins line is the family referred to in other references with the West families who also moved to Indiana.

The Hackleman family was split by the Civil War. The Hackleman descendants in Indiana were Union and another branch of the family--George Hackleman and Conrad Hackleman, brothers of Jacob, moved to Mississippi after 1812 and later descendants were Confederates. Conrad died there in 1832, and there were problems between family members about his estate. George died in Ms. in 1844. The Indiana Hacklemans and the southern Hacklemans kept in contact, and occasionally a member of one family or another would visit. John Hawkins, brother-in-law of Elijah Hackleman, had a sister Rachel who married James Ellis. Through the Hawkins/Ellis connections, the families kept in touch with the southern branch.

In the book on the Hacklemans, pages 36 and 37 reference is made to the George Hackleman branch. When the Civil War broke out, all correspondence ceased. After the close, Elijah wrote to his southern relatives and received no reply. After he wrote several letters, one of the daughters of George wrote him a very upsetting letter. She said, "Do not write to us again, we will not reply." She said that before the war, "They had plenty of everything--2000 acres of land, 1000 slaves, orchards and farms, houses and good quarters for the negroes. But you, Yankees, from the North came in like swarms of locusts and overrun our country. We have nothing left.--not a house, not a house slave, all are gone. Negro quarters burnt, orchards destroyed. Nothing left. We are going to Texas."

The Indiana families heard nothing more from them for thirty years. Then Elijah received a letter from a grandson of George--a James C. Hackleman, and then the family rift began to heal.

These notes taken from the book, The Hacklemans in American, 1749-1988, by Phyllis Hackleman and Burr K. Hackleman, published privately in 1988, and from Elijah Hackleman diaries, and scrapbooks. Also references to the DAR Roster of Rev. Ancestors of Indiana, and biographical sketches in Indiana county histories.

Any researcher working on Hawkins families in North or South Carolina would probably be interested in these Hackleman books, and references in Indiana --Fayette and Franklin, and other counties for both Hackleman and Hawkins families. The original scrapbooks and diaries--40 diaries, and 4 scrapbooks, kept by Elijah Hackleman are in a collection at the Wabash Memorial Museum Hall, Wabash, Indiana. There was a Hackleman Heritage Book written by Beatrice Bailey and the Elijah Hackleman Scrapbook, compiled by Margaret K. Fox, Betty Ann Wilson, and Anna M. Harvey, published in Kokomo, In. in 1988. There may be other family histories based on Elijah Hackleman diaries, etc.

JOHN (?) HAWKINS -- SUSANNA WESLEY

Margaret E. Haynes, P.O. Box 5233, Palm Harbor, FL 34684.

Margaret submitted her Hawkins ancestry chart. Her last known Hawkins were John (?) Hawkins and Susanna Wesley. Their son, John Wesley (known as J.W.) was born in 1817/18 in Rowan CO NC. In Platte CO MO ca 1843-44, he married Rebecca Ann BEST born 1827/28 in East TN. John Wesley died 1864 in Arkansas (in N. Army.) He was a resident of Clements, Chase CO KS. from 1857 until his death. Rebecca died 1898/99 in Clements, Chase CO KS.

John and Rebecca's daughter had a daughter, Susan Frances, b1852 in Savannah, Andrew CO MO, dying in 1943 in South Dakota. She was buried in Neosho CO KS.

Margaret Haynes' maternal grandparents were Winfield Scott PATTON (s/o John Thomas Patton b1848 in Terre Haute, IN; d1922 Neosho, CO KS, and the above Susan Frances.) and Rebecca Rose CLARK. Winfield Scott Patton was b1885 in Chase CO KS, and married 1907 in Texas CO MO. He d1948 in Neosho CO KS. Rebecca Clark was born in MI and died Chanute, KS.

John W. Hawkins and Rebecca A. Best had six children:

Most of this family stayed in Chase CO, KS from 1857 until their deaths, living with or near their mother after J.W. died in an Army camp in Arkansas in 1964:

"a. All except my great grandma Susan F. (Hawkins) PATTON, who died at her daughter's house in South Dakota and was brought to Chanute, Neosho CO KS, to be buried next to her husband, John Thomas PATTON.

"b. And John Henry Hawkins, I believe died in Oklahoma where he went to homestead."

Note: Margaret E. Haynes was born in Chanute, KS.

## Thomas Hawkins - Gilly Crawford

That original idea has grown into many different Hawkins lines, and we anticipate correspondence from all Hawkins descendants! We hope that in your own researching, you will keep a corner of your thoughts open for this particular family. We now know that Sarah Barnett, w/o John R., is from the same Hawkins line as many of our HH members. Perhaps James is also.

## The Daughters of James and Margaret Hawkins

### **Jane Hawkins Moody**

The sons of James and Margaret Hawkins have been discussed in prior issues. They also had daughters -- four we know of. The eldest, Jane, was born circa 1810 in Virginia. According to my research in Flemingsburg, the Jane's marriage record shows her father to be James Hawkins. Jane married James H. Moody 28-7-1830. Moody gravesites share the Hawkins "corner" in Siloam Cemetery in Farmers, KY, outside of Morehead.

Joseph Harvey, one son of Jane Hawkins and James Moody, was born 12-8-1840. He married Ivelia Jane Hedges, daughter of Lucy Ann Hawkins and Jesse Hedges. Joseph was buried in Farmers, KY. Major connecting names with the Moody line include Kissick, Cassity, and Evans. I have information on the latter three lines, and would correspond on any of them.

### **Margaret Hawkins Ringo**

Margaret Hawkins was born circa 1813 in Virginia. On 28-11-1833 she married David Ringo in Fleming County, KY. Her marriage record states James Hawkins as her father. Jesse Hedges, bondsman, and John R. Hawkins, witness.

I have considerable information on the Ringo family. This I obtained from personal research and have not contacted a Ringo descendant. It wasn't that I didn't try! The Ringo family connected with the Powers line. (Granddaughter of James and Margaret Hawkins, Margaret Jane, married her second husband, Henry Clay Powers of Morehead.) If any of our subscribers by chance correspond with Ringo, I would appreciate hearing from you.

### **Lucy Ann Hawkins Hedges**

Lucy Ann was born 15-April-1815 in Virginia. She married Jesse Hedges in Fleming County in 1832, and died 1-3-1884. Her marriage record in Flemingsburg states she was daughter of James Hawkins. John N. Barnett was bondsman, and John R. Hawkins, witness. Both Lucy Ann Hawkins and Jesse Hedges were buried in New Hope Cemetery in Hillsboro, as were John R. Hawkins and Sarah Barnett Hawkins. I have information on Hedges (So does Gail Hawkins of Houston)

Sally Ann Hawkins Halliday

Sally Ann Hawkins, birthdate not validated (would seem circa 1814/20) married George Halliday 4-3-1835 in Fleming County. The preponderance of evidence surely indicates she was daughter of James and Margaret. James was listed as her father on her marriage record. James R. Hawkins, son of James, was listed as bondsman.

In the late 1700's, there were three Halliday brothers living in Stafford County, VA, during the same time James and Margaret and family were there. I am going with the theory that the George Halliday brother in Stafford County later became Sally's husband. I have not researched the Halliday families of Kentucky, and have no clue where George and Sally lived after their marriage. At one time I traced a Halliday descendant who knew of three brothers, one of whom was his ancestor. He thought George moved "west," but that was the only information I have.

# THE JAMESONS AND STEVENS'.

Something of the Noble Ancestry of  
the Jameson and Stevens Families  
in Montgomery County.

Battle-Scarred Veterans of "ye Old-  
en Time," When Strong Arms  
and Stout Hearts were in  
Demand.

Obituary and Sketch of Col. David  
Jameson &c.

Major Wm. Mynheir, of this city, hands us the following letter, accompanied by an old printed obituary notice of Col. David Jameson which follows it, which is stained and dim with age but tells the story of the daring deeds of Col. David Jameson and others, of Virginia. The letter is a better prelude to the obituary than we could write, hence we reproduce both in their entirety. A pencil note on the back of the notice says, "Born Aug. 19, 1752; died ——— 1839:"

LOUISVILLE, KY., April 13, 1892.

Dear Major:—Enclosed herewith I send an obituary of David Jameson, a relation of the Jamesons, who have so many descendants in Montgomery and other counties of Kentucky. If I were a newspaper man I should delight in having such rare articles and therefore enclose to you for inspection of Mr. Cassity. If he will publish please turn the papers over to him, with the in-

junction to return the old obituary to you, as I have borrowed it from one who prizes it very highly. If published have a copy of the SENTINEL-DEMOCRAT sent as follows, viz: Gen'l. John P. Hawkins, Phelan Building, San Francisco, California; Mrs. M. A. Bowen, 202 Second street, Rockford, Illinois; D. J. Ayres, 509 and 511 Main street, Keokuk, Iowa; Wm. Ayres, attorney-at-law, Louisville, Ky., and one to me. I will forward to the SENTINEL-DEMOCRAT pay for the papers.

Again, I will you would call upon Cousin William Stevens, who is a first cousin of my father, and learn from him the names of his mother's brothers and sisters and the names

do not wish to suggest them till after I have heard from you. Please do this soon, as "Uncle Billy" is getting quite old and this is almost my only opportunity for learning.

Do you remember the day of the month when we were notified of the truce between Johnston and Sherman? I enclose envelope addressed to me for return of the old obituary. Would like to see you in Louisville. Very Truly,

## OBITUARY.

Died, at his residence in the county of Culpepper, Va., on the 2d day of October, Col. David Jameson, in the 88th year of his age. The eventful times through which he lived, and the part he acted in some of the occurrences of those times, make it an act of justice to notice them in this obituary memoir. The 20th of April, 1775, is memorable in the revolutionary annals of Virginia by the seizure of the gunpowder in Williamsburg by Lord Dunmore, at that period Governor of the Colony. News of this act of Executive usurpation reached Culpepper county (one hundred and seventy miles distant from the theatre of outrage) on the evening of the 25th day of April of that

year. The independent companies (associated voluntarily, but organized by the Committee of Safety for the county,) then commanded by Edward Stevens and John Green, were on the heights, of Fredericksburg, a distance of forty miles, early on the morning of the 27th of April, in full march to the seat of Government, (the abode of Dunmore and the theatre of Executive outrage), to make reprisal for this wrong. In those companies David Jameson (then a young man) was an officer, and to him was entrusted the duty of "standard bearer" of that celebrated flag, bearing as its emblem the "Rattlesnake in his coil, with the monitory motto, 'Don't tread on me.'" At Fredericksburg they found others assembled, by the perils of the times, and the anxiety which the pervading alarm had awakened. They were then dissuaded from further pursuit of Dunmore by the councils of an assembly of many of the most wise and patriotic of the colony, and they were particularly influenced by the letter of Peyton Randolph, late Speaker of the General Assembly, borne to them by the estimable and enlightened Burgess from Spotylvania, the late Mann Page of Mannsfield. And in which they were assured that further military pursuit for satisfaction would thwart and frustrate a pacific negotiation then in progress with the royal Governor. They did not, however, return to their homes until they uttered a noble and fierce address to their countrymen, breathing independence of all usurped authority, and defiance to all its actors, aiders and abettors. This address bore date, Saturday, the 29th of April, 1775. And the movement of these firm and fearless men, though one hundred miles more removed from the scene of action, was six days in advance of that made on the 2d day of May, by Patrick Henry and his gallant associates. The next military movement in the colony was the assemblage and march of the Culpepper minute battalion, united with those from Fauquier and Orange counties, in September, 1775. David Jameson and his brother John were again in this heroic band, and both were chosen to command in that battalion. Early in December a part of this force, under the command of Col. Stevens and Major Thomas Marshall, were posted for duty at the Great Ridge near Norfolk, and fought with distinguished courage and signal success that first battle with the enemy at day break the 9th of December, when Fordyce fell and Leslie was wounded. In this battle the courage of David Jameson and that of his brother were conspicuous. Following this victory they moved into Norfolk, carrying dismay to the enemy, and fought, under the guidance of Stevens, the bloody fight at the water's edge on the morning of the first of January, 1776. An accomplished historian, Girardin, writing under the eye of Mr. Jefferson, adds with free

access to his full and faithful documents, as of this battle the celebrated Stevens (of whose courage Jameson was sure) added, "his brother was also an officer, hardy, indefatigable and irresistible," and he rushed with the rapidity of lightning to the water's edge, and a large party of British who had just landed there, and compelled them to retire with laughing

and dismay to the protection of their "wooden walls."

These actions were demonstrations of voluntary valor and patriotism, conducted by that American spirit which, at that early period, stood up in the stead of organic and established government. What followed was under the system that necessity created and moulded into form, and gave to it the sanction of enacted law. In the military force raised by act of assembly or ordinance of convention, the elder brother, John Jameson received a distinguished command, with its accessions by promotion, to the close of the war. They could not both leave the county (of which John was the clerk,) and David Jameson remained to perform these more peaceful and equally useful duties. He was, however, frequently out with the militia; and in the years 1780 and 1781 performed an eighteen months' tour in the Southern States, in the capacity of lieutenant in the brigade of Stevens. After the war terminated, Col. Jameson devoted himself to agricultural pursuits, discharging, with faithful ability, the useful functions of county magistrate, and devoting a large part of his leisure to select reading of the best English authors. He was himself, though without the aid and discipline of early education, a chaste and accurate writer of good English: that good and chaste English which Addison wrote and which he learned from the pure and classic pages of this his accomplished model. Col. Jameson resided in that part of the Commonwealth that was distinguished by the sharpest conflicts in the ratification of the present Constitution of the United States. He acted a manly and efficient part in those contests, giving to Mr. Madison in the popular controversy an aid so marked as to call forth the acknowledgments of that virtuous, just and sagacious statesman. In the years 1790 and 1791, Col. Jameson was a delegate from the county of Culpeper to the Legislature of Virginia, and in that service he illustrated his own merits, and approved the selection of his county by a wise, steady and able execution of the trust which he had assumed. When he abandoned political life, he still continued in that active sphere of useful labor which lay before him in the office of justice of the peace in the county and the court to which those labors appertain. Large as these duties are to the county magistrate, and blending in their execution legislative

tive and judicial powers to some extent, the subject of this sketch was universally acknowledged to be one of the most efficient magistrates in the State of Virginia. In all criminal trials, and particularly in those trials where the county courts are judges in the last resort, he administered justice and rendered judgment in that clear and firm and benignant spirit of mercy and of law which is the guard, the ornament and the support of its wide and salutary administration. The latter years of his life were distinguished by an apathy to politics that was not congenial with the anxieties of his constitutional intensity and ardor. From this state he was aroused by the interest he felt and took in the first election of Gen. Jackson to the chief magistracy. But so great was his disappointment in the measures of that illustrious man when raised to power that he seemed for a while more than anxious for his removal, and defeated in this, he returned to that state of indifference to political events which for time he left, increased by the regrets of his appointment and despondency. Col. Jameson had, by continued service as a magistrate twice reached the office of high-sheriff of his county, and the ability, fidelity and dignity which marked his service in office, leave a benefaction to the community both in the service itself and the example it has left. He was a good soldier in war, a good citizen in peace. Faithful in the duties of a Christian and a magistrate, he leaves at his death a reputation without blemish, which the memory will hold in just and grateful recollection. B.

## Welcome to The Hawkins Family Organization

1. Use standard 8 1/2 inch paper.

3. Type, print, or write legibly. Dark black ink copies the best.
4. Use one side of your paper only.
5. If an item is larger than 8 1/2 x 11, and you are unable to reduce it, then send it as is to the editor to reduce.
6. Your submission may be written as a letter to the members, the editor, an article with title and author, a question or an answer to the members, or copies of documents, maps, etc.
7. If you are sending copyrighted material, we cannot use it without the complete source. Please give the title, author, publisher, copyright date, and page. If it is not copyrighted, please cite the source so that credit may still be given.
8. If you want your submissions returned, please provide return postage.
9. If you send family group sheets, number each sheet in the order that it is to be interpreted. This is extremely important especially if it is used in our publication, but also for my indexed files.
10. Put your name or initials on *every* page you send.
11. Please put the date on your letters as well as on the material you submit. It is helpful if you use an inside address on your letters. I file your letters but not the envelopes in my notebooks.
12. If you are a new member, it is hoped that you will send a family group sheet or pedigree chart.
13. We urge our members to take advantage of submitting queries. You may do this once a year, and they can be in "standard" form or in letter form. Since we have new members all the time, your query will still be new to them.
14. Suggestions welcomed.
