**PURPOSE:** The Hawkins Family Organization began in 1985. It is conducted by mail and has no scheduled meetings. We want to promote genealogical research on Hawkins families and related lines; to promote and share family history; and to strengthen extended family ties.

**MEMBERS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS:** We began *HAWKINS HERITAGE* with the hope of identifying the parents of James and Margaret ? Hawkins, b. c1765 and 1768, probably in Virginia. Taxation records show that they lived in Stafford CO Virginia from 1793 until 1825, when they migrated to Clark CO Kentucky. One son, John R., married into the Hawkins/Bourne line, which may be a connecting branch of the above James. Because of an apparent need for group research, our publication is now open to descendants of all Hawkins lines.

Individual membership and subscription is \$12 per year. Contributing Membership and subscription is \$20 per year (may vote.)

Subscriptions begin with the April issue. Subscribers during the membership year may receive back issues of the current year or begin with the next year and pay for and single back issues, which are \$4 each. The 1st issue: December 1986; 2nd, April 1987; then three issues per year beginning April 1988 to current.

You will be given any additional information which we might have on file, that would match up with your own. Your chart will be filed for possible future contact. 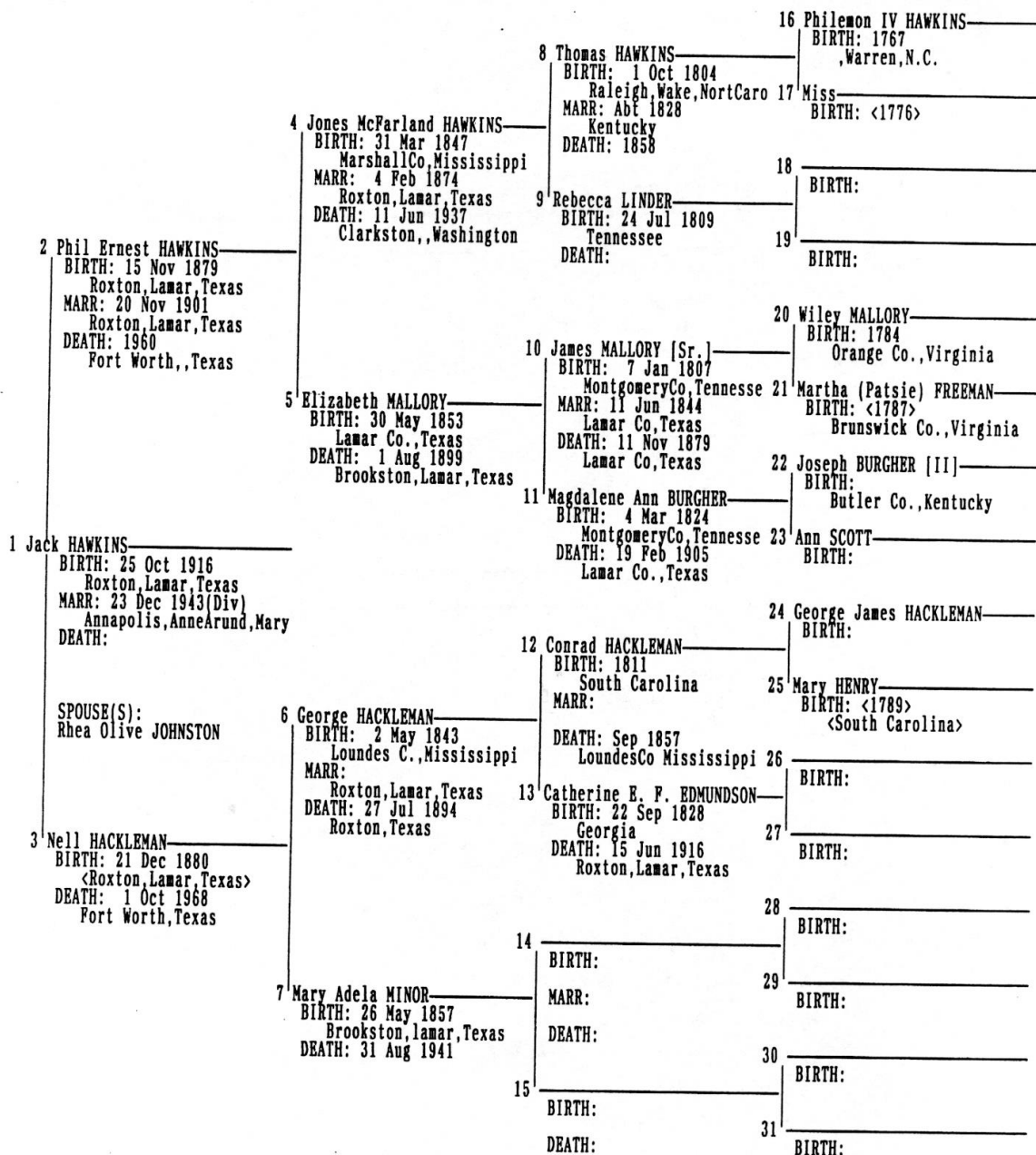

<b>Notes:</b> !Information from Hawkins Connections, Issue # 1 (Midwest Family Connections, P. O. Box 363, Fort Thomas, Kentucky, 41075. !Philemon was an officer in the Colonial Government and an aide to Governor Tryon in the battle of Alamance. He moved from Gloucester Co., Virginia at age 20 to Bute County, North Carolina. (now Warren County.) !Emigrated to America (Virginia) in 1715. The father died at age 35 when the children were still young. Ann did remarry. !One source, "The Virginia Colonial Militia," by Crozier shows that Philemon was a soldier in a regiment commanded by Col. Wm Byrd in the French Colonial War. He was a Capt. of a company on foot, taking his oath 5 Feb 1750 in Spottsylvania Co., Va. He was commissioned a Captain on 21 July 1755. Later he became a Colonel as did his son, John. Philemon owned various properties in Caroline Co., Spottsylvania Co., King William Co., and Orange Co., Virginia. Some of his property was inherited from his father, and a part was purchased.

moved from kentucky to georgetown, il with his father (david) and family; came with his young family to montgomery county in 1857 and entered 160 acres of government land 3 mi. east of donnellson, il.; cabinet maker by trade; had farm home eredted before civil war - a show place; walnut interior finish including fireplace frame and mantel; furnished with walnut furniture; 6 nov 1923 entry in mj diary - "died of paralisiss." 16 aug 1922 - "henderson h-- and ed b-- tore down the old house where cozba h-- lived." 30 may 1909 - hc and mj visited graves in georgetown il. of charlie, henderson and willie; also uncle vincent, charles, sarah and florilla;

An official tombstone to John Hawkins (1757-1838) was unveiled Sunday, 9 Jul 1967 at the Three Forks Bacon Creek Church in Hart Co., Ky., near Hammondville. The stone was presented by the DAR. Descendants of the family bought a stone for his wife, Francis Thorp, which was also unveiled. The life story of John Hawkins was given. He was a Revolutionary soldier, having enlisted at 16 years of age in the Militia of Capt. George Walls. He fought in the old Augusta County, VA., today this is West Virginia.

He was the son of William Hawkins and wife Jane Sharp and grew up in Frederick Co., Va. There were ten children in the John Hawkins family. They lived mostly in Hart County, Ky., as John came to this county when it was formed in 1819. One of their 10 children was Coleman Hawkins the father of the Miller County, Mo. Hawkins family. Most of the 11 children of John Coleman Hawkins and wife, migrated to Miller Co., Mo. before 1840. He was married to Sarah Bond.

James Bond Hawkins b. 1809 m. Jane Kelly in 1835- 1 child raised by John Kelly in Miller Co. He joined Hickory Point Baptist Church with Jane in Feb 1843.

John Coleman Hawkins Jr. b. in VA. 1811 (died young-no data).

David Hawkins b. 1813 m. Susan (?) who was born in Penn. Lived in Miller Co. after 1843.

William Hawkins b. 1815 in VA. m. Catherine McCubbin 10 Jan 1837. Lived in Miller Co., after 1843. Both are buried in Miller Co. Wm. Is buried in Hawkins cemetery.

Frances Hawkins b. 1817 in Va. m. George Payne. Lived in Miller Co. after 1843. Had son William Payne.

Presley Hawkins b. 19 Feb 1819 in VA. m. Sarepta Ballard McCubbin. Died in Miller 18 Jan 1859. Buried in Hawkins Cemetery.

Eppy Hawkins b. 1822 in VA. m. Emily (?). lived in Miller Co. in 1860. 'Joined Hickory Point Church a single person.

Elizabeth Hawkins b. 1824 in VA. m. Alfred DeVore, from KY.

Sarah Hawkins b. 1826 in Va.-M. Gabriel Thorp. In the 1860 Hart Co., Ky. Census.

He was killed and she listed as a widow in 1870 census.

Nancy Hawkins b. 1829 in Ky. m David Caldwell.

Martin Hawkins b. in 1831 in Ky.- died young. Buried in Brumley, Mo.

"From Virginia State Library: John Hawkins saw Revolutionary War service. Romney orig. bo 65-2749-p.11, Capt. "George Walls rolls-enlisted at age 16. Also serving in this company were: Samuel Hodges and George Henry (and others), with John serving 137 days.

The Three Forks of Bacon Creek cemetery stones unveiling was on July 9, 1967 by the DAR of Elizabethtown, Ky. Jacob Van Meter Chapter, Mrs. Elizabeth Pate, Regent. (Note: The stones are for John Hawkins and Frances Thorp; firmly believe that Frances Thorp died in Virginia and John Hawkins married 2<sup>nd</sup> on June 28, 1790 to Jane Ferguson-it is Jane who is buried here-see for instance Halifax Co. deeds from 1800 to about 1816, and death record of son Andrew Hawkins-wife's name Jinny).

Jane Huff was a Hawkins descendant. Washington Hawkins, not traceable after 1840 Hart Co. census in which he appeared (son of John & Jane).

John Hawkins was the son of William Hawkins and Jane Sharp, and he was in the Revolution in Old Augusta Co., Va. (today West Virginia).

**JOHN HAWKINS** saw revolutionary War Service. Enlisted at age 16 in Capt. George Walls company and served with Samuel Hodges and George Henry along with others. He served 137 days.

The Three Forks of Bacon Creek cemetery stones unveiling was on 9 July 1967 by the DAR of Elizabethtown, Ky., Jacob Van Meter Chapter, Mrs. Elizabeth Pate, Regent. (Note: the stones are for John Hawkins and Frances Thorp, firmly believe that Frances Thorp died in Virginia and John Hawkins married the second time on 28 June 1790 to Jne Ferguson. It is Jane who is buried here—See for instance Halifax Co. deeds from 1800 to about 1816, and death record of son Andrew Hawkins-wife's name Jinny.

Jane Huff was a Hawkins descendant. Washington Hawkins, not traceable after 1840 Hart Co. census in which he appeared (son of John and Jane).

James and Julia were married in Miller Co., Mo. by Rev. Z. Wiseman.  
James and the family are listed in "Early Pioneers of Missouri" bio. appen. pages 775 and 776.  
They are also listed in "History of Miller Co. Mo.", by Shultz.  
They are mentioned in the notes of Judge Jenkins of Miller Co.  
James was a surveyor, and laid out the town of Brumley, Mo. in 1877 from land on warrant #35,735, owned by Z.E. Cheatam from war of 1812.  
He was county judge of 2<sup>nd</sup> district elected Nov. 1888.  
He enlisted in 1862 in C/Co., 6<sup>th</sup> Missouri Cav., Col. Woods Battalion, serving 1 year. He was discharged due to wounds received at Helena, Ark.  
He was 14 years of age. He re-enlisted in the US Army in 1864 at Linnecreek, Mo.  
He was the first W/M of AF&AM Masonic lodge #203 Brumley, Mo., which was organized on 27 Dec 1877 by acting deputy Grand Master James Johnston.  
He was charter member of the I.O.O.F. which was organized in 1877.  
He was charter member of the G.A.R., and the agricultural wheel.  
He was appointed deputy sheriff in the fall of 1872 by Mr. W.C. Brumley.  
In 1880 he purchased the T. Thompson & Bro. Mercantile, changing the name to Thompson & Hawkins. He was also in the milling business.  
He is listed in "History of Cole, Moniteau, Morgan, Benton, Miller, Maries, and Osage Counties" by Goodspeed. (He is listed as James Madison Hawkins)



#### JUDGE JAMES M. HAWKINS:

Exs. from "Early Pioneers of Missouri" pages 775, and 776

"Judge James M. Hawkins, county judge of Second District, was born in Miller Co., Mo., near Brumley, 19 Sep 1847, and is the son of Presley and S.B. (McCubbin) Hawkins, the father a native of Virginia and the mother of Kentucky. They immigrated to Miller Co., Mo. in 1842, coming through in wagons, and located near Brumley, where they entered a tract of land at \$1.25 per acre. Mr. Hawkins erected a little log cabin, with clapboard roof and weighted with poles, and began to improve his farm. Later he built a hewed log house, covered with shaved walnut shingles with the corners clipped, and this lasted for twenty-five years. At that time there were but three or four houses in Tuscumbia, and it was the trading point of all south Miller County. Game of most all kinds was plenty, but Mr. Hawkins cared very little for hunting. He died there in 1859. The mother died in Texas, where she had moved a few years previous to her death. They were the parents of six children, five now living-Judge James M., Mary C., wife of James C. Dodson, resides in Texas; Cynthia, wife of Z. Spearman; William L., resides in Miller County, and Millard F., of Moniteau County. Judge James M. Hawkins was reared and educated in Miller County, was brought up in a pioneer way of living, as the country was very wild at that time, and after the war broke out, January, 1862; he enlisted in Company C, Sixth Missouri Cavalry, Col. Woods Battalion; and served one year. At the time of his enlistment he was but fourteen years of age, but he was firm in his determination to enter the service. He was discharged on account of disability at Helena, Ark., having received a wound. He re-enlisted in 1864 at Linn Creek, and served until 29 Jun 1865, when he was discharged. He participated in several hard skirmishes. After returning home he first engaged in farming, and later traveled around quite extensively. On 19 Mar 1871, he married Miss Julia A. Martin, a native of Missouri, and to this union were born seven children, six now living: Edwin P., William C., Philip C., Lena C., James C., and George Clayton. In the fall of 1872 Mr. Hawkins was appointed deputy sheriff and collector under W. C. Brumley, which position he held for four years. He then returned to farming and dealing in stock until 1880, when he engaged in the mercantile business at Brumley, buying out the senior member of T. Thompson & Bro., and the firm continued as Thompson & Hawkins until 1 Jan 1888. In connection with this they also carry on the milling business. Since the last mentioned date Mr. Hawkins has been extensively engaged in farming. He was elected county judge in November, 1888. He is a member of the Masonic fraternity, the I.O.O.F., the G.A.R., and of the Agricultural Wheel".

Since Hawkins Heritage was originated with the hope of identifying the ancestry of James and Margaret Hawkins, b c1765 & 1785, we are including this family group sheet. The Hawkins Family Bible that belonged to my great grandfather, Andrew J. Hawkins, s/o the above William R., stated that James Hawkins, b c1765, died of cholera (possibly during the epidemic of 1833/34 in Fleming CO.)

We hope that in your own research, you will keep a corner of your thoughts open for this family. We now know the mother of Sarah, John R. Hawkins' wife, was a Hawkins connecting to the Bourne line. Perhaps James is also. His parents still have not surfaced in the many years of Hawkins Heritage's publication.

## A CLEAN SWEEP

### *Broomcorn*

"Break off a branch, Eli, we need another broom."

Before brooms, as we think of them, were plentiful, people living in the country made their own. Sweeping dirt floors of a nineteenth-century cabin required a light touch with a makeshift broom of tree branches, sections of a huckleberry bush, or even corn husks attached to a stick. But it served the purpose until a "real" one could be made or purchased at the general store.

Historians would probably agree broomcorn is of Southern origin, with South Carolina's being responsible for sorghum as a broom-making material. This species was cultivated as early as 1791. Later on, harvesting broomcorn shifted to the Midwest, to Ohio and Kansas. A business in Kansas rented land in north Texas and hired hands to cultivate the crops. Economically, Texas seemed better for growing corn because labor was cheaper.

When broomcorn is young, the plants resemble fodder or food corn, but not when they mature. The head of the stalk has a brush end with little seeds over the top. When dry, the seeds are shaken off. Blades on the corn are not as broad, and as many as twenty single brush strips can lead out from each stem.

As young men, my grandfather Jim Shults and his brother George, began making brooms to supplement their income of the early 1890s. The entire family learned how brooms were made, but the labor was left to Jim and George. Choosing strong saplings for handles was the first step toward making good brooms. They needed cutting the proper length, then the work began.

Earlier, leather strips were used for tying, but the Shults brothers tightly wrapped the handle with wire, then tied on each strip of corn whisk until they completed three layers. Jim tied one end of the wire on a small tree limb, for an anchor, while holding the broom across his lap as he turned its handle. That way, one man could do the work of two.

The whisks were then tied further down so they would remain attached, and not fall out with vigorous sweeping. Flat brooms were popular because they covered more space while in use than round ones. A flat broom took more work and more corn, but it also brought more money.

Thinking the Texas Panhandle was the necessary arid region for growing crops, the brothers and their wives moved to Hulver County in 1893. Even though they enjoyed a successful broom-making business in Somervell County, they would not know until a season later if the grass was greener in the Panhandle.

On November 13, 1893, Grandmother Anna Hawkins Shults, Jim's wife, wrote home, "The men made a dugout for the broom machine. They got the shed boxed up for drying the corn, but it isn't covered yet. Jim thinks his allergy is from the corn dust. He puts a bandana over his face while he works. I hope no one mistakes him for a bank robber."

They could afford the machine which would make their efforts easier, but the bulk of work was still done by hand. The men usually wore gloves to trim and bind, but not for stitching. Blisters had to turn into callouses.

Often when a couple started their new household, or when members of a church gave a donation party, a broom was sure to be a present from some well-wisher. It became the symbol of good housekeeping. A model young housewife needed to know how to use one properly, and soon learned it didn't really take a *new* broom to sweep clean.

  2. Try to leave a one inch margin on the top and sides and 1 1/2 inches on the bottom.
  3. Type, print, or write legibly. Dark black ink copies the best.
  4. If an item is larger than 8 1/2 x 11, and you are unable to reduce it, then send it as is to the editor to reduce.
  5. Your submission may be written as a letter to the members, the editor, an article with title and author, a question or an answer to the members, or copies of documents, maps, etc.
  6. If you are sending copyrighted material, please give the title, author, publisher, copyright date, and page. If it is not copyrighted, please cite the source so that credit may still be given.
  7. If you want your submissions returned, please provide return postage.
  8. If you send family group sheets, number each sheet in the order that it is to be interpreted. This is extremely important especially if it is used in our publication, but also for my indexed files.
  9. Put your name on *every* page you send.
  10. Please put the date on your letters as well as on the material you submit. It is helpful if you use an inside address on your letters. I file your letters but not the envelopes in my notebooks.
  11. If you are a new member, we hope you will send a family group sheet or pedigree chart.
  12. We urge our members to send queries. You may do this once a year, and they can be in "standard" form or in letter form. It may be helpful to print it again since we have new members all the time.
